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WHITCOURT TOWN COUNCIL UPDATE

Whitecourt Town Council thanks all of those that provided input on the 2020 Budget at last night's Public Input Session and through written submissions. Your feedback will be reviewed by Town Council during budget deliberations which begin next week. Early in 2020, Council will be host-

ing its annual Budget Open House which will provide ratepayers with further opportunity to share comments and learn about the budget. Watch for further details on the open house in the new year.

Council is recruiting for public appointments to Council Committees. Share your voice and help shape our community by applying to serve on a Council Committee. Information

on public appointment vacancies can be found on www.whitecourt.ca.

The Province of Alberta recently called for public feedback on Section 11: Species At Risk Act Agreement. The proposed document is required by the federal government to satisfy conservation requirements of Woodland Caribou. The Whitecourt & District Chamber of Commerce has worked with

local businesses, industry and other stakeholders to review the document, and has recommended a number of amendments to the Province due to the potential socio-economic impacts it could have on the region. The Town of Whitecourt has endorsed the proposed revision by the Chamber, and will be providing a letter of support for the amendments to the provincial government. For information on Section 11, the Chamber's submission, and impacts Section 11 could have on our region, visit www.whitecourtchamber.com/section11/.

Whitecourt and Woodlands County have contracted B&A Planning Group, in partnership with Nichols Applied Management and McElhanney, to complete a Regional Business Park Feasibility Study. This study will provide valuable information on how our region can meet current and future needs of industry, and provide direction on possible locations for a future business park. The project is fully funded by the Alberta Community Partnership (ACP) grant, and is anticipated to be complete in spring of 2020.

The 2019 Whitecourt Career & Education Expo is scheduled for October 3 at the Allan & Jean Millar Centre. The event will provide youth an opportunity to explore various careers available in the community; and will also provide job seekers an opportunity to meet with employers. Whitecourt has submitted an Expression of Interest to the Forest Resource Improvement Association of Alberta (FRIAA) for a proposed FireSmart program in 2020-2021. The proposed project con-

ducts vegetation management on previously treated FireSmart areas that have experienced regrowth in order to reduce the amount of vegetation that can fuel a fire, and to enhance firefighter access routes during a fire response. The project is estimated to cost

\$186,560; and if approved will be fully funded by FRIAA. For more information on the FireSmart program and practices, visit www.firesmartcanada.ca.

The Town of Whitecourt will be requesting a meeting with MLA Martin Long to discuss the importance

of Family & Community Support Services (FCSS) in our community, and to advocate for continued provincial funding at levels not less than what is currently being granted. FCSS programs support the delivery of community-based preventative social programming. The FCSS program in Whitecourt works with many community partners, including the Whitecourt Cancer Support Group, Lac Ste. Anne Foundation, Boys & Girls Club of Whitecourt & District; Habitat for Humanity and many more. Currently, the Province contributes 80% of the cost of the local FCSS program up to a maximum amount of \$264,769; however, due to local need Whitecourt's 2019 FCSS overall budget was \$648,786. This has led to a funding shortfall that was supported through taxation to Whitecourt ratepayers.

Council has approved the closure of a portion of 51 Avenue (from the Whitecourt Legion to Rainbow Restaurant) on October 26, 2019 for a Trunk or Treat event. This is a new event for our community, and involves local businesses purchasing a spot on the street to bring a decorated vehicle to serve treats to children as they come up to "trunk or treat".

An amendment to Bylaw 1245 – Snow Removal Bylaw has been adopted to allow for improved enforcement of sidewalk snow removal during the winter months.

Council has appointed Metrix Group LLP as the Town's auditor for a three-year term commencing with the 2019 fiscal year audit.

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4 SIMPLE WAYS TO WINTERIZE YOUR HOME

Trimming hanging branches and removing debris from their yards is one simple way homeowners can prepare their properties for winter.

As winter approaches, homeowners know they must do certain things to ready their homes for the coming months. Wrapping up the grill and closing the pool are no-brainers, but homeowners also must prioritize winterizing their homes to ensure homes withstand the winter.

Winterizing tasks range from small to big, but each can protect a home and its inhabitants and some can even save homeowners a substantial amount of money. The following are four simple ways to winterize your home.

1. Plug leaks

Leaky windows and doorways can cost homeowners money

year-round, allowing cold air to escape on hot summer afternoons and letting cold air in on brisk winter nights. When such leaks aren't fixed, homeowners are more liable to turn up their air conditioners or heaters, unnecessarily padding their energy bills along the way. Before winter arrives, check areas around windows and door frames for leaks, as well as any additional openings, such as chimneys, that may allow cold air in. Use caulk or weather strips to plug these leaks, and enjoy your warmer home and lower energy bills as winter weather gets colder and colder.

2. Inspect your chimney

If your home has a chimney, chances are you have not used it since last winter. During that time, the chimney has likely accumulated some dirt and grime, and may even have served as

home to some uninvited critters. As the season for fireside chats approaches, have your chimney serviced by a professional so it's ready for use and you are not greeted by some unwanted guests upon lighting your first fire.

3. Clear the yard

Autumn days, particularly late autumn days, can be gusty, and strong winds can cause branches to fall off trees. Branches big and small can cause damage to cars, siding and roofs, and smaller branches can get clogged in gutters, potentially causing gutters to back up and leading to leaky roofs that damage a home's interior. Take a walk around your property at least once per week during the fall, clearing any fallen limbs and trimming branches that appear one strong gust away from falling off of trees. Remove any

branches that are hanging over your home and driveway so they don't pose a threat to your house or vehicles.

4. Turn off outdoor water supplies

When temperatures get especially low, pipes with water still in them can freeze and burst, potentially leading to significant water damage. When you no longer need to water the lawn and when temperatures get too cold to wash your car in the driveway, be sure to shut off the water supply to outdoor spigots and sprinkler systems. Once you do that, drain them so no water is sitting in the pipes when temperatures dip.

There are many ways to winterize a home, and homeowners should take every precaution necessary to ensure their homes are safe and warm as the cold weather season approaches.

MAKE IT A GREEN WINTER WITH THESE ENERGY-SAVING TIPS

Conserving energy is a great way to protect the planet and save money. While energy bills might be highest in summer thanks to air conditioning units, certain factors around a house can make winter more wasteful and costly than it needs to be.

Energy bills are influenced by a variety of factors, including geography and how energy-efficient a home is. For example, according to data from the U.S. Energy Information Administration, the average monthly utility bill in Connecticut in 2015 was \$153.13, while New Mexico residents paid slightly more than half that amount (\$79.23) on average. Homeowners cannot control winter weather, which can greatly affect how much energy homeowners consume between December and March. However, there are other ways for homeowners to curtail their ener-

gy consumption and save money throughout winter.

- Address any leaks or drafts. Drafty windows and doorways can make the air inside homes feel warmer in the summer and colder in the winter. As autumn weather grows colder, homeowners can perform simple inspections around windows and doorways to determine if they have any leaks. On a cold and/or windy day, place a hand near all windows and doors to feel if there are any leaks. Use caulk or another type of sealant to address leaks so you can keep cold air out and set your thermostat to a reasonable, eco-friendly temperature.

- Inspect air vents, faucets and plumbing fixtures. Air vents, faucets and plumbing fixtures attached to exterior walls should be inspected for leaks. Such inspections might need to be con-

ducted from outside the home, which can make it more difficult to detect if cold air is entering the home. Look for gaps in the insulation around these areas, filling in those gaps as necessary.

- Inspect heating systems at the start of each new season. According to EnergyStar.gov, heating systems account for 29 percent of the average homeowner's energy expenditures. Inspect your heating or HVAC system before the start of winter, making sure all gas or oil connections are operating properly. EnergyStar.gov notes that dirty burners and cracked heat exchangers can cause heating units to operate less efficiently and may even pose a safety risk. Inspect the air filter of the heating system at least once per month, as filters can quickly become dirty during a heavy-use season like winter. Dirty filters cause the system to

work harder to keep a home warm, unnecessarily wasting energy as a result.

- Install a Wi-fi enabled programmable thermostat. Some programmable thermostats can be very difficult to use effectively, making it far too difficult if not impossible for homeowners to set their thermostats for various temperatures in a single day. Wi-fi enabled programmable thermostats that allow homeowners to control their heating and cooling systems via their smartphones can be more user-friendly than many other programmable thermostats, ensuring homeowners are saving money and not wasting energy heating empty homes.

Winter utility bills can be costly, but homeowners can reduce their cold weather energy consumption in various ways without sacrificing comfort.

HOME SAFETY CHECKS TO COMPLETE TODAY

A new kitchen or a bathroom remodeling job might be dream projects for many homeowners, but the right home improvement project at a given moment is not necessarily the most glamorous project. Sometimes safety upgrades around the house must take precedence over more popular projects.

Accidents or injuries can occur in any part of the home, but homeowners who take certain preventative measures can greatly reduce their injury risk. The security resource A Secure Life points out that more than 18,000 Americans die every year from injuries that take place in the home. Unintentional injuries account for millions of medical visits each year. Home injuries also are prevalent elsewhere in the world. In the United Kingdom, the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents reports that there are approximately

6,000 deaths every year that result from accidents at home.

Periodic inspections for potential hazards can keep everyone safe. The following are a handful of ways for homeowners to ensure their homes are as safe as possible.

- Check for sturdy handrails and prevent tripping hazards. Falls are one of the leading causes of home injuries. Falls can be a particular threat for youngsters and the elderly. To help prevent falls, make sure that staircases feature sturdy railings and that there is ample lighting in walkways. Remove obstructions from frequently used paths inside and outside the home. In addition, insert nonslip padding beneath runners or throw rugs.

- Check for frayed wires or faulty outlets. Address any electrical problems around the house, including frayed wiring and faulty outlets. Sparks can

lead to fires, and poor wiring may cause unforeseen problems behind walls. Repair or replace any loose or frayed wires on all electrical devices. Be sure that cords do not run under doorways or rugs. Replace outlets that are in disrepair and install ones with ground-fault current interruptors as an added precaution. If small children live in the home, use plastic safety covers over unused outlets.

- Practice window safety. Young children are curious and do not always recognize the inherent dangers around them. Children excited to see the great outdoors may climb up to peer out windows, and open windows are falling hazards. Screens do not offer an adequate barrier against falls. Consider locking windows or use safety bars to guard against falls. Test to see how easily screens can be pushed out, replacing any that

do not provide adequate resistance to curious youngsters' hands.

- Check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. Replace the batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors at least twice per year, and test them to make sure they're in good working order at least once per month. The National Fire Protection Association recommends replacing hard-wired smoke alarms every 10 years. Battery-operated alarms may need to be replaced even sooner. Many carbon monoxide detectors work for five to seven years. Check the back of alarms for a date stamp that indicates how old the product is and when it expires.

Safety checklists are an important part of home maintenance. A proactive approach can prevent both injuries and damage to the home.

TRANSFORM SPACES INTO COZY RETREATS

Cool weather often drives people to spend more hours indoors than they do during the warmer months. Autumn is a time to winterize gardens, put away lawn furniture and prepare for the holiday sea-

son. Autumn also provides the perfect opportunity to begin home interior projects.

Many people decide to re-decorate their homes to reflect each season. When temperatures change, it's time to tran-

sition from the light colors and breezy fabrics symbolic of summer to thicker, darker materials that evoke coziness.

With some inspiration and a little know-how, any homeowner or apartment dweller can cozy up a space in time for fall and winter.


- Invest in area rugs. While wood floors can look beautiful and work well with many different design styles, wood can feel chilly underfoot. Thick area rugs add warmth to a room and can help it look more lived-in. Area rugs also help a room appear more cohesive, coordinating with other colors in a space and providing a visual border.

- Practice layering in rooms. An affordable and

relatively easy way to make a room seem more cozy is to layer fabrics and other accents. Layers can include throws and blankets. Remove place mats from the dining room table and use them on accent tables or an ottoman in the living room. Table runners also can add a splash of color to the top of bedroom dressers.

- Play with texture. Look for fabrics that boast texture and can add a tactile feel to spaces. When used on throw pillows or small accents, faux fur can create that cozy cabin feel. Draperies made from nubby fabrics or those with grooves and ridges can add dimension to a room as well. Even a lampshade

made of an unusual fabric, such as a waffle-patterned material, can add a little depth and warmth to a space.

- Reevaluate your lighting. Lighting a space is more than just flipping on a switch. Finding the right balance of lighting fixtures can instantly transform the feel of a room. Create more warmth and a cozy feel by switching out bulbs from cooler shades to warmer ones. Those that give off yellow and pink hues rather than cool blues. Accent lighting helps establish a comfortable space for curling up and reading a good book. Spot lighting, such as fixtures that are trained on artwork or inside of a curio or china cabinet,

also can set a more welcoming mood.

- Install a bookshelf and start a book collection. Piles and stacked books can add warmth to any space. Books evoke the hallowed halls of schools and quiet nooks in the library. Fill shelves with books interspersed with additional design accents, and you will instantly make a room feel more inviting.

- Choose dark paint. Do not feel nervous about incorporating deeper shades in rooms. Dark colors give rooms a more enclosed feel than lighter colors, and that can create a warm and cozy feeling. This works particu-

larly well in larger spaces that feel vast and empty. If you're scared to paint all of your walls, try a darker shade below a chair rail or just paint one accent wall.

Add architectural elements. Think about adding rich moldings to crown the ceilings or to frame doorways. If you have the space for a nook, create a window seat beneath a picture window or add a bench and cushions in a corner for a nice escape spot.

Use the colder weather as an opportunity to reinvent some of the rooms in your home. With paint, texture, fabric, lighting, and more, rooms can be quickly transformed into cozy respites from the cold.

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

RCMP SEEKING ASSISTANCE TO IDENTIFY FEMALE

St. Albert, Alta. - St. Albert RCMP are asking for the assistance of the public in identifying a female person connected to stolen credit cards from a St. Albert residence. 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
