CANADA SUMMER JOBS 2019 NOW OPEN

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is encouraging organizations in his riding to apply for the 2019 Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ) Program. This unique funding initiative helps employers create summer job opportunities for those between the ages of 15 and 30.

Please note that updates have been made for CSJ 2019 that will make it easier for employers to provide good quality summer jobs.

• Fewer barriers to good quality jobs: expanded eligibility to include all youth between the ages of 15-30 who are legally entitled to work in Canada – not just students.

• Updated eligibility criteria: the eligibility criteria have been changed to set out what is and isn't eligible for funding.

• Better job matching: All posi-

tions will be posted on jobbank. gc.ca and on the app, to get the word out and help match young people with employers and good quality jobs.

Everything can be submitted online through the Government Grants and Contributions Online Service. You can complete the application at your leisure and track its status once it has been submitted.

Funding is available for notfor-profit organizations and public and private sector employers with 50 or fewer employees. If you are a non-profit organization you can receive up to 100 percent of the provincial/territorial minimum hourly wage, as well as employment-related costs. Public-sector employers and small businesses can receive up to 50 percent of the provincial/territorial minimum hourly wage.

CSJ focuses on local priorities, including:

1. Organizations that provide

services to, and that express an intent to hire, youth who self-identify as being part of the groups which are underrepresented or have additional barriers to the labour market;

2. Opportunities for youth to gain work experience related to the skilled trades;

3. Opportunities for youth in rural areas, remote communities and Official Language Minority Communities;

4. Small businesses, in recognition of their contribution to the creation of jobs; and

5. Organizations which deliver supports or services to seniors.

I encourage you to take advantage of this program and apply for funding by January 25th, 2019.

January 22, 2019 DEVON RCMP SEEKING PUBLIC ASSISTANCE IN LOCATING MISSING FEMALE

UPDATE #1:

Jan. 16, 2019

Devon, Alta. – Devon RCMP continue to investigate the disappearance of Kathleen Rose Ferraz-Duchesneau (25) of Devon.

On Jan. 6, 2019 at 11:10 p.m. Kathleen's vehicle was located, abandoned, south of the Devon Bridge. Kathleen has not been located since the discovery of her vehicle.

To date, the RCMP have been following up on all tips provided, unfortunately no viable information or sighting has resulted. Local businesses have been solicited for any video surveillance, and local homeowners have been requested to check their property for any information that may lead to her whereabouts. Several RCMP units and detachments are involved and working collaboratively to explore all avenues of investigation. The RCMP continue to liaise with various community search groups.

There has not been sufficient evidence at this point for the RCMP to have made any determination that this is a criminal incident.

"I know that everyone wants to help find Kathleen, so I'm asking the public to assist by providing the RCMP information and allowing us to do our investigational job" says Sergeant Jolene Nason of the Devon RCMP. "The public is welcome to conduct searches in open, public areas but should not be going on private property where they may be alarming homeowners and putting themselves in unsafe situations."

TWO ALBERTA TEACHERS PARTNER TO RECEIVE GOVERNOR GENERAL'S HISTORY AWARD FOR EXCELLENCE IN TEACHING

Award-winning class project making connections between communities

Alberta teachers Maxine Hildebrandt and Lisl Gunderman turned a coincidental meeting into a class cultural exchange that connected communities and broke barriers. Because of their unique class project, they will jointly receive a Governor General's History Award for Excellence in Teaching. Her Excellency the Right Honourable Julie Payette, Governor General of Canada, will present the award to them on January 28, 2019, at Rideau Hall in Ottawa.

Hildebrandt, who teaches a grade three-four split class at Mother Earth's Children's Charter School, and Gunderman, a grade four and five teacher at Wildwood School thirty kilometres away, met at a hunting instructor course. Inspired by the course's hands-on, collaborative learning style and their shared vision, they developed a cultural exchange between their classes to teach their students social studies and science — and also about each other.

The consolidation adds 19 family housing units and 32 Seniors Self Contained suites to The Evergreens Foundation operation. The existing operation manages 332 units comprised of Seniors Lodges, Senior Self Contained Apartment buildings, Community and Family Housing and Rent Supplement designations.

We warmly welcome Pembina Housing Authority staff and tenants to The Evergreens Foundation as we continue to provide housing that "Promotes Quality of Life and Independence". "It is an opportunity to actually learn who your neighbours are and learn what their stories are — and really, that is what history is all about," said Hildebrandt.

Over a four-month period, Hildebrandt's and Gunderman's students learned to appreciate history from multiple perspectives. Students learned about the importance of storytelling in Indigenous cultures; they tanned hides, panned for gold, built inukshuks and learned about local medicinal plants. They fished for trout, and then shared their feast with older generations. Students made long-lasting friendships and learned valuable life skills.

"It really elevated everyone's sense of pride in who they are and where they come from," Gunderman said.

Hildebrandt and Gunderman are two of seven recipients of the Excellence in Teaching Award, chosen from twenty-five finalists. The winners will share a \$2,500 prize. In addition, their schools will share a \$1,000 prize.

"With this award, we celebrate the extraordinary work of teachers who outdo themselves every day to shape our adults of tomorrow. Knowledge of our history is a fundamental element of this education. The winners certainly have a significant influence on their students, enabling them to understand their history through unique and innovative projects," said Janet Walker, President and CEO of Canada's History Society. The award is administered by Canada's History Society with support from TD Bank and EF Educational Tours.

• Maxine Hildebrandt teaches at the Mother Earth's Children's Charter School in Stony Plain, Alberta. It is a kindergarten to grade nine school with around 70 students, mostly of Cree, Stoney, and Métis descent.

• Mother Earth's Children's Charter School is Canada's first and only Indigenous charter school. About the Cultural Exchange

• The cultural exchange was supported with a grant from the Canadian Multicultural Education Foundation, to find ways for Indigenous and non-Indigenous students to form partnerships.

• There were four outings the classes did together, with each school hosting two events:


- Event 1: A storytelling day with Métis author David Bouchard.

- Event 2: Historical hands-on knowledge including hide tanning.

- Event 3: A field trip to the Pembina River Valley to learn the area's history, build inukshuks, pan for gold, and learn about local medicinal plants.

- Event 4: A trout pond fishing trip with Wildwood grandparents, ending with a fish feast.

• Students learned valuable life skills and wrote to each other as pen pals.



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EARLY COAL PHASE OUT: GOOD OR BAD POLICY?

In a previous article I addressed the need for governments to make good policy decisions that:

have an aspirational goal,
consider and reflect public

• consider and reflect public thought,

• at the very least do no harm,

• and establish an economic environment that will create jobs.

Here is one example of how a bad policy decision has hurt Albertans.

During its term in government the NDP with little to no consultation fast tracked the phase out of coal.

Now there is no doubt that this new plan to replace coal generated electricity with renewable energy and natural gas was an aspirational goal but did it reflect public thought, do no harm and create jobs?

Within the electrical industry

the phase out of coal resulted in electrical chaos, lost jobs, stranded assets and the tax payer on the hook for at least \$1.7 Billion dollars in payouts to the electrical companies.

The County of Parkland believes that this decision has resulted in a loss of 25-30% of their tax base, partially because of the loss of jobs in both the coal industry and the fact that running a natural gas electrical power plant needs significantly fewer workers.

Now that renewable energy is becoming an important part of the Alberta electricity story we must also come to terms with the fact that when the sun doesn't shine and the wind doesn't blow electricity is not being produced and an alternate source of energy must be found.

Alberta is tied into a continental electricity distribution grid that connects us to the rest of Canada and the United States.

So where do receive the electricity we need when the sun doesn't shine or the wind doesn't blow?

Some of it comes from the Alberta-Montana tie in line.

How does Montana produce much of their electrical energy? Coal

So we find ourselves in the position where rather than producing electricity in Alberta, creating jobs and wealth and a larger tax base this government would prefer to buy from Montana, create jobs in Montana.

The result is what we call bad policy that hurts Albertans and can't even make the claim that we are sacrificing jobs for the environment because the carbon is still being produced by carbon leakage into Montana from plants that are less efficient than in Alberta.

This is just one clear example of how bad policy hurts everyday Albertans and why we need to be careful in crafting policy and in choosing governments as we move in to 2019.


When completed, the Regional Plan will provide certainty for
