\$100M IN FUNDING FOR STEEL AND ALUMINUM INDUSTRIES

EX-RCMP MEMBER FACING ADDITIONAL CHARGES FOR OBSTRUCTION

On March 28, 2019, former RCMP member Aaron Lee Sayler was charged with two additional counts of obstruction of justice and one count of breach of a recognizance.

Further to an ongoing investigation, it is alleged that between the dates of Feb. 8 and March 5,

2019, Mr. Sayler counselled or instructed the destruction of evidence and interfered with a witness in relation to his previous charges. Mr. Sayler will appear in the Provincial Court of Alberta on April 10, 2019.

On March 28, 2019, Sukhvinder Gill was also charged with two counts of obstruction of justice alleging that she engaged

in the concealment and/or destruction of evidence in relation to Mr. Sayler's charges, and acted to facilitate his planned exit from Canada. Ms. Gill was released on a promise to appear to attend court on May 8, 2019.

As these matters are now before the court, no further information will be released at this time.

\$100M in Funding for Steel and Aluminum Industries

Canadian (SME) manufacturers that are significant users of steel and aluminum play an important role in transforming these inputs into finished or semi-finished products for the manufacturing, defence, aerospace, energy, automotive, and construction industries. Esca-

lating commodity prices and increasing financial and competitive pressures have significantly impacted SMEs operating within Canadian steel and aluminum supply chains.

The Regional Economic Growth through Innovation Steel and Aluminum Initiative will:

•Assist firms with high growth potential to scale up and expand;

•Support technology demonstration and the commercialization of new technologies;

•Encourage the early adoption or adaptation of leading-edge technologies and processes to improve productivity; and

•Increase businesses' capacity to grow through market diversification and entry into global markets.

Contributions will range from \$150,000 to \$1 million, to support up to a maximum of 45 percent of eligible project costs.

Priority will be given to applications received on or before April 8, 2019.

"As Canada's steel and aluminum sectors are key contributors to the Canadian economy, I encourage small and medium-sized steel and aluminum industries to apply for this funding," concluded MP Eglinski.

ERIN BABCOCK BACKS NOTLEY PLAN TO REDUCE WAIT TIMES

-- "Your vote decides the future of public healthcare" says Notley --

Alberta NDP Candidate Erin Babcock said Rachel Notley's plan to strengthen our public health system will improve emergency care, cut wait times for surgeries and get EMS crews back into the community faster.

Notley made the announcement in Calgary alongside healthcare professionals. The plan targets \$90 million per year toward reducing surgical wait times and increasing emergency care for Albertans in need. Nearly 40,000 more Albertans will get the surgery they need over the next 3 years with this strategic investment.

"Albertans deserve a government that makes sure their loved ones get the care they need, when they need it. I'm proud that Rachel Notley and our team are fighting for better frontline care."

Notley's plan will:

- Increase urgent access to specialists, such as internists,
- Create new community-based care teams to assist patients at home,

"Investing in surgeries, ERs, and EMS crews will mean tens of thousands more Albertans don't have to wait to get the care they need," said Babcock. "This will make a huge difference in the communities of Spruce Grove-Stony Plain



PARLIAMENT UPDATE - WEEK OF MARCH 18, 2019

On Monday, in the Standing Committee on Public Safety and National Security (SECU), we heard from witnesses on Cybersecurity in the Financial Sector as a National Economic Security Issue. Also, on Monday, I attended a briefing session for parliamentarians who will be attending, as observers, the presidential election in the Ukraine.

On Tuesday, Budget 2019 was introduced.

On Wednesday, 61 votes were held on the Supplementary Estimates (B), 2018- 19 and 68 votes on the Interim Estimates.

On Thursday, an emergency debate was held that evening on the topic of the Prime Minister pressuring the former Attorney General to interfere in the prosecution of SNC-Lavalin.

UCP FAILED SPRUCE GROVE-STONY PLAIN ON FIGHTING RURAL CRIME

SPRUCE GROVE - If UCP candidate Searle Turton was serious about fighting rural crime why did Jason Kenney's UCP oppose giving RCMP the resources they needed to fight it?

On March 15, 2018, the UCP voted against \$37 million that was intended to go towards pay for the salaries and supports of rural RCMP officers.

On April 19, 2018, the UCP voted against an entire rural crime strategy that included:

- 59 additional RCMP officers
- 20 new crown prosecutors
- 40 new RCMP civilian personnel
- 4 new provincial court judges
 - 55 new court clerks
 - 13 new bail clerks

These resources have gone on

to reduce rural property crime by 16 per cent - all while the UCP voted against every single one of them.

"Under Rachel Notley's plan, rural crime is going down and officers are spending more time in our communities to ensure we're safe," said Erin Babcock, NDP candidate for Spruce Grove-Stony Plain. "I'm focused on fighting for what matters for everyone in our community. The UCP needs to answer for why

they voted against important funding to fight rural crime."

RCMP Superintendent Peter Tewfik said about the NDP's strategy: "We've looked at the data and I can tell you our crime reduction strategy is working. Midway through our first year of implementing the strategy, our data indicates our policing approach is making a difference."

Jason Kenney and UCP candidate Searle Turton have some questions to answer. Why did they reject funding to fight rural crime when they had the chance? Why now, with an election looming, do they decide that it's time to show leadership on an issue that the NDP has been leading from the start?



Radon is a colorless, odorless gas that forms naturally when radioactive elements, such as uranium, decay. These radioactive elements can be found in different amounts in soil and rock throughout the world. Though radon is present outdoors and indoors, it is often present in such small amounts that it does not pose a threat to human health. However, the American Cancer Society notes that prolonged exposure to high levels of radon can lead to lung cancer. People who work underground, such

as miners, are most likely to be exposed to high levels of radon. People who work in factories where uranium is processed or those who come in contact with phosphate fertilizers are more likely to be exposed to high, and potentially dangerous, levels of radon. Building materials made from substances that contain radon also can lead to unhealthy levels of radon exposure. However, such substances, which the ACS notes include concrete and wallboard, often give off very low levels of radon.

BENEFITS OF FREESTANDING TUBS

Few home design elements provide the instant wow factor of freestanding tubs. Freestanding tubs have an air of luxury that can help current homeowners relax, and impress buyers when homes go on the market.

Freestanding tubs are typically made of cast iron or porcelain. • Cleaning: Because they're detached from other bathroom fixtures and not flush against the wall, freestanding tubs tend to be easier to clean than built-in bathtubs. Freestanding tubs are accessible from all sides, making it easy to reach all those nooks and crannies where grime can build up.

• Return on investment: In its 2018 "Cost vs. Value" report, Remodeling magazine noted that upscale bathroom remodels recouped 56.2 percent of their cost at resale. That was a better return on investment than an upscale kitchen remodel (53.5 percent) and an upscale master suite addition (48.3 percent). The thought of a sizable return on investment can make relaxing in a freestanding tub that much more enjoyable.

• Warmth: Even freestanding tubs made of materials other than cast iron offer great heat retention. Stone resin bathtubs, for example, provide excellent insulation on cold nights. That's ideal for people who want to unwind in the tub without having to exit early because the water has become cold.

Freestanding tubs can transform regular bathrooms into luxurious oases.



Bylaw 02.19 Public Hearing - A public hearing was held for Bylaw 02.19, an amendment to Land Use Bylaw 16.13 to align the county's Land Use Bylaw with recent changes to the MGA. Bylaw 02.19 would have the effect of establishing timelines for reviewing development permit applications and revising timelines for issuing decisions on development permit applications. Additionally, this bylaw revises the timeline for submitting an appeal to the Subdivision and Development Appeal Board. No public opinion was submitted for council's consideration.

Guenette Area Structure Plan Repeal Public Hearing - A public hearing was held in regards to Bylaw 05.19, which aims to rescind Bylaw 13.99, being the Guenette Area Structure Plan that is located within the NE 1/4 32-52-17-W5M. Approved in 1999, this structure plan allowed for the creation of a one-lot subdivision south of Edson. Since that time, policy changes have meant that developing an additional lot does not require such detailed planning. No public opinion was submitted for council's consideration.

Terrace Heights North Joint Area Structure Plan Repeal Public Hearing – A public hearing



was held in regards to Bylaw 05.19, which aims to rescind Bylaw 29.95, being the Terrace Heights North Joint Area Structure Plan that is located within the N 1/2 4-51-25-W5M. Bylaw 29.95 is now obsolete because the aforementioned lands have been annexed into the town of Hinton. No public opinion was submitted for council's consideration.

Edson Forest Products Letter of Support – Council provided a

letter of support for Edson Forest Products for the following: The company claims that they exceed the standards placed upon them by Alberta Environment and are seeking Yellowhead County council's support for an extension to the certificate of variance so they may continue to use the Olivine burner until such time as Pinnacle (the former consumer of Edson Forest Product's hog fuel) is operational or other options can be

pursued.

Hinton Mountain Bike Association Letter of Support – Council moved to send a letter of support to the Hinton Mountain Bike Association for their efforts towards obtaining grant funding for the Bighorn Trail project.

The next Council Meeting is April 9, 2019. The next Governance & Priorities Committee Meeting is April 16, 2019. All meetings start at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers.

Proposed Bylaw 2019-01 Cannabis Related Amendments to the Land Use Bylaw

As a result of the legislation enacted at the Federal and Provincial levels of government (Cannabis Act, October 17, 2018; Gaming and Liquor Statutes Amendment Act, May 30, 2018), Cannabis cultivation, processing, and retail sales, are legal and regulated in Canada. Municipalities, as the land use management authorities, are responsible for the land use and zoning regulations that will direct these activities. Bylaw 2019-01 includes new land use classes and definitions for a variety of cannabis-related activities; including Cannabis Cultivation, Cannabis Processing and refining the definition of Cannabis Retail Sales. 




