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ALBERTA RCMP MEMBER CHARGED AFTER INVESTIGATION

Premier-Designate Kenney Announces Priorities to Get Alberta Working Again

“Yesterday’s election produced a strong mandate for change, a clear declaration of Albertans’ confidence in our United Conservative team and the new direction outlined in our platform,” Kenney said. “In the highest turnout since 1982, over 55 percent of those who voted expressed their support for a government committed to getting our province working again.”

Premier-Designate Kenney thanked and congratulated all Albertans who participated in the election as party leaders, candidates, campaign volunteers, and voters. “I especially want to thank and congratulate Premier Rachel Notley for her service to our province including her four years as premier,” said Kenney.

Noting that the urgent need for new pipelines was an issue all the major parties and leaders agreed on, Premier-Designate Kenney vowed that the new UCP government’s foremost priority will be getting the TransMountain pipeline approved as soon as possible. Key to that objective, he added, will be building and strengthening Alberta’s alliances with supporters of responsible natural resource development across Canada. “These include other provincial governments, First Nations, communities large and small, and millions of Canadians who understand how important energy and resource development are to our economy and our future,” Kenney said. “Together with these allies we will fight the Trudeau government’s offshore tanker ban, Bill C-48, and its no-more-pipelines bill, C-69. In fact, I am sending a letter today to Senator Tkachuk, Chair of the Standing Committee on Transport and Communications to request the opportunity to formally articulate our incoming government’s position that bill C-48 presents a grave threat to

the economic interests of Alberta and this great province. In our fight to get our resources to market, we will win, because there are far more Canadians with us than against us.”

And if the NDP government of British Columbia continues to obstruct the TransMountain pipeline, the Premier-Designate said, the new UCP government will enact legislation created by Premier Notley’s former government to turn off the flow of Al-

berta energy to BC. “This is not a bluff,” said Kenney. “Alberta will no longer stand by as others stand in the way of our future.”

Premier-Designate Kenney acknowledged the trust Albertans have invested in the new United Conservative government and its plan to get Alberta back to work, get pipelines built, and stand up for a fair deal in Canada. He promised relentless effort to deliver on the UCP commitments, including immediately

scrapping the carbon tax, implementing a job creation tax cut that will rapidly create over 50,000 new jobs, and slashing red tape and speeding up project approvals.

“Alberta has nothing to apologize for and everything to fight for,” Kenney said. “That’s the clear mandate Albertans have given our new United Conservative government. Our plan for a strong and free Alberta starts today.”

The Board of Trustees of Northern Gateway Regional Division No. 10 intends to implement Building Management Energy improvements to reduce energy and related costs in facilities that are owned and operated by the school division. The project estimated cost is \$3,300,000.00. The capital available is \$600,000.00.

Therefore, the sum of Two Million Seven Hundred Thousand (\$2,700,000.00) dollars is to be borrowed on the security of Northern Gateway Regional Division No. 10 by the issue of debentures and shall repay the indebtedness according to the repayment structure in effect, namely yearly equal payments of combined principal and interest installments not to exceed 20 years consecutive annual installments with interest at the rate determined from time to time by Alberta Capital Finance Authority (currently two point nine three per cent (2.93%) per annum). The total cost of the project will be recovered through energy savings.

The Board of Trustees have taken the necessary proceedings under the provisions of the School Act to obtain authority from the Minister of Education to borrow the aforesaid debenture funds or such portion of the said funds as may be required for the aforesaid purposes.

If you do not agree with the Board of Trustees of the Northern Gateway Regional Division No. 10 should implement a Building Management Energy improvement, you may petition for a vote in accordance under the provision of the School Act, Section 268.

And be received by the Superintendent of Schools within 15 days of the last publication of this public notice of the proposed debenture borrowing. The last publication date will be May 1, 2019.

BARRHEAD RCMP REPORT: APRIL 4 THROUGH APRIL 10

Barrhead Detachment investigated 9 theft related complaints this week. Break and Enters were reported at two businesses in Barrhead, the first on April 5 and the other on April 7. An attempted theft of car was reported on April 8 after thieves gained entry to a 1991 Cadillac and damaged the ignition. They were not successful in getting the car started but did go ahead and steal the radio. A tidy tank was targeted in the Moonlight Bay area however the thieves did not manage to get any fuel. On April 8 Alberta licence plate BGN1443 was reported stolen from a vehicle parked on 46 Street in Barrhead and on April 10 somebody entered an unlocked van in the 58 Avenue area and stole the regis-

tration and insurance documents.

On April 9 a female mini bull-dog puppy was reported stolen from a yard on Range Road SOA in the area of Township Road 600. The dog is 5 months old and is brown and white in colour. She also has a bit of an under-bite. While police are still trying to determine for sure if the dog was stolen or simply wandered off, anyone with information is asked to call the detachment.

Copper thefts in the Tiger Lily and Fort Assiniboine area persist. Two suspects were observed on video stealing from a yard just North of Fort Assiniboine at 5 AM on April 11. Faces were not clear enough for identification. Detachment area residents are encouraged to call police immediately if they observe suspicious activity, regardless of the time of day.

Here is little about him and our family.

Jerusalem MERIT was founded in 2018 in order to support the Iraqi refugee community in Jordan. The ambassador of Jerusalem MERIT, The Reverend Canon Dr Andrew White, formerly known as the 'Vicar of Baghdad', was the main pioneer and religious leader support-

ing Iraqi Christians, Jews and Muslims and engaging in conflict resolution during the many years of national political and religious conflict and turmoil. Jerusalem MERIT continues to support this community which is largely a refugee community currently residing in Jordan. Jerusalem MERIT's projects include the provision of comprehensive education and medical assistance through the establishment of a school, medical clinic, the provision of food stamp projects and housing assistance for Iraqi refugees of all faiths. Jerusalem MERIT also supports Canon Andrew White in his international reconciliation and

diplomatic work, focusing principally on the Middle East.

Letter to the EDITOR

NORTHERN GATEWAY DAY HOME BUSING POLICY LACKS PUBLIC INPUT

On March 12, 2019, after 3.5 years without incident, I was notified that my two children could no longer ride the bus after school from Onoway Elementary School to their day home in Sandy Beach, effective immediately (even though the bus stops at the day home anyway). A transportation policy barring the use of school buses for transportation to and from day homes had been enacted in September of 2018 (but was not communicated to our family or the day home). When I asked why the policy was put in place, the acting VP indicated that it was not appropriate for the school division to be "subsidizing" the day home's business by providing this service.

My family promptly requested the superintendent provide us with a written copy of the policy, indicate who reviewed and approved the policy, and what stakeholder consultation and demographic and impact analysis were done in the development of this policy. This information has not been addressed to date.

The superintendent indicated it was a local practice that was not formally approved by the director of transportation, and that the school had made the decision to

cease the practice. However, in talking to parents, day homes, daycares, and agencies in the Valleyview, Fox Creek, Whitecourt, Sangudo, and Mayerthorpe areas, I quickly discovered that this is not a local issue at all. This "policy" is a top-down, unilateral decision made in isolation by the director of transportation and affects the entire school division.

The impact of this policy is far-reaching, including reducing the availability of already limited rural childcare options, and reducing affordability for working families. In the absence of stakeholder consultation, and demographic and impact analysis, the policy fails to address how childcare providers, working mothers, and families are affected. No consideration was given to the rural families, Indigenous families, shift workers, and families with special needs children, already facing barriers to accessing quality childcare. As this policy was not communicated to my day home for six months because the director of transportation did not know the day home existed, I can only surmise that no formal census of day homes/daycares was conducted. This policy also fails to address the unnecessary risk

of transporting children privately versus riding the bus. At a municipal level, it paints a bleak picture of Lac Ste. Anne County, the MD of Greenview, and Woodlands County, as less attractive places to work, live, and raise a family.

Childcare providers across the school division have been told by the director of transportation to purchase a transport van or bus to get children to and from the school. That is not financially feasible for most providers who work for less than minimum wage. In my provider's day home, she has two babies that nap. It is not feasible for her to take the babies with her on the 46 km (round trip) to drop off and pick up the children from school (for a total of 92 kms a day). It impacts her ability to provide quality care, and to retain and attract clientele, and the added costs of transportation are quickly affecting her bottom line. Telling childcare providers to purchase a vehicle is a woefully inadequate and out-of-touch response to the shortcomings of this policy.

The school division's bus policy needs to be built on public consultation and local decision-making. It needs to be re-

sponsive to the needs of the community, and the process must be open. As working parents, our taxes contribute to paying for transportation services, and our concerns and suggestions should be considered in the development of policies that directly impact us, our families, and our communities. Top-down, unilateral decisions – with zero accountability and transparency – simply do not reflect good governance and the high standards to which Alberta taxpayers hold public servants.

Day homes provide a much-needed community service that reflects modern family realities. Help us affirm the pivotal role that childcare plays in supporting our communities' families. 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ANTIMICROBIAL TILES HELP CREATE SANITARY SPACES

Tile can be a worthy addition to rooms with potential moisture issues or areas in a home that may routinely necessitate quick cleanup. Because they are not damaged by constant contact with water, tiled floors and walls are often found in bathrooms, kitchens, laundry

rooms, and entryways. Although tile is resilient, it is not impervious to the microorganisms that tend to proliferate in areas where moisture and humidity are commonplace. Microbes can grow rapidly in warm areas, especially if food is present. Mold or mildew

issues also can become problematic seemingly overnight. But certain modifications can help homeowners alleviate the proliferation of microorganisms.

Various manufacturers have developed their own innovative tile that contributes to cleaner, and

sometimes more eco-friendly, home environments. The application of certain treatments can make ceramic tiles even more impervious to water and moisture. Some tile may help reduce the spread of certain strains of bacteria, such as E. coli and staph, without requiring the application of potentially harsh chemical detergents. Others treatments may protect against yeast, molds and fungi that can cause stains and odors and result in the degradation of tile.

Antimicrobial products inhibit the growth of microorganisms and suppress their reproduction. For example, tiles with Microban protection employ an antimicrobial agent built into the product during the manufacturing process. When microbes touch the product surface, the agent penetrates the cell wall of the microorganism. Other tiles are treated with micrometric particles of titanium dioxide (TiO₂), which is activated by sunlight or artificial light. This causes a photocatalysis process, which is responsible for the product's antipollution and bactericidal properties. Examples of TiO₂-treated tiles include Active Clean Air & Antibacterial Ceramic.

Antimicrobial ceramic tile can be advantageous in rooms where sanitation and hygiene are an utmost priority. This includes not only public places, but private residences. Worktops and floors where microbes can be transferred are particularly beneficial areas to install antimicrobial tile.

A potential side effect of antimicrobial tile is a reduction in reliance on harsh cleaning products. Although regular washing is recommended, residents may not need to use odoriferous or strong chemical cleaners to sanitize their homes. This helps improve indoor air quality and reduce the potential contamination of the environment from chemical runoff.

Homeowners thinking of installing antimicrobial tile in their homes should discuss their options with a tile retailer or contractor during the planning stages.

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PREPARE HVAC SYSTEMS FOR WARMER DAYS AHEAD

The arrival of a new season can be an exciting time. Homeowners may have renewed vigor to start home renovation projects or even tackle some cleaning and organization tasks. Before the weather starts to warm up too much, homeowners may want to evaluate their home cooling needs and ensure that all equipment is in good working order. Spring air conditioning inspections and tuneups are essential steps in system performance. Homeowners should not take for granted that a system that performed optimally last year will do so this year when temperatures climb. Various factors, including weather damage, dust and grime, mechanical wear and tear, and even rodent or insect infestations, can compromise HVAC systems. Since HVAC systems have

so many moving parts, a thorough inspection of such systems can save headaches and money down the road. According to Heating Ontario, the extreme weather conditions that come along with fall and winter can be especially taxing on homes and the systems that keep them comfortable. During a spring visit, an HVAC technician will perform maintenance on the air conditioner and make sure it is ready for the heat of summertime. This maintenance may include cleaning the unit, checking controls, calibrating the thermostat, lubricating moving parts, checking refrigerant levels, tightening electrical connections, and clearing any clogs. Homeowners are urged to also change the filter at the start of the cooling season.

Correcting any issues in the HVAC system well in advance of the arrival of warm weather can help ensure comfort when air conditioning is needed. As an added ad-

vantage, homeowners should install programmable thermostats if they do not already have them to keep cooling as cost- and energy-efficient as possible.

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PITCH IN AND SAVE MONEY

Home improvement projects can be expensive. While the size and complexity of a project will affect how expensive the project is, homeowners can expect to shell out a pretty penny when they renovate or remodel areas

of their home. According to HomeAdvisor, an online resource for homeowners looking to connect with home improvement, maintenance and repair professionals, the average bathroom remodel-

ing project costs \$9,348, while the average home addition costs slightly less than \$41,000. But renovation-minded homeowners need not reconsider their commitment to remodeling, as there are various ways to cut the costs associated with home improvement projects.

One such way is for homeowners to pitch in and do some of the work themselves. Calculating labor costs can be difficult, as such costs can vary greatly depending on the project, the contractor and the amount of hired help that contractor intends to employ. However, some estimates suggest labor will account for anywhere from 25 to 50 percent of the overall cost of the project. So it's no surprise that homeowners can save themselves substantial

amounts of money by doing some of the work themselves.

Homeowners who intend to do some of the labor themselves should discuss this plan with contractors during the vetting process. Before hiring a contractor, make sure homeowners' expected labor contributions are clearly defined in the contract.

While it's best to leave the most complicated parts of a project to the professionals, homeowners can pitch in during the following phases.

- **Demolition:** Demolition involves more than picking up a sledgehammer and swinging away. Some demolition projects are best left to the pros. For example, any projects that involve exposure to hazardous materials are risky and therefore

best left to experienced laborers. However, many homeowners are capable of safely and effectively pulling cabinets from walls, removing flooring or knocking down drywall. Homeowners unsure of how to approach demolition tasks can ask their contractors to demonstrate the proper technique so the demolition is done right and on time.

• **Salvage:** Removing debris and items that will no longer be needed once the renovation is complete is another

way homeowners can pitch in. Homeowners remodeling their kitchens may be replacing their existing stoves and refrigerators and hoping to donate these items. In such instances, driving the items to the donation site or arranging for them to be picked up rather than taken off the premises by the contractor or his employees can cut labor costs, as it allows laborers to keep working toward the end goal rather than requiring them to leave the work site to drop unwanted items off.

• **Cleanup:** Homeowners also can save costs by cleaning up after the contractors at the end of each workday. Speak with the contractor about cleaning up the site each day, asking him or her what can be discarded

and what must remain on-site. Home improvements are costly. But homeowners who are capable of pitching in can greatly reduce the overall cost of their next renovation project.

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HOW TO TAME INDOOR HOME ODORS

A clean home interior can make a strong first impression on prospective buyers, but only if that home is accompanied by pleasant scents. Odors can make a strong impact on buyers' perceptions of a home, including its

level of cleanliness and upkeep. Although dirt and other grime can contribute to the odor of a home, additional culprits can contribute to foul smells as well. Everything from pets to the foods cooked in the kitchen

to the hidden presence of mold can impact air quality and odor inside a home. Fortunately, there are ways to remedy stinky problems and come away with sweet-smelling solutions.

It's important for homeowners to realize that foul air inside a home can be the result of poor indoor air quality - which can be a health hazard. The United States Environmental Protection Agency ranks indoor air quality as a top five environmental risk to public health. EPA studies found indoor air pollutants were generally two to five times greater than outdoor pollution levels. In some cases, indoor air pollution was 100 times greater. The United States Consumer Product Safety Commission says the following can contribute to

poor indoor air quality and also to some interior odors: combustion sources; tobacco products; building materials and furnishings; wet or damp carpet; cabinetry or furniture made of certain pressed wood products; products for household cleaning and maintenance and even outdoor sources such as radon, pesticides and outdoor air pollution.

So how does one remedy poor indoor air quality and odors inside a home? These tips can improve conditions.

- Ensure adequate ventilation. Open windows and doors when weather permits to eliminate the concentration of pollutants and help air out odors. Use exhaust fans in kitchens and baths to pull indoor air to the outside.

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How to Tame Indoor Home Odors

- Invest in an air filter. A high-efficiency particulate air filter will force air through a fine mesh and trap harmful particles, such as pet dander, smoke, pollen, and dust mites, that can build up in a home. Remember to change the filter regularly.
- Increase the number of plants. Plants can brighten interior spaces, and they're also remarkable at cleaning indoor air. The Clean Air Study conducted by NASA set out to find out the best way to clean the air in space stations. The association found that the Boston fern, spider plant, Chinese evergreen, weeping fig, variegated snake plant, and English ivy, among many other plants, were ideal for filtering air and removing harmful contaminants.

- Ditch disposal odors. Food can become trapped and decompose in garbage disposals. Cut citrus fruit into chunks and drop them into a running disposal to remove many odors.
- Air out the washer. New washing machines have tight seals and gaskets that do not allow air to penetrate (or water to leak out). Mildew can grow as a result. Leave the washer door open after a round of laundry to let things dry and air out.
- Tame pet odors. Pets contribute heavily to odor in a home. Wet dog smells are prevalent on rainy days, while cat litter boxes can pack a pungent punch. Cleanliness can cut down on smells. Use activated charcoal in litter products to tame

smells and empty the litter box frequently. Make sure dogs are dried off thoroughly when coming in from the rain, and use a deodorizing spray on pet fur. Regular grooming can help as well.

Odors in a home can be embarrassing and set a poor tone when inviting company over or showcasing a home for prospective buyers. Keep odors at bay by identifying the sources of smells and taking action.

- Div 1 - Rge Rd 30 - South from Hwy 633 to Hillcrest Transfer Station – 1.5 miles
- Div 2 - Hwy 777 from Hwy 37 to Onoway Transfer Station – 1.5 miles
- Div 3 - From Hwy 43 - South on Rge Rd 35 to Regional Landfill entrance - .5 mile
- Div 4 - From Hwy 43 - South on Rge Rd 65 to Sangudo Transfer Station – 1.0 mile
- Div 5 - From Hwy 633 - Access road to Darwell Transfer Station - .5 mile
- Div 6 - Twp Rd 574 - South on Rge Rd 91 to Mayerthorpe Transfer Station – 1 mile
- Division 7 - Twp Rd 574 - From Rge Rd 80 to Rge Rd 81 – 1 mile

Lac Ste. Anne County will pay **\$200.00 per mile of roadway cleaned** (both sides). Safety vests and garbage bags will be provided by Lac Ste. Anne County to the groups chosen to participate.

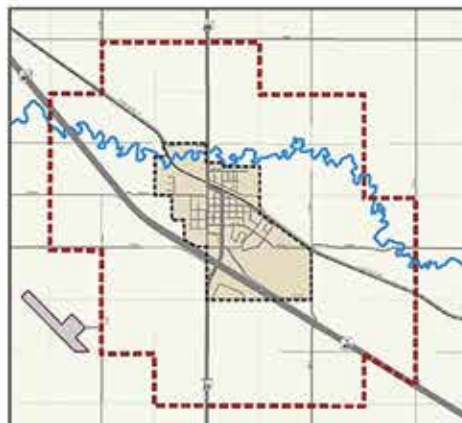
