RCMP MAJOR CRIMES UNIT NORTH INVESTIGATING A HOMICIDE BAND FIRS

UPDATE #2

Paul Band First Nation, Alberta - Two people have been charged in the homicide of 31-year-old Ellie Mae House of the Paul Band First Nation.

On August 17, 2018, after an extensive search consisting of resources from RCMP Emergency Response Team North, Eastern Alberta District Crime Reduction Team, RCMP Police Dog Services, RCMP Cold Lake Detachment, and RCMP Bonnyville Detachment, two suspects were located at a residence on

the Cold Lake First Nations, and were arrested in relation to the investigation.

Nora Flora Papin (31) of Paul Band First Nation is charged with second degree murder and has been remanded into custody. Papin is due in Stony Plain Provincial Court on August 22, 2018

Neil Benjamin Morin (33) of Paul Band First Nation is charged with second degree murder and has been remanded into custody. Morin is due in Stony Plain Provincial Court on August 22, 2018.


As this matter is now before the courts, no further information will be provided. BACKGROUND:

Paul Band First Nation, Alberta The RCMP Major Crimes Unit along with Stony Plain RCMP continue to investigate the death of a 31-year-old female of the Paul Band First Nation.

The investigation began August 14, 2018 at 7:38 a.m., when Stony Plain RCMP responded to the Paul Band First Nation in relation to a death at a residence. Evidence obtained at the scene led the Major Crimes Unit -North to become engaged in the investigation.

On August 15, 2018 an autopsy was conducted at the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner in Edmonton. The autopsy revealed that the manner of death

was homicide as a result of a gun shot wound.

The RCMP have determined that this was an isolated, and purposeful incident. There is no indication that the general public is at risk

Suspects in this homicide were observed to have fled in a black Ford truck, 4-door cab with black 5-spoke split rims, black grill and black tint on all windows. It is believed that the suspects are in the city of Edmonton.

PEMBINA PIPELINES HELPS FUND YCFD CADETS

MAYERTHORPE RCMP INVESTIGATE PLANE CRASH

Plane wreckage has been located in a wooded area after Search & Rescue technicians located the scene from the air earlier this afternoon.

On August 16, 2018 at approximately 4:30 p.m., Mayerthorpe RCMP were notified of the wreckage in rural Lac Ste. Anne County. The aircraft sustained extensive damage and a body was discovered at scene.

Transport Canada is investigating. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner is engaged.

The investigation is preliminary in nature and the identity of the aircraft nor the identity of the deceased has been confirmed at this time.

An update will be provided when new information comes available. New information is not anticipated before Friday, August 17, 2018.

After a struggle, the woman was able to get to a neighbour's house and call the police.

THIBERT was released from custody with conditions and will appear in Stony Plain Provincial Court on September 5, 2018.

WARRANT INITIATIVE

As part of their crime reduction initiative, Stony Plain/Spruce Grove/Enoch Detachment members are actively seeking those individuals that are wanted on outstanding warrants. "In the past months, our members have executed in excess of 100 warrants of arrest. These were individuals within our detachment area that were wanted on charges from our detachment as well as other jurisdictions within the Province of Alberta" states Sergeant Major Kevin McGillivray. If you believe you have an outstanding warrant, police are asking that you attend your closest police detachment with photo identification to turn yourself in. "Over the coming months, we will continue to track down people that are in Spruce Grove, Stony Plain, Enoch and Parkland County" Sergeant Major Kevin McGillivray advises. Police will be attempting to contact wanted individuals at their residence, at their workplace, by telephone or anywhere else they may be located. Phone calls are not to be confused with various scams that are currently taking place. The local detachment will be contacting wanted individuals by phone and

asking that they attend the detachment with photo identification so that they can speak with a police officer in person.

If you believe you may have a warrant for unpaid fines, you may attend your local police detachment or the nearest Alberta Provincial Court House with your photo identification to pay the fine. "Pro-actively taking care of your warrants will prevent you from being disrupted from your workplace, going out to dinner with your family or anything else you may be doing" says Sergeant Major McGillivray.

of an individual that has an outstanding warrant, please contact the Stony Plain RCMP at (780) 968-7200. If you wish to remain anonymous, you can contact crime stoppers by phone at 1-800-222-8477, by internet at www.tipsubmit.com, or by SMS (www.crimestoppers.ab.ca for instructions). While the police officer will not be able to confirm or discuss the particulars of the warrant with the caller, they will investigate to determine if there is in fact an outstanding warrant and will use the information to assist in locating the individual.

On the 31st of July 2018, RCMP at the Edmonton International Airport were alerted to a suspicious suitcase that was heading to St. John's NFLD. Police searched the suitcase and located 2 kgs of hashish, 8 pounds of marijuana and a large quantity of pills that include fentanyl, oxycodine, morphine as well as a number of other controlled

drugs.

"This represents a significant seizure of illegal drugs and will ensure that these drugs won't make it to the streets of St. John's" says Sergeant Beth Philipp, EIA RCMP Detachment Commander.



9 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR GOLF GAME

Warmer weather sends scores of golfers to their favorite courses each and every day. Golf is a challenging pastime, but a few pointers can help golfers hone their short games, long games and everything in between.

• Choose the right clubs. There is

more to selecting clubs than pulling any old iron out of your golf bag and whacking away. Wind, hazards and obstructions in landing areas should influence your decision of which club to use. Novice golfers may want to rely on their caddies to make club recommendations, and as they become more confident in their abilities they can start to make their own choices.

• Anchor your feet. Anchor your foot behind the ball to drive the ball further. Right-handed players will keep the right foot anchored, and lefties will do the opposite. Do not lift your foot prematurely; otherwise, you can lose power and distance.

• Identify your weaknesses. As with any hobby, identifying those areas that need the most work can help you become a better golfer.

9 Ways To Improve Your Golf Game

and then look at the results to see which areas of your game need the most work.

• Fix your alignment. Align your shots by assessing the target from behind the ball. Then set the clubface behind the golf ball and align it with the target before you enter your stance.

• Use your torso for power. The torso is essential to a solid swing. Practice rotating from your core to control your backswing and then maintain the same spine angle and posture on the downswing.

• Use the wind. Not every golf game will be played in perfect weather. A good player knows how to make adjustments for the wind depending on the shot. Use the wind to your advantage when you can, and adjust your swing when hitting into the wind.

• Become a better chipper. Many players put so much emphasis on their backswings and putt shots that they fail to devote any practice to chips. All shots are important for golfers trying to shed strokes off of their scores. • Keep fit. Maintaining or improving your physical strength and overall health can help your golf

game. Exercise and eat right, and you will have more endurance on the links.

SCOUTING CANOLA FIELDS FOR CLUBROOT

With fall approaching it is time once again to remember that clubroot has been detected in Yellowhead County. Clubroot is a soilborne disease that reduces yields of cruciferous crops such as canola, mustards and some vegetables. The disease causes galls or clubs to form on the root systems of infected plants which then restricts the nutrient and water uptake of the plants reducing the yields of crops. The higher rate of the infection of clubroot in the soil, the more severe the yield loss in the crop will be.

Yellowhead County Pest In-spectors will be scouting for this disease in canola and other Brassicaceae fields throughout Yellowhead County from approximately August 28th - September 30th. Scouts will be taking all possible preventative measures to limit the spread of the disease.

The primary way this disease spreads is by soil movement from

infected fields to non-infected fields. This may be done by soil falling off of farm machinery, vehicles, and off-highway vehicles. It may also be spread by wind and water erosion. Êquipment sanitation is essential to preventing the establishment of clubroot.

Rotation of crops is highly recommended to prevent the severity of clubroot in ones fields. Continuous cropping of canola may increase the likelihood and severity of infection. There are no treatments currently available for clubroot infected fields/plants so prevention practices are highly recommended. Some things you can do to prevent the establishment of clubroot as:

· Check fields regularly and look for abnormalities such as galls and/or clubs on roots, premature ripening and/or wilting plants

· Sanitize machinery, vehicles and equipment before moving into a new area with a solution of 1% bleach and 99% water

· Use clubroot resistant varieties of seed for planting

In 2015 a new clubroot patho-

type was confirmed in the Edmonton region that is able to overcome resistant varieties of seed. Dr. Stephen Strelkov at the University of Alberta looked at samples collected from several fields and was able to verify higher levels of infection than expected in some clubroot resistant varieties. "This is a different pathotype that none of the commercially available clubroot resistant varieties in Western Canada are effective at managing," says Strelkov.

The Canola Council of Canada has advised that canola growers and agronomists scout their clubroot resistant varieties this summer with extra effort and vigilance. A focused survey in the Edmonton region has been underway to help better understand the pathogen's prevalence and distribution.





As Albertans we have grave concerns with the direction of our current leadership at both the Provincial and the Federal levels. Our roots from a political standpoint have remained Conservative so when the UCP was formed, we joined. 
