Preliminary investigation has revealed that a SUV was travelling westbound on Highway 18 and was struck by a northbound pickup truck at the intersection of Range Road 40.

Tragically, the lone occupant of the SUV, a 76-year-old woman from Barrhead, was pro-

nounced deceased at the scene.

The youth driver of the truck

was not injured.



Four Arrested After Search Warrants Executed

On Feb. 18, 2019, the RCMP Emergency Response Team executed search warrants at a residence located in Sangudo and a residence located in Rochfort Bridge as a result of a joint investigation between the Mayerthorpe RCMP Detachment and the Western Alberta District Rural Crime Reduction Unit (WADRCRU).

The first search warrant was executed at a residence in Sangudo and police seized the following items:

- 889 grams of methamphetamine
- 32.5 grams of fentanyl
- 89 grams of cocaine
- 3.4 grams of heroin
- 296 grams of cannabis
- a stolen 2015 Arctic Cat sideby-side
- two snowmobiles believed to be stolen

William Raymond Blackwood (41) of Grande Prairie, and Sonja Marie Susan Sanders (28), of Edmonton, have been charged with the following:

- Possession of methamphetamine for the purpose of trafficking
- Possession of fentanyl for the purpose of trafficking
- Possession of heroin for the purpose of trafficking
- Possession of cocaine for the purpose of trafficking
- Possession of proceeds of crime over \$5000
- Possession of cannabis for the purpose of selling
- Possession of property obtained by crime over \$5000

Blackwood was also arrested on a Canada wide warrant for a parole violation and was wanted by police since May of 2018. Both Blackwood and Sanders were remanded to appear in Mayerthorpe Provincial Court on March 14, 2019.

A second search warrant was executed of the residence in Rochfort Bridge area police seized the following items:

- 45 grams of methamphetamine
- 90 grams of cannabis
- Two firearms
- a small amount of heroin
- a large amount of property believed to be stolen

Jeremiah (Jerry) Johnathon Goodine (44) and Karen Lynn Braithwaite (47) both of Rochfort Bridge were charged with:

- Possession of methamphetamine for the purpose of trafficking
- Possession of cannabis for the purpose of selling
- Unauthorized possession of a firearm (x6)
- Careless use, storage of a firearm/ammunition (x3)

Both Goodine and Braithwaite were remanded into custody but have since been released and their next court appearance will be March 14, 2019 in Mayerthorpe Provincial Court.

Tri-Village Regional Sewage Services Commission FORCEMAIN REPLACEMENT

February 22, 2019

The Tri-Village Regional Sewage Commission will be replacing the existing sewage forcemain in Alberta Beach. The Forcemain Replacement is scheduled to start on March 4, 2019 and be completed by the end of July 2019. Lane/road closures will be required and are outlined in the figure below.



Increased construction traffic is anticipated throughout project duration. Detours will be provided and access to residents will be maintained. Sanitary sewer service will also be maintained for the project duration.

On Tuesday and Wednesday, hundreds of trucks under the banner of "United We Roll' arrived in Ottawa to let this Liberal government know that our oil and gas sector is suffering and that pipelines must be built. Later I wandered down the line of trucks on Wellington Street and met with some of the drivers.



MAKE HEALTHY HABITS A PART OF WEDDING PREP



- Get daily exercise. Exercise is important for maintaining a healthy body weight and keeping stress levels in check. Exercise also can boost mood. The Department of Health and Human Services recommends getting at least 150 minutes of moderate aerobic activity or 75 minutes of vigorous aerobic activity each week. Strength training exercises performed at least twice a week complete a well-balanced exercise regimen.
- Slow down and relax. Those who go full-throttle with all of their responsibilities including wedding planning may burn out. Stress can weaken the immune system and make people vulnerable to illness. Schedule some time for date nights with your fiancé, and don't overlook the benefits of hanging out with friends and getting away from wedding planning for a bit.
- Eat body-boosting foods. The foods we eat can impact everything from energy levels to skin radiance. Foods like berries, sweet potatoes, broccoli, greens, green tea, and dark chocolate all contain antioxidants that boost the immune system, states The Food Network. Avoid drastic diets that can do more harm than good. Simply cutting 500 calories a day can help the average person lose a pound per week if weight

loss is a goal. Simple ways to trim calories are to choose skim milk over whole milk and choose low-calorie snacks.

 Cut down on alcohol consumption. Toasting to the future with a glass of wine may become rote in the months leading up to the wedding, but alcohol is a diuretic and a source of liquid calories. Alcoholic beverages dehydrate the body and cause it to hold onto water. When imbibing, stick to low-calorie cocktails like a vodka spritzer (60 to 80 calories) instead of a calorie-laden frozen margarita (300 calories).

Feeling and looking one's best starts long before the wedding day. By making health a priority, couples can start their new lives together on healthy footing.

FACTORS THAT CAN AFFECT THE LENGTH OF YOUR ENGAGEMENT

WEDDING REGISTRY TIPS





















