

Through the Alberta fire commissioner's office, here are a few actions that will help reduce the risk of wildfire:

· Dispose of yard debris and lawn clippings. They act as a fuel for any ground fire.

· Clear leaves and other vegetative debris from roofs, gutters, porches and decks. This will prevent embers from igniting vour home.

· Remove dead vegetation and other items from under your deck/porch and within 10 ft. of vour home.

· Residents near parks and treed areas need to be diligent with combustible materials in and around their yards close to their dwellings.

· Remove flammable materials within 10 ft. (urban) or 30 ft. (rural) of your home's foundation and outbuildings, including garages and sheds. Things like wood piles and propane tanks can catch fire and easily spread.

• Prune trees so the lowest branches are 6 - 10 ft. from the ground.

"Wildfire prevention is everyone's duty as it requires a community approach and our goal this year is to reach as many people as possible to raise awareness," says Kelly.

2018 TAX RELIEF FOR LIVESTOCK PRODUCERS

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to advise that Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada has indicated the need to expand the list of designated regions for 2018, with new regions identified for Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, and Ontario.

The livestock tax deferral provision allows producers in prescribed drought or excess moisture regions to defer a portion of their 2018 sale proceeds of breeding livestock until 2019 to help replenish their herd. The cost of replacing the animals in 2019 will offset the deferred income, thereby reducing the tax burden associated with the original sale.

Eligibility for the tax deferral is limited to those producers located inside the prescribed areas. Producers in those regions can request the tax deferral when filing their 2018 income tax returns.

"Those in the Yellowhead riding who have experienced forage shortages for their livestock in 2018, please check out the link below. The tax deferral will help our farmers manage the impacts of drought and be able to focus on rebuilding their herds and businesses," concluded MP Eglinski. 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4 REASONS TO SKIP TOPPING OFF

The familiar click of the nozzle when filling up at the gas station is recognizable to anyone with a few miles of driving under their belt. Once that nozzle clicks, just about every driver faces the decision of whether or not to squeeze a few extra cents' worth of gas into their vehicles or remove the nozzle from their vehicles, place it back where it belongs and head off on their way.

Such scenes play out every day across the globe, and it's likely that the majority of drivers try to squeeze a few extra drops into their tank. While topping off can seem like a financially savvy way to delay your next trip to the filling station, doing so may only cost drivers and the planet they call home. The following are four great reasons to skip topping off the next time you pull into a filling station.

1. Topping off costs you mon-

ey. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, drivers who top off at the pump are likely paying for gas they're not getting. That's because gas station pumps have vapor recovery systems that feed gas vapors back into their tanks in an effort to decrease air pollution. So any gas that drivers try to pump into their tanks after the nozzle has clicked may only be drawn into the vapor line and fed back into the gas station's tanks and not your vehicle's fuel tank.

2. Topping off may damage your car. Topping off won't just hurt your pocketbook; it can potentially damage your vehicle as well. Fuel tanks need extra room inside them so gas can expand while the car is being operated. Without room to expand, gas may evaporate into the vehicle's vapor collection system, which can damage the system and produce

greater gas emissions, thereby harming the planet.

3. Topping off can affect the air you breathe. If you had a choice, would you pay extra for more air pollution? Likely not. But the EPA notes that this is precisely what many people are doing when they top off their gas tanks. When vehicles' fuel tanks are overfilled, gas vapors can escape into the air and produce toxic air pollutants. That adversely affects air quality, which ultimately affects your health as well.

PLANNING ON AN OUTDOOR **ADVENTURE – BE SAFE!**

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to inform constituents of Public Safety and Emergency Management's funding announcement of \$977,916 to the Search and Rescue Volunteer Association of Canada (SARVAC), for the development and application of a new AdventureSmart Trip App. The funding will also be used to update training for SAR volunteers, data collection and an e-learning platform. The app

will increase safety awareness and spread prevention messages to Canadians.

The app is currently available on iOS and Android devices. The download is free.

In Canada, search and rescue is a responsibility shared by governments, the military, volunteers, and industry groups. There are approximately 15,000 Search and Rescue volunteers across Canada, representing ground, air and maritime domains. Canada's search and rescue area of responsibility is 18 million square kilometres of

land and water and includes the longest coastline in the world.

One of the app's features is to produce a #TripPlan, that can be left with a responsible person when heading out on an outdoor adventure. A plan can help first responders and search and rescue volunteers find a lost or injured person.

The three main tenets of the AdventureSmart program are Trip Planning, Training and Taking the Essentials (the three Ts).




