THE PROVINCIAL COURT OF ALBERTA COVID-19 PANDEMIC PLANNING FOR THE SCHEDULING OF MATTERS

Submitted by The Provincial Court of Alberta

Alberta Health Services has recommended that measures be taken to reduce the amount of time individuals spend in large crowds or in crowded spaces to help reduce the transmission of COVID-19 in the community.

To protect the health and safety of all court users while ensuring respect for the legal rights of accused persons and civil litigants, the Provincial Court of Alberta is limiting all regular operations, effective Tuesday, March 17, 2020, until further notice.

RCMP PROVIDES UPDATE ON DETACHMENT SERVICES AMIDST COVID-19 SPREAD

In light of recent developments and evolving information surrounding the spread of Coronavirus (COVID-19), Alberta RCMP detachments and offices may defer or arrange to provide alternatives for certain services normally delivered in a Detachment. These measures are being

taken as the safety of Albertans and our employees is our number one priority. This practice will be evaluated on a regular basis and the public will be notified when normal business resumes.

There has been no change to the Alberta RCMP's response to critical and emergency matters. We remind the public to please continue to call 911 in these situations.

Effective immediately, Alberta RCMP detachments will be modifying service delivery at front counters and restricting access to public spaces within RCMP facilities. Signage will be displayed at all exterior public entrances reflecting the following:

In order to prioritize essential policing services and to reduce unnecessary contact with personnel, detachments will suspend all non-critical front counter services. Fingerprinting for Criminal Record Checks will only be done in exceptional circumstances. Non-urgent fingerprinting and Criminal Record Checks will resume at a later date.

• Before proceeding to a detachment, please consult our provincial directory and phone the listed telephone number (http:// www.rcmp-grc.gc.ca/detach/en/find/AB#wb-cont). If assistance can be provided to you over the phone, an employee or officer will do so. If your request requires personal contact with an officer, that decision will be made over the phone.

• The decision to limit public contact in non-urgent situations was made to ensure the health of the public and our employees so that we are able sustain essential services across Alberta.

• Please dial 911 only in an emergency.

• Our Operational Communication Centres are open and fully functional for all emergency calls.

"A number of changes have been put in place to protect the health of our employees and the public. These decisions were made to ensure that there were no impacts to essential services, keeping our communities safe," said Deputy Commissioner Curtis Zablocki, Commanding Officer of the Alberta RCMP. "As Alberta's provincial police service, we have sound business continuity plans in place to ensure Albertans can continue to count on us every day, including during times of public health emergencies."

Public safety is our top priority. The Alberta RCMP thanks the public for their patience during these exceptional circumstances.



Government has worked with the Alberta School Boards Association, the College of Alberta School Superintendents, the Alberta Teachers' Association and the Association of Independent Schools & Colleges of Alberta to identify how to continue teacher-directed learning for students across Alberta.

This approach was developed with a focus on the safety of our staff and students. ensuring resources continue to flow to the education system and providing boards with the flexibility required to meet the unique needs of their students. "I want to thank every Alber-

tan involved in our province's education system. Everyone has come together to chart a path forward as part of our COVID-19 response - teachers, support staff, superintendents, administrators, elected trustees, parents, education associations, the provincial government and many others. It is important that Albertans know that we are all working towards the same goal – to provide the best possible learning situation for our students during this very challenging and unprecedented time." - Adriana La-Grange, Minister of Education Continuity of student learning and content delivery

For all kindergarten to Grade 12 students, school authorities will offer at-home learning opportunities, either through online means or through other accommodations, such as course packages and telephone check-ins. Government expects that every student, regardless of their geographic location or socioeconomic status, will continue to learn while in-school classes across the province are cancelled. This includes students in public, separate, Francophone, charter and independent schools, and Indigenous students attending provincial schools.

To identify what content needs to be delivered, teachers will evaluate curricular outcomes that have not yet been covered, prioritize remaining outcomes based on what is manageable for students working from home, and will plan specific tasks and projects for students.

Grade progression and report cards

All students who were on track to progress to the next grade will.

Where possible, schools will work with high school students to complete their courses to the best of their ability, providing a final mark and awarding credits. If a student is unable to complete a course that would have allowed them to progress to the next grade, principals have the ability to award credits to ensure student progression.

High school diploma criteria Students on track to receive 100 or more credits will still be eligible to graduate and receive a high school diploma. Principals have the ability to award up to 15 credits to students in Grade 12 whose program has been negatively impacted by class cancellations. For any courses that are started, schools will complete them with the student to the best of their ability, provide a final mark and award credits. If the student is unable to complete a course that would have led them to achieving a high school diploma, such as a work experience or a career and technology studies course, principals have the ability to award credits to ensure the student graduates.

Provincial assessments

All Grade 6 and 9 provincial achievement tests and Grade 12 diploma exams are cancelled. Under special circumstances, students can request to write a diploma exam. Students wishing to do so should speak to their teacher and school administrator. Resources for parents

On March 17, the Alberta Government declared a state of emergency under the Public Health Act.

The decision came two days after the provincial government canceled all classes indefinitely across Alberta. This means:

• All schools are closed to students starting March 16.

• All child-care and community programming that takes place within Grande Yellowhead Public School Division schools is canceled.

• School buses are canceled.

STAFF

In line with the decision of neighboring school jurisdictions, the Board of Trustees and Superintendent of Schools are implementing a work-from-home option to begin March 19, 2020. Principals are coordinating with school staff to identify work that can be done from home. However, schools will remain open to staff who wish to remain at the site and a principal or delegate will be on site during the workday.

Critical staff will remain in our facilities. This decision aligns with new public health measures that include restrictions on gatherings of more than 50 people.

Staff who are sick, including those with mild cold symptoms, are expected to stay home and follow all guidance from Alberta Health Services.

GYPSD is committed to and values its employees. No staff will be losing their jobs, and contractors will continue to be paid so that they can maintain their crews.

STUDENTS' BELONG-INGS Schools have let families know when they are able to pick up students' belongings. This is a school-based decision. Pick-up times are staggered to ensure we're supporting safe social distancing to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

STUDENT LEARNING

The success of our students is GYPSD's first priority. Instruction is going to change, but our focus on student learning, especially the Division's grade 12s, is constant. Our teachers are working around the clock to connect with families to get learning plans in place.

Each school is looking into instructional alternatives for students after spring break. The Division currently uses G Suite, which offers Google Classroom to all teaching staff. In addition to Google Classroom, other communication tools include Google Docs, Gmail, and Google Hangouts. Teachers will be using an assortment of digital resources and the platform tools to deliver lessons and connect with students.

Schools will be coordinating with families who do not have computers or internet access to provide them with devices or hard copies of learning materials and discuss supports.

We know families have a lot of questions about student learning and we will share more information as it becomes available from Education (k-12) and Advanced Education (post-secondary and industry training).

The Minister of Education has confirmed:

• Every student will receive a final mark and students will progress to their next grade level for the next school year.

VHAT TO KNOW ABOUT DIY INSULATION

Perhaps due in part to the popularity of home improvement television shows, many homeowners now tackle an assortment of home projects without professional assistance. These weekend warriors embrace the do-it-vourself philosophy to home improvement, saving lots of money along the way.

As rewarding as successful DIY projects can be, it's important that homeowners avoid getting in over their heads. Some projects, such as those that involve plumbing or roofing, tend to be best left to the professionals. But many other projects, including insulation installation, are very DIY-friendly.

Can I install insulation myself? The Insulation Institute notes that DIY insulation installation is definitely doable, though typically only when homeowners are installing certain types of insulation. The Institute notes

that installing fiberglass or mineral wool insulation can be simple. However, homeowners who prefer spray foam insulation should leave installation to the professionals.

What should I do before beainning the project?

The Insulation Institute advises homeowners who are going to install insulation to determine if vapor retarders, sometimes referred to as "vapor barriers," will need to be installed before they begin the project. Vapor diffusion retarders can reduce the amount of moisture transferred by air currents, but they are not always necessary. Factors such as climate, cladding type (i.e., brick, stucco, wood, etc.) and the location of the wall being insulated will help homeowners determine if they need vapor diffusion retarders. Homes located in places with mixed climates often

need vapor diffusion retarders. DIYers can visit www.insulationinstitute.org to learn more or consult with an insulation or watersealing professional to determine if they need vapor diffusion retarders.

Determining R-value is another important pre-project step. Different climates require different insulation R-values, which the U.S. Department of Energy notes is a measurement of an insulating material's resistance to conductive heat flow. The higher the R-value, the greater the insulation effectiveness. The amount of R-value your insulation needs will depend on the climate, the existing heating and cooling system in the house and which part of the house you will be insulating. More information about R-value is available at energy.gov/energysaver/weatherize/insulation.

DIYers also will need the ap-

propriate tools and attire before beginning an insulation installation project. In addition to the insulation itself, the online resource The Home Improvement Web® recommends the following tools:

- Safety glasses
- Dust mask or respirator
- · Stapler (electric, standard, or hammer type)
- 3/8" or 1/2" staples
- Protective clothing
- Work light
- · Tape measure
- Extension cord
- · Utility knife and extra blades
- · Stepladder(s)
- · Straightedge for cutting insulation

DIYers can access any number of insulation installation tutorials online to determine if they can install insulation without hiring professionals.

That results in additional labor and material costs that might have been avoidable, especially for homeowners who make an effort to avoid some common DIY mistakes.

1. Failure to secure permits Even though homeowners own their homes, that does not mean they have carte blanche to do what they want with them. Many renovation projects require homeowners to secure

Some may even require additional permits as the projects advance. If proper permits are not secured, homeowners may be fined and projects may be nixed, regardless of how much money homeowners have spent up to that point. Before beginning a home renovation project, homeowners should always contact their local permit office to determine if any permits are required. Bankrate.com notes that permits are often required for any project larger than painting or wallpapering.

2. Overestimating your abilities DIY television shows make home renovation projects look easy, but reality suggests otherwise. Homeowners with little or no experience renovating a home may want to take classes before they think about starting a project on their own. Even online tutorials tend to make jobs appear easier than they are. Roofing and plumbing projects tend to be best left to the professionals, as these projects can be either dangerous or vulnerable to disaster if not addressed by trained professionals.

3. Incorrect materials

Whether it's to save money or a byproduct of inexperience, DIYers do not always choose the correct materials for a job. Experienced contractors have ample experience working with all sorts of materials and are therefore in a unique position to recommend the best materials for any given job. That resource is not available for DIYers, who must perform ample research before beginning a job so the project involves the most appropriate materials. Incorrect materials can be a sunken cost that derails a project, but even jobs completed using incorrect materials may need to be redone a lot more quickly than those that employed the right materials the first time.

Many home renovation projects can be completed without the help of professional contractors., especially when homeowners take steps to avoid some of the more common mistakes made by DIYers.



The court will post further information as it becomes available, so please continue to check the Provincial Court website https://www. albertacourts.ca/pc/home for updates.

As of Tuesday March 17, 2020, if you have a family, civil, criminal court or a Provincial Offences/traffic court appearance in the Alberta Provincial Court, you do not need to attend unless the matter is an in-custody or urgent criminal matter, or an urgent family or child protection matter.

No members of the public will be permitted in court rooms unless they are required for a court matter (parties, witnesses, media). Legal counsel are permitted access to the Court house for urgent court-related business.

Do not come into a court-
