Drayton Valley, Alberta - On the afternoon of June 30, 2018 an arrest warrant was issued for Paul Bosek (54) of Brazeau

County for the murder of 56 vear old Michelle Marcino of Brazeau County. Bosek and Marcino were in a common-law relationship. An autopsy for Marcino is scheduled at the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner on July 4, 2018.

Just prior to 6:00 p.m. on June 30, 2018 RCMP located the vehicle driven by Bosek on Lodgepole Road outside Drayton Valley.

In celebration of National AccessAbility Week, Employment and Social Development Canada has launched the call for expressions of interest for youth leaders across Canada, who will

work with eligible organizations to submit project proposals under EAF's Youth Innovation Component. "This opportunity gives young

volunteers a chance to make a difference and directly address accessibility issues in their communities," stated MP Eglinski.

Youth interested in participating are required to identify accessibility barriers in public places or workplaces within their immediate and/or surrounding communities, and seek out interested organizations willing to work with them to develop an EAF accessibility project funding proposal worth up to \$10,000. Eligible organizations include: not-for-profit organizations, small businesses (up to 99 full-time employees), small municipalities (population under 125,000), Indigenous organizations, and territorial governments.

The call for expressions of interest will support approximately 125 youth-driven projects aimed at increasing accessibility in community facilities and workplaces across Canada.

"This is an incredible opportunity for young people to gain significant experience in public service and project management, while making meaningful changes in their communities for persons with disabilities and accessibility issues. I encourage our local youth to consider applying to this funding program," concluded MP Eglinski.

After the vehicle was located the male suspect was found deceased in his vehicle by a self-inflicted wound. RCMP are not seeking any further suspects in this occurrence. This incident remains under investigation.

AGENCIES WORK TOGETHER TO ARREST PROLIFIC OFFENDER

On July 23, 2018 at approximately 9:30 pm, Drayton Valley RCMP were on patrol when they received a tip of a wanted male on a stolen side by side. The tipster provided information on the direction of travel and approximate speed. The side by side entered a bush area where it became stuck, the male fled on foot through the bush.

Members contacted the RCMP



Police Dog Service and devised a plan to contain the area. Oilfield agency security also assisted with the containment. Upon arrival of the Police Dog Service they began tracking the suspect through deep brush crossing over an area of the North Saskatchewan River through thigh high water, up steep inclines and then back through the water again for a distance of approximately 3 and a half kilometres.

The suspect, 27 year old James Roblin was subsequently arrested for outstanding warrants from Banff and Drayton Valley. Additional Charges include Possession of Stolen Property over \$5000, Break and Enter, Hit and Run to escape, Breach of Recognizance x 3, Possession of a weapon for dangerous purpose.

The cooperation of all parties involved was instrumental in bringing this event to a safe and successful conclusion.

PEMBINA CRISIS CONNECTION SOCIETY (PCCS) AND THE WORK THAT WE DO TO CREATE A SAFE AND HEALTHY COMMUNITY FOR AL

History

In December of 1989, Drayton Valley was struck with a murder/suicide tragedy. This tragedy focused renewed interested and concern on the problems of family violence facing this community. The group realized that all aspects of violence, including suicide, needed to be addressed.

The Pembina Crisis Connection Society was established in April 1990 to bring prevention into focus. A telethon scheduled in May 1991 brought the Society to front page headlines when over \$25,000.00 was pledged in six hours! The community support was overwhelming and PCCS was able to achieve its goal of accessing the Distress Line - a 24 Hour crisis line, in Edmonton on July 1, 1991.

Prevention is key

Children who grow up in homes where there is domestic violence are more likely to die by suicide, more likely to abuse drugs or alcohol and more likely to end up in the criminal justice system. There are very real human costs as well as heavy economic and societal costs to allowing violence to continue in a communi-

"The impact of Childhood Domestic Violence can be lifelong in terms of physical and mental health problems, such as anxiety, depression, and traumatic stress, difficulty in relationships with others, academic and employment failures, and trouble parenting." - Dr. Sandra A. GRAIN FARMERS NEED TO BE PREPARED FOR AUGUST 1 WHEAT RECLASSIFICATION

Saskatoon (June 4, 2018) – The Saskatchewan Wheat Development Commission (Sask Wheat), the Alberta Wheat Commission (AWC) and the Manitoba Wheat and Barley Growers Association (MWBGA) are asking Prairie grain farmers to be prepared for the upcoming reclassification of 29 wheat varieties.

On August 1, 2018, 25 varieties of wheat currently classified as Canada Western Red Spring (CWRS) and four varieties currently classified as Canada Prairie Spring Red (CPSR) will be reclassified into the Canada Northern Hard Red (CNHR) class.

"We want farmers to have a plan to market any remaining wheat that is transitioning to a new class on August 1," says Sask Wheat Chair Laura Reiter. "It is important farmers know what they have in their bins and that they communicate with their local elevator or buyers soon to make sure they are able to maximize the return on these varieties."

In February 2015, the Canadian Grain Commission (CGC) announced the Canadian wheat class modernization process. The process was undertaken to maintain the quality, enhance the consistency and support the marketability of Canadian wheat. In December 2015, the CGC announced the creation of the CNHR and Canada Western Special Purpose wheat classes.

Many producers have been preparing over the last two years by transitioning to varieties not designated for reclassification. However, according to the CGC's 2017 Grain Varieties by Acreage Insured Report, 491,108 acres of wheat varieties which are designated for the CNHR class on August 1, including Harvest, Lillian and Unity, were still grown in Western Canada in 2017.

"The CGC is not allowing any grace period for producers after the July 31st deadline," said Kevin Bender, AWC Chair. "We therefore think it's important that farmers negotiate the best possible terms for the varieties being reclassified and be aware that grain companies will have until December 31, 2018 to ship any remaining stocks from the system as CWRS and CPSR."

Producers who have a contracted delivery date after August 1 for a transitioning variety should contact their elevator or grain buyer as soon as possible to ensure their grain will be accepted as CWRS or CPSR. Wheat varieties classified as CNHR are expected to sell at a discount to the CWRS and CPSR classes.

"The MWBGA is happy to partner with our fellow wheat organizations in communicating to Western Canadian producers the importance of making a transition plan," says Fred Greig, MWBGA Chair. "Maintaining the quality of the CWRS class is important to Canada's reputation and will benefit farmers. While the reclassified varieties are still registered and can be grown, we strongly recommend that farmers arrange their marketing options for these varieties prior to future plantings."

CANADA SUPPORTING UKRAINE'S ECONOMIC SECURITY

OTTAWA - As a member of the Canada-Ukraine Parliamentary Friendship Group (CUF-PG), Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, was pleased to learn that Canada will continue to support Ukraine's economic security.

The announcement was made this week by the Honourable Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister

of International Development, in Kyiv during a joint press conference with Ukraine's First Deputy Prime Minister, Stepan Kubiv.

The announcement launched a \$30-million call for preliminary proposals for innovative projects that will enhance the economic security of rural women, especially those affected by the conflict in the eastern part of the country. The projects will also help to create a more competitive, innovative and sustainable

environment for small and medium-sized enterprises, as well as increase employment and entrepreneurship opportunities for women and for vulnerable and marginalized groups.

The preliminary call for pro-posals is entitled "Growth that works for everyone-Inclusive and shared prosperity in Ukraine." The deadline to submit proposals is October 24, 2018.

Since the previous Conserva-

tive Government initiated support in January 2014, Canada has committed more than \$750 million in multifaceted support to Ukraine, encompassing a broad range of financial, development, stabilization and security, non-lethal military and humanitarian assistance.

"The defence of Ukraine's sovereignty and territorial integrity should continue to be a priority for Canada's government on the international stage," concluded MP Eglinski.

CHANGES TO CANADA STUDENT LOANS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents of recent changes to Canada Student Loans that will take effect in Fall 2018.

A new Skills Boost grants program has been announced. The \$287.2-million three-year pilot project will offer a \$1,600-peryear federal student grant for adults who have been out of school for more than ten years.

In addition, a person's eligibility for a Canada student grant will be based on their current year of earnings, rather than their previous year of earnings. This change is intended to better reflect the financial need of individuals, especially if they have experienced a reduction in hours or been laid off.

There have also been complimentary changes to the employment insurance (EI) program to support those wanting to return to school.

ALBERTA RCMP, EDMONTON POLICE SERVICE, LAY CHARGES FOLLOWING SERIES OF BREAK-INS IN CENTRAL ALBERTA

Police arrested four individuals in connection with 18 incidents that took place in Edmonton, Strathcona County, Spruce Grove and Fort Saskatchewan over a two-month period. The group is alleged to have stolen over \$125,000 in cash and goods and caused nearly \$50,000 in property damage.

It was clear members of the crime group were experienced. They moved carefully and operated at all hours to try and avoid police detection. To take them down, a coordinated strategy and additional resources were needed.

A task force under the Intelligence Sharing and Action Program was activated in order to pool resources. Through this collaborative model, Alberta RCMP, Edmonton Police Service and other agencies are able to quickly mount large investigations normally outside the range of single detachments.

"This is true collaborative and intelligence-led policing. We were faced with an issue that impacted multiple jurisdictions and, together, developed and executed a strategy to meaningfully respond." - Superintendent Peter Tewfik, Officer in Charge of Crime Reduction, Alberta RCMP

Through a coordinated effort, and with the support of a High Altitude Surveillance Plane that helped guide surveillance on the ground, the task force was able to gather the evidence required to execute search warrants on four residences and locate and arrest four individuals. Police recovered, among other items, jewellery, a wall mounted safe and a signed Nugent-Hopkins Edmonton Oilers jersey as well as other memorabilia.

"Criminals never pay attention to boundaries on a map when they're conducting their illicit activities nor should police when responding to them. This joint operation between EPS and the RCMP is a prime example of that." - Deputy Chief Brian Simpson, Edmonton Police Service

Brian James Hunt, 49, Nathan Michael Tucker, 32, Ashley Nathaniel Yardley, 33, and Ibrahim Mohamed Elkayal, 32, are facing a total of 38 charges related to Breaking and Entering including one charge each for Conspiracy to Commit Breaking and Entering.

"Thank you to the RCMP and Edmonton Police Service on finding and arresting these criminals. These crimes not only cost business owners time and money but affect our customers and the surrounding com-

CONSULTATION – AIR PASSENGER BILL OF RIGHTS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing residents that the Canadian Transportation Agency (CTA) has announced the launch of public consultations on air passenger protection regulations.

Under new provisions of the

Canada Transportation Act, which were added by the recently-passed, Transportation Modernization Act, the agency is charged with drafting a bill of rights for air travelers.

"This consultation will help develop regulations for the minimum standards of treatment and minimum levels of compensation, including how best to deal with tarmac delays, bumped seats and lost luggage," state MP Eglinski.

Canadians can give their input on these regulations by:

• attending one of eight in-person or online sessions across the country,

• filling in a questionnaire, or

• Reading the discussion paper and providing a written submission.

The CTA will also conduct surveys with air travelers at select airports across Canada.

The consultation process will continue until August 28, 2018. Once it concludes, all the input received will be considered and the new regulations will be drafted. The regulations will require approval from both the CTA and the Governor in Council to come into force.

"When this Bill was going through the legislative process, I received several emails concerning this issue. Therefore, I encourage all those interested in air passenger protection to participate in this consultation," concluded MP Eglinski.

Recipients of EI are required to be ready and available for work as a condition of receiving the funds, and enrolling in a program of study used to put an individual's EI claim at risk. With the new changes, recipients of EI will now remain eligible if they enroll in an educational program.

"Due to recent layoffs of coal miners in our riding, I am hopeful that these changes will benefit many in Yellowhead. I encourage anyone interested in pursuing a new career, or brushing up on their current skills, to ensure they take full advantage of the Skills Boost grant program," concluded MP Eglinski.
