RCMP ARREST MALE FOR ASSAULT WITH WEAPON

On October 1st, 2018 Mayerthorpe RCMP responded to an assault with a weapon and dangerous driving complaint at a private residence.

It is alleged that an adult male used his vehicle to repeatedly ram into another vehicle containing two adult female occupants. The male then used his vehicle to block the driveway, not allowing the other damaged vehicle to depart. The two females sought shelter inside the residence, and the male departed in an unknown direction of travel prior to Police arrival.

The male was located a short distance from the residence, and a traffic stop was conducted. The male was arrested without incident and is facing numerous Criminal Code offences.

Neither female victim in this matter sustained injury. Their vehicle suffered significant damage from the event.



In addition, the Association offers young people the opportunity of continuing their education through scholarships. In order to be a member of High School Rodeo, a student must have a signed form from the school's principal stating that they are a student in good standing, worthy to represent the school.

Three talented OJSH students are actively involved in Alberta's High School Rodeo Association. Bailey Bartel will be graduating OJSH this year; she has been an active competitor in High School Rodeo for two years. Bailey says she was 'born into it' and she loves the adrenaline rush of competition. Her two horses, Blink and Sully,

are her best and most-loved friends and they help her earn points on the circuit in pole bending, barrels, breakaway roping, team roping and goat tying.

This accomplished young rider was looking to increase her points until a collarbone injury sidelined her for a few weeks this fall and she will miss four rodeo competitions. Bailey hopes to catch up on her points in the spring when the rodeo season heats up - even though the weather is often cold and snowy at the beginning.

Madysen "Maddy" Johnson is also in Grade 12, graduating this year from OJSH. Maddie's specialty in High School Rodeo is breakaway roping although she also competes in barrels and poles.

She has been in two rodeos this fall and already has placed in the top ten. Her goal is to gain enough points to qualify for provincials at Ponoka in early summer and then go for nationals in Wyoming. She has not ruled out a career in pro rodeo after she graduates in June. Her enthusiasm and talent will take her far.

Colby Stark is on the Junior High School Rodeo circuit. Colby is in Grade 8 this year at OJSH and has already made a name for himself in the rodeo world. Colby is a mini bronc rider. Saddle bronc is his favourite event but he also enjoys bare back and steer riding. He enjoys calf roping and team roping as well. He has experienced rodeos from a young age as his parents used to rodeo and they have passed the love of the sport onto him. Colby says he loves the adrenaline rush that the sport gives him.

WHITECOURT TOWN **COUNCIL UPDATE**

Whitecourt Town Council thanks all of those that provided input on the 2019 Budget at last night's Public Input Session and through written submissions. Your feedback will be reviewed by Town Council during budget deliberations which begin next week. Early in 2019, Council will be hosting its annual Budget Open House which will provide ratepayers with further opportunity to share comments and learn about the budget. Watch for further details on the open house in the new vear.

Council is recruiting for public appointments to Council Committees. Share your voice and help shape our community by applying to serve on a Council Committee. Information on public appointment vacancies can be found on our website at www.whitecourt.

Council has approved a new ATCO Gas and Pipelines Ltd. Franchise fee rate for 2019 effective January 1, 2019. The new rate has been approved at 23.26%, which equates to an average annual increase to residents on their gas bill of \$13.24. Every year Council has the opportunity to review the franchise fee charged for the delivery of gas to town residents.

Sagitawah RV Park has been approved for a five-year exemption to the Park operating season allowing the Park to operate year round from October 16, 2018 to May 14, 2024.

Whitecourt Town Council is hosting its annual Appreciation Reception for Council Committee Members on October 17. This event provides Council and Administration the opportunity to thank members of the public that volunteer their time and share their knowledge on Council Committees.

Council approved a street clo-

sure request by the Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce for Friday, November 30 to accommodate the annual Christmas Parade. Reminders on the street closures will be posted to motorists and residents closer to the event date.

Permission has been granted to Eastlink Park to access funds from the capital reserve that was established by the municipality while Eastlink Park was being developed. The \$32,000 requested will be used to fund pump and hill repairs, snow cat repairs, and to purchase an additional snow gun.





Proposed Bylaw 2018-19 Parkland County and Lac Ste. Anne County Intermunicipal Development Plan

An Intermunicipal Development Plan (IDP) is a statutory document prepared with two (or more) municipalities that share a common border, and where at least one member is not a part of a growth management region. An IDP ensures future development and land use policy are coordinated between municipalities. Parkland County and Lac Ste. Anne County, under the direction of Section 631 of the Modernized Municipal Government Act, have agreed to jointly engage in an IDP. This plan has been developed to reduce the possibility of any potential conflicts between Counties and to ensure the relationship remains strong, transparent and collaborative in the future.


Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. Written submissions or presentations may either be submitted to Planning & Development by 4:00 P.M. on October 16, 2018, or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing.


Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation to Council must notify Planning & Development Services by 4:00 P.M., on October 16, 2018. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.



Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

1. Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire by half.

2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.

3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children. 4. Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.

5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.

6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires. 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.

8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.

9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.





October 9, 2018 AS FIRE PREVENTION WEEK APPROACHES, ONOWAY REGIONAL FIRE SERVICE ENCOURAGES RESIDENTS TO "LOOK. LISTEN. LEARN." WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

Home fires today can burn faster than ever. Occupants may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time wisely takes planning and practice.

Onoway Regional Fire Service is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) – the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years – to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign: Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere. The campaign works to educate the public about basic, but essential ways to quickly and safely escape a home fire.

Data from Statistics Canada shows that the number of struc-

ture fires have declined by 26 per cent between 2005 and 2014. However, residential fires consistently accounted for roughly six of every 10 structural fires during that period. According to StatsCan, cooking equipment and smokers' material caused approximately six of every 10 residential fires.

"These numbers show that while we've made significant progress in teaching people how to prevent fires from happening, there's still much more work to do in terms of educating the public about how to protect themselves in the event of one," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "This is particularly critical given the increased speed at which today's home fires grow and spread."

Carli notes that home is the place people are at greatest

risk for fire, but home is the place people feel safest. That over-confidence contributes to complacency toward home-escape planning and practice.

"Working in the fire service for many years, we know that people often make choices in fire situations that jeopardize their safety or even cost them their lives," said David Ives, Fire Chief of Onoway Regional Fire Service. "We need to do a better job of teaching people about the potentially life-saving difference escape planning and practice can make and motivating them to action."

Fire Chief David Ives, says this year's "Look. Listen. Learn." campaign highlights three steps people can take to help quickly and safely escape a fire:

• Look for places fire could start.

• Listen for the sound of the

smoke alarm


• Learn two ways out of every room.

While NFPA and Onoway Regional Fire Services are focusing on home fires, these messages apply to virtually any location.

"Situational awareness is a skill people need to use wherever they go," said Ives. "No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately."


