TRANS MOUNTAIN PIPELINE: MINISTER SCHWEITZER

Submitted by Government of Alberta

Doug Schweitzer, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General, issued the following statement on the Supreme Court of Canada's ruling on B.C.'s attempt to stop shipments of Alberta oil:

"The Supreme Court of Canada has upheld the rule of law and put an end to the British Columbia government's campaign of obstruction against Alberta energy. We are pleased that the court unanimously dismissed B.C.'s appeal of a 5-0 decision by the British Columbia Court of Appeal, which ruled the B.C. government does not have constitutional authority to stop the Trans Mountain Pipeline expansion through delay, uncertainty and the likely prospect of future litigation. By ensuring that B.C. must respect the federal government's rigorous process in approving TMX, this outcome will have major ramifications for the project and its profound importance to Albertans and all Canadians.



The B.C. court's decision was an affirmation of the unique economic union among Canada's provinces.

"Building the TMX and ensuring a fair price for our natural resources will create thousands of new jobs and increased prosperity that will benefit the entire country. We are pleased with the decision by our country's highest court and look forward to the continued construction of the Trans Mountain Pipeline." without taking anything.

TUTTLE, William Donald Apr. 18, 1941 - Jan. 20, 2020

William "Don" Tuttle - April 18, 1941 January 20, 2020 It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of Don Tuttle at the age of 78, after a battle with dementia.

Don was survived by his 3 children, Rick (Linda), Midge (Warren), Larry (Jolene), his grandchildren Jesse & Valerie, as well as his sister Marj & numerous nieces & nephews. Don was predeceased by his parents William & Mary Tuttle.

A celebration of life will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Saturday, February 1, 2020 at the Evansburg Legion, 4802 51 Ave, Evansburg AB. of Entwistle. Evansburg, you've had your share of fame! Time for those easterners to get a chance in the spotlight.

Our caboose already has interesting information about the fine community. But this exhibit will blow you out of the water, onto the trestle bridge, and into the wild west (or east?).

It is 1911, and Entwistle is the toughest town on the frontier. Moon shine stills, shirtless brawls in the streets, no police, and even a few houses of ill repute. The railroad brings with it an interesting crowd.

Fast forward a few years, and a fire consumes the Pembina Hotel, claiming thousands of lives.

At least, that's what an Edmonton newspaper claimed. Apparently, it was full of bedbugs.

Major accidents plagued the village. In the 1920s, two trains had a head-on collision. Thankfully no one was hurt. In 1936, the entire village was quarantined because of a polio epidemic. At least one fatal rafting accident occurred. But let's not stay completely gloomy.

Soon enough the police showed up.

Allegedly the rail camps were some of the healthiest that one doctor had seen.

An awesome community effort saw a great many old railroad ties placed in the cliff to ensure easy access to a swimming hole beneath the bridge.

Thriving businesses and community organizations as well as countless volunteer hours made this community a wonderful place to see the growth of this nation and province.

If you think that this has spoiled the exhibit much like modern film trailers, have no fear! There are many more great stories to be heard and displays to see. Tipple Park Museum will be partnering with Salt of The Earth Gallery for this special evening. Brie, the Gallery Owner will be talking and sharing her exciting mural project with guests!

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH: ALBERTA'S NEW POST SECONDARY FUNDING MODEL

Submitted by MLA Mark Smith | Drayton Valley – Devon Constituency

As many of you know, the education of our children has always been one of my top priorities, which is why I would like to spend some time unpacking a new outcomes-based post-secondary funding approach that will increase transparency and accountability and help build a modern and diverse workforce for the future.

Under the new funding model, a portion of government funding to colleges, universities and polytechnics will be based on achieving key performance measures. Performance measures will encourage institutions to improve services, increase efficiencies and create opportunities for Albertans through strong labour market outcomes and innovative programs and research. As the Minister of Advanced Education, Demetrios Nicolaides, points out

"This is a new and completely transformative funding model for our universities, colleges and polytechnics. Our new approach will help ensure students are set up for success by encouraging institutions to produce job-ready graduates. Students make a significant investment in their post-secondary education, and it is essential we do everything possible to give them a rewarding career at the end of their studies. By shifting the focus to performance, we will ensure taxpayer dollars are being used in the most responsible way possible."

In addition to tying public

investment to results, government is also transforming its relationship with post-secondary institutions by negotiating three-year funding agreements. Investment management agreements will include specific performance targets for each institution. They will also specify the government funding each institution will receive if they meet their performance targets. Three-year terms will help institutions plan for the future and build on their record of excellence.

The amount of funding tied to performance outcomes will begin at 15 per cent of operational funding for 2020-21 and gradually increase to a maximum of 40 per cent by 2022-23. A small number of performance measures will be introduced for the 2020-21 academic year, and more measures will be gradually introduced over the next three years to a total of about 15.



RCMP ISSUE BITCOIN WARNING POSTERS

Alberta – In an effort to stop victims of fraud from making bitcoin payments, the RCMP has launched an initiative that will see posters with warnings placed in rural locations.

Scams continue to be prevalent throughout the province, primarily scams where culprits are representing themselves as agents from a government organization and requesting payment in Bitcoin. To assist citizens throughout Alberta, posters have been created by the RCMP – Strategic Communications New Media team. The posters are very clear with warnings, including: "STOP – DO NOT use this Bitcoin machine if you are not in control of the QR Code you scan".

"We felt that we needed to take one more step in educating potential victims and stopping them from making that irretrievable payment" says Staff Sergeant Rob Marsollier of Red Deer RCMP Detachment. "We know that Edmonton Police Service has done similar posters and if it stops even one person from losing their savings, then it's a success."

With cooperation from the businesses hosting the bitcoin machines, the posters will be put up throughout Alberta in the near future.

GOVERNMENT ANNOUNCES PLAN TO COMBAT RURAL CRIME

The province is standing up for rural Albertans by acting on concerns to deter crime, reinforce property rights and give victims a stronger voice in the justice system.

"We are sending a strong signal to rural Albertans who have been victimized for far too long. We have listened to you. We have heard you. And we are standing with you. We want to ensure you know that we are going to do everything we can as a provincial government to help you feel safe in your communities." - Doug Schweitzer, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General

"In many ways, rural communities are the heart of this province – hard-working, salt-of-the-earth, and always ready and willing to lend a hand to a neighbour in need. It's heartbreaking to see the scourge of criminal activity worsen in these communities over the past several years, and we need to take action. This is an issue that affects many in my own community, and it is one that I take very seriously. As we promised, our government is taking immediate steps to make sure everyone feels safe and secure in their homes and in their communities." - Jason

Integrating provincial peace officers

In rural areas, police can be stretched across large distances, which can lead to longer response times. To help reduce response times, the government will create the Rural Alberta Provincial Integrated Defence Force - the RĂPID Force – by expanding the roles and authorities of 400 peace officers in the Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Branch. Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Branch and the traffic arm of the Alberta Sheriffs. The changes will allow these officers to respond to a wider range of calls and to assist the RCMP and other police services in some emergencies.

Training and related planning is underway, to have the first of these officers available to assist rural Albertans by fall 2020.

Strengthening property rights

To defend the rights of law-abiding property owners, the government will introduce changes to the Occupiers' Liability Act. These changes would eliminate the liability of law-abiding property owners who are protecting their property against trespasses who are, or who are believed to be, in the commission of a criminal act. This provision will be retroactive to Jan. 1, 2018.

To strengthen trespass laws and further defend property rights, planned legislation includes a proposed five-fold increase to the maximum fines for trespassing offences, with fines of up to \$10,000 for a first violation and \$25,000 for subsequent offences, as well as possible prison time of up to six months. Corporations that help or direct trespassers would face fines up to \$200,000. In addition to these increases, a proposed change would increase the maximum amount a court

can order for loss of or damage to property from \$25,000 to \$100,000.

The planned legislation would amend the Petty Trespass Act to add explicit references to better capture land used for crops, animal-rearing and bee-keeping.

A proposed biosecurity regulation under the Animal Health Act would create offences and penalties for people who enter agricultural operations without authorization or encourage others to do so. Such incidents can introduce disease and threaten the welfare of animals.

Cracking down on metal theft

Government has proclaimed the Scrap Metal Dealers and Recyclers Identification Act to deter metal theft by making it more difficult for criminals to monetize stolen material by selling it for scrap.

Metal theft is a significant public safety risk. Thieves terrify property owners by trespassing and stealing materials such as copper wire and industrial batteries and frequently damage and interfere with critical systems like electrical lines, telecommunications cables and transportation infrastructure.

Criminals often steal metal from property owners and critical infrastructure in isolated areas to avoid detection. This has also made rural Albertans a target of trespassers and thieves looking for metal.

The Scrap Metal Dealers and Recyclers Identification Act was passed in 2012, but never proclaimed. An Order in Council signed Nov. 5 puts the legislation into effect immediately.

Regulations outlining requirements on dealers and recyclers to obtain proof of identification from sellers, record and retain details of transactions and share information with law enforcement will be in place by spring 2020. There is also an immediate requirement for scrap metal dealers and recyclers to report any suspected stolen property in their possession to authorities.

A new voice for victims

Community impact statements will recognize the far-reaching effects of a crime and how an entire community can suffer harm or loss.

A new program will enable communities to take part in the sentencing of offenders by letting them submit a statement describing how the crime has affected the

community as a whole – including the emotional, physical and economic impact, or fears they may have for their own security.

A community impact statement could be written on behalf of any group of people, such as those in a geographic area, diverse segments of the population, and groups affected by the crime.

Community impact statement forms will be available online in early January.

There will also be additional support for victims, via a new

Restitution Recoveries Program. The program will help victims collect outstanding payments on restitution orders by giving government the authority to use enforcement measures against offenders, such as garnishing wages or seizing and selling property, as needed.

This program will reduce red tape for victims who would otherwise have to navigate the legal system and attempt to collect court-ordered restitution at their own risk, effort and expense.


