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
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Family Day 2019

Volunteer Income Tax Program Gets Your Taxes Done Free

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
You will be contacted at a later date to pick up your tax return. The program hours are as follows: 8:00 AM to 12:00 noon; then 1:00 PM to 4:30 PM, Monday to Friday at the Wildwood Office, and 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday to Friday at the Edson Office.

Please note that you will be asked to complete a questionnaire and sign an authorization form to e-file your tax return by the volunteers. No records or documents will be kept by the volunteers.

To be eligible, your Tax Returns must be simple (no business or farm income, no capital gains, no depreciation and not a death return). You must also be a resident of Yellowhead or Parkland County, and have a low income, wherein a single Income is \$35,000 or less, couples income is \$47,500 or less, and a single adult with dependent income is \$37,500 or less. As well, note that a current tax return is required for federal benefits to

Protect yourself by learning how to recognize fraud. Here are some tips:


- If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is
- Ignore communication from unknown contacts
- Purchase items from reputable organizations
- Never send money on a dating site
- Regularly monitor credit card statements for unknown charges
- Research organizations via the Better Business Bureau
- Don't leave personal identification in your vehicle

TRUDEAU MUST RESIGN AMID SNC-LAVALIN AFFAIR: MP JIM EGLINSKI

Jim Eglinski, Member of Member for Yellowhead, today reiterated Conservative Leader Andrew Scheer's demand that Justin Trudeau resign amid the SNC-Lavalin affair.

"Canadians were shocked to hear the explosive testimony of former Attorney General Jody Wilson-Raybould on the SNC-Lavalin affair. It's clear there was inappropriate - and potentially illegal - pressure brought on her by the highest officials in Justin Trudeau's government, all in a bid to let a Liberal-connected corporation off the hook on corruption charges," said MP Eglinski.

Media began reporting in early February that the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) pressured Justice Minister and Attorney General, Jody Wilson-Raybould, to intervene in the criminal prosecution of Montreal engineering and construction giant SNC-Lavalin Group Inc.

At the Justice Committee, Ms. Wilson-Raybould said, "...I experienced a consistent and sustained effort by many people within the government to seek to politically interfere in the exercise of prosecutorial discretion in my role as the Attorney General of Canada in an inappropriate effort to secure a deferred prosecution agreement with SNC-Lavalin."

Ms. Wilson-Raybould's testimony tells the story of a Prime Minister who has lost the moral authority to govern. A Prime Minister who allows his partisan political motivations to overrule his duty to uphold the law. A Prime Minister who has allowed a systemic culture of corruption to take root in his office.

"Canada's Conservatives are calling on Justin Trudeau to resign and the RCMP must immediately open an investigation into the numerous examples of obstruction of justice that was detailed in the testimony," concluded MP Eglinski.

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YELLOWHEAD COUNTY COUNCIL SUPPORTS PROPOSED YCE CENTRE

Yellowhead County Council moved to support the Joint Steering Committee's proposed Yellowhead County/Edson (YCE) Centre project outline, estimated to cost some \$70 million.

Yellowhead County Council moved to support the Joint Steering Committee's proposal for the new Yellowhead County/Edson (YCE) Centre, which is expected to be constructed at Edson's Griffiths Park at a cost of some \$70 million.

County council has stressed the importance of developing a conservative timeline for the project's fruition as the county aims to budget responsibly for the benefit of ratepayers in light of the current economic situation. The county is also adverse to borrowing funds for the project.

Additional costs are also under consideration, including the demolition of Repsol Place and planned YCE Centre's site infrastructure upgrades (including road and intersection construction, water/sewer line upgrades, fire protection, etc.).

With these considerations in mind, county council is considering the fol-

lowing timeline: Once the concept is presented to communities for information and clarity, pending any unforeseen negative reactions, the detailed design work would commence. This would likely begin at the end of 2019 or early 2020 and may take as long as 2 years to complete.

Following this, county council will look closely at the economic situation and consider the feasibility of such a project with respect to its impact on the county's ratepayers. Permitting favorable economic con-

ditions, the construction phase may begin in early 2022—estimated to be complete in 2024.

Yellowhead County is committed to serving its residents in a responsible manner, and aims to ensure that all fiscal considerations are made in the process of this project.

As always, county council looks forward to working jointly with the Town of Edson to ensure that the project outcome meets residents' needs.

4 ARRESTED AFTER INTERRUPTED BREAK AN ENTER TO A RESIDENCE

The suspects were unsuccessful in stealing the van and took off on foot, breaking into some outbuildings on a golf course on Highway 44. <u>Proposed Bylaw 2018-29 Parkland County and Summer Village of Betula Beach</u> <u>Intermunicipal Development Plan</u>

An Intermunicipal Development Plan (IDP) is a statutory document prepared with two (or more) municipalities that share a common border, and where at least one member is not a part of a growth management region. An IDP ensures future development and land use policy are coordinated between municipalities. Parkland County and the Summer Village of Betula Beach, under the direction of Section 631 of the Modernized Municipal Government Act, have agreed to jointly engage in an IDP. This plan has been developed to reduce the possibility of any potential conflicts between the municipalities and to ensure the relationship remains strong, transparent and collaborative in the future.

Hearing Procedure

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. Written submissions or presentations may either be submitted in advance to Planning & Development by 4:00 P.M. on March 1, 2019, or submitted at the commencement of the Public Hearing on March 12, 2019.

Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation to Council must notify Planning & Development Services in advance of the Public Hearing by 4:00 P.M., on March 1, 2019. Verbal presentations at the Public Hearing will be limited to a maximum of 10 minutes. Anyone wishing to make a verbal presentation who has not made prior arrangements may be allocated a time at the commencement of the Public Hearing. Council advises that this is your last opportunity to comment on the proposed Bylaw as Council is unable to receive further submissions after the Public Hearing is closed.

Preventing Crushes

• From rolling machinery to falling front-end loaders there are countless crush hazards on a farm. While farm operaters and workers can't prevent every hazard on a farm, they should prevent every hazard they can by taking simple preventative measures while working.

• Faillure to block-up equipment safely can result in a fatal crushing injury. A jack may slip, a hose or overhead support may break, or the equipment may roll. Always take the precaution of placing support blocks under the equipment prior to working with raised machinery for any reason.





4 REASONS TO SKIP TOPPING OFF AT THE GAS STATION

The familiar click of the nozzle when filling up at the gas station is recognizable to anyone with a few miles of driving under their belt. Once that nozzle clicks, just about every driver faces the decision of whether or not to squeeze a few extra cents' worth of gas into their vehicles or remove the nozzle from their vehicles, place it back where it belongs and head off on their way.

Such scenes play out every day across the globe, and it's likely that the majority of drivers try to squeeze a few extra drops into their tank. While topping off can seem like a financially savvy way to delay your next trip to the filling station, doing so may only cost drivers and the planet they call home. The following are four great reasons to skip topping off

the next time you pull into a filling station.

1. Topping off costs you money. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, drivers who top off at the pump are likely paying for gas they're not getting. That's because gas station pumps have vapor recovery systems that feed gas vapors back into their tanks in an effort to decrease air pollution. So any gas that drivers try to pump into their tanks after the nozzle has clicked may only be drawn into the vapor line and fed back into the gas station's tanks and not your vehicle's fuel tank.

2. Topping off may damage your car.

Topping off won't just hurt your pocketbook; it can potentially damage your vehicle as well. Fuel tanks need extra room inside them so gas can expand while the car is being operated. Without room to expand, gas may evaporate into the vehicle's vapor collection system, which can damage the system and produce greater gas emissions, thereby harming the planet.

3. Topping off can affect the air you breathe.


If you had a choice, would you pay extra for more air pollution? Likely not. But the EPA notes that this is precisely what many people are doing when they top off their gas tanks. When vehicles' fuel tanks are overfilled, gas vapors can escape into the air and produce toxic air pollutants. That adversely affects air quality, which ultimately affects your health as well.

4. Topping off can cost the gas station money.

Many drivers may wonder why gas stations, who would seemingly benefit financially from topping off, post signs that forbid topping off. But the EPA notes that gas stations are likely to lose money due to drivers squeezing an extra few cents' worth of gas into their vehicles. That's because topping off can damage the station's vapor recovery systems, causing them to operate improperly and requiring potentially costly maintenance.

Topping off at the filling station may seem like a savvy move. But drivers, their vehicles and the planet are best served by taking the pump handle out of the tanks at the familiar sound of the nozzle's click.

Protect the engine.

The engine is arguably the most expensive part of your vehicle to replace, so protecting it should be a priority. Routine oil changes and oil filter replacements is a great way to protect the engine. Manufacturer guidelines vary in regard to oil change and oil filter replacement intervals, but such recommendations can be found in your manual.

Hone your DIY skills. Drivers also can save money on maintenance by doing some of their own minor vehicle repairs. YouTube is home to many DIY tutorials that can teach drivers how to change their own oil and replace the filters on their vehicles. Routine repairs are relatively easy, and many tutorials can walk you through them step-by-step. Depending on how much you drive, learning to do your own minor vehicle repairs

may save you hundreds of dollars per year.

Perform routine inspections. Older vehicles may or may not alert drivers via noises or leaks that they're in need of repair. Routine inspections of hoses, brakes and tires, which should always be properly inflated, can let drivers know if their vehicles are experiencing problems before those problems grow and become something costly.

Vehicle maintenance costs tend to be most expensive when drivers ignore routine maintenance or miss signs that their cars and trucks might be struggling. By adhering to manufacturer maintenance guidelines and paying attention to their vehicles, drivers can reduce the cost of keeping their cars on the road.

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
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












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
