# RCMP MEMBER CHARGED AFTER INVESTIGATION

Cst. Dorian Tooze, of the Stony Plain, Alta. RCMP, has been charged following a police investigation.

On Oct 24, 2018, members of the Stony Plain RCMP were in pursuit of a stolen work vehicle where they successfully deployed a tire deflation device. A short time later, the driver lost control of the vehicle while attempting to negotiate a turn. The driver exited the vehicle on the road and was taken into custody and handcuffed.

Through the course of the members restraining the driver, it is alleged that Cst. Tooze used excessive force.

After a statutory investigation was completed by a neighbouring detachment, Cst. Tooze has been charged with one count of assault. There is no change to Cst. Tooze's duty status.

Cst. Tooze first appearance in Stony Plain provincial court is May 1, 2019.



#### The new United Conservative Government will focus on jobs, pipelines and getting a fair deal in Canada

EDMONTON, AB (April 17, 2019): Alberta Premier-Designate Jason Kenney today thanked Albertans for giving the United Conservative Party a strong mandate in the 2019 election and set out the immediate priorities for his new UCP government.

"Yesterday's election produced a strong mandate for change, a clear declaration of Albertans' confidence in our United Conservative team and the new direction outlined in our platform," Kenney said. "In the highest turnout since 1982, over 55 percent of those who voted expressed their support for a government committed to getting our province working again."

Premier-Designate Kenney thanked and congratulated all Albertans who participated in the election as party leaders, candidates, campaign volunteers, and voters. "I especially want to thank and congratulate Premier Rachel Notley for her service to our province including her four years as premier," said Kenney.

Noting that the urgent need for new pipelines was an issue all the major parties and leaders agreed on, Premier-Designate Kenney vowed that the new UCP government's foremost priority will be getting the Trans-Mountain pipeline approved as soon as possible. Key to that objective, he added, will be building and strengthening Alberta's alliances with supporters of responsible natural resource development across Canada. "These include other provincial governments, First Nations, communities large and small, and millions of Canadians who understand how important energy and resource development

are to our economy and our future," Kennev said. "Together with these allies we will fight the Trudeau government's offshore tanker ban, Bill C-48, and its no-more-pipelines bill, C-69. In fact, I am sending a letter today to Senator Tkachuk, Chair of the Standing Committee on Transport and Communications to request the opportunity to formally articulate our incoming government's position that bill C-48 presents a grave threat to the economic interests of Alberta and this great province. In our fight to get our resources to market, we will win, because there are far more Canadians with us than against us."

And if the NDP government of British Columbia continues to obstruct the TransMountain pipeline, the Premier-Designate said, the new UCP government will enact legislation created by Premier Notley's former government to turn off the flow of Alberta energy to BC. "This is not a bluff," said Kenney. "Alberta will no longer stand by as others stand in the way of our future."

Premier-Designate Kenney acknowledged the trust Albertans have invested in the new United Conservative government and its plan to get Alberta back to work, get pipelines built, and stand up for a fair deal in Canada. He promised relentless effort to deliver on the UCP commitments, including immediately scrapping the carbon tax, implementing a job creation tax cut that will rapidly create over 50,000 new jobs, and slashing red tape and speeding up project approvals.

"Alberta has nothing to apologize for and everything to fight for," Kenney said. "That's the clear mandate Albertans have given our new United Conservative government. Our plan for a strong and free Alberta starts today."

Every report of a missing person is taken seriously and investigated with all available resources. Investigations on current and recent missing youth have not revealed any link to the "48-hour-challenge." "We don't want youth putting themselves in danger to keep up with online trends," says Sgt. Raymond Tardif of the "K" Division Missing Persons Unit. "We remind parents to be aware of their children's online activities and remind them that fake reports divert resources from legitimate emergencies and investigations."

Here are some tips for keeping your kids safe while using the Internet:

• Set rules for what your kids can and can't do online.

Teach your kids to check with you before downloading anything.
Set the expectation that you will monitor children's use of devices.Use parental controls.

• Discuss what children are allowed to share online.

• Keep open lines of communication.

• Encourage kids to talk to you if something makes them feel uncomfortable.

Jasper National Park was established in 1907 and Mt. Revelstoke National Park joined in 1914. Kootenay is the youngest of the



mountain national parks having been established in 1920.

Our mountain national parks are internationally well-known for their breathtaking landscapes, incredible visitor experiences, and remarkable biodiversity. We need to preserve these marvellous places," said MP Eglinski.

Parks Canada will be consulting on and developing all seven management plans for the mountain parks at the same time to facilitate landscape level planning and develop common approaches across the region. All Canadians, including youth and newcomers, are encouraged to get involved and help shape the future of the mountain national parks.

The first stage of public engagement is now underway for Banff, Jasper, Yoho, Kootenay, Mount Revelstoke and Glacier national parks and will run to April 30, 2019.

Management plans for the mountain national parks are due in 2020.

Based on the input received, Parks Canada will develop individual draft management plans for further review input during a second stage of public engagement expected in early 2020. Feedback collected during the second stage will help to finalize each management plan in 2020.

"I encourage stakeholder organizations, from Indigenous peoples, and from local communities and visitors to provide their input in helping to shape and guide the priorities for each of the mountain national parks through the development of individual management plans," concluded MP Eglinski.

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

# PREVENT THE HAZARD OF OVERLOADED ELECTRICAL CIRCUITS

A home is a safe haven for its residents. No matter what's going on at school or the office, many people know they can relax in comfort and safety when they arrive home at the end of a day. Safety at home is something

that can be taken for granted until it's too late. The National Fire Protection Association notes



that each year more than 47,000 home fires in the United States are caused by electrical failure or malfunction.

Overloaded electrical circuits are a frequent culprit in residential fires. Fortunately, overloaded circuits are preventable. According to the Electrical Safety Foundation International, the following are some potential indicators that circuits are overloaded.

• Flickering, blinking or dimming lights

• Frequently tripped circuit breakers or blown fuses

• Warm or discolored wall plates • Cracking, sizzling or buzzing from receptacles

• Burning odor coming from receptacles or wall switches • Mild shock or tingle from appliances, receptacles or switches.

• Learning to recognize the signs of overloaded circuits is an important step in making homes safe, as the NFPA notes that home fires contribute to hundreds of deaths and more than 1,500 injuries each year. Such fires also hit homeowners in their pocketbooks, causing an estimated \$1.4 billion in property damage annually.

• Prevention is another key component when safeguarding a home and its residents from fires sparked by electrical failures of malfunctions. The ESFI offers the following tips to prevent electrical overloads.

 Never use extension cords or multi-outlet converters for appliances.

· All major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall receptacle outlet. Only one heat-producing appliance should be plugged into a receptacle outlet at any given time.

· Consider adding new outlets to your home. Heavy reliance on extension cords indicates that your home does not have enough outlets. Bring in a qualified electrician to inspect your home to determine if more outlets are necessary.

• Recognize that power strips only add additional outlets; they do not change the amount of power being received from the

outlet.

# PREPARE HVAC SYSTEMS FOR WARMER DAYS AHEAD

The arrival of a new season can be an exciting time. Homeowners may have renewed vigor to start home renovation projects or even tackle some cleaning and organization tasks. Before the weather starts to warm up too much, homeowners may want to evaluate their home cooling needs and ensure that all equipment is in good work-



ing order.

Spring air conditioning inspections and tuneups are essential steps in system performance. Homeowners should not take for granted that a system that performed optimally last year will do so this year when temperatures climb. Various factors, including weather damage, dust and grime, mechanical wear and tear, and even rodent or insect infestations, can compromise HVAC systems. Since HVAC systems have so many moving parts, a thorough inspection of such systems can save headaches and money down the road.

According to Heating Ontario, the extreme weather conditions that come along with fall and winter can be especially taxing on homes and the systems that keep them comfortable. During a spring visit, an HVAC technician will perform maintenance on the air conditioner and make sure it is ready for the heat of summertime. This maintenance may include cleaning the unit, checking controls, calibrating the thermostat, lubricating moving parts, checking refrigerant levels, tightening electrical connections, and clearing any clogs. Homeowners are urged to also change the filter at the start of the cooling season.

Correcting any issues in the HVAC system well in advance of the arrival of warm weather can help ensure comfort when air conditioning is needed. As an added advantage, homeowners should install programmable thermostats if they do not already have them to keep cooling as cost- and energy-efficient as possible.

# TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM CHANGES FOR 2019-2020

Necessary changes are being made to Parkland School Division's Regional Transportation System that will affect some students and families more than others.

These adjustments will allow our existing transportation system to better adapt to the current funding model for bus transportation in the province given the addition of the two new schools Parkland School Division so desperately needed in Spruce Grove.

Funding Model

In the province of Alberta, transportation funding for students is distributed to school boards using formulas that take many things into consideration. There's a lot of math involved, but the most important number to remember is 2.4 km. If you live more than 2.4 kilometres away from and attend your designated school, the school division will receive grant funding from the province to operate our Transportation Services system (i.e. your student is eligible for funding).

If you live less than 2.4 kilometres away from your designated school, NO money flows from the Government of Alberta to the school division to cover the transportation of your child (i.e. your child is ineligible for funding).

Prior to the 2016 opening of Prescott Learning Centre and the 2018 opening of Copperhaven School, more students lived further away from their designated schools, and this meant Parkland School Division received more money to operate the Regional Transportation System. This is no longer the case. With service levels remaining consistent despite more students riding the bus and less money to operate the system, Parkland School Division's Transportation system has had to operate at a deficit for the past number of years. Losses are mounting and money cannot keep being taken from the classroom to sustain the transportation system. Expecting a shortfall of around \$1 million for 2019-2020, the Board of Trustees directed Parkland School Division's administration to adhere to the Division's Enduring Priority of Resource Stewardship and essentially fix the problem.

On March 5th, the Board of Trustees approved an increase to the Fee Schedule for 2019-2020. The new fee of \$350/year for every ineligible rider in Grades 1-12 still does not match the actual cost incurred to transport these students, since the government rules limit how much school boards can increase fees for riders who are ineligible for grant funding, and any fee increases are subject to Ministerial Approval. In actuality, it costs approximately \$800 to transport a student living in an urban setting, and just shy of \$1,200 to transport a student attending a rural school. Because of this, the Board's fee increase will only help recover the shortfall by about \$100,000.

Bus Arrival/Departure Time Review

Another way the Board plans to recover the annual expected \$1 million deficit is to simplify the complexities in the Regional Transportation System. Reducing the amount of buses in the fleet, redrawing routes and having some buses make double runs will create almost \$800,000 in savings each year.

Double-running Buses

Double-running buses will operate as follows:

• A bus drives through a few urban neighbourhoods, picking up a full load of students.

• The bus delivers the students to a transfer site, where they each board one of several other buses to make the trip to their schools.

• The original bus returns to another set of neighbourhoods to collect another load of students.

• The bus delivers the second group of students directly to their designated school without stopping at a transfer site.

When this new system comes into effect in September 2019, it's anticipated that approximately 700 students will be transported to school each day without having to stop at one of Parkland School Division's transfer sites. As a result, there will be fewer buses on roads and reduced congestion around schools while parents are picking up or dropping off their students. Double-running buses will also help fulfill Transportation Services' preference to reduce ride times for bus students when possible.

New Bell Schedules

In order to accommodate these changes to the Regional Transportation System, a number of schools will have to adjust their bell schedules. Approximately half of Parkland School Division schools in the Regional Transportation System will experience no change to their schedules, while some will see schedules shift by as much as 40 minutes. In most cases, school schedules will only shift earlier or later by 5 or 10 minutes.

We acknowledge that some of these changes will affect daily routines for many PSD families. Parents can assist their children by helping them understand why changes happen and modelling a positive approach to change. Demonstrating such behaviour encourages a child's own ability to be resilient and resourceful.

Schools may or may not have to adjust their bell times depending on the shift being made to bus arrival and departure times. Information will be shared by the schools for any changes that are necessary. Once available, those will be reflected on schools' Bell Schedule pages.

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform residents that Transport Canada has announced \$16.5 million under the Rail Safety Improvement Program to support 136 new projects and initiatives, including improvements to 104 grade crossings and rail infrastructure across the country.

This will include funding for new projects that focus on Infrastructure, Technology and Research, (ITR) safety improvements on rail property, the use of innovative technologies, research and studies, as well as the closures of grade crossings that present safety concerns.

The deadline for (ITR) projects starting in 2020-2021 is August 1, 2019.

"Rail safety is a top priority in the Yellowhead. These projects

and initiatives will contribute to increasing safety at grade crossings and along rail lines," concluded MP Eglinski.

# CANADA DAY CELEBRATION MAINSTAGE LINEUP ENTIRELY ALBERTA-BASED

"Like a brisk morning on an east coast shore, Derina Harvey Band (dHb) brings colour to your cheeks and takes your breath away." Winners of the People's Choice Award at the 2018 Edmonton Music Awards, these transplanted east coasters who now call Alberta home offer a fresh take on traditional Celtic folk songs alongside original jigs and reels. With a rocky, rhythmic undertow, layered guitars, and dizzying fiddle, topped by Derina's powerful voice, they've been called a rockier version of Great Big Sea, if fronted by Adele. Now they're bringing their high-energy kitchen party to Spruce Grove on July 1 to headline the City's Canada Day Celebration and rock the crowds in Jubilee Park.

Derina Harvey Band has performed over 180 concerts across Canada since 2016 including two sold-out shows at Horizon Stage. They have released two full length recordings; their self-titled debut album (2013) garnered radio airplay across Canada, and their second album Rove and Go (2016) was added to the rotation at over 30 stations across Canada and tracked at #65 on CKUA's top-played albums for 2016. dHb are currently writing more original material and will release a full-length album in 2019. They will perform at 9:30 p.m. on the Canada Day Mainstage until right before the fireworks.

All three artists performing on the Mainstage this year hail from Alberta's capital region. "Alberta Transportation statistics indicate that, between Sep. 1, 2011, when distracted driving legislation was introduced, and March 31, 2018, 97 per cent of distracted driving-related convictions were for using a hand-held electronic device while driving," says Supt. Rick Gardner, Alberta Sheriffs. "Make sure you always store your phone away from you while driving and be prepared for the unexpected actions of other motorists or poor driving conditions."

• Make sure children are comfortable and properly buckled up before leaving. Prepare safe activities for the trip so they don't get restless.

• Finish grooming before leaving home. Do not comb your hair, shave or apply make-up while driving.

• Pre-set the temperature, radio or CD player. Do not make adjustments unless the vehicle is stopped.

• If you have to make a call, eat, read, take notes or engage in another distracting activity, make sure you pull over to do it safely.


