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ONOWAY REGIONAL MEDICAL CLINIC IS UNDERGOING SOME EXCITING CHANGES

From 2008 to 2016, twelve municipalities supported the operations of Onoway Regional Medical Clinic by providing an annual \$76,000 cash subsidy to the clinic's operator. Concerns about the sustainability of a permanent and growing subsidy led these municipal partners to consider alternative fund-

ing structures. A business case was developed that suggested the clinic could be operated for profit without a municipal subsidy, and in January of 2017, six municipal partners (the Town of Onoway; Lac Ste. Anne County; and the Summer Villages of Ross Haven, West Cove, Silver Sands and Val Quentin) assumed operations of Onoway Regional Medical Clinic (ORMC).

The initial commitment was

for a two-year trial to prove a business case for a medical clinic in Onoway operated without subsidy. The results of this trial have been nothing short of remarkable. At the end of the two-year mark, our clinic was operating with a small profit, which was reinvested back into the facility. The clinic exceeded revenue projections by 11% in 2017 and 15% in 2018.

With the departure of Dr. Winterbach earlier this year, we are now focused on recruiting a new third physician. Additionally, we're interested in working with a Primary Care Network to bring the services of nurses, dietitians, therapists, and other specialized medical resources to the com-

munity. Although the ORMC Board and partner municipalities are all supportive of adding these services, the current clinic space limits our ability to house and support these additional services. The ORMC Board has made an official request to its municipal shareholders to support its efforts to improve the variety of services available in the region and help it find a new

larger location for the clinic.

Regardless of the outcome of our request for additional clinic space, we will begin to work through the process of incorporating as a Municipally Controlled Corporation. This process will complete the efforts of our municipal partners to ensure the sustainable and independent operation of Onoway Regional Medical Clinic without a dependence upon municipal subsidies to survive.

A Success Story in Accessible, Family-focused Medical Care Onoway Regional Medical Clinic continues to accept new patients. With its convenient location next to the pharmacy in Onoway, the clinic's friendly and knowledgeable staff provide a spectrum of essential services from routine check-ups to more specialized treatments such as:

• Medicals & completion of required forms, including driver's medicals, insurance, employer physicals and notes, and Work-



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RCMP – INTERIM MANAGEMENT ADVISORY BOARD

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise constituents that the Department of Public Safety is taking immediate steps to establish a new Interim Management Advisory Board for the RCMP, to provide advice on the administration and management of the RCMP, and strategies to achieve its objective, by

- transformation and moderniza-
- the effective and efficient use of RCMP resources;
- corporate risk and responses to address them;
- policies and management controls that support RCMP operations;
- human resources and labour relations;
- corporate and strategic direction, and implementation plans including, financial and human resources strategies and multi-year

plans;

- operating and capital budgets; and
- performance measurement and departmental results.

The Governor in Council will appoint up to 13 part-time members to the initial Board by April 1, 2019. Legislative changes will be introduced this spring to the RCMP Act to make the Board permanent.

The mandate of the Board will initially focus on key priorities of RCMP transformation, including supporting the development of a "People First Strategy," RCMP business modernization and employee health and well-being.

"As a former RCMP Officer for 35 years, I welcome the creation of an Interim Management Advisory Board to assist in modernizing the RCMP," concluded MP Eglinski.



6 OPTIONS FOR FUNDING YOUR NEXT HOME IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Before starting a home improvement project, either on one's own or with the assistance of a professional contractor, homeowners must first consider the costs involved. According to the home improvement resource HomeAdvisor, more

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than one-third of homeowners do not understand what hiring a professional will cost, and then cannot successfully budget and secure financing once they have set their sights on a renovation project.

HomeAdvisor says that some

of the more popular projects, such as remodeling a kitchen or bathroom or building a deck, can cost, on average, \$19,920, \$9,274 and \$6,919, respectively.

1. Cash-out refinancing: With cash-out refinancing, a person will begin the mortgage process anew with the intention of paying off the current mortgage balance, and then taking out additional funds for other purposes. Cash-out refinancing is a way to tap into a home's existing equity for use on improvements or other expenses, such as college tuition.

2. Home equity line of credit: The financial experts at Bankrate indicate that a HELOC works like a credit card, with the house as collateral. There is

a credit limit, and borrowers can spend up to that limit. The interest rate may or may not be fixed. However, the interest may be tax-deductible if the financing is used to improve, buy or build a home.

- 3. Home equity loan: Individuals also can borrow against equity in their homes with a fixed interest rate through a home equity loan. Most lenders will calculate 80 percent of the home value and subtract a homeowner's mortgage balance to figure out how much can be borrowed, according to the financial advisory site The Simple Dollar.
- 4. Personal loan: Homeowners can shop around at various financial institutions for competitive personal loans to be used for home improvement purposes.

Funds may be approved within one business day, which can be ideal for those who want to begin their improvements soon.

- 5. Personal line of credit: A personal line of credit allows borrowers to borrow only the money needed at the time, and offers a variable interest rate that is generally lower than fixed loan rates. Again, like a credit card, PLOC gives a person a maximum borrowing amount and is ideal for ongoing purchases.
- 6. Credit cards: In a pinch, credit cards can be used to finance improvements, but they do come with the cost of very high interest rates if the balance is not paid in full by the time the bill comes due. However, for funding smaller projects

and maximizing rewards points through home improvement retailers or specific credit card company promotions, credit cards can be a way to earn various perks in addition to the benefit of improving a home.

DESIGNS GRAY IS HERE TO STAY IN



COUNTY ADDRESSES FROZEN CULVERTS

Lac Ste. Anne County is experiencing a significant number of frozen culverts and incidents of ditch glaciation.

This issue was precipitated by arctic temperatures, large amounts of insulating snow cover, and groundwater continuing to run throughout the winter months.

Public Works employees are actively thawing culverts throughout the area on numerous roads and approaches within our borders. Thawing culverts is a very time consuming and challenging process. When the warmer weather arrives, it will take some time for the culverts to fully thaw and to handle the



increases in water volume. This may result in water pooling near our infrastructure. Residents are advised to use caution while driving and slow down while crossing these affected areas.

Please report frozen culvert locations to PW@LSAC. ca. Please note that culvert issues will be handled on a basis of urgency. Non-urgent matters will be addressed in the order they are received.

CHANGES TO DUST CONTROL PROGRAM

After much discussion, at the March 14 County Council meeting, Council moved to make some changes to the current dust control program that's provided annually to County residents. Historically, the service has been offered to the residents for private dust control at a subsidized rate. This subsidy, funded by public tax dollars, equated to roughly 55%, meaning residents paid \$400/100 meters toward the full cost of \$877/100 meters.

To make this program fair and equitable, and to avoid any budget implications, Council has elected to discontinue the subsidized rate for private dust control. Recognizing that there are many residents who utilize the service, the County will continue to offer the service at full application costs. At this time, two dust application options are available:

- 1. Purchasing Calcium with a gravel application = \$877 + GST/ 100 meters (minimum)
- Purchasing Calcium without a gravel application
 \$558 + GST/ 100 meters (minimum)

COUNTY LAUNCHES MUNICIPAL LAND CORPORATION

County Council has initiated a process to establish a Municipally Controlled Corporation (MCC) to provide property development and facility management services desirable to the municipality and for the benefit to residents of Lac Ste. Anne County. This entity will be called Legacy Municipal Land Corporation, or Legacy MLC for short.


Projects that bring significant benefit to regional communities and residents may not always be seen by the private development sector as having sufficient return on investment. Recognizing this economic barrier, the County has decided to establish a Municipally Controlled Corporation (MCC) to provide property development and facility management services for communicipal communicipal services for communic

nity-focused projects.

Municipally controlled corporations (MCCs) are for-profit corporations where a municipality (or group of municipalities) holds more than 50 per cent of the votes in electing directors of the corporation. Controlled corporations are similar to other privately-owned business corporations, but must comply with specific requirements under

the Municipal Government Act and the Control of Corporations Regulation. Although municipalities maintain the controlling interest in these corporations, day-to-day operations occur at arm's length.
