"This afternoon Leduc Fire

Services and the RCMP responded to an industrial work-place incident in the Leduc Business Park where three individuals tragically lost their lives. On behalf of Leduc City Council and administration, I want to express our deepest condolences to the co-workers and families affected by this tragic incident.

We stand with those impacted and hold you in our thoughts and prayers. We understand that this situation is contained to the site and there are no risks to the general public. This matter is under investigation by Alberta Occupational Health & Safety and the RCMP and any further details will be released by them."

CALL FOR EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST FOR LOW-RISE WOOD BUILDINGS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform local residents that Natural Resources Canada has announced a call for Expressions of Interest for low-rise non-residential wood buildings.

Natural Resources Canada will spend \$39.8 million over the next four years on the implementation of a new national mass timber program, Green Construction Through Wood (GCWood), designed to encourage the use of wood as a building material. This program advances the ambitious goals set out in the Canadian Council of Forest Ministers' Forest Bioeconomy Framework, which aims to make Canada a global leader in the emerging bioeconomy.

GCWood provides non-repayable contributions of up to 100% of a project's eligible incremental costs for the demonstration of innovative mass timber products and systems. The funding is intended to offset the cost of being the "first mover" of

wood-intensive projects, and to support the development of knowledge and tools to support the success of future projects.

The focus is on low-rise non-residential buildings (1-4 storeys) in the following categories:


- Commercial/Industrial (e.g., retail, warehouse, box-type)
- Office/Institutional (e.g. office building, school, health facilities).

Not-for-profit and for-profit organizations validly incorporated or registered in Canada are eligible to apply. Projects must demonstrate an innovative technical solution, and represent a significant advancement in wood construction.

The deadline is December 3, 2018.



LEDUC COUNTY SELECTED FOR CPWA NATIONAL PUBLIC WORKS WEEK AWARD

Leduc County, AB, has received an award from the Canadian Public Works Association (CPWA) as part of CPWA's 2018 National Public Works Week (NPWW) Awards Contest. Leduc County's 2018 NPWW celebration competed for the award with other Canadian municipalities entering the contest for the first time.

The 2018 NPWW award was presented by Patty Podoborozny, CPWA Board Member from Alberta, during Leduc's October 23, 2018 Council Meeting at 1:30 PM in Council Chambers, 1101 – 5 Street, Nisku, AB. Accepting the award for Leduc will be Des Mryglod, Director of Public Works and Engineering.

National Public Works Week annually recognizes the tens of thousands of men and women in North America who provide and maintain the infrastructure and services collectively known as public works. In May of each year, municipalities throughout the U.S. and Canada celebrate NPWW with open houses, project and facility tours, parades, education, media events, school visits, and career events. Municipalities also use the week to recognize their staff – the women and men who play such an important role in their community's quality of life.

"National Public Works Week is a great way to increase public awareness about the critical role that public works plays in the provision of important services to our cities and towns," said Ms. Podoborozny. "Leduc County's celebration of public works, from multiple open houses and a career fair to hosting students for a field trip, engaged residents in learning more about the services that public works provides and how central these services are to our communities."

"Our entire public works team worked incredibly hard during National Public Works Week," said Mr. Mryglod. "We wanted to highlight the ways public works is involved in our communities and also wanted to highlight the multitude of careers available in the public works industry. I want to thank everyone who participated in our Public Works Week events. We received a lot of positive feedback and we plan on celebrating National Public Works Week in a big way each year."

Residents who attended Leduc County's two public open houses – one at each of Leduc County's Public Works shops – had the opportunity to check out equipment, test out a grader simulator and speak with staff members about a variety of department services and operations, including acceptable waste and recyclables, fleet and maintenance activities, road bans, winter operations, frost boils, culvert thawing and spring statistics, and dust suppression.

In addition to the public open houses and an all-staff open house, Leduc County hosted a field trip for 151 elementary school children. The students participated in experiments with water; had the opportunity to tour, climb on and paint equipment; learned what various crews do in different seasons, such as snow clearing in the winter and dust suppression in the spring; and had a souvenir photo taken in a hard hat and vest while holding a stop sign. Council members also attended the student field trip, as well as both open houses.

The NPWW Awards Contest evaluators credited Leduc County for hosting a public works career fair at New Sarepta High School. Public Works and Engineering staff, as well as several council members, outlined possible careers in public works for the students. A senior engineer spoke about road work, a manager of operations discussed the various responsibilities and tasks of road crews, and a utilities technician talked about water services and treatment. Students were also invited to learn more about several pieces of equipment that the staff brought to display.







BLUE-GREEN ALGAE BLOOM ADVISORIES LIFTED PROVINCEWIDE

Recent weather has cooled lake and reservoir water temperatures to such an extent that blue-green algae is no longer a health concern, including in 2 water bodies in Edmonton Zone and in 17 water bodies in North Zone, which had previously been placed under blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom advisories.
