### **CONSULTATION –** TAXATION OF CANNABIS

Submitted by Jim Eglinski, MP - Yellowhead

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched a consultation on a set of technical draft regulatory and legislative proposals under the Excise Act, 2001 that would provide for the additional excise duty rates for each province or territory that has signed a CCTA with the Government of Canada. These

rates would come into effect when cannabis for non-medical purposes becomes available for legal retail sale.

In keeping with the agreement reached by Finance Ministers, under the CCTAs, revenues from the excise duties on cannabis products will be shared on the following basis: 75 per cent to provincial and territorial governments, and 25 per cent to the federal government. Provinces and territories will work with municipalities according to shared responsibilities towards

legalization.

In addition, federal revenues from the excise duty on cannabis will be capped at \$100 million per year for the 24 months that follow the legalization of non-medical cannabis. Excess federal revenues over the \$100 million cap will be provided to provinces and territories that have concluded a CCTA with the federal government.

The Victims Restitution and Compensation Payment Act allows authorities to seize cash and property used in or obtained through criminal activity. This process of civil forfeiture makes crime unprofitable and deprives


offenders of the money and tools necessary to commit further illegal acts. The Civil Forfeiture Grant program then redirects the forfeited cash and the proceeds from the sale of forfeited property towards programs that reduce crime and assist victims of crime.

"The Civil Forfeiture Grants are an effective way to deter criminal activity while making communities across Alberta safer. These funds help organizations maintain their existing programs and extend their reach to improve the lives of even more Albertans." - Kathleen Ganley, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

Funding this year will go to proposals with innovative, promising or proven practices, with a focus on:

- services that directly prevent at-risk youth from becoming involved in criminal activity, and/or
- crime-prevention planning initiatives, such as coordination plans to deter rural crime

- exemptions for certain entities to allow the possession of cannabis products stamped for multiple jurisdictions, under certain conditions;
- the ability for third

parties to possess cannabis excise stamps for specific purposes; and

• exemptions from the proposed excise duty for certain cannabis-based products that are not intended for human consumption.

A total of \$2.5 million in Civil Forfeiture Grants is available this year. Eligible organizations include non-profit agencies, schools, municipal governments, Metis Settlements and First Nations communities. Grants between \$50,000 and \$200,000 are

available, with projects spanning up to two years.

The list of 2017 grant recipients includes Boyle Street Community Services in Edmonton, the Grande Prairie and Area Big Brothers Big Sisters Association, the Miywasin Friendship Centre in Medicine Hat and Alcove Addiction Recovery for Women in Calgary.

More than \$9 million in Civil Forfeiture Grants have been awarded since 2008.

Potential candidates for Civil Forfeiture Grants are encouraged to download the online application form.

The deadline for submissions is noon Oct. 12, 2018.

# CONSULTATION – POLITICAL ACTIVITIES OF CHARITIES

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched a 30-day public consultation period on draft legislative proposals to remove the quantitative limits on political

activities from the Income Tax Act.

Under these draft legislative proposals, charities would still be required to be constituted and operated for exclusively charitable purposes, meaning they cannot have a political purpose, and restrictions against partisan political activities would remain.

The draft legislative proposals

would apply retroactively to related audits and objections that are currently suspended. As announced on August 15, 2018, the Canada Revenue Agency will soon issue supporting administrative guidance for consultation with the charitable sector on how it would implement the legislative proposals released today. Canadians are invited to provide

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# EALT SECURES OLD GROWTH FOREST WEST OF EDMONTON

PARKLAND COUNTY AND EDMONTON, AB | September 21, 2018 – The Edmonton and Area Land Trust (EALT) is proud to announce it has secured 100 acres of old growth forest just west of Edmonton, in Parkland County.

This is the 11th conservation area secured by EALT in this, their 10th Anniversary Year.

The Land

This natural area is located a few kilometres west of Edmonton and a short distance from the North Saskatchewan River, and is adjacent to many other conserved natural areas. It is almost entirely undisturbed old growth forest and native understory shrubs, with patches of conifers nestled inside the mixed woods, and some of the spruce trees are around 100 years old, according to the Northern Forestry Centre of Resources Canada.

The land is within one of Parkland County's Ecologically Significant Areas, and is adjacent to other protected areas with contiguous habitat, so it forms part of an important conservation corridor. There are several dugouts on the property, which have enriched the habitat even further. It provides excellent habitat for wetland and upland birds, mammals and other wildlife. Such wildlife include: moose, deer, great blue heron, great horned owl, Cooper's hawks, ruffed grouse, yellow bellied sapsucker, muskrat, and several songbirds including red-eyed vireos, purple martins and blackcapped chickadees.

The land is part of a geologically significant post-glacial dune field, and has permeable sandy surface soils, so is part of a sensitive groundwater recharge area, which is important to Parkland County.

Conservation Easement

The landowner wanted to preserve the land's conservation values. So they did this by working with EALT to place a protective notation (a Conservation Easement) on Provincial Title. This restricts future activities which they knew would damage the native habitat, such as subdivision, development, logging, or drainage.

The EALT will now be monitoring the land in perpetuity, to uphold the conservation values, and to ensure that future owners don't engage in prohibited activities. Thus the Conservation Easement helps conserve and sustain Alberta's important biodiversity.


"Conserving this land is important, as Edmonton's region is one of the fastest-growing areas

This special landscape is part of the half percent of Alberta left in native aspen parkland. And besides being important in its own right, with trees over 100 years old and habitat for a large variety of wildlife, it's also part of a series of protected areas which form an important conservation corridor".

About: The Edmonton and Area Land Trust is the only non-profit conservancy to focus entirely on conserving natural areas in and around the City of Edmonton. EALT has conserved 2,170 acres in 11 conservation lands over the last decade, and is working to secure more.

The Government of Alberta created the Alberta Land Trust Grant program which assisted with this securement.




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

### DESIGN A MORE FUNCTIONAL PANTRY

Many homeowners wish they had more storage space, and kitchens are one area where people seemingly can always use more storage.

Despite a desire for more kitchen space, until recently, kitchen

pantries fell out of favor. Builders and architects may have thought that close proximity to supermarkets as well as multi-use cabinets in kitchens would offset the need for pantries. But according to a recent survey from the National Association of Home Builders, a kitchen pantry is the most desirable kitchen feature for buyers in the market for a new home.

According to a 2016 survey from ReportLinker, 98 percent of Americans say cooking at home is their preferred way to prepare a meal. And despite the wide array of restaurants, prepared meals and fast food options nearby, more than one-third of people cook at home daily, with nearly 50 percent cooking between three and six days a week.

In order to accommodate for spending more time in the kitchen, homeowners are directing additional attention to kitchen preparation and storage features. In fact, one recent trend in kitchen renovations is creating custom-designed pantries.

Locate the appropriate space Ideally, pantries should be in or adjacent to the kitchen. But not every home layout allows for this setup. Some homeowners need to move storage pantries into the garage, the basement or a mud/laundry room.

Various factors should be considered before placing a pantry outside a kitchen. What is the climate? Will food spoil? Is there a possibility that vermin or insects can infiltrate the room and access food? These factors will dictate whether to have closed cabinets, air-tight bins or open shelves or if other modifications must be made to the room prior to building

Choose the type of pantry

Accessibility is essential in a pantry. Everything should be

easily reached and grabbed as needed without having to move too many things. Ideally, foods should be arranged in a single layer so that all items can be viewed at a glance. Shelves of various depths and heights can accommodate items of different sizes. Adjustable shelves are ideal because they can be modified as foods change. Sliding drawers can improve reach in cabinets.

In smaller spaces, French doorstyle reach-in cabinets are convenient and flexible. In complete kitchen remodels or new constructions, walk-in pantries offer the most space and flexibility.

Must-have features

Pantries serve different functions in different homes. For the bulk shopper, a pantry with plenty of room for large items will be needed.

### WHAT TO DO WHEN A PROJECT STALLS

# MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR HOME IMPROVEMENT DOLLARS

Home improvement projects provide homeowners with a chance to put their own stamp on their homes. In addition, many such projects make homes safer and, in some instances, more eco-friendly.

The opportunity to make a home more comfortable, safer and/or more

eco-friendly entices many homeowners to open their wallets. In fact, the Home Improvement Research Institute estimates that the home improvement products market will grow by more than 5 percent in 2018.

For example, the home improvement resource This Old House® notes that homeowners willing to do their own demolition before the contractors arrive can save substantial amounts of money. A professional contractor may charge \$1,000 to demo a 200-square-foot deck, but This Old House estimates that homeowners who demo their own decks may spend only \$450 (for the dumpster rental and parking permit).

• Hire a consultant. The DIY movement is incredibly popular, no doubt thanks to television channels such as HGTV and the DIY Network. Homeowners with DIY experience may be able to complete projects on their own with little consultation from professional contractors. Some contractors may not offer consulting services, however. The consultation route, which typically requires paying licensed contractors hourly fees to offer guidance, should only be considered by homeowners with legitimate DIY skills, for whom this option can be a great way to save money.

• Schedule renovations during homeowner-friendly times of year. Summer and fall tend to be contractors' busy seasons, and homeowners will likely pay more for projects during this time of year. If possible, delay starting projects until right after the new year, when contractors aren't so busy and might be more flexible with pricing.

### MAKE FLOORS SHINE LIKE NEW

Flooring should last for years. The online home improvement resource HomeAdvisor estimates that the average cost of a flooring project ranges from \$357 for vinyl or linoleum flooring to \$4,240 for wood flooring. Homeowners investing in new flooring do not want to replace floors too frequently, and keeping floors looking like new takes effort and maintenance.

Sweep and clean

Restoring shine to flooring involves making sure the floor is clean. Dirt and grime can diminish the color and look of flooring. Homeowners are urged to use products designed for their particular flooring material, such as wood, laminate, stone, or vinyl. Products oftentimes are not interchangeable.

Begin by thoroughly sweeping or vacuuming the floor. Clean along all surfaces of the floor, including under furniture where dust and dirt tends to accumulate. Use the hardfloor setting on a vacuum to avoid having the brush rolls scratch or damage the flooring. Laminate can scratch easily and hardwood flooring is not impervious to dings and scratches. Quite often a dry mop or a static-charged mopping cloth effectively picks up debris left behind on many flooring surfaces.

Although many commercial cleaners can clean flooring, home-made mopping solutions are sometimes just as effective. Keep in mind that wood, laminate and vinyl should not be soaked in water. A little liquid can go a long way on these surfaces. Water and other liquids can seep between laminate and wood boards, potentially contributing to swelling and damage over time. Also, resist the urge to use too much soap. Soap can leave behind a residue that dulls the finish of the floor.

Vinegar-based solutions can work well on a wide variety of flooring types and help cut through any sticky residue left behind from cooking, cleaning and the activities of daily life. Many wood-flooring cleaners and polishes are oil-based to condition the wood in the process. Whenever making one's own solution, test a small amount in an inconspicuous spot to make sure it will not damage the flooring.

Protection

Another way to prolong the life of flooring is to protect it from wear and tear. Removing shoes before walking indoors can help. Avoid high heels and athletic cleats, which can create divots in hardwood and some other types of flooring.

Place indoor and outdoor mats at the entrances of the home to catch any dirt that would be ground into the flooring. Furniture protectors will help prevent scratches from furniture feet while moving pieces around a room. Remember to wipe up spills when they occur to prevent the formation of stains.

These steps can keep floors in top form and prevent premature aging or damage. Floors that are in especially bad shape may need professional restoration or replace-

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

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
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
