Mayerthorpe, Alta. March 3, 2020, marks the 15-year anniversary of the four RCMP officers who died in the line of duty. Constables Leonide Johnston,

Anthony Gordon, Brock Myrol and Peter Schiemann were ambushed and killed on March 3, 2005, while investigating a marijuana grow operation and vehicle chop shop outside of Mayerthorpe, Alta.

A memorial service host-

ed by the Fallen Four Society will be held at the Fallen Four Memorial Park in Mayerthorpe. This is an opportunity for family, friends, peace officers and members of the public to come together to remember those we have lost in the

line of duty.

### WILDFIRE SEASON BEGINS MARCH 1 March 1 marks the start of wildfire season in Alberta.

Wildfire season begins one month earlier in Al-

berta than in other jurisdictions and runs until Oct. 31. Research shows that wildfires are starting earlier and lasting longer. Alberta's



early fire season means our firefighters are trained and positioned throughout the province sooner.

Almost all spring wildfires are caused by human activity and are completely preventable.

Human-caused wildfires are generally accidental in nature - often started by an out-of-control campfire or spark from an off-highway vehicle. Dead and dry grass, twigs, leaves and branches provide fuel for fast-moving grassfires. Whether started by accident or arson, wildfires can cause major environmental damage. While arson is a criminal offence.

any unsafe fire-related behaviours can lead to hefty fines or charges for the person involved.

"Most wildfires are preventable. More than 70 per cent of Alberta wildfires last year were caused by humans - and the McMillan wildfire near Slave Lake was started by arson. We will continue to promote prevention, provide adequate funding and improvements to forest management." -Devin Dreeshen, Minister of Agriculture and Forestry

During wildfire season, fire permits are required for any burning except campfires in the Forest Protection Area of Alberta. Fire permits let firefighters know exactly where planned burning is being done. Permits also help prevent false calls, which ensures firefighters are available for real wildfire response. Fire permits are free and can be requested from any Agriculture and Forestry office.

Quick facts

· Last fire season, 989 wildfires burned more than 883,411 hectares in Alberta.

· Seventy-one per cent of the wildfires were human-caused.

• If you see a wildfire burning in the forest, report it toll-free at 310-FIRE (3473).

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





Culvert/Drainage Project -During the Summer/Fall of 2019, Lamb's Construction proceeded with drainage work in the village. The project was funded by a Municipal Sustainability Initiative (MSI) grant through Municipal Affairs Alberta. Ice Fishing is a popular and enjoyable sport at Lac Ste Anne and has resulted in an increase of ice fishing shelters/ huts on our lake. We strongly recommend ALL ice huts be removed by March 31, 2020!

Intermunicipal Collaboration Framework (Bill 25) (ICF) - The revised MGA requires all municipalities that share a common boundary to adopt ICF bylaws by April 1, 2020. The Summer Villages of Val Quentin and Sunset Point continue to work collaboratively with the Village of Alberta Beach and the County of Lac Ste Anne to maximize our opportunities to work together on Core Services including Transportation, Emergency Services, Water/Waste Water, Solid Waste and Recreation.

Snow Removal - Unless otherwise indicated with signage by property owners, windrows are cleared of snow on all driveways in conjunction with snow plowing of the roads. Windrow removal service will be provided when the windrow is an accumulated height of 6 inches or greater. Windrow removal service will not be provided to residents who push snow from their driveways into the windrow for removal by the Village. The intent of the windrow removal service is to knock down the windrow and allow for vehicle passage. Windrows will be removed from the edge of the roadway inwards to a maximum of 4 feet and a maximum length of 20 feet. Property owners with rear entrances are required to

post signage to indicate that the driveway entrance is to be cleared. The plow operator does not enter private property to clear windrows.





### **ARE AUTO FINANCING RATES NEGOTIABLE?**

When buying a home, buyers are often on the lookout for the most competitive interest rate they can find. Buyers may request estimates from various lenders in the hopes of finding low interest rates that can save them tens of thousands of dollars over the life of the loan. In such instances, these lenders will quote buyers an interest rate, and buyers can then compare those quoted rates with the ones they receive from dealers, ultimately choosing the best rate for them.





### WHAT NOISY BRAKES MAY BE TELLING YOU

The only noises many drivers ever want to hear coming from their vehicles are the sounds of their favorite songs blasting from their car stereos. But cars sometimes make noises that aren't nearly as inviting as music.

Noises that seem to pop up when applying the brakes can be especially scary for motorists. No one wants to drive a vehicle with faltering or suspect brakes, so learning to distinguish between the two most common brake noises can be a wise move for drivers.

Grinding brakes

The automotive retailer Pep Boys® notes that grinding noises indicate a serious problem with the

braking system. According to CarsDirect.com, there are two major causes behind the grinding noise made by brakes. If the grinding sound is audible when pressing on the brake pedal, this likely because the rotor disc is coming into contact with part of the caliper. This typically occurs because the brake pads or rotors are extremely worn down, causing the steel backing of the worn out pad to grind against the rotor. In such instances, Pep Boys® recommends replacing the brake pads immediately.

If the grinding noise is audible while the vehicle is in motion, debris might be stuck inside the brakes. Drivers might be able to dislodge this debris by repeatedly moving their cars forward and backward in a safe place, such as a driveway. If that does not work, have the brakes serviced by a qualified mechanic.

Squealing

Many drivers are familiar with the high-pitched sound that sauealina comes from their vehicles or those of fellow motorists. That squeal, while certainly not music to the ears, might be a good thing. That's because Pep Boys® notes that some brake pads are equipped with small steel clips that serve as wear indicators. When brake pads have worn down, these devices produce a squealing sound to let drivers know it's time to get new brake

#### pads.

But squealing can be indicative of other things as well. Squealing noises are sometimes heard immediately after brake pads or rotors have been replaced. In such instances, the noise typically subsides within a day or two once the pads have been broken in.

Glazed pads also can create a squealing sound. When calipers stick, the brakes stay partially applied, producing excessive friction or heat. The heat causes the brake pads to glaze.

No one wants to hear noises coming from their brakes. However, such noises are often a car's way of telling drivers that brakes need to be serviced.




