CAD CRU RECOVER OVER \$50,000 OF STOLEN PROPERTY

Submitted by RCMP Central Alberta District Crime Reduction Unit (CAD CRU)

Leduc, Alberta – The RCMP Central Alberta District CRU team continue to assist detachments and pursue arrests, charges and recover stolen property. Four people have been charged following an investigation which saw the CAD CRU team collaborating with Leduc RCMP CRU and Drug Sections to solve investigations.

On October 25, the CAD CRU team received intelligence from

Leduc RCMP relating to a rural commercial break and enter which occurred in the early morning of October 24. The CAD CRU team were able to link information from the break and enter investigation to independent arrests that they made on October 25, relating to a stolen vehicle.

The CAD CRU had arrested two males in a stolen truck and observed a generator in the back of the truck. After liaising with Leduc RCMP CRU and Drug Sections, a search warrant was obtained and executed at a

residence on Songhurst Place in Leduc on October 26. The search warrant resulted in the seizure of a second stolen generator, tools, car parts, evidence of false identification production, a stolen Polaris Sportsman ATV and seismic recording equipment.

The total value of the property recovered is believed to be well over \$50,000,00.

Two individuals were arrested inside the residence and two outside on the property, all without incident.





TAMPERED HALLOWEEN CANDY INCIDENT

On Halloween night Devon RCMP were alerted to an incident where pins were found in children's candy.

At 9:12 p.m., the RCMP received a complaint from a Devon citizen that when children came home from trick-or-treating, the alert child checking the candy found a pin in three different treats. Two were candies; a marshmallow based candy and Starburst, and one was a deflated bag of Cheezies. It is believed that likely those three different treats were all disbursed from the same house.

The pins were described as straight pins with a curved top.

The RCMP have seized the candy and are investigating this incident. No other incidents were reported to the Devon RCMP and parents are requested to check all their children's treats. It has not been determined which home or neighbourhood the candies came from.

"It's lucky that the child in this incident had the awareness to check

the candies prior to them being consumed", says Sergeant Jolene Nason, Devon RCMP Detachment Commander. "This is a very alarming occurrence but we want to assure our Devon citizens that this is the anomaly in our community and we are working to solve this. The safety of our community is an RCMP priority."



HOW TO SAFEGUARD YOUR VEHICLE FROM THE ELEMENTS

In a perfect world, all vehicle owners would be able to park their cars and trucks in garages. In such a world, automobiles would not be vulnerable to sun. storms and other natural elements that, over time, can contribute to wear and tear.

But many drivers cannot or choose not to park their cars in garages. Some are content to let their vehicles brave the elements, while others look for ways to protect their cars and trucks as much as possible. Drivers who count themselves among the latter group can take

these simple steps to protect their cars and trucks from whatever Mother Nature has in store for them

• Park in the shade. Parking in the shade can protect both the interior and exterior of a vehicle. Shaded areas protect upholstery and dashboards inside the car from sun-induced fading, while also limiting the damage sun can cause to exterior paint. Faded paint may hurt the resale value of a vehicle, prompting prospective buyers to walk away or at least wonder if a vehicle with a faded exterior was well maintained.

- · Wash and wax. Washing and waxing a vehicle helps to minimize damage that's inevitable regardless of where drivers park their cars. Dirt and debris litter roadways, and over time cars can collect a large amount of these unwanted stowaways. If dirt and debris are not removed, they can cause long-term damage to vehicle exteriors. Washing and waxing a car can ensure its exterior looks good and reduce the likelihood of rust and other corrosion from occurring.
- · Don't write off bird droppings. Some drivers, especially those who do not park their cars and trucks in garages, may write off bird droppings as an annoying yet harmless side effect of vehicle ownership. However, bird droppings are acidic and, if left to their unsightly devices,

can cause permanent damage to vehicle paint. Tree sap is an equally formidable foe, potentially causing scratching because it can be very difficult to remove without spreading. Specially formulated sprays can help drivers remove bird droppings and sap from their vehicles.

• Employ a car cover. Drivers who have garages but use them to store things other than their vehicles can use car covers when parking their cars in their driveways. Covers protect cars from the elements and can be quickly and easily removed.

Nature can be harsh on vehicles. Protecting automobiles from the elements should be a priority for drivers, especially those who do not park their cars and trucks in garages.





Vehicle identification number etching, or "VIN etching," is a theft deterrent in which an automobile's VIN, a 17-character

code consisting of letters and numbers unique to each vehicle, is etched onto the vehicle's windows. Some manufacturers may etch the VIN onto the windows of all of their vehicles, while others may not. Dealerships may charge VIN etching fees to buyers of new vehicles, but buyers should always consult their insurance companies before agreeing to pay such fees. Some insurance providers do not discount premiums for vehicles with VIN etching, while others might. Drivers may not want to pay VIN etching fees if their insurance providers will not discount their premiums, so it pays to consult with providers before purchasing a new vehicle. In addition, drivers who want to save money on etching fees but still do all they can to deter prospective car thieves may want to purchase their own VIN etching kits, which typically cost

around \$20.

It is important to find a trusted mechanic who will fix a problem for a reasonable price. Repair Pal is an app that has already culled quotes and reviews from nearby mechanics to simplify comparison shopping.

Navigation made easy

Smartphones already feature built-in map apps that offer navigation and directions, such as those offered by Google and Apple. But Waze is a community-driven app that provides real-time updates to traffic situations, gas prices, law enforcement sightings, and alternative routes to avoid delays.

Enter Honk, an app that can mark your vehicle's location with a GPS pin. 


