accomplished without the continued efforts of Albertans in securing their personal property and informing their local police of suspicious activity and criminal offences.

In the past, we've heard that people say they've noticed an increase in crime, but that they aren't report-

Leduc, Alta - In 2016, an analysis of collisions over a five-year period in the six kilometer corridor of the QE II Highway within the municipal boundaries of Leduc was completed. The analysis showed the collision rate was more than

twice the provincial rate for similar four-lane highway segments.

PROJECT UPDĂTE

The analysis also collected speed sensor data, which showed more than 100,000 vehicles a year traveling in excess of 30 km/hr over the posted speed limit and more than 16,000 vehicles a year traveling in excess of 50 km/hr over the posted

speed limit. In addition to the high speeds, the safety of first responders was identified as an area of concern. Collisions with first responder vehicles while attending collision scenes had also occurred over the same five-year period.

Leduc RCMP QE II Project Update

Following the analysis, it was incumbent upon the RCMP and City of Leduc to look for solutions in addressing speed and safety concerns – for both motorists and first responders – along the Leduc corridor of the QE II.

In response, the City of Leduc and RCMP partnered with Alberta Transportation and the University of Alberta Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering to commence a project to reduce speeds and collisions in the corridor. This strategic and carefully considered project consisted of an intelligence-led, manned enforcement response supported by academic research.

Additional resources, above the regular compliment for Leduc Detachment, were brought in to support operations of the project. A public information campaign was launched, which included signage installed along the safety corridor alerting the public of the increased enforcement in the area. Media releases were published, and an educational pamphlet titled "Speed Impacts Us All" was distributed to accompany the enhanced enforcement.

Following the project's conclusion, an evaluation was conducted by the University of Alberta. The results of the evaluation showed a reduction in the average speed of vehicles up to 8.8 km/hr. Overall, the results from this project demonstrated that implementing an integrated speed management program, with manned enforcement at its core, has the potential to improve safety by increasing compliance with traffic laws, reducing the number of violations, and decreasing the average speed on highways.

While the academic-led project has now completed, enhanced enforcement con-

tinues along the QE II corridor in an effort to maintain the lower speeds and subsequent safety benefits gained from the project.

Today is not just any day and this article is not just an everyday article that can be skimmed and quickly forgotten because as I write this article it is Budget Dav!

How is it going to impact our lives? Are taxes going to go up? Will the budget bring deep and serious cuts in spending? Who will be the winners in this year's budget?

All of these questions are asked in light of a new government that has inherited a \$62 Billion dollar debt that could blossom to \$100 Billion over the next 4 years if spending is not curtailed.

Alberta's debt has been growing faster than any other sub-national debt in the world. Alberta has experienced a deficit budget every year since 2008. Alberta could spend approximately \$10.4 Billion dollars less if our per capita spending matched the average

of Canada's 3 largest provinces. We spend about \$2,600 dollars more per person to receive approximately the same level of services.

The budget that the Finance Minister presented to Albertans focused on controlling spending by reducing the budget by about 3 cents for every dollar the government spends. That may not sound like a lot but it speaks to the care that was taken to reduce spending while ensuring that Albertans priorities of Health Care, Education and taking care of the vulnerable would also be reflected in the budget.

The Minister has produced a realistic budget that uses cautious revenue projections. He estimates that there will be .6% real GDP growth this year with growth rates over the next 3 years of 2.7%, 3% and 3%. He has also used a conservative oil price for oil revenue predicting that the WTI price for oil will be \$57.00 this year and that it will likely rise to \$63.00 over the term of the present government. A possibility of a global recession and how successfully

we increase our access to tidewater could affect the predictions of revenue that this budget is built upon.

The budget is built upon prudent budget cuts that look to ensure effective use of tax dollars. With this in mind the government is predicting a 2019/20 budget deficit of \$8.7 Billion dollars while predicting that subsequent budgets will reduce yearly deficits until in the fourth year of the government's mandate there is a projected \$600 million dollar yearly surplus.

Health and Education spending will remain relatively stable with few if any cuts in spending while Advanced Education is looking at about a 5% reduction in overall spending. Municipalities will be facing spending cuts but Community and Social Services will see an approximately 7.6% increase and Seniors and Housing will receive a 1.6% increase and Children's Services will receive a 15% increase. The goal in this budget is to bring Public Sector remuneration in line with other provinces and the budget predicts a 7.7% reduction in the size of the Public

Service over the course of the next 4 years obtained primarily through attrition as individuals retire.

Finally, the budget also focuses on Standing Up for Albertans. In light of the results of the Federal election this budget will follow through with the campaign promise to spend \$30 million on the Canadian Energy Center that will promote and defend Alberta's energy industry. There is also the intent to pursue fiscal fairness within the Canada by addressing the billions of dollars that leave Alberta every year through the equalization payments.

The 2019/20 Budget successfully addresses Albertans priorities of Health Care, Education and the vulnerable while facing up to the fiscal realities that have left the province in financial distress. It addresses fiscal issues responsibly with cautious revenue projections and realistic reductions in government spending while increasing spending in some areas but above all it addresses the priorities that Albertans set in the last election.

LEDUC'S NEW CROSSWALK TECHNOLOGY AMONG THE FIRST OF ITS KIND IN CANADA

Two types of adaptive pedestrian crossing technologies have been installed at a number of crosswalks in Leduc. The technologies, which are among the first of their kind in Canada, adjust crossing times and light cycles based on pedestrian needs.

The first technology allows pedestrians to pick from two pre-programmed walk times dependent on the time they need to cross the intersection safely. Pressing the button for one second activates a standard walk time, while pressing the button for two seconds activates an extended walk time. This feature is installed at six crosswalks along 50 Avenue from Discovery Way to Deer Valley Drive, which are clearly marked with instructional signs.

The second technology, which is installed at the intersection of Highway 2A and 50 Street/Southfork Drive, uses a video detection system to sense when pedestrians require additional time to finish crossing. The system doesn't increase walk times but delays lights from changing so pedestrians can safely exit the intersection. Green lights are extended up to a set time limit to keep traffic lights cycling on a regular basis. The video detection system is anticipated to be active within the next several weeks.

"Innovative solutions like these help make our community a safer place for pedestrians and motorists," says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "Any improvements we can make to address the needs of our pedestrians puts us one step further in reducing potential risks and increasing traffic safety in Leduc." The technologies are placed at intersections where wider than average road width means some pedestrians, especially students from surrounding schools and those with mobility restrictions, may require additional crossing time. Rather than extend all walk times, which ultimately extends light cycles and disrupts traffic, pedestrians are given extra crossing time as needed.

Both technologies are installed on a trial basis and will be monitored over the next several months to determine if any adjustments are required.
