Close to Three Thousand People Working on the Project

MAYERTHORPE RCMP INVESTIGATE SHOOTING

from 2018 to 2019, but there is still room for improvement. In February 2019, there were almost 700 vehicles stolen from Alberta RCMP jurisdiction.

ALBERTA RCMP KICK-STARTS NEW YEAR WITH INTERSECTION SAFETY TIPS

As we enter into 2020, Alberta RCMP reminds drivers to maintain safe driving habits on all types of roads, including intersections, in both urban and rural areas.

Alberta RCMP urges road users to practice the following

intersection safety tips:

Drivers

- Slow down as you approach an intersection, stop and check all traffic before proceeding.
- Obey traffic signs and signals. Make a full stop at red lights and stop signs, even when turning right.
- At a four-way stop, remember the Right of Way rule. You

must yield to the vehicle on your right.

- Use your signal when making turns. Ensure it is safe to turn left before doing so.
- Pedestrians have the right of way in all marked or unmarked crosswalks.

Pedestrians

- Never jaywalk. Check traffic before crossing and only proceed when it is safe to do so.
- Always use crosswalks and pedestrian-activated signals when they are available.
- Don't be a distracted pedestrian. Remove headphones; put away cell phones or other electronic devices when crossing the street.


"You should always be prepared for the unexpected at intersections: pay attention to pedestrians, changing lights, slippery road conditions and other drivers before proceeding through an intersection," said Supt. Rick Gardner, Alberta Sheriffs. "Intersection safety entails consistently watching the road and other drivers and pedestrians to avoid dangerous collisions."

"According to Alberta Transportation, over 85% of collisions involve a driver error. The most common driver errors identified in casualty collisions at intersections include left turns, stop sign violations and disobeying a traffic signal," said Supt. Gary Graham, Alberta RCMP Traffic Services. "Intersection safety is a shared responsibility. Together, we have the ability to reduce the number of collisions and save lives."


Drop-in Weekly Pool and Darts Clubs














MALE WANTED ON FIRST DEGREE MURDER CHARGE

On Jan. 3, 2020 the Wetaskiwin RCMP responded to a homicide in the city of Wetaskiwin. An investigation conducted by the Major Crimes Unit has led to first degree murder charges against Ryan Jake Applegarth (27).

Applegarth has not been located by the RCMP since

an earlier request for public assistance on Jan. 6, when he had arrest warrants on unrelated charges. The whereabouts of Applegarth remain unknown and the Major Crimes Unit is now looking to take him into custody. He is believed to be in either the Wetaskiwin, Maskwacis or Edmonton area. He is believed to be armed and should not be approached.

TECK MINE PROJECT

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead and Deputy Shadow Minister for Natural Resources (Forestry and Mining), rose in the House of Commons to ask the government to stop dividing the country and approve the Teck mine project.

MP Soroka stated, "Canada's Environmental Assessment Agency recommended this mine be approved. The project has signed agreements with all Indigenous

groups who live near it."

He continued, "since the Liberals were first elected, over \$100 billion in energy projects have been lost, thousands of jobs are gone, and national unity is damaged. The failure to approve the Teck Mine would make this problem even worse."

In response, the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Economic Development and Official Languages said: "...we'll have a decision at the end of February 2020, Thank you."

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, is pleased to inform constituents that the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) has required all telecom service providers to implement a call-blocking system that will better protect Canadians against illegitimate and unsolicited calls.

These systems must be

implemented within their networks by December 19, 2019. The implementation of this system will mean that calls that do not come from a number that can be dialled or exceed 15 digits will be blocked before reaching the subscriber.

FATAL COLLISION ON HIGHWAY 44

On February 9th, 2020 at approximately 5:20 p.m., Morinville RCMP responded to a report of a two vehicle head on collision on Highway 44 near Township Road 535 south of Villeneuve.

Preliminary investigation revealed an SUV was travelling northbound on Highway 44 and another SUV travelling southbound when a collision occurred.

The 25-year-old male driver from Parkland County in the southbound SUV was pronounced deceased at the

scene. The adult female and infant occupants of the south-bound SUV suffered serious, but non-life threatening injuries and was taken to hospital. The adult female driver of the northbound SUV suffered serious non-life threatening injuries. There were also two youth in the northbound vehicle tak-

Traffic on Highway 44 was diverted for a couple of hours while police investigated but is now open. Icy road conditions and gusty winds were reported at the time of the collision.

TRANS MOUNTAIN PIPELINE: MINISTER SCHWEITZER

Doug Schweitzer, Minister of Justice and Solicitor General, issued the following statement on the Supreme Court of Canada's ruling on B.C.'s attempt to stop shipments of Alberta oil:

"The Supreme Court of Canada has upheld the rule of law and put an end to the British Columbia government's campaign of obstruction against Alberta energy. We are pleased that the court unanimously

dismissed B.C.'s appeal of a 5-0 decision by the British Columbia Court of Appeal, which ruled the B.C. government does not have constitutional authority to stop the Trans Mountain Pipeline expansion through delay, uncertainty and the likely prospect of future litigation. By ensuring that B.C. must respect the federal government's rigorous process in approving TMX, this outcome will have major ramifications for the project and its profound importance to Albertans

and all Canadians.

"This is the decision we expected. British Columbia's own top court was clear that the proposed law is 'an... existential threat to a federal undertaking that is being expanded specifically to increase the amount of oil transported through British Columbia.' The B.C. court's decision was an affirmation of the unique economic union among Canada's provinces.

"Building the TMX and ensuring a fair price for our natural resources will create

thousands of new jobs and increased prosperity that will benefit the entire country. We are pleased with the decision by our country's highest court and look forward to the continued construction of the Trans Mountain Pipeline."

THEFT OF MOTOR VEHICLE FROM SERVUS PLACE

St. Albert, Alta. – On January 2, 2020, at approximately 5:00 p.m., St. Albert RCMP General Duty members, with the assistance of St Albert RCMP Crime Reduction Unit (CRU), began an investigation into two males who stole personal items from lockers at the Servus Place. The suspects

stole wallets & vehicle keys and once in possession of the items, made their way to the parking lot, located the vehicle and drove away. The suspects proceeded to use the victim's credit cards at various gas stations in St. Albert as well.

Police attempt to stop the stolen truck but it fled the area. The male suspect was known to police and known to be a prolific property crime offender. 

MOVE OVER AND STOP FOR EMERGENCY RESPONDERS

Parkland RCMP would like to remind the public of the importance of pulling over and stopping for flashing emergency lights and sirens. The Alberta Traffic Safety Act states: when an emergency vehicle (ambulance, fire, police or peace officers) is approaching you from any direction and is sounding a siren, you must yield the right-of-way.

If you hear a siren or see flashing emergency lights:

- Clear the intersection.
- If you are driving on a road with one or two lanes, pull over on the right side of the road.
- Remember to use your signal.
- If you are driving on a road with three or more lanes, clear the intersection and move your vehicle to the nearest side of the road.
- If you are in the centre lane, pull your vehicle over to the right side of the road, come to a complete stop and wait for the emergency vehicle to pass you.
- Move right or left to the nearest curb on 1-way streets.
- Emergency vehicles have the right-of-way and take precedence over all other traffic. Keep to the side of the street until they have safely passed and watch closely for additional emergency vehicles approaching from behind.
- Don't enter an intersection until the emergency vehicle is completely through it, even if you have a green light. The only exception to this rule is when a peace officer gives you other directions.
- Remember, you must not follow within 150 m of any emergency vehicle that has its siren or lights operating
- Be considerate of other drivers that have pulled over in front of you.
- Motorists must slow down to 60 kilometres per hour, or less if the posted speed limit is lower, when passing emergency vehicles or tow trucks stopped with their lights flash-

ing

• Failing to slow down puts emergency workers, including tow truck drivers and other motorists at risk of serious injury or even death.

If you fail to slow down for emergency vehicles or tow trucks parked road side with emergency lights flashing, fines for speeding are double. If you fail to yield to emergency vehicles with emergency lights and sirens engaged, you could receive a fine and demerits.

By remembering these rules of the road, you will help emergency responders get to the scene as quickly as possible and keep emergency personnel safe who are assisting road side.







Trans Mountain Expansion Project Construction Accelerating

With 65 per cent of the detailed route approved, and a process established by the Canada Energy Regulator for the remainder in progress, the path forward is clear. Construction is accelerating and we're very excited to be delivering this important Project and on our commitments to Canadians, our customers and communities," says Ian Anderson, President and CEO of Trans Mountain Corporation.

The Trans Mountain Corporation Board of Directors recently approved a Project cost estimate of \$12.6 billion to bring it into service by the end of 2022. To date, the company has spent \$2.5 billion in respect to the Project, which includes the impact of delays and the resulting additional regulatory process. It is anticipated that an additional \$8.4 billion will be spent to complete the Project, plus \$1.7 billion of financial carrying costs. The company has also recommended to the Government of Canada in its capacity as owner and lender, a further \$600 million reserve for cost impacts beyond the control of Trans Mountain. This cost will be presented to the Government of Canada as part of the process to obtain the necessary funding of the Corporation's capital needs. This estimated cost of the Expansion reflects today's realities of enhanced environmental protections, security, quality assurance and Indigenous inclusion, and is based on reasonable assumptions, including the completion of regulatory approvals, permits and route hearings.

The Corporation's projected earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization (EBITDA) are expected to be at least \$1.5 billion in the first year of the Project's operation and expected to grow annually. These projections are underpinned by long-term contractual commitments covering 80 per cent of the system's 890,000 barrels a day of capacity.

The board also affirmed that this Project remains commercially viable, and that Canada's overall investment in Trans Mountain remains on course to generate a return at commercial levels.

The Project is also expected to drive significant economic benefits for workers, businesses and Indigenous communities across Alberta, British Columbia and the country. At peak construction, there will be approximately 5,500 workers employed in communities along the construction corridor in Alberta and British Columbia. Trans Mountain is prioritizing and maximizing Indigenous, local and regional hiring to the greatest extent possible. Canadians will also benefit from the economic and tax contributions made by the Project once it is in operation. Communities along the construction corridor will benefit from significant tax dollars, which are anticipated to exceed \$52 million annually, contributing to these local communities' ability to meet their respective social, economic and development goals.

"Today's Trans Mountain Expansion Project has seen significant changes, enhancements and improvements since it was originally envisioned in 2009, and first introduced to the public in 2012. The Project has set new standards for Indigenous participation and inclusion – with 58 signed agreements worth over \$500 million. The Project reflects the input and feedback from thousands of Canadians

and incorporates the very best safety and environmental protections. From the installation of state-of-the-art leak detection and monitoring technology, route adjustments to avoid sensitive areas, tunneling versus trenched crossings, to installing more valves and ground water monitoring stations, Canadians will be proud to know that Trans Mountain has established the very highest benchmark for the development and construction of a major energy infrastructure project," says Anderson.

Canadians will benefit from the economic and tax contributions made by the Project once it is operation. In addition, Trans Mountain will make payments to the British Columbia government of between \$25 million and \$50 million annually, for a total contribution over a 20-year period of up to \$1 billion. These funds are to be used by the B.C. Clean Communities program to fund local, environmental projects everywhere in British Columbia.

Trans Mountain will continue to provide updates on its construction activities as the Project proceeds.






