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### CONSULTATION – POLITICAL ACTIVITIES OF CHARITIES

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform residents that the Department of Finance has launched a 30-day public consultation period on draft legislative proposals to remove the quantitative limits on political activities from the Income Tax Act.

Under these draft legislative proposals, charities would still be required to be constituted and operated for exclusively charitable purposes, meaning they cannot have a political purpose, and restrictions against partisan political activities would remain.

The draft legislative proposals would apply retroactively to related audits and objections that are currently suspended. As announced on August 15, 2018, the Canada Revenue Agency will soon issue supporting administrative guidance for consultation with the charitable sector on how it would implement the legislative

proposals released today.

#### CHANGES TO PARENTAL BENEFITS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that the Government of Canada has announced that Employment and Social Development Canada intends to launch the new parental sharing benefit on March 17, 2019.


This new measure will provide

an additional five weeks of Employment Insurance (EI) parental benefits when parents agree to share parental benefits, or an additional eight weeks for those who choose the extended parental benefit option. Parents with children born or placed for adoption on or after March 17, 2019, will be eligible.

As women make 85 percent of all parental claims and take lon-

ger leaves from the workplace, the EI parental sharing measure allows pregnant workers and their families to consider their personal, health and workplace circumstances when choosing when to begin their maternity leave.

### Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit Recover Stolen Camaros

Information led the CRU to Hinton, where a stolen 30-foot recreational vehicle being used by the two was located and recovered. It was determined that two Camaros were stolen from a residence in Hinton, allegedly by the targeted individuals. The CRU determined that the individuals fled to Westlock in the Camaros.

On August 31, the Westlock RCMP received a complaint that a local Ford dealership was the victim of the theft of a Dodge pickup truck. Information was obtained that the male suspect responsible was dropped off by a female accomplice driving a yellow Camaro.

On September 1, the Westlock RCMP received information that both the stolen truck and suspect Camaro were at a gas station. The truck and the Camaro both fled from the gas station after purposefully ramming two responding police vehicles. A brief pursuit was initiated by responding Westlock RCMP and then terminated.

The Central Alberta District CRU were positioned in West-lock already as a result of determining that their targeted subjects had travelled to West-lock. With the timely CRU response, a tire deflation device

was deployed and the Camaro went into the ditch to avoid the device. Police Dog Services attended and successfully tracked the female driver. She was arrested and transported to the hospital with minor injuries. It was determined that this was the same Camaro which had been stolen earlier out of Hinton.

At 7:30 p.m. that evening, Central Alberta District CRU located the male suspect. He was in proximity of a stolen Ford F350. With the assistance of RCMP Air Services, and Police Dog Services, the CRU effected his arrest and seized the stolen Ford F350 along with multiple other stolen items, including a large quantity of tools from an earlier break and enter.

On September 2, the CRU, in conjunction with Leduc RCMP GIS located and seized the second yellow Camaro in Wabamun. In total, two Camaros, one Ford F350 and one recreational vehicle were all recovered by the CRU.

The Westlock RCMP later recovered the stolen Dodge Truck.

At the time of their arrests, 21-year-old Annette Brown and 28-year-old Eric Michael Unger, both of Red Deer, were wanted on a combined total of six warrants out of a combination of different detachments, including Leduc, Red Deer and Blackfalds. Investigation into

several other unrelated incidents remains ongoing.


In relation to the Westlock incident, Eric Unger is facing the following 20 charges:


- Break and enter with intent
- Fail to comply with a condition of an undertaking or recognizance (x8)
- Operation of a motor vehicle while being pursued by police
- Dangerous operation of a motor vehicle
- Resist police officer
- Possession of property obtained by crime over \$5,000 (x2)
- Possession of property obtained by crime under \$5,000 (3)
- 3 charges under the Traffic Safety Act

Annette Brown is facing 17 new criminal charges as a result of this incident including break and enter and commit theft, fail to comply with a condition of a Recognizance (x7), dangerous operation of a motor vehicle, et al.

Both Unger and Brown were remanded in custody and were scheduled to appear in court in Westlock on September 4, 2018.

"The Central Alberta District CRU is a mobile unit which means that offenders who wreak havoc in one jurisdiction can't hide in a different jurisdiction. We will effectively utilize intelligence to track offenders" says Corporal Will Hiscock of the Crime Reduction Unit. "It takes a unified response amongst different units and detachments to effect arrests like these."







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# OLDER ADULTS AT GREATER RISK OF BEING KILLED OR INJURED DUE TO FIRE

Research has shown older adults (65 years and up) are at a greater risk of being injured or killed due to smoke and/or fire and Leduc Fire Services wants to help.

"At Leduc Fire, we believe 'an ounce of prevention is worth a

pound of cure," says Deputy Fire Chief Gerry Kelly. "The fire safe steps you take now could make a world of different to help shield loved ones from injury or saving a life."

According to a study completed in December 2017 by the University of the Fraser Valley and Murdock University, fire-related deaths are much higher for older adults, 1.6 times for

65 – 79-year-old and 2.4 times for those 80 years and over. The causes for many of these fires include:

- 46 per cent of residential fire fatalities involving people 65 and over were due to careless and inappropriate discarding of smoking materials
- 38 per cent of fire deaths involving older adults involve the improper use of space

heaters

• Ignition of clothing, bed linens and upholstered furniture also contribute a significant number of house fire deaths among older adults

To be more fire safe, Kelly and the crew at Leduc Fire offers a few helpful tips that can be applied to all households in Leduc:

- Ask smokers to go outdoors and use a safe container to use when they butt out.
- Refrain from smoking if you or a loved one uses medical oxygen. Keep oxygen cylinders at least five feet from any heat source, open flame or electrical devices.
- When using space heaters, leave plenty of room in and around the unit recommending at least three feet. Turn them off and unplug them from the wall when you leave your home or when going to bed.
- Be kitchen wise when cooking, by using oven mitts, wear tight-fitting or short sleeve shirts, refrain from cooking if you feel drowsy, and never leave cooking unattended.
- Have working smoke alarms and test them monthly.
- Have a fire escape plan and practice the plan with everyone in your home.
- Post and memorize local emergency numbers, such as 911

"The importance of being fire safe includes all members of a community and in some cases, a greater emphasis is required for many older adults and seniors to ensure they know what to do and what not to do when faced with a fire emergency," says Kelly.



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# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 17, 2018

It was a busy first week back in Ottawa.

The following was debated in the House:

- Bill S-228 Child Health Protection Act (Third Reading)
- Bill C-79 Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership Implementation Act (Second Reading)
- Bill C-375 An Act to amend the Criminal Code (presentence report) (Report Stage)
- Bill C-81 Accessible Canada Act (Second Reading)
- Bill C-376 Sikh Heritage Month Act (Second Reading)
- Bill C-71 An Act to amend certain Acts and Regulations in relation to firearms (Third Reading)
- Bill C-77 An Act to amend the National Defence Act

and to make related and consequential amendments to other Acts (Second Reading)

- Bill S-245 Trans Mountain Pipeline Project Act (Second Reading)
- M-163 Women, Peace and Security Ambassador

On Tuesday, I presented two petitions. The first requested that the government revise the definition of "eligible resident" in the National Parks Act so that those who do not work in Park communities, such as Jasper, can remain a resident if they demonstrate a strong connection to the community. The second requested that the government act to prevent Canadians from travelling abroad to receive illegally trafficked human organs.

On Friday, I gave a statement in the House to recognize my friend and Yellowhead constituent, Ray Gideon, who recently passed away at age 85.

In the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU), we met with a delegation from Norway, as well as received a briefing on cybersecurity for an upcoming study. As I have been newly appointed to SECU, I will be busy over the weekend reviewing material and preparing for my new role. For

This week, I attended ten meetings and five events. I will remain in Ottawa over the weekend as the House will continue to sit next week. Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.

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Follow these fire safety tips, and review them with other members of your household, to protect yourself, your property, your community and your loved ones.

#### PREPARE

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, as well as inside and outside every sleeping area.

Test smoke alarms monthly, and replace the batteries if needed.

Purchase and learn how to safely use a fire extinguisher.

Create a fire escape plan with your family, reviewing and practicing it twice a year.

Your fire escape plan should include two exit points from every room, as well as a designated outdoor meeting spot.

Make sure everyone in your family knows when and how to call 911 or the fire department.

#### PREVENT

Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Keep matches and lighters out of reach from children, and make sure they know never to play with these items.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

#### STAY ALIVE

In the event of a fire, yell "Fire" repeatedly and evacuate immediately. Once outside, call 911 and never reenter a burning building for any reason.

If a door or door handle feels warm to the touch, do not open it. Use an alternate escape route.

If you must walk through smoke, get as close to the ground as possible to escape under the smoke, closing doors behind you.

If your clothing catches fire, always remember to stop, drop and roll, covering your face with your hands.

If you can't escape a room, close the door and cover vents and door cracks with a towel or cloth to keep out smoke. Signal for help at the window with a piece of cloth or a flashlight.

### Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family and your property against fire hazards.

- Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.
- 2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.
- 3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children.
- Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.
- 5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.
- 6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires.
- 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.
- 8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.
- 9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.

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

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
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# RCMP SEEK INFORMATION TO LOCATE WANTED MALE

## GRANTS FOR CRIME REDUCTION PROGRAMS AVAILABLE

Organizations can now apply for Government of Alberta grants that support local crime-prevention initiatives.

The Victims Restitution and Compensation Payment Act allows authorities to seize cash and property used in or obtained through criminal activity. This process of civil forfeiture makes crime unprofitable and deprives offenders of the money and tools necessary to commit further illegal acts. The Civil Forfeiture Grant program then redirects the forfeited cash and the proceeds from the sale of forfeited property towards programs that reduce crime and assist victims of crime.

"The Civil Forfeiture Grants are an effective way to deter criminal activity while making communities across Alberta safer. These funds help organizations maintain their existing programs and extend their reach to improve the lives of even more Albertans." - Kathleen Ganley, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

Funding this year will go to pro-

posals with innovative, promising or proven practices, with a focus on:

• services that directly prevent atrisk youth from becoming involved in criminal activity, and/or

• crime-prevention planning initiatives, such as coordination plans to deter rural crime

A total of \$2.5 million in Civil Forfeiture Grants is available this year. Eligible organizations include non-profit agencies, schools, municipal governments, Metis Settlements and First Nations communities. Grants between \$50,000 and \$200,000 are available, with projects spanning up to two years.

The list of 2017 grant recipients includes Boyle Street Community Services in Edmonton, the Grande Prairie and Area Big Brothers Big Sisters Association, the Miywasin Friendship Centre in Medicine Hat and Alcove Addiction Recovery for Women in Calgary.

More than \$9 million in Civil Forfeiture Grants have been awarded since 2008.

Potential candidates for Civil Forfeiture Grants are encouraged to download the online application form.



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

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# PARLIAMENT UPDATE – WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 24, 2018

On Monday, I participated in debate on the concurrence of a report by the Standing Committee on Natural Resources entitled, "The future of Canada's oil and gas sector." In my speech and questions, I defended our riding's oil and gas workers and urged the government to act in order to ensure the construction of the Trans Mountain Pipeline, which will run directly through Yellowhead.

I also had the opportunity to ask questions during the debate on our Conservative Party's motion, which called on the Minister of Veterans Affairs to revoke the benefits that have been extended to Chris Garnier, who is a convicted murderer and has never served in the Canadian Armed Forces. In the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU), we had a briefing on the mandate letter of Bill Blair, Minister of Border Security and Organized Crime Reduction. On Thursday, I sat on the Standing Joint Committee for the Scrutiny of Regulations (REGS) where they are reviewing statutory instruments, and later I sat on the Standing Committee on Natural Resources (RNNR) where they have begun a study on forests pests, including the Mountain Pine Beetle. I will be following this study closely as it continues.

This week, I attended 10 meetings, three events, and recorded a radio message. I will travel to the riding over the weekend to attend two events. Look for my update next Friday on the happenings of Parliament.

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




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
