IS IT TIME FOR YOUR MAMMOGRAM?

SCREEN TEST IS COMING TO WHITECOURT ON MARCH 4 - 16, AND TO BARRHEAD ON MARCH 26 - APRIL 5, 2019.

Screen Test brings breast cancer screening to women across Alberta with its mobile mammography clinics.

Why should I get a screening mammogram?

A screening mammogram is

a special X-ray of your breast. Once you're over 50, it is the best way to find breast cancer early. Screening mammograms can help find breast cancer when it is very small, 2-3 years before you or your doctor can feel it. The earlier breast cancer is found the better treatment can be. In fact most women (about

90%) are now surviving breast cancer 5 years after diagnosis.

Who should get a screening mammogram?

Women 50 and over should plan to have a mammogram every 2 years and may self-refer.



Women 40-49 should discuss the risks and benefits of screening with their doctor, and require a referral for their first appointment. There is no cost for this service. For more information visit: www.screeningforlife.ca/screentest.

Here are some common myths and facts about breast cancer screening:

Myth #1: Breast cancer isn't very common.

In fact, 1 in 8 Alberta women will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Myth #2: Only women with a family history of breast cancer will get it.

The truth is, 80% of women who develop breast cancer have no family history. So it's important to understand that you are still at risk for breast cancer even if no one in your family has ever had the disease.

Myth #3: Regular mammograms can't find small tumours any sooner than women could find them themselves.

Screening mammograms can find small tumours about 2-3 years before they can be felt. That's why screening is so important — it can find cancer before it has a chance to become more serious.

Myth #4: Having a mammogram can cause breast cancer or can cause an already existing cancer to spread.

Mammograms use a very small dose of radiation. Research con-



firms that the risk of harm from radiation from mammography is very low. The benefits of finding and treating breast cancer early far outweigh the risk of the small dose of radiation.

Myth #5: There is nothing a woman can do to lower her risk of developing breast cancer.

While it's true that there are some things you can't control, there are some things you can do:

• Physical Activity – Be physically active throughout your life


and exercise every day.

- Weight Try to reach or stay at a healthy body weight. This becomes even more important after menopause.
- Alcohol Limit the amount of alcohol you drink to no more than one drink per day.
- Smoking Don't smoke and avoid second-hand smoke. If you're currently a smoker, talk to your healthcare provider about options for quitting or cutting back. You can also get support at AlbertaQuits.ca or call

1-866-710-QUIT.

• Long-term Hormone Replacement Therapies (HRT) – Limit using the combination of estrogen and progestin menopausal hormone replacement therapy to no more than 5 years; long-term use (beyond 5 years) increases a woman's risk of breast cancer. But within 2 years of stopping, a woman's risk of breast cancer returns to average.


ical motivations to overrule his duty to uphold the law. A Prime Minister who has allowed a systemic culture of corruption to take root in his office.



The Guild raised a matching amount in order to qualify for the grant. And work has already begun!

Repair of the roof over the Onoway Public Library portion of the building has been completed. Another improvement – much noticed and appreciated by facility users – is the replacement of fluorescent tubes with LED lighting. Carpet in the Open Area and tile in the Museum hallway will be replaced. The office/storage room used by the Cadets (one of the longest renters) received a major flooring update as well as painting.

One of the major improvements will have long-term positive ramifications. Solar panels will be installed on the roof of the building; this will result in reduced utility costs, a payback of the investment in five years.

The Guild – and the thousands of people who use the facility annually (62,880 in 2018) – are most appreciative of this funding to help make our community better. President Hazel Bourke said it best: "We as the Guild, believe that we will be trend setters in our community and conscientious stewards of the environment with these improvements to our facility."

Entanglements

- ° The average farm is full of machinery and device that can grab, cut, smash and entangle fingers, hands, toes, and feet causing injury to the extremities and even death. The sad truth is that most of these injuries can be avoided.
- "Some of the key entanglement prevention measures to implement when working with or near machinery are:
 - -Before operating any machine or equipment, ensure that all guards are in place and in good condition.
 - -Wear tight fitting clothing, such as overalls. Avoid wearing any items that could become entangled, such as long coats or scarves.
 - -Never step over a PTO shaft or conveyer belt while it is still running.
- ^oEnsure that anyone working with augers, PTOs, and other extremely hazardous machinery receives appropriate safety instruction and adequate supervision.
- "Keep young children out of the farm or ranch work site, especially areas where there is moving machinery.

Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operaters and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.


• Faillure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.



FARM SAFETY & HEALTH MARCH 10-16, 2019 Farm Safety Tips When farming please follow these precautions in order to keep yourself, your family and your workers safe: . Decrease your risk of being crushed by using lockout procedures before beginning any maintenance or repair work, Lockout means to physically neutralize all energies in a piece of equipment, Machines, devices or power transmission lines can be de-energized by applying blocks to all parts under tension or pressure, bleeding the hydraulic pressure from the lines or by releasing pressure from a coil or spring, · Provide a safe, fenced play area for all children and supervise closely. The working area of the farm is not a playground any more than a construction site or other industrial area would be a play area, Review the safety rules on your farm with your family often. Fence off all manure, retaining ponds and dugouts, and lock buildings containing hazardous goods. > At the Justice Committee, Wilson-Raybould said, "...I experienced a consistent and sustained effort by many

people within the government to seek to politically interfere in the exercise of prosecutorial discretion in my role as the Attorney General of Canada in an inappropriate effort to secure a deferred prosecution agreement with SNC-Lavalin."

Ms. Wilson-Raybould's testimony tells the story of a Prime Minister who has lost the moral authority to govern. A Prime Minister who allows his partisan political motivations to overrule his duty to uphold the law. A Prime Minister who has allowed a systemic culture of corruption to take root in his office.

February 22, 2019


The Tri-Village Regional Sewage Commission will be replacing the existing sewage forcemain in Alberta Beach. The Forcemain Replacement is scheduled to start on March 4, 2019 and be completed by the end of July 2019. Lane/road closures will be required and are outlined in the figure below.



Increased construction traffic is anticipated throughout project duration. Detours will be provided and access to residents will be maintained. Sanitary sewer service will also be maintained for the project duration.

Motorists are advised to use caution in the area while these planned road maintenance activities are underway.





TIPS FOR STAYING SAFE WITH KEYLESS SYSTEMS

Auto manufacturers have long embraced technology that can streamline the automotive experience for drivers. For example, several years ago keyless entry and ignition systems were introduced, initially on high-end vehicles before they became standard on many other models. Keyless entry systems require a fob, which sends a signal to the receiver inside the vehicle. The fob transmits a low-frequency code to the car's internal computer system, which engages the locks and will allow the driver to push a button on the dashboard or console to start

the vehicles. The fob can be stashed away in a pocket or purse and still send the signal, which makes it convenient for drivers. Drivers with arthritis or hand injuries also may find keyless systems an asset.

Because fobs work on wireless systems, hackers potentially can intercept the fob-to-car signal. That enables a thief to not only open the vehicle's doors, but also to potentially drive away as well. Even though the fob/car security pairing is unique and can create billions of codes, researchers at Radboud University in the Netherlands and the University of Birmingham found that, by intercepting the wireless signal just twice, they could narrow down the possible combinations from billions to just 200,000. After that, a computer can figure out the code in just half an hour and unlock the car. Potentially, a thief can gather car codes as drivers enter their vehicles during the day, then return


later to steal a number of cars.

Thieves who purchase signal amplifiers also pose a threat. These amplifiers magnify the reach of the fob signal so that a vehicle owner can be in his or her house with the fob, but the thief can walk up to the car and open it - even if the fob is far enough away that it should not engage. One way to circumvent this is to buy a signal-blocking pouch that can hold the key fob. Also, an old-school steering wheel or gear shift lock is an effective way to provide another layer of protection.

Drivers also should be aware of their surroundings as they approach their vehicles. Thieves may count on keyless entry systems to be able to hop into a vehicle once the owner gets within range and drive away.

Vehicle technology thrives to make driving as convenient as possible, but some features also may make things more convenient for prospective thieves.





















