

On February 3rd, 2020 in the early morning, Police received multiple calls for service relating to the theft or attempted theft of vehicles and ATMs in the Whitecourt area. Police first responded to a convenience store where suspects attempted to steal an ATM; however, they were unsuccessful due to security measures.

Sometime later, Police responded to a Robbery at the Eagle River Casino where two suspects drove a vehicle through the doors of the casino and then threatened an employee while stealing an ATM. The suspects removed the ATM and departed but due to business practices the ATM did not have any cash inside.

Police believe these and other occurrences are connected. Surveillance images were obtained and Whitecourt RCMP are seeking the public's assistance to identify these two suspects and locate the two stolen vehicles. The first vehicle sought is a black 2006 GMC Sierra 3500 that was stolen displaying Alberta licence plate BKY0083, it has an 11-inch lift, 38-inch tires, cracked windshield and light bar installed between the fog lights. The second vehicle is a white 2011 Ford F-350 that was stolen displaying Alberta licence


The former lead singer of The Boom Chucka Boys, Ryan Langlois' solo career has earned him three Alberta Country Music Award

BARRHEAD RCMP REPORT

The male spent the night in custody and was released the following morning on a number of conditions.

2 a trailer and two snow machines were stolen from a residence in Barrhead. Also on February 2, a stock trailer was stolen. Surveillance video is being reviewed and a suspect vehicle has been identified.

CATER WEDDING MENUS TO GUESTS' DIETARY NEEDS

HOW TO PLAN A WEDDING CEREMONY

Months of planning is par for the course for couples about to tie the knot. Much of that planning concerns the reception, and rightfully so. Receptions last longer than ceremonies, and couples are often involved in every reception detail, from picking the appetizers to serve during cocktail hour to choosing the final song before everyone calls it a night. But it's equally important that couples devote considerable attention to their wedding ceremonies.

- Give the ceremony equal footing with the reception. - Choose a ceremony location that is close to the reception site. If a ceremony will take place in a house of worship, try to choose a reception


venue close to the ceremony site. This keeps guests, some of whom may be out-of-towners who have already traveled extensively, from spending too much time on the road during the day of the wedding.

A DJ is a popular choice, and today's DJs are often artists in their own right. They know just how to select and seamlessly mix music to create the mood and really keep the party going. START A SMOKE-FREE AND VAPE-FREE LIFE

You're ready to start a smoke-free and vape-free life. Here are some suggestions for you, as you get ready to make the change.

1. Stock up on supplies

Withdrawal on the first day—and after—can be intense.

Using nicotine replacement therapy or pharmacotherapy doubles your chance of successfully quitting. Get advice from a pharmacist or your doctor.

And have lots of healthy snacks and gadgets on hand to help with cravings, keep your hands busy and keep you distracted. Common supplies include:

- Gum or mints
- Cinnamon sticks

- $\bullet \ Unsalted \ sunflower \ seeds$
- Crunchy veggies such as carrots and celery
- Herbal or decaffeinated
- Stress ball, fidget spinner or Rubik's Cube
- Supplies for current or new hobbies such as knitting or painting.
- 2. Stay positive

Try not to let negative thoughts overtake you. Quitting is hard, and for the first few days you'll need to take it one hour at a time. But remember, you've got this. Make a list of your reasons for quitting and keep it handy—in your wallet, on your fridge door, even taped to your computer at work.

Try to focus on why you chose to quit in the first place and envision how good you'll feel when you are smoke-free for good!

Think of a positive mantraperhaps "I will beat this and be smoke-free"—and repeat it over and over if you feel negative thoughts slipping in.

3. Avoid your triggers

Triggers may include places, people or situations that cause you to want to smoke or vape. Everyone has their own triggers, so know yours and avoid them where possible.

Remember the four Ds: delay, deep breathe, drink (water) and do.

Here are more tips for overcoming common triggers:

- Alcohol can reduce your resolve to stay quit. Consider drinking water or herbal tea as alternatives.
- Avoid caffeine, as it's a major trigger and can give you the jitters. Try an alternate beverage like tea, juice or water
- Stress can trigger an urge to vape or smoke, so try to stay calm and do some deep breathing. Consider yoga or meditation to help you stay relaxed.
- Avoid being around other people who smoke or vape. This might be hard if your family or friends smoke or vape, but ask that they don't smoke or vape around you and organize activities

where people can't smoke, such as going to the movies.

• If sitting around after meals is a trigger, get up and move. Do the dishes, brush your teeth, call a friend, go for a walk or go to the gym.

4. Find help

QuitCore is a free group support program that provides Albertans 18 years and up with the tools and skills they need to quit vaping and using tobacco. The program consists of six 90-minute sessions over a period of up to nine weeks at various locations around the province.

Or join a group in your community to share your stories, learn new coping strategies and celebrate milestones together. To find a session near you and to get customized email tips about quitting, go to www. albertaquits.ca.

Lastly, remember that setbacks sometimes happen. They don't mean you've failed. Slipping up is a normal part of the process, and we learn new things each time we try. It is possible to successfully stop smoking. Sometimes you have to just keep trying.




