





AS FIRE PREVENTION WEEK™ APPROACHES, SPRUCE GROVE FIRE SERVICES REMINDS RESIDENTS: NOT EVERY HERO WEARS A CAPE. PLAN AND PRACTICE YOUR ESCAPE! ™

September 16, 2019 – Spruce Grove Fire Services is teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA)–the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than



90 years-to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape!" The campaign works to educate everyone about the small but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe. In Canada, most fire deaths occur in the home, where people believe they are most safe. Canadian fire departments respond to roughly 25,600 structure fires per year. In 2015, structure fires caused more than 1,400 injuries and almost 200 deaths.*

"These numbers

show

that home fires continue to pose a significant threat to safety," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. "In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Escape planning and practice can help you make the most of the time you have, giving everyone enough time to get out.

While NFPA and Spruce Grove Fire Services are focusing on home fires, these messages apply to virtually any location.

"Situational awareness is

a skill people need to use wherever they go," said Fire Prevention Officer Ryan Harley. "No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately."

• The Guide also provides information on the voter identification requirements, including the pieces of identification accepted at the polls.

Elections Canada is an independent, non-partisan agency that reports directly to Parliament.


Music Night was a fun night with 10 musicians and an appreciative audience. Stay tuned for the next one!



Refresh your memory of fire safety during Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12.

- Never smoke or leave candles burning when you are in bed or sleepy.
- Designate an outside meeting place in case of a fire.
- Check and replace smoke alarm batteries when you change your clocks.
- Never use an outdoor grill, such as a gas or charcoal grill, indoors.
- If there is a fire in your house, touch the doorknob to check if it is hot before entering another room.
- Don't overload electrical circuits.
- Store matches and lighters in a safe place away from children's reach.
- If you smell gas in your home, leave immediately and call the fire department from another house.

Escape Planning

SAFETY TIPS

- MAKE a home escape plan. Draw a map of your home showing all doors and windows. Discuss the plan with everyone in your home.
- HAVE an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole or mailbox) a safe distance from the home where everyone should meet.
- PRACTICE your home fire drill at night and during the day with everyone in your home, twice a year.
- PRACTICE using different ways out.
- TEACH children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.


IF THE ALARM SOUNDS...


- If the smoke alarm sounds, GET OUT AND STAY OUT. Never go back inside for people or pets.
- If you have to escape through smoke, GET LOW AND GO under the smoke to your way out.
- CALL the fire department from outside your home.

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms inside every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- According to an NFPA survey, only one of every three American households have actually developed and practiced a home fire escape plan.
- While 71% of Americans have an escape plan in case of a fire, only 47% of those have practiced it.
- One-third of American households who made an estimate thought they would have at least 6 minutes before a fire in their home would become life-threatening. The time available is often less. And only 8% said their first thought on hearing a smoke alarm would be to get out!

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

Fire Prevention Week will take place October 6 to 12, 2019. It's a good time of year to check your smoke alarms to ensure they're working.

Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home, including the basement (but not in unfinished attics).

• Put smoke alarms in the hallways that lead to each bedroom.

· On floors without bed-

rooms, install the smoke alarm in or near each living area such as dens, living and family rooms.

• Put a smoke alarm on the ceiling at the bottom of any staircase leading to upper floors.

• Mount the smoke alarm high on walls or ceilings (remember–smoke and hot gases rise). Wall-mounted alarms work best when placed at least 10 to 30 cm down from the ceiling. Ceiling-mounted alarms are ideally placed at least 10 cm away from the nearest wall. If ceilings are pitched, install the alarm near the ceiling's highest point.

How do I care for a smoke alarm?

Smoke alarms must be kept clean, as dust and grime may affect how they work.

• Replace the batteries at least once a year

• Replace a smoke alarm every 10 years, sooner if it isn't working.

• Regularly dust or vacuum the unit.

• Keep each smoke alarm free of paint, stickers, or

other decorations that may prevent it from working properly.


Plan an escape route

• It is important for families and people living alone to practice a fire escape route out of the home. Make two exit plans for each room of the house.

• To reduce the risk of a fall, keep fire escape routes clear of household items and clutter. That will help ensure you have safe and accessible exits.

PREPARE

Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, as well as inside and outside every sleeping area.

Test smoke alarms monthly, and replace the batteries if needed.

Purchase and learn how to safely use a fire extinguisher.

Create a fire escape plan with your family, reviewing and practicing it twice a year.

Your fire escape plan should include two exit points from every room, as well as a designated outdoor meeting spot.

Make sure everyone in your family knows when and how to call 911 or the fire department.

PREVENT

Turn off portable heaters whenever you leave a room or go to sleep.

Keep matches and lighters out of reach from children, and make sure they know never to play with these items.

Replace or repair loose plugs, exposed wiring or frayed extension cords, and avoid overloading outlets and extension cords.

Keep any items that can catch fire at least three feet away from cooking and heating devices.

Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Always turn off the stove if you leave the kitchen even for a brief period of time.

OCTOBER 6-12

STAY ALIVE

In the event of a fire, yell "Fire" repeatedly and evacuate immediately. Once outside, call 911 and never reenter a burning building for any reason.

If a door or door handle feels warm to the touch, do not open it. Use an alternate escape route.


If you must walk through smoke, get as close to the ground as possible to escape under the smoke, closing doors behind you.

If your clothing catches fire, always remember to stop, drop and roll, covering your face with your hands.

If you can't escape a room, close the door and cover vents and door cracks with a towel or cloth to keep out smoke. Signal for help at the window with a piece of cloth or a flashlight.

Follow these fire safety tips, and review them with other members of your household, to protect yourself, your property, your community and your loved ones. October 8, 2019

A Little Prevention Goes a Long Way Follow these prevention tips to safeguard your home and family.

Always remain in the kitchen while cooking, and keep things that can burn, such as towels, plastic bags or paper, at least three feet away from the stovetop.
Store matches and lighters in a place where children cannot reach them.
Keep space heaters at least three feet from curtains, newspapers and other things that can burn, and never leave heaters unattended.

Have your chimney, furnace, fireplace & wood/coal stove inspected every year.
 Install smoke alarms on every level of your home and inside or near every

bedroom. Test alarms monthly, and replace batteries once a year.
Develop and discuss a home fire escape plan with your family. Identify two exits from every room, and pick a meeting place outside the home.

FIRE PREVENTION

WEEK

Follow these 9 tips to help protect yourself, your family & your property against fire hazards.

1. Install a fire alarm in every sleeping area and on every level of your home, and be sure to test alarms every month. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of death in a home fire in half.

2. Check the manufacture date on the back of your home's smoke alarms. Smoke alarms should be replaced at least every 10 years! Batteries should be replaced every year.

3. Never leave burning candles unattended, and always keep matches and lighters out of reach from children. 4. Make a fire action plan, so every member of your household knows how to escape and where to meet outdoors.

5. Over half of home heating fire deaths are caused by equipment being placed too close to things that can burn. Make sure furniture, clothing, mattresses and bedding are at least three feet from heating sources.

6. Always turn off space heaters when you leave the room or go to sleep. Space heaters are the cause of about 79 percent of fatal home heating fires. 7. Remain in the kitchen when frying, grilling or broiling food. Turn off the stove whenever you leave the kitchen, and never leave home while food is cooking.

8. Inspect electrical cords regularly, and replace cords that are cracked or damaged or have broken plugs or loose connections.

9. In the event of a fire, crawl to safety. Use the back of your hand to see if a door is hot before opening it. If it feels hot, try to use another exit.

BARRHEAD RCMP REPORT

September 19 through September 25

Another week of Break and Enter complaints kept detachment members busy. Eight B&E's were reported this week with three Barrhead businesses and five rural properties being targeted. On September 19, members responded to a yard in the Elk's Beach area and located a female hiding on the property. This was initially reported in last week's news release; however, since that time, the 25 year-old Barrhead woman has been charged in relation to eight separate files totaling 16 counts, including numerous B&E and Possession of Stolen Property offences. This suspect's arrest resulted from a prompt call to the police by the property owner and she remains in custody.

On September 23, members attended an abandoned farm yard on Highway 764 after the owners had checked the yard and observed sea cans and buildings open. A 29 year-old County of Barrhead male was found asleep in a car with stolen property nearby. He was arrested following a



brief struggle. A 30 year-old Edmonton woman was also located and arrested without incident. The male had recently been released from custody after being picked up on warrants by Parkland RCMP, but was already the subject of a warrant when the Barrhead members arrested him. The male appeared before a Justice of the Peace on September 24 and was released to make his first appearance in court on September 25. The male failed to attend court on the 25th and warrants for his arrest are again pending. This male presently faces at least 14 charges on five separate matters.

On September 19, a resident in the Thunder Lake area reported a suspicious vehicle. Police were able to make immediate attendance and found a 22 vear-old Hinton male and a 20 year-old Edson woman who were in a 2012 Toyota which had been reported stolen from Hinton on September 10. Both subjects were arrested without incident. When the vehicle was searched, a loaded, sawed off shotgun and large quantities of ammunition were located. Following a lengthy investigation, the woman was released without charges, while the male was released on six charges with a first appearance scheduled for November 12.

On September 23, a member on patrol observed a suspicious vehicle in Rotary Park. A query of the licence plate determined that the vehicle had been stolen from Stony Plain on August 20 and the plate attached was stolen form Stony Plain on August 21. A 36 year-old Duffield, Alberta man was found in the truck and is facing five charges including possession of heroin. He was released from custody and will make his first court appearance on November 26.






