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MADE-IN-ALBERTA UPGRADER MOVES AHEAD

These past months we've seen major movement on refining more of our oil and gas here in Alberta with this week's announced petrochemical processing facility to be built in Sturgeon County by Canada Kuwait Petrochemical Corporation (CKPC), which includes Calgary-based Pembina Pipeline

Corp. During the announcement, Premier Rachel Notley stressed that this project will be "led by thousands of Alberta workers and a Calgary-based company, this project is truly Made-in-Alberta. By adding value to resources owned by all Albertans, we're putting economic diversification first and seizing opportunities to upgrade more resources right here in this province."

the importance of getting our products to tide water and holding Trudeau's feet to the fire on the Trans Mountain pipeline, we have known for decades more refining, upgrading and value-added processing needs to be done here at home. 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
RCMP WARN RESIDENTS **ABOUT ONGOING SCAM**

Spruce Grove, Alberta - Spruce Grove RCMP are reminding the public about an ongoing scam in which taxpayers across the country receive phone calls or emails from individuals impersonating CRA employees. These people are scammers. A local resident recently fell victim to this scam and RCMP are once again educating the public on this issue.

An individual received a call from the Canada Revenue Agency indicating that she owed taxes following an audit. The caller demanded that she pay the amount owing by purchasing iTunes cards and providing the activation codes to the caller.

The phone scammers typically



threaten individuals with arrest. imminent legal action, a warrant for arrest, or deportation if their demands are not met. No legitimate government agency or business will demand payment in gift cards or prepaid credit cards. These methods are used by criminals in order to hide their activities from police.

The complex will process approx. 23,000 barrels per day of Alberta propane into polypropylene, a high-value plastic used internationally to make products such as food packaging, auto parts and electronics. At the peak of construction, more than 3,000 workers will be on site, with the project expected to create over 200 full-time operations and head office jobs upon completion. There will also be huge benefits to subcontractors all across the province. Construction is expected to start in 2019, with the complex fully operational by mid-2023. The project will receive royalty credits after the facility has been constructed and is in operation so there is no risk to Alberta taxpayers.

According to Mick Dilger, President and CEO of Pembina Pipeline Corp, our Petrochemical Diversification Program has provided "the incentive and vision that has helped make this investment a reality."

Another project, Inter Pipeline's \$3.5-billion Heartland Petrochemical Complex, is already under construction near Fort Saskatchewan as a result of this program. The complex is a similar gas-to-plastics operation, employing about 2,300 people during construction with 180 full-time jobs upon comple-

This program, like several others we've spearheaded to diversify the economy have created, and will continue to create, tens of thousands of jobs for Albertans. Let's keep investing in our future.

NGPS has two Mental Health Capacity Building teams already, operating the CHAMP Team (Choosing Healthy Attitudes through Modeling Pals) in Fox Creek and the TEAM for Success in Whitecourt. The yet to be named Onoway team will be the third mental health support team in the division and will increase and enhance these types of support for students in the east end of the division.

Teams work with students of all ages to promote positive mental health and to help nurture and develop the skills required to be emotionally and mentally prepared and successful. Based on research and best practice that demonstrates that mental

emotional well-being can be developed, nurtured and supported through promotion and prevention efforts, these teams:

- · deliver mental health promotion and prevention programming including presentations to students, staff, parents and other community members that increase well-being, resilience, self-esteem, protective factors, promote early identification of issues and address risk factors;
- build capacity in others who work with children, youth and families, to deliver wellness presentations and programming;
- · organize and facilitate school and community-wide Mental Health events and awareness campaigns (i.e. Pink Shirt Day, Hats on for Mental Health);
- · facilitate access for students to community supports and services
- examples of supports include in-school clubs and workshops like Mental Health First Aid,

Family Games Night, Mindful Walking, Community Gardens, Yoga for Anxiety and Chicks in Charge.

AIRSOFT RIFLE WARNING

St. Albert RCMP were called to a report of two suspicious males with a rifle in a wooded section of the Grandin neighbourhood of St. Albert at approximately 10:45 a.m. on Saturday, January 26, 2019. RCMP responded and were able to locate two youth with an airsoft gun playing "war games".

While no charges were pursued in this incident, the youth and their parents were educated about the 2017 Protection of Persons and Property By-Law that defines a firearm as any device from which any shot, bullet, or

other projectile capable of causing bodily injury or death can be discharged including but not limited to air guns, BB guns, sling shots, bows and arrows, and gas powered guns. The By-Law further states that no person shall use or discharge any firearm within the St. Albert city limits.

The youth and their parents

were also educated about the fact that police will respond to firearms calls prepared to protect the public from someone with a weapon. This could mean that officers may have their firearms drawn as they search for the person with a weapon, as the safety of everyone is of upmost importance to the RCMP.

RCMP INVESTIGATE THEFT OF TRAILERS

On Feb. 8, 2019 RCMP were advised that two trailers had been stolen. The trailers were parked on the side of road as the truck broke down and the trailers were disabled. The trailers were

RCMP MEMBER CHARGED FOLLOWING ASIRT INVESTIGATION

January 24, 2019

On Nov. 15, 2017, the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) was directed to investigate the circumstances surrounding the arrest of a 26-year-old man by members of the RCMP that occurred in Nisku, Alberta.

On that same day, the subject officer entered a gas station where a confrontation occurred when the officer placed the man under arrest for possession of stolen property. During the arrest, the officer is alleged to have used both physical force and a pair of handcuffs to strike the man. Following the arrest, it was determined that the man had sustained serious injury, including an orbital floor facial fracture.

ASIRT conducted a thorough and independent investigation into the circumstances surrounding the incident. Upon review, it was determined that the evidence raised reasonable grounds to believe that an offence or offences had been committed. As required under the Police Act, the complete investigative file was

forwarded to the Alberta Crown Prosecution Service (ACPS) for a determination on whether it met the standard for prosecution. Having been advised by ACPS that the case meets the Crown standard for prosecution, and having carefully reviewed the investigation, and there being reasonable grounds to believe that offences were committed, ASIRT executive director, Ms. Susan D. Hughson, Q.C., made the determination that the involved officer should be charged accordingly.

Today, Cpl. Peter MacMillan, a member of the RCMP, has been charged with one count of assault causing bodily harm and one count of assault with a weapon, to wit: handcuffs.

Cpl. MacMillan was served with an appearance notice, and is required to appear in Leduc Provincial Court on Thursday, Feb. 28, 2019.

As these matters are now before the courts, ASIRT will not provide any further information in relation to these incidents.

ASIRT's mandate is to effectively, independently and objectively investigate incidents involving Alberta's police that have resulted in serious injury or death to any person, as well as serious or sensitive allegations of police misconduct.

MAN FACES CHARGES OF **CRUELTY TO ANIMAL**

St. Albert, Alta - At approximately 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, February 5, 2019, St. Albert RCMP received a report of animal cruelty towards a dog. The animal was in critical condition and was being taken to the 24 hour Veterinarian Hospital in Edmonton, where it was not known if it would survive.

The RCMP investigation found that the dog is alleged to have been kicked more than once by a 27 year old man residing in the same home as the animal. This investigation is continuing and charges will be pending against

Under the Criminal Code, animal cruelty is defined as wilfully causing unnecessary suffering, pain or injury to an animal or a bird, and convictions under this section would result in a criminal record, a fine or even a term of imprisonment. As animals cannot speak for themselves, there is a responsibility for people to help watch out for their safety. To report cruelty or neglect to an animal, please call the St. Albert RCMP or St. Albert Municipal Enforcement Services at 780-458-7700.

EX-RCMP BY ASIRT MEMBER ARRESTED

On Sept. 28, 2018, as a result of ASIRT investigations and a subsequent prosecution, Aaron Lee Sayler, a former member of the RCMP, was convicted of multiple criminal offences.

That same date, Mr. Sayler was released pending sentencing on his own recognizance on multiple conditions including that he surrender his passport to the court, which he did.

On Feb. 7, 2019, Aaron Sayler was arrested pursuant to the provisions of S. 524 (2) of the Criminal Code on the basis that there were reasonable grounds to believe that the accused was about to contravene his bail conditions. The matter was brought back before the court to seek bail revocation.

Subsequent investigation provided reasonable grounds to believe that Mr. Sayler had committed additional criminal offences and, as a result, on Feb. 11, 2019, in consultation with the Alberta Crown Prosecution Service, four additional charges were laid. As these new charges are now before the court and the proceedings in relation to Mr. Sayler's bail are the subject of a publication ban pursuant to S.517 of the Criminal Code, no further information will be released at this time

RIVEWAY CLEARING PROGF

Any property owner residing within the County who requires the services of the County Public Works Department to clear the snow in their driveway must purchase a snowplow flag in advance at various outlets throughout the County. The charge is \$25.00 per flag, per clearing. This means one (1) flag will be used each time you request snow removal.

The \$25.00 fee provides snowplowing from the road to the residence only. For snowplowing services with no flag (call in), the cost will be \$40.00 paid via credit card at the time of the call. Additional clearing and/or custom snowplowing requirements are to be requested through the Public Works Department at the County office and will be charged at a rate of \$80.00 per hour with a minimum charge of one (1) hour.

Please note that your approach and driveway must be a minimum of 22 feet wide, with no obstacles and have a clearance of 18 feet high, with no overhanging trees or wires, otherwise the County grader(s) will NOT clear your driveway.

After a major snowstorm, opening of roads will take approximately three (3) days Therefore plowing of driveways would not normally occur until the fourth (4th) day or later. Other arrangements should be made if you require your driveway plowed sooner.

 Consider a backpack or handsfree bag so you are not weighed down when collecting the swag



PROVINCIAL FUNDING ANNOUNCED FOR WOODLANDS COUNTY AND WHITECOURT INTERMUNICIPAL COLLABORATION PROJECT

nity Partnership program to manage and complete the Intermunicipal Framework Negotiations project.

CONSULTATIONS ON AIR PASSENGER PROTECTION REGULATIONS

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that the Canadian Transportation Agency's proposed air passenger protection regulations will be published in the Canada Gazette Part I for public comment this weekend.

The Transportation Modernization Act mandated the Agency to develop regulations for air travellers that would be clear, consistent, transparent and fair. After months of public and stakeholder consultations, Canadians will have 60 days to comment.

Air passengers who are bumped from overbooked flights or forced to sit through long delays could receive up to \$2,400 in compensation -- under proposed regulations for the government's long-promised Passenger Bill of Rights.

Draft regulations, which will apply to all flights to and from Canada, and those within Canada include:

•Airlines would be required to provide passengers with food, drink and free Wi-Fi after delays of two hours, and accommodation if the delay stretches overnight.

•Compensation of up to \$1,000 for lengthy flight delays and cancellations. This will vary depending on the length of delay and the cause and whether it was in the airline's control.

•Compensation of up to \$2,400 if a passenger is denied boarding and is delayed reaching their destination because an airline overbooked the flight.

The final regulations will be published in Part II of the Canada Gazette. Regulations are expected to

come into force next summer.

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
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

















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
