Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing constituents that Transport Minister Marc Garneau has issued strict new regulations for the use of drones in Canada, from banning drunk droning, to banning drones from flying in airspace near emergency scenes and airports.

Drone operators will now have to register their drones and pass an online test to receive certification to continue operating them. These new changes apply to drones between 250 grams and 25 kilograms that are operated within the pilot's sight, regardless of whether the drones are being used recreationally or for work.

Among the new rules:

•You can't pilot a drone while under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or within 12 hours of consuming alcohol;

RONE OPERATORS

•You must be over 14 years of age to apply for basic registered ownership and pass a test to become a certified pilot;

•Drones cannot fly higher than 122 metres above ground level, or 30 metres above a building or structure;

•Special certification is needed if you want to transport weapons or explosives;

•You can't transport living creatures on your drone; and

•Unless a certified first responder, drones cannot fly over or near an emergency scene.

The new regulations come with fines between \$1,000 and \$3,000 for individuals but can rise much higher for corporations or anyone deliberately breaking the rules. Violators who deliberately fly near an aircraft's flight path could be subject to fines of up to \$25,000 and even jail time depending on the severity of the offence.

It will cost \$5 to register a drone, and the pilot exam for basic operations costs \$10, while the test for advanced drone operations is \$25.

The new rules around drone operations that exist now will continue to apply until these new provisions come into effect on June 1st of this year.

"Remember: Drones are an object in our air space. Flying one means you are a pilot, whether you operate one for fun, work or research," concluded MP Eglinski.

# MONTHLY UPDATE OF THE GROWTH ALBERTA BOARD

The following report provides a brief overview of the Board meeting of the Grizzly Regional Economic Alliance Society held November 26, 2018.

Membership Pricing

There was a discussion surrounding annual membership fees and the potential of welcoming a new Municipal member in 2019, this facilitated the development of placing a nine-thousand-dollar cap on registration fees.

The membership fee structure has historically been tied to value propositions for larger members. A reduced fee would exemplify GROWTH Alberta's commitment to ensuring value is more fiscally tangible. This membership cap will promote a more affordable attraction model for larger communities.

Fostering Collaboration

AUMA BLANKET EXER-CISE The Blanket Exercise Initiative is a partnership between AUMA and RMA to provide municipal governments an opportunity to increase their understanding of Indigenous history in Canada. AUMA and RMA are seeking applications from municipalities that are interested. GROWTH Alberta board members have moved to partner with one another to host a Blanket Exercise and invite Woodlands County to be the host municipality.

COMMUNITY FUTURES YELLOWHEAD EAST PART-NERSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Community Futures and GROWTH Alberta will partner on

a business diversification/retention/expansion project through the CARES project.

TOWN OF BARRHEAD BRANDING PROGRAM

GROWTH Alberta and WILD Alberta have agreed to send a letter of support for the Town of Barrhead branding program.

Tourism Development REGIONAL HISTORY PROJ- ECT

WILD Alberta is looking at undertaking a 3 Phase project that would seek to leverage our rich regional history into experiences specific to the area. These experiences would entail weaving that history into story-telling during events, tours and other deliveries. GRIZZLY TRAIL UPDATE

The Grizzly Trail brand has been in use for several decades and has the advantage of being an established brand. An opportunity exists to re-imagine and relaunch this brand in the region.

Digital Connectivity

GROWTH Alberta is discussing opportunities with Brian Crest, the new telecom division lead at ATCO, to have GROWTH Alberta communities become pilots for a broadband project. ATCO is hoping to piolet 15 communities before March 2019. NEXT MEETING



Spruce Grove, AB - The Young Novelists are a Toronto-based band fronted by husband and wife Graydon James and Laura Spink. Since 2009 they have played stages across the U.S. and Canada, released four full-length albums, won numerous awards, and received continuous praise for their unmatched, effortless harmonies. With a sound that has been compared to everyone from The Band to 'pre-weirdness' Wilco, their personal mission is to create sad songs for happy people - whether that means nostalgic ballads or upbeat anthems. The Young Novelists' ability to tell familiar stories with a modern folk edge make them, and their songs, instant classics. The Young Novelists are touring Alberta in January 2019 and will be performing at Horizon Stage on Friday, January 25 at 7:30 p.m.

When they first met, Graydon and Laura had no idea that they would be married one day - much less touring the world together. They both grew up in Ontario; Laura in Peterborough and James in Verona, a small eastern town with a population of a mere 1,800. They both moved to Waterloo for university, where they met via community theatre: but it wasn't until James decided to refocus his career from drummer to front man that they combined their talents musically. After recruiting some musicians, and touring the east coast as a sixpiece, the band became Graydon James & The Young Novelists. Between 2011 and 2012, they released two albums: live at dublin st. church and in the year you were born. However, it soon became clear that Laura was taking on more lead vocal duties. By the time they recorded their 2015 album, made us strangers, it made the most sense to simply shorten their name to The Young Novelists. Happily, made us strangers, landed them a Canadian Folk Music Award for New/Emerging Artist, a nomination for Vocal Group of the Year, and reached top 20 on both !earshot and Stingray Music folk charts.

2016 was a huge year for The Young Novelists - Laura quit her job as a scientist, they packed their things (and their five year old son Simon), and went on a massive North American tour. After over 100 shows, including a 10-week stint on the road, they pair returned to Toronto to start working on their next album and draw inspiration from their travels. They recorded their 2018 album, in city & country, with the help of JUNO-winning producer Howard Bilerman (Arcade Fire, Leonard Cohen, The Wooden Sky). Recorded at Bilerman's Hotel2Tango studios in Montreal, the duo returned to their classic him-and-her vocals, with James playing acoustic guitar and Laura on percussion and vibraphone.

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the signing of the armistice in 1911, the Royal Canadian Legion Dominion Command wanted "Bells of Peace" to ring 100 times at sunset (local time) in as many Canadian communities as possible. This would replicate what happened across Europe in 1918.

When I talked with members of St. John the Divine Anglican Church in Onoway, they were very interested. The seed had been planted, but then I was told that the bell at St. John had not been used in a very long time. It was in poor repair to the point that they felt it was unsafe to operate.

Because the tolling of bells for November 11 was important to me, I spoke with Wayne Hilsendeger, who was looking after the maintenance of the Church, to ask if there was any way I could do to help get the bell operational. I explained that my hobby was doing metal work, and if anything needed to be fabricated, then my skills and workshop were at their disposal. Well, Wayne and his crew worked their magic, replacing some wooden parts of the structure that had rotted. In the process, they found that the bell itself had some issues. The lever of the bell, where the rope attached to rock the bell, was simply spinning on the shaft instead, so the bell wouldn't ring. Just in time for the November 11 ceremony, Wayne and crew simply attached the rope to the top nut to make it somewhat serviceable.

When sunset arrived on Remembrance Day, everyone still at the Legion, and many from the church, were outside to witness a unique and moving event. While the bell tolled across the street, Legion President Neil Gorman read the names of the 102 Onoway-area men and woman who had served in WW1. The ceremony was posted live on Facebook for those who couldn't attend.

At the next Legion meeting, Legion members voted to give the church a donation to help offset some of the expense in getting the bell ready, aware that St Johns' had gone to a great deal of work and expense to participate.

My personal contribution came



later, when Wayne called about my previous offer to help with the bell's repair. He had already removed the bell from the tower, so I took it home to see what I could do to secure the actuating lever. I discovered that the bell and all its parts were sand-cast iron. All mating surfaces were just as they were cast, without a machined surface anywhere, making things a touch more difficult.

The part of the shaft where the actuating lever mated with the bell was tapered with a "V" groove, from the sand mold. The actuating lever had broken previously and been welded, making a poor fit, to the point that the lever could no longer grip the shaft.

I realized I could machine a 3/16" key-way into the shaft, but in order to have the yoke anywhere close to a point where I could make the cut on my milling machine, I first had to build a fixture to hold the yoke to the mill table.

Sometimes it takes longer to set the piece up in the machine than to perform a cut, and this was the case for the bell. It took about six hours to dream up and make the necessary fixture, but only about 15 minutes to make the cut once everything was aligned.

The next step was fabricating a new lever. I started with a piece of round bar and after facing the ends into the lathe, drilled a hole in the place I expected the top of the keyway to be. I then I bored a taper hole in the center of the piece, trying to use my rusty trigonometry skills

ver. I discovered that the bell and all its parts were sand-cast iron. All mating surfaces were just as they were cast, without a machined surface anywhere, making things a touch more difficult. The part of the shaft where the actuating lever mated with the bell was tapered with a "V" groove,

nothing consistent about the taper on the shaft. I was forced to take a good guess. I had to keep reminding myself that I was not working on a crankshaft of a Kenworth, nor dealing with 3000 rpms!

After cutting the taper, I cut the rest of the keyway manually. I welded a piece of flat bar with an offset to the hub and a smaller piece of stock to tie the rope to. Next, I sized a piece of flat bar to hammer into the keyway. I was lucky because if the keyway did not quite line up (again not a Kenworth), the key stock would hold the hub to the shaft nicely. That is what has happened. It took a great deal of force to install the key but, as a result, the lever is very secure on the shaft. (If you'd like the machining details, contact me at 780-720-7447 and I'll be glad to pass them on.)

It took a community to have the St. John bell toll on Remembrance Day, and I'm proud of my part in ensuring the bell will work for another 50 years. Now it's time to get back to work on my steam locomotive.

# WHITECOURT APPROVES 2019 INTERIM BUDGET

Whitecourt Town Council has approved the 2019 Interim Operating and Capital Budget. The Interim Budget includes over \$55 million of capital and operating expenditures and requires a 3.09% overall tax change.

"As our community grows, we are challenged to present an Interim Budget that not only maintains existing service levels but also includes impacts of our current economy and cost of living," stated Mayor Maryann Chichak. "All projects and costs were looked at and deferred where prudent and possible to minimize a budget increase. 2019 saw increased costs due to external factors that came from new legislation and enforcement requirements under the Cannabis Act, the Municipal Government Act, the Emergency Management Act, the Peace Officer Act, the Revenue Canada Tax Act, the Occupational Health and Safety Act and Employment standards, along with other increases such as the carbon tax.

The passing of the Interim Budget allows projects to proceed before the 2019 Budget is given final approval. The 2019 Budget will be finalized in the spring of 2019 once the Provincial budget is adopted, and final assessment figures are estab-

"The provincial and federal budgets could significantly impact our operations, and that is why our budget numbers and projects could be adjusted between now and April," added Mayor Chichak. "We will also be hosting our annual public open house on the proposed budget early in the new year, which I hope to see a high level of engagement from our citizens. This document significantly influences the lives of our residents and the opportunities and services they are provided, and I look forward to hearing their input and comments."

Capital Budget Highlights:

• The 2019 Street Improvement Program includes street, lighting, and sidewalk repairs at locations throughout the community.

• Tendering for the Water System Upgrade Project will begin in early 2019. This project includes a second utility river crossing to west Whitecourt, a dedicated supply main and other system upgrades, including pressure reducing measures and looping for improved distribution and fire flow.

• Preliminary engineering and second phase grit testing for the Wastewater Treatment Plant were completed in 2018, and the study and capital investment options will be brought to Council for consideration in 2019. Capital enhancements will improve the plant's performance and efficiency; recover existing treatment capacity; address odour issues; and meet future treatment needs.

• Recreation will continue with ongoing maintenance for all public facilities. Construction is anticipated to begin in the spring of 2019 on the 3,000 square foot expansion to the Scott Safety Centre.

• Implementation of a trail sign project which will include design and installation of new signs for trails and staging areas throughout our local trail system.






