RCMP SEIZE DRUGS, STOLEN VEHICLE AND SUSPECTS WANTED ON WARRANTS

On January 11, 2019 at approximately 12:40 pm members of the Leduc Integrated Traffic Unit were involved in a traffic stop northbound on Highway 2 near Glen Park Road, when a vehicle, unrelated to the stop pulled over in front of the police. A woman then exited the vehicle and asked police for assistance as she had run out of gas. As police engaged the woman in conversation and provided her with assistance they discovered she was wanted on an outstanding warrant. Further investigation revealed there were two men in the vehicle, also wanted on outstanding warrants and attempting to hide from police. One of the men was found to be suffering from medical distress and was transported to hospital by ambulance.

In a subsequent search of the

vehicle, police located approximately 900 grams of what is believed to be methamphetamine and 85 grams of what is believed to be cocaine. The vehicle was also stolen.

The women and two men are currently in custody facing a multitude charges and awaiting a Judicial Release Hearing.

Once the hearing has been completed an update will be provided.

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NEW RULES FOR DRONE OPERATORS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is informing constituents that Transport Minister Marc Garneau has issued strict new regulations for the use of drones in Canada, from banning drunk droning, to banning drones from flying in airspace near emergency scenes and airports.

Drone operators will now have to register their drones and pass an online test to receive certification to continue operating them. These new changes apply to drones between 250 grams and 25 kilograms that are operated within the pilot's sight, regardless of whether the drones are being used recreationally or for work.

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CANADA SUMMER JOBS 2019 NOW OPEN

•Updated eligibility criteria: the eligibility criteria have been changed to set out what is and isn't eligible for funding.

•Better job matching: All positions will be posted on jobbank. gc.ca and on the app, to get the word out and help match young people with employers and good quality jobs.

Everything can be submitted online through the Government Grants and Contributions Online Service. You can complete the application at your leisure and track its status once it has been submitted.

Funding is available for not-forprofit organizations and public and private sector employers with 50 or fewer employees. If you are a non-profit organization you can receive up to 100 percent of the provincial/territorial minimum hourly wage, as well as employment-related costs. Public-sector employers and small businesses can receive up to 50 percent of the provincial/territorial minimum hourly wage.

CSJ focuses on local priorities, including:

1.Organizations that provide services to, and that express an intent to hire, youth who self-identify as being part of the groups which are underrepresented or have additional barriers to the labour market;

2.Opportunities for youth to gain work experience related to the skilled trades;

3.Opportunities for youth in rural areas, remote communities and Official Language Minority Communities;

4.Small businesses, in recognition of their contribution to the creation of jobs; and

5.Organizations which deliver supports or services to seniors.

I encourage you to take advantage of this program and apply for funding by January 25th, 2019.

- There were no confirmed threats communicated to the RCMP, Town of Drayton Valley or County of Brazeau Administration.

- Sunchild First Nations Band Councillor Joey Pete stood with us and stated that his First Nation is supportive of the energy industry, and HAVE NOT been consulted by the government in any respect towards the proposed Bighorn Park/PLUZ land use changes.

- The Counties of Ponoka, Westaskiwin, and Parkland are now supporting Brazeau County's measures to spread awareness of the lack of consultation, and the poorly managed process to date.

- The Town of Drayton Valley water treatment plant manager is quoted as stating that: "The quality of the water upstream of Drayton Valley is excellent, and that it could be drank right out of

First responders in the Leduc area have suffered severe mental stress injuries as of recent, and the time is now to dispel stigmas and any negative association of mental illness and those working within the emergency services industry.

"As a firefighter/paramedic, a husband and father...if we're more aware of the resources available to us, it could potentially save one of us," says Daniel Sundahl, a firefighter/paramedic with Leduc Fire Services. "We need to be tearing down the barriers of what society deems 'perceived normal' and 'perceived abnormal' when it comes to mental illness and do more to educate others on the mental health resources available to those in this industry."

This free event at the Maclab Centre for the Performing Arts, Jan. 22, 2019, will host six speakers, including Sundahl, on various topics, such as post traumatic growth, All Services Kinship, Legacy Place Society, Alberta Critical Incident Provincial Network, re-integration, and the Strathcona Firefighter Paramedic Spouses Association.

"In our role as community leaders, we want to put the spotlight on the issue of mental health in this industry to help shed any perceived stigma others may view when they think of mental illness," says Leduc Fire Chief George Clancy. "We know first responders experience PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder) two times the average population, and paramedics have the highest rate among first responders. We must take a stand now by demonstrating our support to our brothers and sisters, letting them know there are resources and people out there who can help. And it all begins with talking."

Although each seat is accounted for, Sundahl says there may be a possibility of hosting a second information night due to the overwhelming response.

New Rules for Drone Operators

Among the new rules:

•You can't pilot a drone while under the influence of drugs or alcohol, or within 12 hours of consuming alcohol;

•You must be over 14 years of age to apply for basic registered ownership and pass a test to become a certified pilot;

•Drones cannot fly higher than 122 metres above ground level, or 30 metres above a building or structure;

•Special certification is needed if you want to transport weapons or explosives;

•You can't transport living creatures on your drone; and

•Unless a certified first responder, drones cannot fly over or near an emergency scene.

The new regulations come with fines between \$1,000 and \$3,000 for individuals but can rise much higher for corporations or anyone deliberately breaking the rules. Violators who deliberately fly near an aircraft's flight path could be subject to fines of up to \$25,000 and even jail time depending on the severity of the offence.

It will cost \$5 to register a drone, and the pilot exam for basic operations costs \$10, while the test for advanced drone operations is \$25.

The new rules around drone operations that exist now will continue to apply until these new provisions come into effect on June 1st of this year.

"Remember: Drones are an object in our air space. Flying one means you are a pilot, whether you operate one for fun, work or research," concluded MP Eglinski.

At approximately 8:15 a.m. on Dec. 27, an industrial explosion occurred in the Nisku Business Park at 8 Street and 13 Avenue.

"Our crews, including more than 20 firefighters from Station 1 (Nisku), Station 6 (Calmar) and Station 5 (EIA) worked quickly to evacuate the building," says Leduc County Fire Chief Keven Lefebvre. "After a primary search of the building, a decision was made to allow acetylene tanks, which were on fire, to vent off. This will mitigate risks on scene."

At this time, the cause of the

explosion is still under investigation.

Crews will remain on scene as required.

LEDUC COUNTY COUNCIL APPROVES 2019 INTERIM BUDGET

Leduc County council unanimously approved the 2019 interim municipal budget, which represents a 1.5 per cent tax dollar budget increase over the 2018 final budget, on Thursday, Dec. 6. The decision followed four days of public deliberations.

"The interim budget — which reflects council's commitment to providing high-quality, cost-efficient operations — means we can maintain the level of services our residents expect and deserve, and undertake new initiatives that will enhance the quality of life for our citizens.: - Mayor Tanni Doblanko The interim operating and capital budgets are set at \$85 million and \$13 million, respectively.

"Throughout the process, council made difficult decisions that reflect the current economic climate, and that will minimize the impact to our citizens and businesses, many of whom are experiencing economic changes." - Mayor Tanni Doblanko The approved interim budget allows important projects to proceed or continue before council approves the final budget in the spring. Council and administration will continue to monitor the budget until tax rates are set.


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

A BIG HORN RESPONSE

Sometimes it is hard to know where to start when trying to respectfully respond to an individual or a political party that you disagree with on any issue but especially on the most recent NDP fiasco – the Big Horn Proposal.

Perhaps you start by addressing the trust issue and the actions of the Minister of Environment and Parks when she created the Castle Wildland Provincial Park when she promised to continue to permit off highway vehicle use on existing designated trails and then backtracked on that promise shutting down almost all OHV use in the Castle region.

Will this be the same fate for the West Country Public Land Use Zone? The documents provided by Alberta Environment and Parks that address the Big Horn Proposal say that OHV use will continue on all designated trails and designated areas giving the impression nothing is going to change. When I asked how many of the existing trails in the West Country PLUZ are designated trails the answer I was given was that there were no designated trails in the West Country PLUZ. In light of the actions in the Castle region one has to seriously wonder what the real situation will be regarding



OHV use or any industrial activity once the government begins applying regulatory policy to the Big Horn Proposal.

The consultation process has been deeply flawed with the Minister claiming that the process had become dangerous. Now any intimidation, threats, or harassment is completely unacceptable. I would of course condemn any documented incidents - but, to date, there appear to be no such documented incidents. This then leads a person to wonder if disagreement over government policy and the exercise of our free speech is the new standard for deciding that the government will not meet with Alberta stakeholders.

Environmental groups like Y2Y and CPAWS are two of the groups pushing the Bighorn park plan and both are recipients of foreign-funding from the Tides Foundation, an anti-oil and gas group. Many conclude that the real reason for this Big Horn Proposal is that foreign money and environmentalist want to shut down the West Country to economic opportunity and recreational activity. This would appear to fall in line with this government supported trend of using the environment as the excuse for piling regulation and taxes upon an already struggling oil and gas industry.

Clearly, serious consideration should be given by this government into removing the Minister of the Environment from this file and starting over. Good public policy needs to have the support of the people, do no harm and where possible increase economic activity. This proposal misses the mark and the government should hit a reset button on this issue. A real and respectful consultation process must be initiated that listens to and at the end of the day results in a land use proposal that has the support of Albertans in general and with the users and stakeholder groups of the West Country in particular.


