

IDENTITY THEFT & FRAUD INVESTIGATION LEADS TO ARREST

St. Albert, Alta. – In March, 2019, St. Albert RCMP Crime Reduction Unit (CRU) began a lengthy identity theft and fraud investigation which lead to a search warrant being executed at a residence in St. Albert, Alta. As a result of the search warrant, police have identified over a hundred victims of identity theft and fraud from all over Central Alberta.

As a result of the investigation Ahmed SALHA, age 33, a resident of St. Albert, Alta. was charged with:

• Did Knowingly Obtain or Possess Identity Information (X 1 count) - Section 402.2(1) Criminal Code

• Did Knowingly Make A False Document (X 6 counts)- Section 367(1) Criminal Code

• Did Possess Forged Government Issued Identification (X 6 counts) -Section 368(1) Criminal Code • Did, Without Lawful Excuse, Procure To Be Made An Identity Document (X 6 counts) - Section 56.1 Criminal Code

• Possession of Instruments That Were Intended To Be Used To Commit Forgery (X 1 count) - Section 368.1 Criminal Code

He is scheduled to appear in St. Albert Provincial Court on May 27, 2019.

The St. Albert RCMP believe some of the victim's identities were stolen by suspects going through unlocked motor vehicles and obtaining comprising documents. Insp. Pam Robinson advises residents to adhere to the 9 PM Routine (#9PM-Routine), lock up and remove valuables from your vehicle including any documents that could lead to your identity being stolen.

In 2018, there were 11,000 reports of fraud within RCMP jurisdiction in Alberta. Impersonation and identity-related incidents accounted for 14% of all reported frauds for the


Holiday Weekend for Everyone

Stranger Tips:


Walk and play with others and use the buddy system. If you walk somewhere, walk with other children.

 If someone is following you on foot or in a car, go to a place where there are other people--to a neighbor's home or into a store, a police station or even a library for instance--and ask for help.

À bit of background. Our team leader, JEANNETTE HUTCHISON prices the household goods. With 3 people sorting, it makes for a lot of merchandise. Afternoons she heads out back where she spends hours sizing men's and ladies' jeans and dress pants and most times still doing that long after everyone else has gone home.

ELEANOR SNIDER started working with her mother back in 1983. 36 YEARS is a true milestone. She not only sorts incoming household goods, she takes home bags of clothing and cuts them up for rag bags (still only \$8). She also takes home all small toys to clean, bag and price. And last but not least, she takes home burnable clothing. There are days when we can't get it all in the back of her truck.

LUCY STROBL our pottery expert is also out front sorting household goods. She does all the shop's "seasonal" goods (Christmas, Halloween, etc) and prices the items for sale to be ready for the next season. Last year she had 40 boxes of Christmas merchandise ready and waiting for the festive season. Lucy also does the children's books.

BRENDA BRUCH is one of our newer volunteers. A retired nurse is handy to have around for us "maturing matrons". She works out front with Eleanor and Lucy sorting household goods.

A trio of ladies shelves the household goods as they are priced: EVA STELTER (antique china and glass expert). AUDREY WEISE and EL-LEN WYNN. They are kept busy from knick-knacks, china, glassware, pictures, books to boots. Replacing old stock with new, tidying, cleaning and rearranging as needed. Eva sets up seasonal shelves (ie: Mother's Day, Father's Day, Camping, etc.). Eva and Audrey also manage to bake birthday cakes for all.

On Mondays you will find MIL-DRED HEEKS among the linens, pillows, purses, suitcases, scarves and infant clothes.

The girls in the back that sort clothing: DORIS SCOTT, LOUISE GIBNEY, ROSEANNE LEE, and JOY WELSH (our resident newfie - she told me recently when you go for a walk on the rock, everything is uphill).



COMPOST IS PART OF THE CIRCLE OF LIFE IN GARDENS

The season for fresh fruits and vegetables grown right in the backyard is upon us. Warm weather breathes life into fresh berries, tomatoes, eggplant, cucumbers, and many other delectable fruits and vegetables.

Home gardens can be supplemented with delicious finds from the supermarket or farmer's market, including melons, corn and more.

The bounty of the garden can be made more abundant and fruitful with the addition of the right soil amendments. Compost is a key element of rich, nutritious soil. Scraps from items that have been grown in the garden can then be reused in the production of the compost that feeds that same garden. It's a continuous circle of garden life.

Getting started with compost is relatively easy. Homeowners should choose an outdoor space near the garden but far away from the home so that it won't be disturbed by kids or animals. Some people opt for an open compost pile, while others choose closed bins to contain the possible smell and to camouflage the compost. A sunny spot will help the compost to develop faster, according to Good Housekeeping.

The next step is to start gathering the scraps and materials that will go into the compost. Better Homes and Gardens suggests keeping a bucket or bin in the kitchen to accumulate kitchen scraps. Here are some kitchen-related items that can go into the compost material:

- Eggshells
- Fruit peels

• Vegetable peels and scraps

Coffee grounds

Shredded newspaper

In addition to these materials, grass and plant clippings, dry leaves, bark chips, straw, and sawdust from untreated wood can go into the pile. Avoid diseased plants, anything with animal fats, dairy products, and pet feces.

A low-maintenance pile has an equal amount of brown and green plant matter in the compost plus moisture to keep the bacteria growing and eating at the right rate. Aerating the compost occasionally, or turning the bin when possible, will allow the compost to blend and work together. Compost will take a few months to form completely, says the Planet Natural Research Center. The finished product will resemble a dark, crumbly soil that smells like fresh earth.

Compost will not only add nutrients to garden soil, but also it can help insulate plants and may prevent some weed growth. It is a good idea to start a compost pile as a free source of nutrition for plants and a method to reduce food waste in an environmentally sound way.

HOW TO CONTROL CRABGRASS BEFORE IT APPEARS

Homeowners who enjoy tending to their lawns know that grass is vulnerable to a host of problems, many of which appear at a time of year when lawn enthusiasts want to showcase the fruits of their lawnand-garden labors.

Crabgrass is a common problem that appears in summer. According to Lowes, crabgrass plants produce thousands of seeds between midsummer and early fall. While the first frosts of late-fall or early winter kill the crabgrass plants, the seeds produced by the plants remain dormant throughout winter and then begin to grow as the ground temperature warms up with the spring and summer thaw. As a result, controlling germination, which is the development of a plant from a seed or spore after a period of dormancy, is the key to preventing crabgrass

from becoming an unsightly blemish that can harm your lawn in summer.

A proactive approach to crabgrass can save homeowners the headaches of dealing with this unwanted guest taking over their grass. The following tips, courtesy of Lowes, can help homeowners reduce the likelihood of their lawns being overcome by crabgrass as summer hits full swing.

• Recognize that routine lawn maintenance may not be enough. Even lawns that receive sufficient TLC can fall victim to crabgrass. A proactive, crabgrass-specific approach to lawn maintenance is the most effective way to control the problem before it pops up.

• Apply a pre-emergent herbicide. Pre-emergent herbicides kill crabgrass seedlings as they germinate. While these herbicides are highly effective, they must be applied at precisely the right time. The right time to apply them depends on weather patterns. For example, Lowes notes that homeowners who live in regions that might have experienced warmer than usual winters will probably need to apply the herbicides earlier than usual. While the manufacturer instructions should always be followed when applying herbicides, it's essential that homeowners take weather patterns into consideration as well.

• Wait until the ground temperature rises above 60 F. Applying herbicides when the ground temperature is below 60 F might render the products ineffective. Gauging soil temperature can be tricky, but Lowes advises monitoring shrubs and trees on the property. Once shrubs begin to bloom and trees bud, herbicide can be applied. • Wait when treating newly seeded lawns. Pre-emergent herbicides might kill new grass seedlings, so homeowners with newly seeded lawns should wait until they have mowed their lawns three times before applying a herbicide.

• Emphasize uniform application. If a herbicide is not applied uniformly across the lawn, crabgrass can establish itself and ultimately spread to the rest of the lawn.

• Do not thatch or aerate after applying a herbicide. Thatching or aerating a lawn after applying a herbicide might break the product's chemical barrier, thereby rendering it ineffective.

Crabgrass can quickly spread on an untreated lawn. A proactive approach that prevents its growth can keep lawns looking great through summer.



2) Praise your child for reporting bullying situations to you and assure your child you will take action.

3) Talk to your child's teacher, counselor, or other caregiver about reports of bullying.

4) Work together to address the bullying situation. Don't confront the parents of the bully directly.

5) Ask your child specific questions about how your child is treated by peers, who he or she eats lunch with, and how other children are treated.

6) Teach your child to be assertive. Your child should be able to express feelings and needs clearly, without shouting or other aggressive behavior.



7) Provide opportunities for your child to make friends. Identify some of your child's interests and encourage your child to pursue them through sports, clubs, or other group activities.

8) Teach your child to identify bullying behaviors. These include hitting, damaging possessions, threatening, name calling, & excluding someone


