The court will post further information as it becomes available, so please continue to check the Provincial Court website https://www.albertacourts.ca/pc/home for updates.

As of Tuesday March 17, 2020, if you have a family, civil, criminal court or a Provincial Offences/traffic court appearance in the Alberta Provincial Court, you do not need to attend unless the matter is an in-custody or urgent criminal matter, or an urgent family or child protection matter.

No members of the public will be permitted in court rooms unless they are re-

quired for a court matter (parties, witnesses, media). Legal counsel are permitted access to the Court house for urgent court-related business.

Do not come into a courthouse in person if you have been advised to self-isolate by public health officials, your doctor or the Alberta Health Services website; or you are self-isolating as a result of travel or contact with individuals with COVID-19.

The Provincial Court will remain open, subject to the following:

CRIMINAL and YOUTH CRIMINAL MATTERS

If you are not in custody and you have a criminal court appearance in the Alberta Provincial Court between Tuesday March 17 and Friday, May 22, 2020 you do not need to attend court. The Court website will be updated regularly to provide information regarding rescheduling, which will be 10 weeks from the date of your scheduled court appearance or the next court date thereafter

All in-custody matters will proceed including:

- · Bail hearings
- Sentencings with a priority given to those facing a time served situation
- Preliminary inquiries and trials
- Youth criminal sentence reviews

The Court will hear urgent

out of custody criminal matters with leave of a judge.

The Court will be available to process urgent warrants and judicial authorizations.

CIVIL MATTERS

Civil matters, with the exception of pretrial conferences and case management that are set to proceed before May 22, 2020 will be adjourned indefinitely and parties will be contacted by the local trial coordinator or the Court about rescheduled dates.

Urgent landlord and tenant matters and other urgent matters will proceed with leave of the Court.

LEDUC COUNTY CANCELS ALL PUBLIC PROGRAMS AND EVENTS IN RESPONSE TO COVID-19

This afternoon, Leduc County announced that all county-hosted public programs and events, including council and committee meetings, will be cancelled until further notice in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In addition, public access to all Leduc County administrative buildings has been restricted for the safety of both staff and residents.

"These decisions are in line with health authorities' recommendations to practice social distancing and avoid time spent in crowded spaces," says Leduc County Mayor Tanni Doblanko. "The health and safety of our residents and our employees is our priority. We recognize that the situation is changing on a daily basis, which is challenging for all of

us; but we are in this together and are doing our best to keep everyone safe during this unprecedented time."



WHAT TO KNOW ABOUT DIY INSULATION

Perhaps due in part to the popularity of home improvement television shows, many homeowners now tackle an assortment of home projects without professional assistance. These weekend warriors embrace the do-it-yourself philosophy to home improvement, saving lots of money along the way.

As rewarding as successful DIY projects can be, it's important that homeowners avoid getting in over their heads. Some projects, such as those that involve plumbing or roofing, tend to be best left to the professionals. But many other projects, including insulation installation, are very DIY-friendly.

Can I install insulation myself? The Insulation Institute notes that DIY insulation installation is definitely doable, though typically only when homeowners are installing certain types of insulation. The Institute notes that installing fiberglass or mineral wool insulation can be simple. However, homeowners who prefer spray foam insulation should leave installation to the professionals.

What should I do before beainning the project?

The Insulation Institute advises homeowners who are going to install insulation to determine if vapor retarders, sometimes referred to as "vapor barriers," will need to be installed before they begin the project. Vapor diffusion retarders can reduce the amount of moisture transferred by air currents, but they are not always necessary. Factors such as climate, cladding type (i.e., brick, stucco, wood, etc.) and the location of the wall being insulated will help homeowners determine if they need vapor diffusion retarders. Homes located in places with mixed climates often

need vapor diffusion retarders. DIYers can visit www.insulationinstitute.org to learn more or consult with an insulation or watersealing professional to determine if they need vapor diffusion retarders.

Determining R-value is another important pre-project step. Different climates require different insulation R-values, which the U.S. Department of Energy notes is a measurement of an insulating material's resistance to conductive heat flow. The higher the R-value, the greater the insulation effectiveness. The amount of R-value your insulation needs will depend on the climate, the existing heating and cooling system in the house and which part of the house you will be insulating. More information about R-value is available at energy.gov/energysaver/weatherize/insulation.

DIYers also will need the ap-

propriate tools and attire before beginning an insulation installation project. In addition to the insulation itself, the online resource The Home Improvement Web® recommends the following tools:

- · Safety glasses
- · Dust mask or respirator
- · Stapler (electric, standard, or hammer type)
- · 3/8" or 1/2" staples
- · Protective clothing
- · Work light
- · Tape measure
- · Extension cord
- · Utility knife and extra blades
- · Stepladder(s)
- · Straightedge for cutting insulation

DIYers can access any number of insulation installation tutorials online to determine if they can install insulation without hiring professionals.



STOCK THE CAR FOR ROADSIDE EMERGENCIES

Disasters can happen in a flash, and having a plan in place for common emergency situations can make it easier to handle adverse conditions, particularly when away from home.

According to MFASCO Health and Safety, a supplier of first aid supplies and kits, 90 percent of people do not carry first aid supplies or other emergency gear in their vehicles. Among those who may carry supplies, 30 percent never check to determine if they're in good working order. The National Safety Council says that drivers should always keep emergency supply kits in the trunks or cargo areas of their vehicles. Kits should be inspected every six months, and worn out items should be replaced.

Roadside emergency kits can make the difference between getting back on the road safely or being stranded for hours. Such kits also may help prevent or treat injuries, potentially saving lives. Weather should be considered when preparing vehicle emergency kits, which should include the following.

- · A properly inflated spare tire and tire-changing equipment
- Jumper cables
- · A multipurpose utility tool and/or tool kit
- · Flashlight and batteries
- · Flares or triangle reflectors
- · An extra quart of motor oil

· A first-aid kit containing at the least, gauze, tape, bandages, antibiotic ointment, aspirin, nonlatex gloves, scissors, hydrocortisone, thermometer, tweezers, and instant cold compress

· A blanket

- · A tire pressure gauge
- · A portable tire inflator
- · Paper towels
- · Nonperishable, high-energy foods
- · Drinking water
- · A reflective vest
- · Duct tape
- · A fire extinguisher
- · An ice scraper
- · A folding shovel
- · Coolant and washer fluid
- · A phone charger
- · Baby/child supplies, if perti-
- · Rope

Keep roadside emergency kits organized at all times. Store items securely in a milk crate, box or backpack so they are always readily available. People should familiarize themselves with the items in the kit so they know how to use them correctly and quickly.

With some planning and organization, drivers can have the supplies they will need to make it through roadside emergencies safely.


