# GYPSD ALUMNI: GET PROGRAMMING WITH GO

Grande Yellowhead Public School Division is always proud to share their former students' success stories: today's highlight is an alumni from both Wildwood School and Grand Trunk High School in Evansburg, Nathan Youngman.

Nathan's career in coding and computing began at an early age when he attended a book fair hosted by Wildwood School and found a book on computer programming in BASIC which got him started in those early years of personal computers (Atari, Commodore, and Apple II). According to Nathan, books continued to be a large part of his schooling, which helped the

launch of his own software business while attending Grand Trunk High School. During his time at GYPSD, Nathan also helped develop a new program TrialType that was used on many Division computers. After graduating, he launched a career in web development that has kept his interest for the past 22 years.

Nathan's inspiration to write Get Programming with Go was a pay it forward initiative, providing a hobbyist-friendly programming book to a new generation of coders. 



### RECOGNIZE AND AVOID BUYING A LEMON

New or preowned vehicles are significant investments. New cars might be more expensive than preowned models, but according to Edmunds, the average cost of a preowned vehicle is around \$16,000.

Preowned vehicles seem and often are consumer-friendly options. However, preowned vehicles always carry some measure of risk. Unless a vehicle is covered by a warranty, consumers take that risk on themselves.

One way for buyers to reduce any anxiety they may have about preowned vehicles is to learn as much as they can about automobiles and spotting potential lemons. Despite the availability of vehicle history reports, some lemons still make it onto used car lots. The following are a handful of ways buyers can protect themselves

from buying lemons.

- Research vehicles through reputable sources. Investigate the reliability ratings of certain vehicles on reputable sites such as Edmunds.com, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration website (NHT-SA.gov) and Kelly Blue Book (kbb.com).
- Ask the right questions. Once you find a vehicle that interests you, ask pointed questions about its condition and features. Relatively new cars with high mileage may raise red flags, so ask how many owners such vehicles had and if maintenance records are available. Consumer Reports says a high-mileage car used on a long highway commute is better than if the car does many short trips or stop-and-go driving. Also ask if a vehicle you're considering has been in

an accident or if there are any recalls on the make and model.

- Request a vehicle history report. Ask to see a copy of the vehicle's history report. Such reports may include information about major accidents, mileage counts, number of owners, airbag deployment, and many other clues that can shed light on the condition of the vehicle. The report also may included warranty information and whether the car or truck was branded a lemon.
- Conduct a visual inspection. Look at the vehicle for certain telltale signs of wear and tear that may indicate you should not buy the vehicle. Such indicators may include prematurely worn pedals or a sagging driver's seat. Check for dents, chipped paint, mismatched body panels, body filler, or sloppy repair work. Inconsis-

tent welds around the hood also may indicate the car has undergone significant repairs.

When looking under the hood, Consumer Reports suggests paying attention to the level of grease and corrosion on the engine, radiator and battery. Check for wet spots that may be indicative of leaks. Melted wires or blackened areas can be a sign of an engine overheating or even a fire.

• Rely on a trusted mechanic. Ask a mechanic you trust to give the vehicle a thorough, professional inspection. He or she may be able to spot signs of a lemon more readily than amateurs.

Purchasing a car can induce some anxiety. Research and patience can calm buyers' nerves and ensure they find the right vehicle at the right price.

### PREVENT MOBILE PHONE-RELATED ACCIDENTS

Because they enable people to make calls or send messages from just about anywhere, mobile phones can be great conveniences. But they also can be annoying when conversations, texting or perusing the Internet gets in the way of proper etiquette.

Talking loudly in public areas, texting when in the middle of a face-to-face conversation or sharing personal details in public are not just bad manners, but such behaviors also can be unsafe. Poor mobile phone etiquette is cause for some concern, but there is great cause for concern for people who find themselves routinely distracted by their mobile phones while driving or operating equipment. Using a mobile phone when driving greatly increases a person's

risk of getting into an accident. Distracted driving has become something of an epidemic, as the following figures, courtesy of Don't Text and Drive, illustrate.

- Texting or doing something on your phone can distract drivers for as long as five seconds. If you're traveling at 55 miles per hour, that is the equivalent of driving the length of a football field without looking at the road.
- Texting while driving makes you 23 times more likely than normal to be in a car crash.
- Among drivers between the ages of 18 and 20 involved in car accidents in the United States, 13 percent admitted to texting or talking on their phones at the times of their crashes.

• The National Safety Council reports that cell phone use while driving leads to around 1.6 million crashes each year, with nearly 330,000 injuries occurring from such accidents.

• Cell phone usage while driving can delay a driver's reaction time as much as having a blood alcohol concentration at the legal limit.


Although the majority of drivers support a ban on texting while driving, many still continue to do it. The single best way to prevent driving accidents and fatalities related to mobile phone usage is to put the phone down. Consider the following suggestions to help you avoid looking at your phone while behind the wheel.

• Keep your phone in a purse or in a bag in the back

seat so that it is not readily accessible while driving. Many cars now have Bluetooth-enabled hands-free dialing and calling. So you do not need to have the phone nearby to answer a call.

- Leave your phone at home on short trips and give yourself a break from screen time.
- Set up an automatically generated text message that indicates you are driving. Other apps will read out texts to you or block incoming calls or texts altogether.
- Turn off notifications so you will not be tempted to look at your phone each time there's a new pop-up or sound.

Remember, any texts can wait until you pull over, park or arrive at your destination.

### REDUCE RISK OF VEHICLE THEFT

According to the Insurance Information Institute, more than 700,000 motor vehicles were reported stolen in the United States in 2015. And car theft is not exclusive to the United States, as the Insurance Bureau of Canada reports that automobile theft costs Canadians roughly \$1 billion each year.

Car thieves are often highly skilled, but that does not mean car owners cannot take steps to reduce their risk of being victimized by auto theft.

- Take the simple steps. Suggestions like keeping cars locked at all times and rolling up all windows before walking away from the car may sound simple, but they're also effective. Drivers should avoid being careless no matter how briefly they plan to be away from their vehicles. Talented thieves need only a few seconds to steal a car, so don't make it any easier for them than it already is.
- Park in well-lit areas. Well-lit parking lots may not prevent cars from being stolen, but such lots, especially ones monitored by security cameras, can be a strong deterrent to thieves who want to avoid being seen and having their crimes documented on camera.
- Park in public areas. Avoid parking in areas that are off the beaten path. While this might make for easy parking, such areas are also enticing to prospective car thieves worried about people witnessing their crimes. When parking at grocery stores, malls or other areas with large parking lots, park as close to pedes-

trian entrances as possible. Constant foot traffic can deter thieves from attempting to steal cars.

- Install an alarm system and anti-theft device. Insurance companies often discount their premiums for drivers whose vehicles have alarm systems and anti-theft devices. Such systems and technology draw attention to vehicles when thieves attempt to steal them, and many thieves can easily spot which cars have anti-theft devices they would prefer to avoid.
- Remove personal items and valuables from the vehicle. Automobiles should not be used as rolling storage facilities for various reasons. One such reason is that valuables may attract thieves. Women should always take their purses with them when leaving their vehicles, and all drivers should make sure to remove all valuables when exiting their cars.

Car theft is a legitimate

concern for drivers, but savvy motorists can take steps to reduce the risk of their vehicles being stolen.



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### **BUILDING SCHOOLS FOR THE FUTURE**

Following through on its commitment to continue building new schools, the province has announced 25 new school projects.

The Budget 2019 capital plan supports 15 new schools, including brand new high schools in Calgary, Edmonton, Leduc, Blackfalds and Langdon. Six schools are slated for replacement and four will receive modernization or additions. Together, the 25 projects will receive \$397 million.

"We made a promise to Albertans that our government will continue to build new schools, and we are doing exactly that. Through our significant investment in new schools, replacements, modernizations and infrastructure upkeep, our children will continue to learn in up-to-date and safe spaces. This will result in better success in our classrooms. The future is bright for Alberta students." - Adriana LaGrange,

Minister of Education

"These 25 projects confirm our government's commitment to continue to build schools across the province. Alberta Infrastructure will continue to deliver key infrastructure projects to build prosperity for Albertans." - Prasad Panda, Minister of Infrastructure

Budget 2019 also includes \$1.4 billion over four years to continue work on previously announced school projects across Alberta, which includes \$123 million for about 250 new modular classrooms to address the most urgent needs for additional space across the province. There are more than 60 projects underway in the province. Twenty-seven are expected to be open for the 2020-21 school year, and the remaining projects are in various stages of planning and construction.

The province will also provide \$527 million to school divisions for plant operations and maintenance to support the day-to-day upkeep of

school facilities. Additionally, \$194 million will support the capital maintenance and renewal of existing school buildings through the Infrastructure Maintenance and Renewal Program.

"I am pleased that the government chose to make this announcement here in Calgary-North East. Students and families in my community will be relieved to hear that they will be getting the new high school we have needed for a long time. I'm proud that this critical funding was included in Budget 2019, as this was one of my first and most important motivations for why I wanted to represent Calgary-North East at the legislature." - Rajan Sawhney, Minister of Community and Social Services and MLA for Calgary-North East

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

# BLUE-GREEN ALGAE BLOOM ADVISORIES LIFTED PROVINCEWIDE

Recent weather has cooled lake and reservoir water temperatures to such an extent that blue-green algae is no longer a health concern, including in two lakes which had previously been placed under blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom advisories in the Edmonton Zone of Alberta Health Services (AHS).

Effective immediately, AHS has lifted the bluegreen algae (cyanobacteria) bloom advisories for Jack Fish Lake and Wabamun Lake.

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water at any time.

thority responsible for planning and delivering health supports and services for more than four million adults and children living in Alberta. Its mission is to provide a patient-focused, quality health system that is accessible and sustainable for all Albertans.

# ENCANA RELOCATION: STATEMENT FROM MINISTER SAVAGE

Minister of Energy Sonya Savage issued the following statement regarding Encana relocating its headquarters to the United States:


"I am troubled by the news that Encana is formally relocating its headquarters to the United States. Sadly, I cannot say I am surprised, as Encana has been shifting its efforts to the U.S. for years, in large part due to harmful policies in Canada.

"Today's news follows Encana's earlier decision in November 2018 to move to a 'headquarter-less model' with a heavy shift to the U.S. It is no coincidence that today's news is being an-

nounced after the federal election.

"I would encourage all to read Encana founding CEO and energy pioneer Gwyn Morgan's 2018 commentary on how the company he founded is being pushed out of Canada due to policies from our federal government. I sincerely hope today's news will serve as a wake-up call for leadership in Ottawa.

"Encana still maintains significant operations within Alberta, and I expect that to continue. The government has been informed that today's news does not involve elimination of jobs in Alberta, nor does it alter the company's Canadian capital allocation plans."
