The 2,000 new long-term care beds provide benefits to both patients and their caregivers by:

- Reducing crowding in emergency rooms which helps ER nurses and ER team.
- Helping to improve the responsiveness of our paramedics.
- Reducing wait times.
- Ensuring people who need long-term care are being treated in the proper facility.
- Allowing nurses and other staff to focus on patients who should be treated in hospital.
- Ensuring long-term care nurses and caregivers get the space and resources they need to care for long-term care patients.

Notley's \$170-million strategic investment ensures the 2,000 new long-term care beds are added over the next five years and that the beds already added under her government are kept operational. 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#### RCMP - INTERIM MANAGEMENT ADVISORY BOARD

Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to advise constituents that the Department of Public Safety is taking immediate steps to establish a new Interim Management Advisory Board for the RCMP, to provide advice on the administration and management of the RCMP, and strategies to achieve its objective, by:

· transformation and modernization plans;

- the effective and efficient use of RCMP resources;
- · corporate risk and responses to address them;
- · policies and management controls that support RCMP operations;
- · human resources and labour relations:
- · corporate and strategic direction, and implementation plans including, financial and human resources

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strategies and multi-year plans;

- · operating and capital budgets;
- · performance measurement and departmental results.

The Governor in Council will appoint up to 13 part-time members to the initial Board by April 1, 2019. Legislative changes will be introduced this spring to the RCMP Act to make the Board permanent.

The mandate of the Board will initially focus on key priorities of RCMP transformation, including supporting the development of a "People First Strategy," RCMP business modernization and employee health and well-being.

"As a former RCMP Officer for 35 years, I welcome the creation of an Interim Management Advisory Board to assist in modernizing the RCMP," concluded MP Eglinski.

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#### SPRUCE GROVE RCMP WARN RESIDENTS ABOUT ONGOING SCAM

Spruce Grove RCMP are reminding the public about an ongoing scam in which taxpayers across the country receive phone calls or emails from individuals impersonating CRA employees. These people are scammers. A local resident recently fell victim to this scam and RCMP are once again educating the public on this issue.

An individual received a call from the Canada Revenue Agency indicating that she owed taxes following an audit. The caller demanded that she pay the amount owing by purchasing iTunes cards and providing the activation codes to the caller.

The phone scammers typically threaten individuals with arrest, imminent legal action, a warrant for arrest, or deportation if their demands are not met. No legitimate government agency or business will demand payment in gift cards or prepaid credit cards. These methods are used by criminals in order to hide

their activities from police.

## ALBERTA RCMP STARTS 2019 BY TACKLING IMPAIRED DRIVING AND SHARING INTERSECTION SAFETY TIPS

This past holiday season, RCMP ran Checkstops across Alberta. From Dec. 22, 2018 to Jan. 2, 2019, Alberta RCMP laid 81 charges for impaired operation by alcohol and five charges for impaired operation by drugs.

As we enter into a new year, Alberta RCMP encourages drivers to maintain safe driving habits on all types of roads, including intersections, in both urban and rural roads. In Alberta, the most frequently identified driver errors leading to collisions that occurred at intersections in 2016 were: improper left turns, committing a stop sign violation and disobeying a traffic signal. (Alberta Transportation)

Alberta RCMP encourages you to practice the following intersection #TrafficSafety tips:

Drivers

- Slow down as you approach an intersection, stop and check all traffic before proceeding.
- Obey traffic signs and signals. Make a full stop at red lights and stop signs, even when turning right.
- At a four-way stop, remember the Right of Way rule. You must yield to the vehicle on your right.
- Leave ample room between your vehicle and the vehicle in front. It might stop unexpectedly.
- Use your signal when making turns. Ensure it is safe to turn left before doing so.
- Pedestrians have the right of way in all marked or unmarked crosswalks. Pay attention to pedestrians crossing when making any turns or at an all-way stop.
- Be prepared for the unexpected. Always look for pedestrians, changing lights, slippery road conditions and other drivers before proceeding through an intersection.
- Don't try to speed up on a yellow light. A yellow light means slow down and prepare to stop.

Pedestrians

- Never jaywalk. Check traffic before crossing and only proceed when it is safe to do so.
- Always use crosswalks and pedestrian-activated signals when they are available.

• Don't be a distracted pedestrian. Remove headphones; put away cell phones or other electronic devices when crossing the street.

"Intersection safety entails consistently watching the road and other drivers and pedestrians to avoid dangerous collisions. You should never assume that other drivers will do the right thing at an intersection," said Supt. Rick Gardner, Alberta Sheriffs. "We all have the responsibility as road users, drivers

and pedestrians alike, that intersection safety is a shared responsibility."


"Almost every collision is preventable. The most common driver errors at intersections include driving too fast for road conditions, unsafe turns, running yellow or red lights and unsafe lane changes," said Supt. Gary Graham, Alberta RCMP Traffic Services. "From Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 2018, there were 31 fatalities involving intersections in

Alberta RCMP jurisdictions. When we all take steps to enhance intersection safety, we have the ability to reduce the number of collisions and save lives."

## NO SPRAY PROGRAM YEARLY RENEWAL REMINDER

If you are a Yellowhead County landowner who does not want herbicide applied adjacent to your property, you must enter into a no-spray agreement with the County prior to April 1st of each year. This means that you will be responsible for weed and brush control in the designated areas, as defined by the no-spray agreement.

Once an agreement has been completed, you must place nospray signs in a highly visible area as close as possible to the property line. No-spray signs must be purchased from the Yellowhead County Edson or Wildwood Offices at a cost of \$5.00 for two signs.

Yellowhead County Agricultural Services requires each landowner who has signed the agreement to fulfill their obligations before the July 1st deadline. After the July 1st deadline, Yellowhead County re-assumes responsibility for weed and brush control and may apply herbicide adjacent to non-compliant roadsides if necessary.

If you chose not to renew your agreement for 2019, we ask that you please remove your signs prior to the start of the spray season starting May 1st, 2019.

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## INVESTIGATION OF LARGE SCALE FRAUD OPERATION RESULTS IN NUMEROUS CHARGES

On Jan. 4, 2019 an investigation conducted by members of the Stony Plain/Spruce Grove/ Enoch RCMP Drug Section and Crime Reduction Unit led to the execution of a search warrant at a residence in Stony Plain, Alta.

Police recovered a large quantity of stolen mail, stolen and fraudulent identity documents,

stolen and fraudulent cheques and a small quantity of methamphetamine.

Crystal Stebbings (38) of Stony Plain, Alta. has been charged with:

- Possession of property obtained by crime less than or equal to \$5000
- Unauthorized use of credit cared data
- Draw execute document without authorization, so as to de-

fraud

- Identity theft
- Identity fraud
- Possession of Methamphetamine (Crystal Meth)
- Unauthorized possession of a prohibited weapon
- Make/Sell/Possess instruments for making a forged document
- Theft, forgery, misuse of credit card
- · Possession of matter stolen

Stebbings was out of custody on two separate recognizances. The first was stemming from an arrest in Edmonton in Apr. 2018 which resulted in her being charged with possession of property obtained by crime and 25 additional charges. The second pertained to a Jul. 2018 charge from Leduc for theft of a motor vehicle.

She was released from custody after a judicial interim hearing on Jan. 16, 2019, and will be appearing in Stony Plain Provincial Court on Feb. 6, 2019.

During the search of the residence the following was located:

- 3 grams of methamphetamine;
- A fraudulent Alberta Operator's licence containing the information of one of the victim's but altered to have Crystal Stebbing's photograph displayed
- A binder which contained, among other items, hundreds of fraudulent or stolen gift cards
- Hundreds of stolen or fraudulent debit cards, credit cards, gift cards and identification documents of hundreds of victims with an estimated value exceeding \$100,000
- Hundreds of stolen or fraudulent cheques with more then 50 victims with an estimated value exceeding \$100,000
- Thousands of pages of financial, government issued or mailed documents from more then a hundred victims from locations across Alberta
- Hundreds of pages of hotel receipts which contain complete credit card details from hotel guests;
- Blank cheque printing paper
- A typewriter loaded with a fraudulent bank draft with the amount \$11,289.29 typed on it
- Nun chucks (a prohibited weapon)

Investigation revealed that some of the victims did not realize they were victims of fraud and/or identity theft. Some of the documents located during the search warrant had been taken from recycling bins, some from the garbage. These documents



## CONCEPTUAL DESIGN AND LOCATION CHOSEN FOR EDSON MULTI-USE RECREATION COMPLEX

The joint Town of Edson and Yellowhead County Steering Committee has agreed to the project scope, location, timeline, and cost of the proposed Multi-Use Recreation Complex to be constructed in Edson, at Griffiths Park. The chosen location will be ideal for future expansion and parking considerations.

The project is estimated to cost \$70 million, though the proposed development and construction timeline will allow

both communities to budget in a responsible manner with the objective of a limited impact on future tax rates and consider the current and future impacts of the local economy.

This option has all the recreational requirements that were part of the Steering Committee's tender that were derived from recent community engagement, as well as previous consultation with various community groups and organizations that took into account all the needs for local recreation.

Going forward, the Steering

Committee intends to present their recommendations to both Yellowhead County and Edson Councils for adoption, as well as bringing it to the residents for information regarding the design concepts.

After a thorough review process, the facility's detailed design is planned to commence in late 2019 and construction anticipated to commence in late 2022. The Steering Committee is very pleased with the regional cooperation that has been displayed throughout the realization of this project, and believes this to be

the right recreational enterprise to serve our communities and future generations.

Moreover, the Steering Committee is confident that the timelines set out for this project will allow our communities to gauge and plan fiscally—so that this exciting new initiative can be accommodated with limited tax implications.

Thank you to all who participated in the development of this initiative, and we are excited to continue our regional collaboration to ensure that the needs of our residents are met.





be fixed. However, the interest may be tax-deductible if the financing is used to improve, buy or build a home.

- 3. Home equity loan: Individuals also can borrow against equity in their homes with a fixed interest rate through a home equity loan. Most lenders will calculate 80 percent of the home value and subtract a homeowner's mortgage balance to figure out how much can be borrowed, according to the financial advisory site The Simple Dollar.
- 4. Personal loan: Homeowners can shop around at various financial institutions for competitive personal loans to be used for home improvement purposes. Funds may be ap-

proved within one business day, which can be ideal for those who want to begin their improvements soon.

- 5. Personal line of credit: A personal line of credit allows borrowers to borrow only the money needed at the time, and offers a variable interest rate that is generally lower than fixed loan rates. Again, like a credit card, PLOC gives a person a maximum borrowing amount and is ideal for ongoing purchases.
- 6. Credit cards: In a pinch, credit cards can be used to finance improvements, but they do come with the cost of very high interest rates if the balance is not paid in full by the time the bill comes due. How-

#### WHEN IT CAN BE SMART TO HIRE A PAINTING PRO

Even though some people think they'll save money by painting their own homes, that's not necessarily true. Professionals already have all the equipment necessary, unlike novices who may need to make repeated and potentially costly trips to the hardware store for supplies. Plus, if mistakes happen, DIYers have to spend additional time and money fixing them.

Safety can be a large motivator for turning painting over to a pro. Navigating exterior areas or tall interior ceilings can be challenging and may require scaffolding or tall ladders DIYers do not have. Risk of falls or other injuries increase with lack of experience.

Painting can give a home a facelift, and oftentimes it is smart to turn the work over to professionals to ensure the job is done just right.

#### Proposed Bylaw 2019-01 Cannabis Related Amendments to the Land Use Bylaw

As a result of the legislation enacted at the Federal and Provincial levels of government (Cannabis Act, October 17, 2018; Gaming and Liquor Statutes Amendment Act, May 30, 2018), Cannabis cultivation, processing, and retail sales, are legal and regulated in Canada. Municipalities, as the land use management authorities, are responsible for the land use and zoning regulations that will direct these activities. Bylaw 2019-01 includes new land use classes and definitions for a variety of cannabis-related activities; including Cannabis Cultivation, Cannabis Processing and refining the definition of Cannabis Retail Sales. This proposed bylaw also includes the necessary accompanying regulations and identifies appropriate land use districts for each of the new use classes.

#### **Hearing Procedure**

This is a formal Public Hearing and Council is prepared to hear and receive formal submissions and presentations (verbal or written) from those who wish to speak to the proposed Bylaw. #### WHAT TO DO WHEN A TIRE BLOWS OUT WHILE DRIVING

Many frightening scenarios can unfold while driving. Inclement weather can affect visibility and the safety of roads, while distracted driving can put anyone on the road in harm's way.

One situation that can suddenly turn a Sunday drive into something scary is a blown out tire. No drivers or vehicles are immune to blown out tires. But savvy drivers who know what to do in such situations can greatly reduce their risk of a blown out tire turning into something far worse.

Recognizing a blown out tire

The movies might make blown out tires seem as though drivers suddenly find themselves in wholly uncontrollable situations. But blown out tires won't immediately send cars into the nearest roadside ditch. When a tire blows, the vehicle will immediately slow down and then begin pulling to the right or left, depending on which side of the car suffered the blowout. The automotive retailer Pep Boys notes that, if a front tire blows out, drivers will feel the force in their steering wheels, while a rear tire blowout will be felt more in the seat and/or body of the vehicle.

Driving through a blowout

Plenty of drivers have safely navigated their way through tire blowouts. When such a situation arises, drivers should avoid slamming on their brakes, instead allowing their vehicles to gradually decelerate, making sure to turn on their emergency flashing lights once they are certain they have control of the vehicle. As the vehicle slows down, pull to the side of the road, calling for help if necessary.

When on the side of the road


Drivers who do not have a spare tire or cannot change the tire themselves should wait patiently for assistance to arrive after they have called for help. Drivers who can change their tires should place reflective cones or triangles behind their vehicles before they begin working. Such devices warn oncoming drivers of stranded vehicles. If replacing the tire with a donut, remember that such replacement tires are not designed to travel long distances and will need to be replaced shortly after they are put on the vehicle.

This December, over 400 Grade 4 to 12 students got some much-needed schooling on internet safety courtesy of The White Hatter team.

The award-winning White Hatter Team visited Yellowhead County to remind our students of best digital safety practices. The team includes Darren Laur, a former Staff Sergeant with the Victoria City Police Department, and his son, Brandon, who recently received his Master's Degree in Professional Communications. Both have devoted their professional lives to helping the public navigate the darker side of the internet.

This event was put on in partnership with both Grande Yellowhead and Parkland School divisions. Key messages for digital safety included:

- Old cell phones should not be sold, even after a factory reset, as some of the information can still be accessed.
- Six digit passwords are optimal for improving a phone's unlock security.
- Finally and probably the most important, kids should remember that "Everything they do online is public, permanent, searchable, exploitable, copy-able and for sale." The team stressed that banks, colleges, universities, and employers are

The White Hatter Team also facilitated a session of tips for parents, noting that the most important thing a parent can do to keep their kid(s) safe online is to keep Wi-Fi-capable devices out of kids' bedrooms. Devices should be used with parental su-

pervision until parents feel their kids can be trusted to use their devices responsibly.

Darren also impressed on parents that "The majority of kids are [...] really good digital citizens. Only a small percentage of them aren't and it's that small percentage that gets a lot of the media attention and as a result, a lot of parents think that all the

kids are doing bad stuff when in fact, that's not true."

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

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












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
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
