Close to Three Thousand People Working on the Project



With a new year ahead of us and recent court decisions announced, the Trans Mountain Expansion Project is accelerating. Work is well underway with pipe in the ground and terminal construction in Alberta, and significant work ongoing at the Burnaby and Westridge Marine Terminals in British Columbia. Before the end of 2020, construction is expected to be underway across the entire line.

"Today, we have more than 2,900 people working on the Project and that number will grow significantly in the months ahead. With 65 per cent of the detailed route approved, and a process established by the Canada Energy Regulator for the remainder in progress, the path forward is clear. Construction is accelerating and we're very excited to be delivering this important Project and on our commitments to Canadians, our customers and communities," says Ian Anderson, President and CEO of Trans Mountain Corporation.

The Trans Mountain Corporation Board of Directors recently approved a Project cost estimate of \$12.6 billion to bring it into service by the end of 2022. To date, the company has spent \$2.5 billion in respect to the Project, which includes the impact of delays and the resulting additional regulatory process.



RCMP INVESTIGATE FATAL COLLISION ON HIGHWAY 44 IN STURGEON COUNTY

On February 9th, 2020 at approximately 5:20 p.m., Morinville RCMP responded to a report of a two vehicle head on collision on Highway 44 near Township Road 535 south of Villeneuve.

Last year, there were almost 10,000 thefts of motor vehicles in Alberta RCMP jurisdiction. Over 6,500 of those thefts were trucks, SUVs, or vans. Cars made up a smaller portion of thefts accounting for just over 1,200. There was a 5% decrease in vehicle thefts from 2018 to 2019, but there is still room for improvement. In February 2019, there were almost 700 vehicles stolen from Alberta RCMP jurisdiction.

One of the most important tips is to lock your vehicle and remove the keys. If you plan to start your car to warm it up, you need a remote starter or plan to stay with your vehicle.

Here are some easy steps to keep your vehicle safe:

- Lock the doors
- Remove all valuables
- Use a steering wheel lock
- Lock your garage
- Remove garage door opener from vehicle
- Use a vehicle tracking system
 - Park in a well-lit area

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

This last week Minister Shandro announced a highly anticipated and welcome review of Alberta's Healthcare System. The report, conducted by Ernst & Young LLP (EY), will look to maintain current healthcare spending while searching for greater efficiencies and more effective services for Albertans.

The review is the first in 10 years, since Alberta Health

Services was formed. The report contains 57 recommendations and 72 savings opportunities to improve the quality and long-term sustainability of health services.

"The AHS review is a key commitment to Albertans, and I'm very excited about moving forward with implementation. Every dollar we save will be put right back into the health system to deliver on our promise to improve access and make the system work better for patients. It's about freeing up administrative resources so

we can spend more directly on Albertans' health care." - Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health

The recommendations address four key areas: people, clinical services, non-clinical services and governance. The government accepts the report, with two important exceptions: there will be no hospital closures or consolidation of urban trauma centres.

Internal savings will allow more money to be directed to patients and front-line care, and will help free up funds for more surgeries while diminishing wait times.

The report identifies a range of long-term savings initiatives with the potential to save between \$1.5 billion to \$1.9 billion annually.

Stakeholder input into the review process far exceeded any similar projects that Ernst & Young LLP (EY) has conducted across Canada. Staff engagement included feedback from about 1,200 physicians, 27,000 front-line staff and 4,200 AHS leaders.


Over the next 100 days, AHS will engage staff and clinical leaders as it develops a long-term implementation plan. The successful completion of this AHS review will fulfill an important platform committed to cut administrative costs while increasing patient care.

I am also excited to tell you about an incredible opportunity to honour and recognize those who help keep our communities safe. The Alberta Community Justice Awards acknowledge the people and organizations involved with crime prevention and community safety initiatives. This includes youth justice, restorative justice and other community-based justice efforts that improve safety and well-being.

Nominations close February 28 and the 29th Annual Alberta Community Justice Awards ceremony will take place in Edmonton in June.

Finally, in regards to our oil and gas sector, we have been receiving some great news and even better numbers. Since being elected, our government has focused on attracting investment and sending a strong message that Alberta is open for business.

I am happy to report that the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers expects total investment in oil and gas will be \$37 billion this year – up \$2 billion from \$35.1 billion in 2019. This investment will support approximately 8,100 jobs here in Alberta and 3,700 jobs in the rest of Canada. This is in addition to the 533,000 jobs that Alberta's energy industry provides across the country.

Charitable donations




Late-night snacks

Weddings says a cascade of flowers and greens can be romantic and elegant.


Dance floor blooms

Trans Mountain Expansion Project Construction Accelerating

It is anticipated that an additional \$8.4 billion will be spent to complete the Project, plus \$1.7 billion of financial carrying costs. The company has also recommended to the Government of Canada in its capacity as owner and lender, a further \$600 million reserve for cost impacts beyond the control of Trans Mountain. This cost will be presented to the Government of Canada as part of the process to obtain the necessary funding of the Corporation's capital needs. This estimated cost of the Expansion reflects today's realities of enhanced environmental protections, security, quality assurance and Indigenous inclusion, and is based on reasonable assumptions, including the completion of regulatory approvals, permits and route hearings.

The Corporation's projected earnings before interest, taxes, depreciation and amortization (EBITDA) are expected to be at least \$1.5 billion in the first year of the Project's operation and expected to grow annually. These projections are underpinned by long-term contractual commitments covering 80 per cent of the system's 890,000 barrels a day of capacity.

The board also affirmed that this Project remains commer-

cially viable, and that Canada's overall investment in Trans Mountain remains on course to generate a return at commercial levels.

The Project is also expected to drive significant economic benefits for workers, businesses and Indigenous communities across Alberta, British Columbia and the country. At peak construction, there will be approximately 5,500 workers employed in communities along the construction corridor in Alberta and British Columbia. Trans Mountain is prioritizing and maximizing Indigenous, local and regional hiring to the greatest extent possible. Canadians will also benefit from the economic and tax contributions made by the Project once it is in operation. Communities along the construction corridor will benefit from significant tax dollars, which are anticipated to exceed \$52 million annually, contributing to these local communities' ability to meet their respective social, economic and development goals.


"Today's Trans Mountain Expansion Project has seen significant changes, enhancements and improvements since it was originally envisioned in 2009, and first introduced to the public in 2012. The Project has set new standards for Indigenous par-

ticipation and inclusion - with 58 signed agreements worth over \$500 million. The Project reflects the input and feedback from thousands of Canadians and incorporates the very best safety and environmental protections. From the installation of state-of-the-art leak detection and monitoring technology, route adjustments to avoid sensitive areas, tunneling versus trenched crossings, to installing more valves and ground water monitoring stations, Canadians will be proud to know that Trans Mountain has established the very highest benchmark for the development and construction of a major energy infrastructure project," says Anderson.

Canadians will benefit from the economic and tax contributions made by the Project once it is operation. In addition, Trans Mountain will make payments to the British Columbia government of between \$25 million and \$50 million annually, for a total contribution over a 20-year period of up to \$1 billion. These funds are to be used by the B.C. Clean Communities program to fund local, environmental projects everywhere in British Columbia.

Trans Mountain will continue to provide updates on its construction activities as the Project proceeds.
