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## RCMP SHARES TIPS FOR SAFE CANNABIS CONSUMPTION

Serious accidents can easily happen when you drive while impaired by a drug, regardless of the quantity or the purpose of using it. The Alberta RCMP would like to remind the public that getting behind the wheel while impaired by drugs is not only dangerous, it's against the law.

"Cannabis affects everyone differently," says Constable Mike Hibbs, "K" Division Media Relations. "There is no safe limit for drivers who are recreational cannabis users or medicinal users since everyone has a different body tolerance for drugs."

Drug-impaired driving laws apply to all drivers, including those with a medical authorization for cannabis. The new law is consistent with the Criminal Code's long-standing drug-impaired driving offence which has never exempted drivers who drive impaired by prescription drugs.

Different drugs act on your brain in different ways, but almost all affect your attention, judgment, reaction time, decision-making skills and more. If you choose to use cannabis, choose not to drive.

Here's what you need to know to keep roads and public spaces safe for everyone:

- Cannabis consumption is banned in vehicles. Provincial laws have established a number of consequences when cannabis is consumed in a vehicle, including fines and other administrative penalties to discourage and reduce the incidents of impaired driving.
- Keep cannabis out of reach. When cannabis is in a car, it must be secured in closed packaging and not within reach of any occupants.
- Prescription drugs can impair a person's ability to safely con-

trol a moving vehicle. When taking prescription drugs, it is vital to follow doctors' orders against operating any machinery, for a certain time after taking them. Talk with your doctor about the effects of your prescriptions and how they can react with other substances.

• Know your local rules before consuming. Albertans are allowed to consume cannabis in their homes and in some public spaces. Municipalities have the power to create additional restrictions on public use.

When motorists follow safe driving practices, such as planning ahead and arranging a designated driver, the risk of being involved in a collision resulting in death and injury are significantly lower. The Alberta RCMP will continue to positively impact the safety of those travelling on roads through public education and strategic enforcement plans.

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### SECURITY BREACH AT AIRPORT

Update - Charges Sworn

Following an incident that occurred on November 22 at the airport and resulted in an arrest in Sylvan Lake, charges have been laid.

EIA RCMP in collaboration with Sylvan Lake RCMP and the Forensic Identification Section conducted an investigation into the breach and determined appropriate charges.

27-year-old Joshua Michael Ulan of Mundare is facing charges of mischief (x), danger-

ous operation of a motor vehicle and fail to stop at the scene of an accident under the Criminal Code and endangering the safety or security of an aircraft under the Aeronautics Act.

Ulan has been released, on conditions, to attend court in Leduc on January 3, 2019.

The RCMP will not be providing any speculation as to the reason for this occurrence but can assure the public that this was not a planned, targeted event. This matter is now before the courts and further information will not be provided.

BACKGROUND:

Edmonton International Airport, Alberta – The RCMP have one male in custody following an incident that occurred early afternoon on November 22, 2018 where an SUV breached a perimeter fence and accessed areas of the airport.

Shortly after noon, the RCMP were dispatched as well as EIA Security. The vehicle had departed the airport and was last seen heading west on Highway 19 at the time of the dispatch. Surrounding RCMP detachments were immediately noti-

fied and requested to patrol for the suspect vehicle.

The RCMP in Sylvan Lake located the suspect vehicle and arrested the male driver without incident. One 27-year-old male is in police custody and facing charges. The RCMP can offer no comment as to the motivation behind this incident.

Edmonton International Airport operations were not affected by this incident beyond fencing being damaged.

The incident remains under investigation.

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### HEALTH, SAFETY RULES IN FORCE ON FARMS AND RANCHES

Farm and ranch workers now have similar health and safety requirements as workers in other industries and other provinces.

On Dec. 1, the Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) Code will apply to farms and ranches that employ waged, non-family workers. The code contains technical health and safety rules and now includes new rules specifically for farms and ranches.

"Our government has the backs of working people and we value the contributions of Alberta's farm and ranch communities. We have worked collaboratively with farmers, ranchers and workers to make changes that ensure workers in Alberta benefit from the same protections as workers in other provinces." - Christina Gray, Minister of Labour

"All workers have a right to return home safely each day. I am confident the new rules will ensure farm and ranch workers are better protected, just like their peers in other provinces. I want to thank Alberta producers for their hard work and for helping find the right balance." - Oneil Carlier, Minister of Agriculture and Forestry

The new rules were created through extensive consultation with industry stakeholders during the past two years. The rules reflect the need to protect health and safety while preserving the unique way of life on farms and ranches.

Alberta farmers and ranchers created AgSafe Alberta, an industry-led, non-government health and safety association. AgSafe has developed program-

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ming and additional resources to help farmers and ranchers implement the new rules.

Healthier, safer farms and ranches

By comparing data from 2017 to 2016 – the first year health and safety rules applied to the sector – the overall injury rate decreased 21 per cent and the serious injury rate decreased 23 per cent.

Quick facts

- About 4,100 farms and ranches in Alberta employ waged, non-family workers.
- Family members and volunteers are exempt from the OHS rules. Neighbours can still provide support to neighbours and kids can still do chores on the farm as they have always done.
  - Eligible producers can

apply for grants to help offset the costs of implementing the new rules. Up to \$6 million is available during the next three years through the Farm Health and Safety Producer Grant program.

• OHS officers are currently visiting farms and ranches to respond to complaints or investigate serious incidents or fatalities.



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# MAN CHARGED WITH SEXUAL ASSAULT; POLICE SEEK ADDITIONAL COMPLAINANTS

MRU #: 18R124 - The Edmonton Police Service has charged Vincent Noseworthy, 39, in connection to a sexual assault and believes there may be additional complainants.

On Sunday, Oct. 14, 2018, an adult female reported to police that she had been sexually assaulted by a male, identified as Vincent Nose-

worthy, on Tuesday, Aug. 14, 2018.

The female reportedly met Noseworthy, who she became acquainted with through Tinder, for a date. The two then drove to a rural location outside of Edmonton in the female's vehicle where Noseworthy allegedly confined her and violently sexually and physically assaulted her.

Noseworthy was arrested on Wednesday, Oct. 31, 2018 and has been charged with aggravated sex-

ual assault, sexual assault, choking with the intent to overcome resistance, assault and unlawful confinement. He has since been released on conditions.

Noseworthy is active on online dating websites and may use the name "Vinnie Worth." As a result, investigators believe there may be additional complainants and are concerned that he may commit another offence against someone while



in the community.

In the interest of public safety, police are releasing a photo of Noseworthy and are encouraging any additional complainants to come forward.

## CITY OF EDMONTON'S ANNEXATION APPLICATION APPROVED

The Government of Alberta, by way of an Order in Council signed Nov. 27, approved the City of Edmonton's annexation of land from Leduc County.

Effective Jan. 1, 2019, 8,260 hect-

ares (20,402 acres) of Leduc County land will become part of the City of Edmonton.

"The Government of Alberta's decision reflects the agreement we reached with the City of Edmonton in 2017, after years of collaborative discussion. The decision to support the annexation application demonstrates the importance and value

of regional collaboration." - Tanni Doblanko, mayor

The City of Edmonton issued a notice of intent to annex land from Leduc County on March 5, 2013, and an agreement was reached between the city and county on June 30, 2017.

The Order in Council supported the conditions outlined in the agree-

ment, including providing a 50-year property tax protection provision in the annexation area, meaning properties will be assessed and taxed at the lowest of either the City of Edmonton's or Leduc County's tax rate for a 50-year period, unless specific landowner-initiated development occurs.

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## LET THERE BE LIGHT: BUS STOPS ILLUMINATED TO IMPROVE VISIBILITY

### - Solar-powered lights installed at 14 of Leduc Transit's bus stops

Leduc Transit is investing in rider safety by installing solar-powered lights at 14 bus stops with limited lighting. Support for the initiative is provided by the Government of Canada, contributing \$12,500 to this project through the Public Transit Infrastructure Fund (PTIF), and by the Government of Alberta, contributing \$6,250 through Green TRIP.

"The Government of Canada is committed to investing in green infrastructure that helps communities find sustainable solutions to local needs," said the Honourable François-Philippe Champagne, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities. "These new solar-powered lights will increase visibility to improve passenger safety while also saving energy costs, a win-win for everyone in Leduc."

Installation currently focuses on Route 2 in the west end of Leduc. Bus stop locations were chosen for lighting through consultation with bus drivers, who based their selection on current lighting conditions and consistent rider use. The intent is to keep riders visible to bus drivers and traffic during early morning and night times when lighting is usually poor.

"We are pleased to support the installation of cost-effective, environmentally-friendly solar powered bus stop lights in the Leduc area," said the Honourable Brian Mason, Minister of Alberta Transportation. "This investment will improve safety and visibility for riders."

In addition to improving visibility and safety, the lights are also dark sky friendly. Once it's dark, riders can activate the LED lights on demand by pushing a button. When active, the lights stay on for roughly five minutes, shinning directly onto the bus stop below and minimizing light pollution cast into the night sky.

"It is important to Leduc County council to offer public transportation options to our residents, workers and visitors. Alongside the City of Leduc, we are proud to champion innovation with the installation of solar lights that help improve visibility and safety for our valued customers," says Leduc County mayor Tanni Doblanko.

"The addition of these lights helps to fulfill Leduc city council's mandate to balance growth and development with respect for our natural surroundings," says City of Leduc mayor Bob Young. "Through partnership with Leduc County and with contributions from the Government of Canada and the Government of Alberta, we are able to improve the experience for Leduc Transit riders while being mindful of the environment."

Although other transit properties across Alberta have begun installing solar-powered technology, Leduc Transit is among the first to install solar bus stop lights.

Further, the decision reflects the agreement that the City of Edmonton provide Leduc County with a one-time payment of \$3.2 million and 10 annual payments of \$530,000 in compensation.



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


