Yellowhead County, Alta. – The RCMP Major Crimes Unit is providing an update about the found human remains dating back to May of this year, which were identified as 25-year old Nature Duperron, of Athabasca.

Duperron's family reported her missing on April 15, 2019. An RCMP missing

person investigation determined that Duperron was last seen in Edmonton in the beginning of April of this year.

An autopsy was conducted at the Office of the Chief Medical Examiner's Office in Edmonton on April 25, 2019, and as of this date a cause of death has not yet been determined.

The RCMP Major Crimes Unit is treating Duperron's death as a homicide.



JAKE'S GIFT IS ABOUT LEGACY AND REMEMBRANCE

Spruce Grove, AB - Horizon Stage is pleased to bring back Jake's Gift to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of the Juno Beach campaign. This multi-award winning one-actor play is about a Canadian World War II veteran's reluctant return to Juno Beach for the 60th Anniversary of D-Day. While revisiting the shores of Juno Beach, Jake encounters Isabelle, a precocious 10-yearold from the local village. AFFORDABLE HOUSING FOR STONY PLAIN SENIORS




Budget

· With the new provincial budget released on October 24, 2019, the GYPSD Finance Team is investigating the financial impact to the Division's overall budget. Transition grant funding was announced in replacement of three prior grants; however, this amount is considerably less than last year's allocation. Insurance premiums have also significantly increased for all jurisdictions, adding to the financial pressure school boards are facing. More information on the provincial funding model will be available to boards in February 2020.

Seclusion Rooms

Ministerial Order #42/2019 - Seclusion and Physical Restraints in Alberta School Standards and Guidelines for Time-Out in Alberta Schools - comes into effect on November 1, 2019. GYPSD schools do not operate any seclusion rooms under the Order's definition. In order to build understanding and clarity of the new Ministerial Order, the Division has implemented a number of steps including the creation of a handout for families providing the definitions of seclusion, seclusion rooms, physical restraints, and time-outs, and providing on-going professional development opportunities for staff on de-escalation strategies and defusing situations.





Teacher Mentorship

 Since 2016, GYPSD has provided additional supports and resources to teachers beginning their career with the Division. The 2019/2020 Teacher Mentorship Program includes strategies as collegial support, collaborative learning and reflective practice, with a PD focus on the implementation of the Teaching Quality Standards, classroom management, instructional planning, foundational knowledge of concept-based teaching, meeting the needs of all students, balanced assessment practices, communication strategies, mental health, and stress management.

Superintendent's Update

• Superintendent Lewis updated the Board on her recent attendance at various provincial and local meetings on behalf of the Division. She recently completed school visits with the trustees and commended staff on the exemplary instructional practices observed in classrooms.

At the latest administrators' leadership meetings, Ms. Lewis and the senior team worked collaboratively with school leaders to prepare for upcoming instructional rounds: a process that brings groups of educators together to reflect on their instructional practice as a means of improving student learning. The superintendent also participated in the Board's planning seminar where the trustees discussed Board priorities, key issues facing school divisions and the important work carried out by trustees and administration.

New Crosswalk Lights Installed

• The Board received a report from the Mary Bergeron School Principal, Mr. Darcy Reynolds and the Assistant Director of Facilities, Mr. Brian Orge, regarding the recently installed crosswalk lights which were a part of the final construction phase of the new facility. The location of the crosswalks and lights resulted from consultations with school staff, school

council members, GYPSD Facilities staff, and employees from the Town of Edson. In addition, traffic flow observations carried out over the last two years identified the safest location for crosswalk installations.

Trustee Reports

- · Trustees shared their appreciation for the student learning and teaching excellence observed during school visits, and thanked Superintendent Lewis and the administrative team for organizing these valuable opportunities to visit classrooms and meet with each school leadership team who presented key information about each school's budget, staffing, Accountability Pillar Results, programs, goals, and expectations.
- Trustee representatives on the Policy Committee are currently reviewing all Division policies to ensure align-

ment with the new Education

- Each trustee shared highlights from their recent attendance at monthly school council meetings, Public School Boards Association of Alberta Fall General Meeting, Alberta School Boards Association's Zone 2/3 meeting, and school awards ceremonies.
- Trustees in each zone will be representing the Board during upcoming wreath laying ceremonies in recognition of Remembrance Day events at local schools.
- Board Chair Rosadiuk reiterated concerns over the current financial uncertainties and the possible expectation of the Board having to make some tough decisions in the future for a balanced budget while still focusing on the best interests of students.

The next Public Board Meeting is November 20, 2019.



When operating at optimal capacity, an air filter improves fuel efficiency while ensuring vehicles accelerate smoothly without taxing the engine. But when air filters are clogged, fuel efficiency is reduced and emissions are increased, a 1-2 punch that costs motorists money and hurts the planet at the same time. Drivers can check their owners' manuals to determine the recommended intervals to replace air filters, but the following are a handful of indicators that suggest it's time to change them.


- Gas mileage: Unless you just purchased your vehicle, you likely know how many miles you can drive on a full tank of gas. If that gas mileage is
- Drivers may be alerted to engine issues when the "Check engine" lights up on the vehicle's dashboard. This light may come on to

air filter, as clogged air filters reduce air flow to the engine, resulting in an imbalanced air-fuel mixture that adversely affects the engine.

- Starting and idling problems: Vehicles sometimes don't start up as smoothly as they once did, and drivers may also notice vehicles are not idling smoothly. These symptoms may indicate misfiring spark plugs that are being polluted (and made less effective) by a dirty air filter that is reducing the flow of air to the engine.
- Acceleration difficulties: Automobiles that are operating at peak capacity accelerate quickly.

But dirty, worn out air filters adversely affect acceleration. Drivers who notice that their cars are struggling to accelerate when stoplights turn green or on highways may need to replace their vehicles' air filters.

Dirty air filter: Perhaps the biggest indicator that an air filter needs to be replaced is the filter itself. If you cannot find the air filter on your own, consult your vehicle owner's manual to determine where it is. Once you find the air filter, examine it in broad daylight. Clean air filters are white, so if the filter has darkened, it may need to be replaced.



HANDLE A BREAKDOWN WITH EASE

Drivers expect their vehicles to safely transport

them from point A to point B. But sometimes drivers



find themselves stranded on the side of the road due to a breakdown. That can be an especially precarious position to be in, but knowing what to do during a breakdown can help drivers and their passengers get through such situations unscathed.

1. Find a safe spot to pull over. Whenever possible, guide the car to a shoulder or area out of the line of traffic but still visible to oncoming traffic. If the car is not drivable, enlist the help of someone to push it into a safe zone.

2. Turn on hazard lights. Esurance advises to put on hazard lights, which will warn other drivers that something is wrong. Hazard lights also may alert other motorists who might offer assistance. Once your hazard lights are on, pop the hood, which can serve as an additional alert to other drivers.

3. Engage the emergency brake. Turn the wheel away from the road and put on the emergency brake to help prevent the car from

rolling.

4. Set up other warning signals. Prepared drivers keep cones, reflective triangles or flares in their cars. AARP suggests placing three warning signals. The first should be 50 feet away and directly behind the vehicle. The other two can then be placed nearer to the vehicle.

5. Remain in the vehicle. It is safer to stay in the vehicle and call for help than to get out and stand on the side of a busy roadway.

6. Call for assistance. Use a mobile phone to dial a roadside assistance service or tow truck. Drivers also may want to contact the

nearest police station to ask

for help.

Roadside assistance programs are available for a fee from private companies and sometimes through vehicle dealerships or insurance companies. Such services can provide peace of mind if and when breakdowns occur.

MODIFICATIONS CAN MAKE DRIVING SAFER FOR SENIORS

Despite popular misconceptions, seniors are some of the safest drivers around. The experts at Hartford Auto Insurance indicate that the number of accidents involving older drivers actually decreases as age increases. It's the risk factors like medical conditions, medication usage and reduced physical function that increase the risk for accidents and injuries involving older drivers. the direction of the light beam with the movement of the steering wheel.

- Pedal extenders: Extenders help short drivers reach the pedals while maintaining a safe distance from the steering wheel and potential airbag deployment.
- Hand controls: Whether one has sensory changes in the feet from surgery or a medical condition, adaptive hand controls can move the "pedals" up to the steering column.
- Blind spot warning and other sensors: Today's cars can be equipped with any number of sensors that can detect oncoming traffic, cars to the left or right of the vehicle, items or cars behind the vehicle when reversing, and even if the vehi-

cle has drifted out of the lane. These are all great safety features for any driver, but may be especially helpful to seniors.

• Parking assist: Parking assist technology can steer the vehicle into a space with little input from the driver.

- Voice control: Avoiding distractions and keeping hands on the wheel is enhanced by voice controls, which can be set up to do things like turn on the radio or adjust climate control.
- Convex mirrors: Special mirrors increase the field of vision.
