Stony Plain, Alta. - On May 29, 2019 at 12:07 a.m. Parkland RCMP were dispatched to the report of an armed robbery. At approximately 10:30 p.m., a 17 yr. old male youth and a 16 yr. old female youth were walking through the Outdoor Wellness Park towards the Skate Park. When they entered the tunnel underneath the train tracks, they were approached by three males asking for money. When the youth refused, the 3 males attacked the male youth and a knife was used to threaten him. A fourth male joined the group and continued to assault the victim. The female youth was as-

saulted when she attempted to pull the attackers off of the victim. The attack ended when the suspects obtained the victim's back pack. The suspects fled the scene in a blue four door car. The two victims suffered non life threatening injuries.

On Tuesday, I rose in the House to speak on my Private Member's Bill, C-206 - "An Act to amend the Criminal Code (abuse of vulnerable persons)". My Bill dealt with the physical, emotional, sexual or financial abuse of a person over the age of 65 or of a person 18 years of age or older who depends on others for their care because of a mental or physical disability as an aggravating circumstance for sentencing purposes. On Wednesday, I met with representatives from the geothermal industry and later that evening, I rose in the House to give my 'farewell' speech to my colleagues, my constituents and to my staff in Ottawa and the riding. I will miss you all!

debate on C-93, "An Act to provide no-cost, expedited record suspensions for simple possession of cannabis".

On Saturday, I will be speaking at the Edson Legion's D-Day Commemorative Ceremony, acknowledging the 75th anniversary of the allied forces invasion of Normandy. The parade will begin at 10:45am, followed by a brief ceremony at the Cenotaph.

On Sunday, I will be returning to Ottawa as Parliament is scheduled to sit for the next two weeks.

Edmonton - RCMP at the Edmonton International Airport are investigating a security breach where a male passenger did not

wait for authorization to board his flight, and instead ran down the boarding ram and on to the plane.

The plane was not occupied by any passengers at the time, and the flight crew was onboard in the process of completing their pre-flight briefings. The male uttered threats to the crew and, fearing for their safety, the flight crew safely removed themselves from the plane. The male then caused damage to a door on the

aircraft before police arrived and took the male into custody without further incident.

A 41-year-old male is presently in police custody and charges are pending.

# A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: **PROMISE MADE – PROMISE KEPT**

The election is over and the new government has now been sworn into office, the Speech from the Throne has been delivered by the Honourable Lieutenant-Governor Lois Mitchel

and we are now just into the very early days of the Legislature. The various ministry offices are now up and running and legislation is starting to be introduced into the Legislature.

The United Conservative Party ran on a platform of killing the Carbon Tax and Bill 1: An Act to Repeal the Carbon Tax was



introduced into the Legislature. This act will repeal the Climate Leadership Act eliminating the Alberta carbon tax effective 12:01 on May 30th, 2019.

Bill 2: The Open for Business Act will address some of the policies passed by the previous NDP government that have had the effect of killing jobs in Alberta. It will maintain new rules for compassionate leave and restore mandatory secret ballots for union certification votes. It will also end the practice of forcing employers to pay holiday pay to employees who are not working and give employees more freedom and flexibility to bank overtime hours.

One of the problems identified by businesses across Alberta has been the raising of the minimum wage law. I have met with local employers who are very concerned with the impacts that the minimum wage has had on their

business. Across Alberta we have seen the average number of employees in the restaurant industry drop from 13 to 11.7 employees between 2015-2018. We have record high youth unemployment at 11.6%. It is critical that youth have the opportunity to gather the needed experience and knowledge that a first job creates. At \$15 dollars/ hour businesses had to adjust by laying off youth who did not have the necessary skill and experience of an older worker. Bill 2 will create more opportunities afor young people to gain necessary skills and experience by encouraging businesses to hire youth at a lower hourly rate.

During the election the United Conservative Party campaigned on rebuilding the economy. Jobs, pipelines and the economy would be the priority of this government. Bill 3: The Job Creation Tax Cut will move Alberta forward on this promise by lowering corporate tax rates over a period of years from 12% to 8%. This will entice capital back in to Alberta and will, according to economist Jack Mintz, create 55,000 jobs over the next few years. By 2022 Alberta's combined federal-provincial business tax rate will lower than that of 44 U.S. states and will be one piece of the economic puzzle that will result in a competitive Alberta economy capable of affording the social programs that all Albertans desire.

These are just the first three bills before the Legislature, they all address key 2019 platform promises made to the people of Alberta. Promise made - promise kept.

In 1927, to celebrate Canada's Diamond Jubilee of Confederation and a Royal visit, Edward, Prince of Wales (later King Edward V111) arranged for every incorporated city, town and village to receive a gift in the form of a peony root. Seba Beach, which was incorporated in 1920, received a root, which was planted by Mrs. Perly Cull, who maintained it for over four decades. In 1970, she bequeathed ownership to Mrs. Ivy May of Seba Beach. No other peonies were grown by either gardener.

In 2010, Ivy May entrusted the Price of Wales peony (determined to be a Festiva Maxima) and its provenance to the Campbell family. In 2017, the Magnolia Joy of Gardening Club was approached to conserve this nearly century old sliver of Canadian history, the result of which is shown below. The Gardening Club appreciates gift of this peony from the Campbell family and thanks Eugene and Rose for bringing the beautiful peony and its history to be enjoyed by our community.

The Magnolia Joy of Gardening Club meets monthly at the Magnolia Community Hall and has built and maintains the flower and shrub beds on the south side of the hall. # PARKLAND RCMP ARREST TWO MALES FOR 2018 ARMED ROBBERIES

On July 3, 2018 at approximately 11:07 p.m. three masked suspects entered the Wabamun Hotel Bar and committed an armed robbery with two firearms.

A lengthy and complex criminal investigation was undertaken by the Parkland Serious Crimes Unit, Edmonton RCMP General Investigation Section, RCMP Central District Crime Reduction Unit and Edmonton Police Services.

Two male suspects were iden-

tified and were found to be responsible for the Wabamun Hotel armed robbery as well as the armed robbery that occurred at the Garden Inn in Vegreville, Alta. on June 13, 2018. The third male suspect involved in the Wabamun Hotel robbery remains unidentified.

Darin Edward Jenkins (37) of St. Albert was arrested on May 3, 2019 and charged with the following offences:

• Using a firearm while com-

# A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: FILIBUSTER

#### Good Morning,

It is 9:30 am on Thursday June 6 and the Legislature is in the middle of a filibuster on Bill 2: The Open for Business Act and Youth Minimum Wage. The debate on Bill 2 resumed 2nd reading after the Question Period around 3:00 pm on Wednesday, June 5th and is continuing as I write.

In our Parliamentary system of democracy it is said that the Government decides when the Legislature will sit but the Opposition decides when the debate in Legislature will end.

The same holds true when de-

bating a bill. A filibuster occurs when the Opposition uses the rule of the legislature to draw out debate on any particular bill.

In this case the Opposition is placing amendments before the Legislature extending the debate on Bill 2.

Why filibuster?

There is no way the Opposition, no matter how long they string out the debate has the capacity to outvote the government and defeat Bill 2.

Filibusters are often used to try and draw to the attention of Albertans to an issue of political importance to the Opposition and they hope to average Albertans.

It can be used to send a message to the government that there is another point of view the government needs to consider by drawing out the debate and to slow down the passage of a piece of legislation.

Filibusters can sometimes get a little goofy as members engage in the long time tradition of heckling each other in the Legislative chamber.

During my first filibuster, as a member of the Opposition, I was addressing the legislature in the early morning hours and heard one of the younger members from the government benches yell out something like: "Your looking a little tired there old fellow. Don't you think it's time to go to bed?" To which I replied, "Do you have your parent's permission to be up this late?"

I have been writing this off and on over the last several hours, it is now 11:00 am and if we are still filibustering around 6:00 pm we might very well break the record for the longest filibuster in Alberta Legislative history.

By the time this is printed in the papers this unique part of the parliamentary process will be completed, Bill 2 will have passed second reading and I will hopefully have caught up on some lost sleep.

P.S. The filibuster finally ended Thursday night and yes a record was made as it was the longest filibuster to date in the Alberta Legislature.

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# HELP KIDS LEARN THE GAME OF GOLF

Adults who play golf know just how fun and frustrating the game can be. Whether you're a veteran golfer or someone just learning the links, golf can be challenging.

But as exacting as the game can be, it also can be just as rewarding, even for kids. Children who embrace the game of golf will learn a host of lessons they can apply in all facets of life. A humbling game even for professional golfers, golf can teach kids lessons in humility and the value of persistence even when things aren't going your way.

Golf is also a great way for parents to get kids off the couch and outdoors for some fun in the sun. Instead of spending summer afternoons in front of the television, kids who play golf are out patrolling pristine golf courses while getting some cardiovascular exercise along the way. Golf can also strengthen a child's hand-eye coordination, which can help them in other activities, including many different sports.

Though many people do not begin playing golf until they've reached adulthood, it's never too early for boys and girls to start learning the game of golf. Parents of preschoolers can start their kids off with a toddler play set. Though it's just a toy, a play set can help lay a solid foundation for future golfers. Kids who have watched Mom and Dad play golf or practice their swing can develop their own swings on their play set. As kids approach school age, don't overlook the nearby puttputt or miniature golf range as a valuable teaching tool. Miniature golf clubs are small enough for many children to use comfortably, and kids can use miniature golf courses as a place to put any lessons or advice on putting to good use. What's more, a miniature golf course is more than just golf, with creative courses and other fun activities, so kids won't feel overwhelmed with golf.

When kids move on from preschool to elementary school, some might want to tag along with Mom or Dad to the driving range. You should try to avoid overwhelming kids with too much instruction or information. Instead, keep things as simple as possible, teaching them the basic swing and encouraging them no matter how quickly they adapt.

As kids enter middle school and approach high school, those who are enjoying the game of golf can take advantage of the driving range if they haven't already begun to. A driving range typically has markers that indicate the distance of a regular hole, regardless of which tee you will play from on an actual golf course. Kids can aim for holes at shorter distances to learn how far their drives are going. You can then adjust the lessons you teach your children based on how far youngsters can drive the ball.

As a child gets closer to high school, you might want to buy the child his or her own set of clubs. Look for inexpensive clubs (oftentimes, thrift stores or other secondhand retailers have clubs for sale) because growing children will eventually grow out of their first set of clubs. When your child finds a set of clubs that suits him or her, teach the proper way to swing and consider signing up your son or daughter for lessons. Those first few lessons can prove invaluable, turning a pastime into a passion kids will carry with them throughout their lives.


