2018 TAX RELIEF FOR _IVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has indicated the need to expand the list of designated regions for 2018, with new regions identified for Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Ontario.

The livestock tax deferral provision allows producers in prescribed drought or excess moisture regions to defer a portion of their 2018 sale proceeds of breeding livestock until 2019 to help replenish their herd. The cost of replacing the animals in 2019 will offset the deferred income, thereby reducing the tax burden associated with the original sale.



ANNUAL CLUBROOT INSPECTION COMPLETED

September 25, 2018 marked the completion of the annual clubroot inspection done by Lac Ste. Anne County. We inspect all canola fields for visible symptoms of clubroot on canola plants, as per Policy 408 – Control of Clubroot Disease.

Thank you to all participants in the annual inspections! The County is endlessly impressed with our producers' ability to prevent the spread of this soilborne crop disease.


At this point, anyone with a confirmed field should have received the news already, either contacted by the County or by the landowner of the property. If you wish to confirm whether your field was found positive, there is a clubroot map available for viewing at the County office, digitally on the website, or can be confirmed with a quick call to Ag Services at 780-785-3411 or email to AgServices@LSAC.ca.

Over the last eight years we have seen a distinct high-low cycle of finding clubroot within the County, as shown in the graph.

This year followed the pattern; only five clubroot cases were found compared to last year's 18. We believe this has to do with the common two-year rotation that many producers follow. Please take note of this cycle in your crop rotation decisions for 2019, especially if you are in a high-risk area.

We will be sending our 2018 samples to be tested at the Crop Diversification Centre North to understand what pathotypes are present in our County. However, this testing takes several months over the winter, as they must identify the type of canola, grow it in lab, and do a resistance test by inoculating the plants with several pathotypes. We did not get an answer from our 2017 samples until April of this year. Unfortunately, that doesn't help producers make cropping choices for 2019, but as soon as we have an answer, we will provide it publicly.





DEVELOP A VEHICLE MAINTENANCE SCHEDULE mile interval between oil chang-

The oft-sudden expense of vehicle repairs can throw monthly budgets into disarray. Maintaining a routine service schedule is one way for drivers to keep repair costs down.

The online automotive resources Edmunds.com says many car owners do not adequately prepare for scheduled maintenance, and may not give maintenance a thought until it's too late. The first step drivers take upon purchasing a new or preowned vehicle should be to familiarize themselves with the vehicle's

owner's manual, which is filled with valuable information and likely includes maintenance interval recommendations. Next, drivers should learn

about their vehicle, which is particularly relevant when buying a preowned vehicle. Getting to know how the car or truck rides, as well as any sounds it may make, can provide drivers with a solid foundation they can then use to keep their cars running strong.

Routine service typically includes tire rotation, oil changes and topping off of fluids. So just how long between service appointments can a car go? Here are some generalized estimates.

Oil change: Oil chemistry and engine technology have improved so much that most cars can go well beyond es. Now many vehicle manufacturers recommend between 5,000 and 10,000 miles between changes, advises Edmunds. Drivers should err on the side of caution if they do a lot of stopand-go driving and short trips. Other drivers may want to invest in vehicles that have oil change maintenance minders built in. A light or countdown will come on the dashboard, indicating when the oil has reached the end of its usefulness.

. Tire rotation: Rotating tires helps prolong the life of the tires and alleviates uneven tread and wear. During the rotation, each tire is removed and relocated to a different position to ensure that all the tires will wear evenly. Michelin Tires states that tires should be rotated around

6,000 and 8,000 miles.

Vehicle fluids: Your best bet is to see what the manufacturer recommends in regard to fluids such as transmission fluid, differential oil, brake fluids, coolant, etc. Some transmissions need regular maintenance, while others can go 150,000 miles between changes, according to the vehicle information site The Drive. Coolant typically can last 100,000 miles. For these types of changes, it may be best to go to a mechanic or service center familiar with your make and model rather than a quicklube center, as knowing when to drain and refill can be more complicated.

Service schedules can be designed to adhere to manufacturers' recommendations and drivers' personal preferences.





PROPERLY PACK A CAR EMERGENCY KIT

After home and work, the next most common place people spend their time is in their vehicles. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety says the average American spends 17,600 minutes driving each year. Statistics Canada indicates that most of the Canadian population averages 1.2 hours per day behind the wheel.

Because they spend so much time behind the wheel, drivers need to be prepared for breakdowns. Packing an emergency kit in the car can help people make the best of such situations.

A car emergency kit can help drivers get back on the road promptly. Without such kits, drivers may be stranded for hours after a breakdown. Emergency kits also come in handy during weather-related events that can sideline cars until roads become passable. Getting caught in a vehicle during a snowstorm and failing to have the proper gear can be a life-threatening scenario under extreme conditions.


It is always wise to plan for the worst and hope for the best. The Department of Motor Vehicles and the Department of Homeland Security note that these key items should always be included in a car emergency kit.

Durable bags or crates to store supplies, complete first aid kit, small fire extinguisher, jumper cables, rain ponchos, plastic tarp, flashlights and extra batteries, bottled water, small cache of nonperishable foods, wrench and pliers, local maps, rags, duct tape, multipurpose tool, ice scraper, automotive fluids, blankets/warm clothing, cat litter for slick roads, tire-changing equipment, spare tire, road flares or caution reflectors, empty, refillable gas canister, cash for gas and phone charger cable.

Being prepared can make a difference when vehicles are sidelined. In addition to an emergency kit, cars and trucks should be regularly maintained to prevent breakdowns. This includes ensuring all fluids are at proper levels, filters are changed, batteries are in good working order, and tires are inflated correctly. Investing in a roadside assistance service also can help get drivers back on the road quickly.

FEBRUARY 26, 2019

Whitecourt Town Council approved the implementation of traffic calming measures along 55 Avenue to enhance pedestrian and traffic safety. In response to concerns received regarding traffic congestion and pedestrian safety, the Town of Whitecourt recently completed a traffic study that fo-

cused on traffic patterns between the north and south intersections of 55 Avenue with Mink Creek Road. The study concluded that:

• Traffic speeds are not a concern, with most drivers travelling between 32-48 kilometers per hour (below the 50 kilometers per hour speed limit).

• Collisions in the area are low, with no vehicle-pedestrian accidents between 2015 and 2018.

• Volumes exceed the design capacity. Long term plans include the extension of 52 Avenue to McIlwaine Drive, which will offer an alternate route for vehicles and should decrease the amount of traffic utilizing 55 Avenue. To address safety along this road, the following traffic calming measures will be implemented in 2019:

1. Extend the no-parking zone along 55 Avenue and Atkinson Crescent intersection to increase visibility of the crosswalk to en-

sure that the stopping sight distances and turning sight distances are maintained.

2. Contact Canada Post to inquire if the mailbox at 55 Avenue and Atkinson Crescent can be relocated.

3. Add a no-parking zone along the northern portion of the Mink Creek Road extension cul-de-sac.

4. Increase enforcement of parallel parking bylaws along the Mink Creek Road extension culde-sac.

5. Change the yield sign at the 55 Avenue and Atkinson Crescent intersection to a stop sign due to the amount of traffic recorded along 55 Avenue.


6. Add a zebra line crosswalk to the east side of the intersection of 55 Avenue and Mink Creek Road to increase visibility of this crosswalk.

7. Add pedestrian crossing signs along Mink Creek Road to increase awareness of the crosswalk.

Council has adopted the 2019 Whitecourt Strategic Plan. The Plan identifies goals and initiatives for the year, and assists with the scheduling of projects. To complement the overall municipal Plan, an Economic Development Strategic Plan has also been adopted to guide initiatives and projects for this function. Both documents are available to view on www.whitecourt.ca.

Whitecourt has completed a Sprinkler Deployment Plan and will be implementing the Plan this spring and summer. The Plan outlines placement of forestry type sprinklers and water lines around the hilltop residential perimeter to allow for quick deployment to protect structures and critical infrastructure in the case of a wind driven wildfire. The project was completed with funding support from the Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA), and in partnership with Alberta Agriculture and Forestry.

A Special Meeting of Council is scheduled for Monday, April 1 at 5:00 p.m. to review the 2019 Budget. The meeting will be held in Council Chambers at the Forest Interpretive Centre.


