which records water level data for the federal government, daily highs have been broken on at least 12 different occasions this season, and the lake level has remained above the upper quartile all year. Because Lac Ste Anne is part of the Sturgeon River, lake levels are naturally cyclical. However, there are external factors that are contributing to the unusual levels, including excessive rainfall, beaver dams and debris in the river, and blockages at the outflow of Lac Ste Anne due to debris blocking the 'weir'.


This has led to significant erosion of private and public property, as well as high groundwater levels. Lakefront property owners have lost significant parts of their yards, and many have seen their retaining walls deteriorate and become ineffective. The villages have seen damage to lake accesses, parks, the public beach, and the boat launch. Water levels have also caused storm systems (drainage ditches) to back up and have even created problems with the sewer system. These are just the issues that we see today, there are longer term comsequences if water levels stay high.

The villages and their residents could see higher insurance costs and the cost to maintain and repair public and private infrastructure may go up. Continued damage to riparian areas will cause more nutrients to enter our lake, which could contribute to a decline in lake quality including more algae, and cyanobacteria



**Damage to Public Beach** blooms. In the long run, excessive damage to the main beach and boat launch in Alberta Beach could cause economic concerns. Further, if the lake freezes while the water levels are high, the damages from ice quakes and spring ice melt pushes will be more severe.

"We were very pleased with the number of communities who submitted applications during July and August this year," explains RCF Board Chair Harvey Hagman. "From over 200 submissions, the RCF Board was able to identify those communities who best fit our mandate. We know that community members will benefit from the project these groups are creating and will complete thanks to the RCF funding."

The mandate of the RCF is to improve the sustainability of farmers and ranchers in Alberta by improving access to funding for educational, recreational and cultural facilities and programs in those communities. The RCF was created through the United Farmer's of Alberta Co-operative Ltd. ("UFA").

The Onoway and District Historical Guild's Heritage Village is looking to expand and the group plans on building a se-

cure machine shed to house and expand its historical farm equipment collection, which is designed to inform visitors about the history of farming in the community. The Delia School Enhancement Society Green Spaces project serves to ensure community members can come together to plant, grow and harvest in a free community garden space, an outdoor learning and meeting space area. And finally, the Paradise Valley & District Muse-um Society "Climb Thru Time Museum" will see some of its buildings restored to historical standards.

"The Heritage Village Project" Onoway and District Historical Guild: \$50,000

The Onoway and District Historical Guild, founded in 2003, is home to a historical museum and the Onoway Public Library; the space is also leased to the town playschool, 4-H, parent link, Girl Guide, Boy Scouts and many other daily users. In 2018 more than

62,480 individuals visited the facility. The Guild's Heritage Village is looking to expand and the group plans on building a secure machine shed to house and expand its historical farm equipment collection such as the threshing machine, binder, buggy, wagons and other pieces. The project will benefit the community by expanding the museum to include large farm machinery displays that will inform visitors about the history of farming in the community. The group plans to officially name the building at the Heritage Village as the UFA Machine Shop, in honour of the monies received from the Rural Communities Foundation.

Groups who are eligible for funding include registered charities under the Canada Revenue Agency, registered non-profit organizations that are registered with either their provincial or municipal government, and community service co-operatives. All projects must align with one of the three funding categories of recreational, education events and activities, or cultural facilities and programs. Projects must be completed within a two-year period and be located in a community that has a UFA presence.

RCF made the announcement during National Co-operative week, October 13-19, 2019. The 2019 theme "Interco-operation" directly rates to the 6th principle of Co-operatives: Co-operatives serve their members most effectively and strengthen the co-operative sector by working together through local, national, regional and international structures.

"As an agriculture co-operative, UFA believes in the power of giving back to its members. We look forward to continuing to give back through the RCF in 2020," said Hagman.

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### October 22, 2019 High Water Levels Impact TriVillage Area

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The villages have been working with local residents, Lac Ste Anne County and MLA Shane Getson to try and find a solution: Lac Ste Anne County did a helicopter flyover to identify blockages in the river; local residents and councillors took MLA Getson on a tour of the village and weir to show the extent of the damage; and letters have been sent to Alberta Environment and Parks, MLA Getson, and the Minister of Environment and Parks. We have also lobbied the government to reduce permit times and have gotten a verbal commitment from Minister Nixon that they are working to reduce permit wait times to a maximum of 40 days.

It is unclear who is responsible for clearing blockages at the weir and other down channel obstructions, who should be applying for permits, and who should pay to maintain the channel. Although they are keen to help, local municipalities believe it is a provincial responsibility and that the province should implement a management plan. MLA Getson has suggested that concerned local citizens should form a group to manage the weir and the outflow of Lac Ste Anne. In the meantime, there are some steps that concerned residents can take to help reduce the impacts of high water levels and move towards a solution:

• Some insurance companies provide earthquake insurance in our area for a reasonable price. If you live near the lake and feel you may be affected should an ice quake occur, you may want to look into this:

• If you need to fix your riparian area or retaining wall,

### PARKLAND RCMP DETACHMENT GRAND OPENING

On October 11, community leaders and employees of the Parkland RCMP invited members of the public to the grand opening event at the newly built detachment.

"We're ecstatic this day has finally come. One facility allows for operational efficiencies and eliminates duplication of services leading to better policing for the region. What many people don't realise is Stony Plain, Spruce Grove and Enoch have been operating as one detachment in three locations for over 20-years. Unifying the RCMP into one building has been the goal of both municipalities for some time. This will strengthen the RCMP for our region both logistically and fiscally. Making this dream a reality is another example of how working together can have such a positive impact for all of our citizens." - Mayor William Choy, Town of Stony Plain

The detachment, located at 91 Campsite Road, Spruce Grove, Alta. has consolidated employees from the previous Stony Plain and Spruce Grove detachments along with Traf-





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fic Services, formerly located in Edmonton and Evansburg, Alta.

"Building stronger, trusting relationships within the communities we serve, is at the core of the Alberta RCMP. The opening of the new Parkland RCMP detachment is a welcome addition for the communities of Spruce Grove, Stony Plain and Enoch Cree Nation. Having our detachment members co-located in one building adds to the efficiencies of our service." - Deputy Commissioner Curtis Zablocki, "K" Division Commanding Officer

The municipally funded building is 4,665 square metres, will house roughly 160 employees and cost approximately \$22 million to build. The previous Stony Plain RCMP detachment will be disposed of by selling the building to a third party following an environmental assessment and appraisal. The Spruce Grove RCMP detachment is owned by the municipality and will remain with them. Finally, we will maintain the lease with the Enoch RCMP detachment as an outreach office for the community.

Older vehicles using traditional oil may need to adhere to the once-standard oil change interval of 3,000 miles. Mechanics will typically replace oil filters with the same frequency as they replace oil.

• Air filter: Air filters generally need to be replaced every 15,000 to 30,000 miles. However, CarGurus® notes that drivers who park in dusty environments should err on the side of caution and have their air filters replaced every 15,000 miles.

• Fuel filter: Clogged fuel filters can affect engine performance and even prevent engines from running. Fuel filters may need to be changed at 30,000-mile intervals.

• Battery: A typical car battery tends to last around four or five years. • Brake pads: Worn out brake pads will make a screeching sound. Brake pads should last around 50,000 miles, though they should be inspected at regular intervals regardless of mileage.

• Brake rotors: Brake rotors can be resurfaced or replaced, and this should be done around 60,000 miles. Resurfacing can only be done once and is less expensive than a full replacement.

• Hoses: Hoses crack over time, but generally do not need to be replaced until they reach the 90,000-mile mark. However, hoses should be inspected routinely, as busted hoses can cause very significant damage.





### **EXERCISE CAUTION AROUND BRAKE DUST**

As cars age, certain wear and tear is to be expected. One of the realities of frequent driving, particularly for drivers who routinely drive in stop-and-go traffic, is the gradual deterioration of brake pads. Do-it-yourselfers can replace brake pads on their own, but those that do should be aware of a potential hazard when doing so.

The Mesothelioma Center says that brakes sometimes contain asbestos due to that material's heat-resistant qualities. As brakes start to wear down over time, the asbestos can escape. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) says that, while many new automotive components are asbestos-free, asbestos hasn't been eliminated entirely from the industry. That is why mechanics and do-ityourselfers need to exercise caution when repairing or replacing brakes.

Brake dust may inadvertently expose individuals to cancer-causing asbestos through inhalation or ingestion. OSHA says that exposure to asbestos, if not properly controlled, can cause mesothelioma, lung cancer and asbestosis. Symptoms may not appear for years or even decades after contact with asbestos fibers.

The Mesothelioma Center estimates that asbestos is present in 30 to 80 percent of brakes and other components. The routine task of "blowing out" brake surfaces, which involves using an air hose to clean the surfaces of brakes and rotors, is one of the most common ways people are exposed to asbestos through brake dust.

Gray-black brake dust is made up of iron particles formed by the grinding of the brake rotor by the brake pads. However, brake dust also can contain some metallic elements and other components housed in the brake pad - including asbestos.

The automotive resource YourMechanic says that, while brake dust is not indicative of a poor braking system, over time brake dust can corrode the clear coat on a car and may eat into the aluminum alloy surface of the wheel. That is why so many drivers try to clean away brake dust, potentially exposing them to dangerous materials.

DIYers may be better off visiting professional service centers to have brakes addressed rather than doing the job on their own. OSHA says all automotive brake and clutch repair facilities in the United States must comply with the OSHA asbestos standard. These include using negative pressure enclosure/HEPA vacuum systems and low pressure/wet cleaning methods.

While asbestos is being phased out of many automotive components, it is always best to treat bakes, clutches and more with extra caution in the event that asbestos is present.



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
