We have had two activities since the New Year

On Jan 20/2020 Marlene Petersen was the presenter of a Walk in my Greenhouse. The important things to have in a greenhouse are grow lighting, air circulation and water misting for your plants. An interesting fact that came up was that tomatoes can't be in temperatures below 50*F/10*C. or they won't set blooms.

On Jan 25/2020 we had our 13th Annual workshop, Floral Fantasies. Maria Beers a Dutch landscape designer talked about spring flowering bulbs. Her talk included the way to combine them with other early flowering perennials and shrubs to make an attractive spring yard. Let perennials that emerge later cover your bulbs so your yard is always in bloom.

You buy the bulbs in the fall and plant them as soon as possible after purchasing them. Plant them in August or September for zone 2 yards and Mid-September to early October for zone 3-4 yards.

LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY - A CONSERVATION SUCCESS STORY



Submitted by Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS)

Despite the terrible farming conditions in 2019, Lac Ste. Anne County farmers had another successful year for conservation. The farmers here are leaders in the western provinces for the Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) program. A total of 265 acres were protected this year, as a direct result of 10 alternate watering systems and 11 miles of fencing.

The ALUS program works with farmers to complete environmentally sustainable projects on private land and compensates farmers for land they are no longer farming or are unable to farm effectively. We costshare fences, watering systems, nest boxes, some tree and shrub planting in order to protect wetlands, old growth forests, and sensitive areas. Farmers are paid to grow clean air, clean water, and wildlife habitat with no change in land title.

The LSAC ALUS program runs on a Provincial grant from the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program and this is the last year for funding under this grant. Do you have an area on your farm that you would like to protect? Then come to our open house at the County office on February 20, 2020 from 5 - 8pm! The more root development they achieve, the more chance they will survive the winter. Water them well after planting. Don't mulch the soil above them until the soil is frozen.

Clara Qualizza is the owner of Meadow and Thicket Farm Flowers, a cut flower operation. It is important to use clean sharp tools to cut the stems of flowers at a 45* angle. Cut your flowers in the cool part of the morning. Put your flowers in a bucket of water right away. The stage you harvest your flowers in affects how long they will live in the vase. To extend their vase life: After picking the flowers put them in a dark place for eight hours and feed them flower food. When you put them in the vase make sure no leaves extend into the water, feed them flower food and recut the stem at a 45* angle every day. Keep the vase out of direct sun. Keep vase away from heat sources, and fruits and vegetables. Use rain water, as water quality also affects plant life.

To make your own flower food, 1 liter water, 2 tsp lemon

juice, 1 tsp sugar, 1 tsp bleach. Our day would not be complete without our vendors at the trade show.

WHITECOURT APPROVES 2020 INTERIM BUDGET

Whitecourt Town Council has approved the 2020 Interim Operating and Capital Budget. The Interim Budget includes over \$52 million of capital and operating expenditures and requires a 0% overall tax change.

"Whitecourt Town Council realizes that an unpredictable and volatile economy has impacted many families in our community, and we have been mindful of that during development of this budget," stated Mayor Maryann Chichak. "We tasked Administration and community advisory boards to find cost efficiencies and reduce spending. At a time when inflation and cost of living continues to increase, we have developed an interim budget that requires no change to tax rates," stated Mayor Maryann Chichak.

The passing of the Interim Budget allows projects to proceed before the 2020 Budget is given final approval. The 2020 Budget will be finalized in the spring of 2020 once the Provincial budget is adopted, and final assessment figures are established. The 2020 Interim Budget Report can be viewed on www.whitecourt.ca.

"While we have managed to keep the overall tax change at 0% for the interim, there are still a number of factors that could significantly impact our operations and the tax rate before we adopt the final budget. The federal and provincial budgets, as well as intermunicipal service agreement negotiations with Woodlands County, could impact revenue sources and force us to revisit proposed projects, service levels and the tax rate for 2020," added Mayor Chichak.

Capital Budget Highlights:

• The 2020 Street Improvement Program includes street, lighting, and sidewalk repairs at locations throughout the community.

• The Water System Upgrade Project construction is anticipated to begin in 2020 with funding support from the Build Canada Program and the Alberta Community Partnership Program. The upgrades include a dedicated supply main and other system upgrades, including pressure reducing measures to improve the distribution network and fire flows. • The Aerial Platform Pumper Truck was ordered in 2019 and is expected to be delivered in June 2020. The unit is expected to be in service by the summer of 2020.

 Festival Way will be constructed in Rotary Park in the spring of 2020 with funding support from the Enabling Accessibility Fund and sponsorship from the Rotary Club of Whitecourt. Festival Way will provide the base for future cultural and family entertainment options in the community, and will enhance Rotary Park through the creation of a corridor for pedestrian traffic through the park with spaces for community groups to set up tents/displays with power services and pathway lighting.

Operating Budget Highlights: • Continue with the Odour Control Program at the Wastewater Treatment Plant (chemical treatment, permitting of haulers, etc.) until future system upgrades are complete.

• Continued collaboration and development of new agreements with Woodlands County for services that benefit residents of both municipalities.

• Creation of a Geographic

Information System (GIS) that will be completed in the spring of 2020 that will centralize the Town's datasets and allow for better use and analysis of the information.

• Completion of the Regional Business Park Feasibility Study in partnership with Woodlands County to identify current and future industrial needs in the region.

• Create recommendations based on the Flood Mitigation Plan for future flood mitigation enhancements, funding strategies, education programs, and projects that will improve community flood planning and mitigate potential flood damage.

• Development of a Sports Hosting Partnership Program to support and grow the economic impact that is experienced through hosting sporting activities in our community.

As part of the budget process, members of the public will have an opportunity to review the Interim Budget and provide feedback at the annual Budget Open House. The 2020 event is tentatively scheduled for February, and advertisements will be published in the new year.

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

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TRAFFIC STOP IN OLDS RESULTS IN SEIZURE OF DRUGS AND FRAUDULENT DOCUMENTS

Olds, Alberta - On Tuesday, January 21st, 2020, at approximately 9:40 PM, the Olds RCMP responded to a complaint of a possible impaired driver in the town of Olds. A short time later, an officer located the vehicle and determined that the male driver was wanted on outstanding warrants. The male was arrested and an initial search of the vehicle revealed what appeared to be several fraudulent documents including falsified identification cards and licences. Whitecourt Town Council awarded over \$16,000 to community organizations as part of the FCSS Grant Program. The grant provides financial assistance to organizations that provide social programs that are preventative in nature to the community.

Recipients for the 2020



funding year include:

• Royal Canadian Legion -\$540.80 for the Little Warrior, Prevent It! Workshop & Training;

• Community Lunch Box -\$13,575.37 for Volunteer Centre Support;

• McLeod River Primary Care Network - \$2,500.00 for the Whitecourt Connections Event.

Whitecourt has created a Sports Hosting Program that will support hosting of sporting events that have a positive economic impact on our community. Events hosted by the sporting community increase visitors into Whitecourt, which has a positive impact by generating overnight stays and stimulating the local economy. 




