PARKLAND RCMP INVESTIGATE SUSPICIOUS DEATHS

The Parkland RCMP responded to a call on July 23, of two deceased people in a residence. The Parkland RCMP Serious Crimes Unit took carriage of the investigation with assistance and consultation provided by Edmonton RCMP Major Crimes Unit. At 3:00 p.m., the RCMP received a 911 call from a person who located the 56-year-old male and 44-year-old female. Both were confirmed to be deceased. Edmonton Forensic Identification Unit attended and provided investigational assistance.

An autopsy was conducted today by the Medical Examiner's Office in Edmonton and it was determined that the manner of death in relation to the adult female was homicide.

The RCMP can confirm that the two people were in a domestic relationship. No charges will be laid in relation to this investigation and the RCMP are not seeking any suspects.

The names of the two people will not be released as per the Federal Privacy Act. No further information will be provided.



BLUE-GREEN ALGAE BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR BUCK LAKE

DRAYTON VALLEY – A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Buck Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with bluegreen algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible. • Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Buck Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock, while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm.

Blue-Green Algae Bloom Advisory Issued For Buck Lake

Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae or who ingest water containing blue-green algae may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/ or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Weather and wind conditions



can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Buck Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Buck Lake in which the blue-green algae bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this blue-green algae Health Advisory is in place.

Grande Yellowhead Public School Division (GYPSD), her students, and the community of Wildwood have long recognized Lisl Gunderman as an excellent educator, but she is now officially a national one. The Right Honourable Julie Payette, Canada's 29th Governor General, recently presented Ms. Gunderman with one of six Governor General's History Awards for Excellence in Teaching, in a ceremony at Rideau Hall on January 28, 2019. Only 150 award recipients across Canada have received this prestigious award in the last 23 years.

Ms. Gunderman's innovative history project, created with Mother Earth's Children's Charter School (MECCS) teacher, Maxine Hildebrandt, aims to not only teach stu-

dents about differing cultures, but also to inspire them to build deeper understandings of Canadian history and how communities can strengthen these rich connections. Ms. Gunderman and Ms. Hildebrandt connected at an outdoor education training camp in the summer of 2016, where they quickly discovered a mutual love and passion for history. The two kept in touch and developed a unique project in 2017 between Ms. Gunderman's Grade 4-5 class at GYPSD's Wildwood School, and Ms. Hildebrandt's Grade 3-4 class at MECCS in Warburg, Alberta. The project outlined an exchange of cultural diversity and family history between the two schools. Wildwood students exchanged their local community's farming, mining, and agricultural history with MECCS's students who in turn shared their Indigenous traditions and family teachings.

"What started off as a chance meeting between Maxine and myself has deepened into a friendship that I truly honour, and she has inspired me to seek other learning partnerships and cultural opportunities. Wildwood School

continues to offer Cree classes, and many of my students have delved deeper into learning about local community and family history."

Along with the teachers' family members, Bouchard was also invited by Gunderman and Hildebrandt to join them in when they received their award at Rideau Hall in Ottawa

Back in her classroom at Wildwood, Ms. Gunderman is looking forward to this year's collaboration and new group of students, thanks to the continued support of her principal, James Randall, and Grande Yellowhead. "My first teaching position was at Wildwood School in 1992," she noted. "You quickly learn that each class is unique and comes with its own story to share."

Along with the national award, Ms. Gunderman and Ms. Hildebrandt will share a \$2,500 cash prize, and an additional \$500 will be given to each of their respective schools. Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is very proud of Ms. Gunderman and looks forward to her inspiring future generations of storytellers.

HOME CHILD CARE PROVIDER AND HOME SUPPORT WORKER

OTTAWA: Jim Eglinski, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, wishes to inform constituents that Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship is launching 2 new pilots that will help caregivers who come to this country make it their permanent home.

The Home Child Care Provider and Home Support Worker pilots will open for applications on June 18, 2019, replacing the expiring Caring for Children and Caring for People with High Medical Needs pilots.

Caregivers will now only receive a work permit if they have a job offer in Canada and meet standard criteria for economic immigration programs. Once working in Canada, caregivers will be able to begin gaining the required two years of Canadian work experience to apply for permanent residence.

Through these new pilots, caregivers will also benefit from: • occupation-specific work permits, rather than employer-specific, to allow for a fast change of employers when necessary;

• open work permits and/or study permits for the caregivers' immediate family, to help families come to Canada together; and

* a clear transition from temporary to permanent status, to ensure that once caregivers have met the work experience requirement, they will be able to become permanent residents quickly.

"This will provide caregivers from abroad and their families with a clear, direct pathway to permanent residence," concluded MP Eglinski.

The expiring pilots will close to new applications on June 18, 2019. Caregivers who have applied before this date will continue to have their applications processed through to a final decision.



June 29, 2019 - The Board of Trustees of Grande Yellowhead Public School Division has approved the 2019/20 School Year Budget in its June 19, 2019, Public

Asking \$2,745

Board Meeting. The \$60 million budget is built on a funding allocation model that distributes funds to schools based on the needs of all students, while demonstrating fiscal responsibility. The Division is projecting a deficit of \$1.2 million in the 2019/20 school year.

"This is the first time that our

board has had to approve a budget without receiving a funding assurance from the province for the upcoming school year," explained Board Chair, B. Rosadiuk. "We have to make a number of assumptions due to this uncertainty and delay of the provincial budget."

Some of the assumptions include

Asking \$1,375



Asking \$2,300 Call for more information, or to view the ring 780-907-8642 the potential discontinuation of the Classroom Improvement Fund (CIF), a grant created in 2017 to hire more staff to improve classroom conditions, and the potential discontinuation of the School Nutrition Grant. The Division is also projecting a slight enrolment decline in the 2019/20 school year, which adds pressure on the revenue projections.

A number of cost pressures unfunded by the Funding Framework also contribute to the projected deficit, such as increasing standard costs of teaching and support staff, unfunded TEBA settlement cost and inflationary costs in various service areas.

Chair Rosadiuk continued. "Unfunded cost pressures and the funding uncertainty has also led the board to delay the renewal of some teaching contracts. However, we choose to remain optimistic and believe no drastic measures will be taken in the upcoming provincial budget. Any cuts to education funding will be extremely challenging for rural school boards like us."

ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER

Golfers rejoice! Those dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.
