EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT AT DEVON GENERAL HOSPITAL TO TEMPORARILY CLOSE DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

Emergency patients to be diverted to other Edmonton Zone hospitals

Effective 7 a.m., Monday, April 20, 2020, the Emergency Department at the Devon General Hospital will be closed and no longer accepting patients.

This temporary closure

will help protect the 14 long-term-care residents at the DGH, who are at heightened risk for severe illness if exposed to COVID-19. As well, 10 additional acute care beds at the DGH will be converted to long-term care beds at this time, providing additional temporary long-

term care capacity within the Edmonton Zone.

The ED closure and bed conversion will remain in place for the duration of the COVID-19 pandemic.

LEDUC COUNTY ANNOUNCES 2020 TAX PAYMENT POSTPONEMENT

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

For many, this last weekend was an important time to observe religious traditions for Easter and Passover. These traditions bring us comfort and community in challenging times. From virtual Easter dinner and online Sunday services, to Easter egg hunts conducted from the car, many people successfully celebrated while maintaining appropriate social distance. I know that my family connected by having a Zoom Easter supper where we ate and visited over the computer. I hope that, despite everything that is going on, you were able to connect with loved ones and celebrate the Easter season in new and innovative ways.

I am happy to report that our government is taking strong, immediate action to get Albertans back to work. This week, our government announced \$2 billion in accelerated capital investment from the 2020 Capital Plan. The accelerated projects will resurface roads, restore bridges, repair schools, and fill potholes, all to get thousands of Albertans working through the COVID-19 recession. This doubles the planned capital maintenance for 2020-21, allowing our government to work with companies province-wide and help to keep workers employed.

The COVID-19 response has created serious challenges and uncertainty for small business owners in the past few weeks. Business Link is now available to help small businesses learn about and connect to available COVID-19 supports based on their unique business needs. The platform is offering free programming through June, including one to-one guidance and expert sessions with specialists to help small businesses survive this extremely difficult

This week, Alberta Health released its modelling projections outlining possible timelines of the COVID-19 pandemic. These projections highlight the importance of continuing aggressive countermeasures to protect the lives and livelihoods of Albertans in order to stop the pandemic and restart the economy. This modelling will help us prepare for the demands on Alberta's health care system and province-wide response to COVID-19, and provides transparent information to Albertans on this pandemic. As we continue to fight COVID-19, our province will keep Albertans informed on what we can reasonably expect in the weeks to come.

In order to keep vulnerable Albertans safe during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Chief Medical Officer of Health has ordered a province-wide ban on visitors to continuing care facilities. This ban on visits, except for in cases when a resident is dying, builds on restrictions implemented last week to ensure that all facilities in Alberta follow strict stan-

dards and prevent the risk of COVID-19 to vulnerable patients. These measures are not taken lightly, but they are critical to saving the lives of our loved ones from this pandemic.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, Albertans have stepped up to support frontline workers in the fight against COVID-19. In order to coordinate the hundreds of offers of medical supplies and other essential equipment from businesses and nonprofits, our government has launched the Alberta Bits and Pieces Program. This program will accept offers of materials that are needed by frontline workers and make sure that they get where these materials are needed most. ALBERTA AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY EXPEDITE GRANT PROCESSING FOR ALBERTA AGRICULTURAL SOCIETIES

(Grant funding allocations will be processed as soon as possible)

Edmonton, Alberta – Alberta Agriculture and Forestry will be instituting an expedited grant funding process to the Alberta Agricultural Societies membership as soon as possible.

This was confirmed this week in an email to Tim Carson, CEO of the Alberta

Association of Agricultural Societies (AAAS) from Deputy Minister Andre Tremblay of Alberta Agriculture and Forestry.

The Deputy Minister's response is to a letter that was sent to the Agriculture and Forestry office of Minister Dreeshan last week and plus media release stating the significant financial revenue challenges that the Alberta Ag Societies are facing with the situation of

Covid 19.

In a joint statement this morning, AAAS President Rick McCarthy and AAAS CEO Tim Carson stated "on behalf of the AAAS Board of Directors and the AAAS membership, we appreciate the immediate action of Alberta Agriculture and Forestry of our request to advance the grant processing for our Ag Societies. Instead of receiving the grant monies in early summer, the Ag

Societies will receive their funding as early as May now. This advancement of funding can primarilarily assist in expenses to maintain facilities in this time of shutdown. We will continue to work with the Alberta Agriculture and Forestry to further alleviate any additional situations that may arise during this time of crisis."

CITY OF LEDUC COUNCIL ACTS TO SUPPORT RESIDENTS AND **BUSINESSES DURING PANDEMIC**

Property Taxes Reduced and Business Taxes Delayed

Submitted by City of Leduc

In light of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Leduc Council has approved a number of measures aimed at mitigating the pandemic's financial impacts on residents and businesses. Specifically, the following measures have been enacted, effective immediately:

- Previously approved tax increase has been eliminated;
- · Utility payment penalties will not be applied for the remainder of 2020, for both residential and non-residential account holders;
- Tax penalties will not be applied for the remainder of 2020, for residential and non-residential ratepayers;

· Non-residential ratepayers are now able to defer tax payments under December 31, 2020 upon request.

"Council has clearly heard that residents and businesses in our community are suffering financial difficulties as a result of the ongoing pandemic," said Leduc Mayor Bob Young. "As an organization, we are fortunate to be in a position where we are able to support our community and alleviate some of the hardship. We will continue to look for ways that we can help residents and businesses to navigate this time of uncertainty - and thrive when we come out of it."

The municipality is projecting that it will need to use reserve funds and lines

of credit to cover the costs associated with COVID-19. These include direct costs, such as overtime for essential services areas, materials and supplies, and capital costs, as well as indirect costs resulting from deferred utility payments, reduced fines, utility and tax penalty elimination, among others.

"We have taken a number of measures to ensure that we are as sustainable as possible while maintaining the services on which our residents and businesses rely," said Acting City Manager Michael Pieters. "Thanks to ongoing initiatives to ensure we are fiscally responsible as an organization, we have a good foundation to continue to work with Council to address COVID-19 impacts in

the short and long term. We are acting prudently to ensure that we are able to cover short-term costs associated with managing and mitigating the effects of COVID-19 and supporting our community during this time. I want to thank our staff, who continue to look for alternatives to maintain services while remaining financially and socially responsible."

The municipality has already undertaken a number of cost-cutting measures, including the temporary layoff of approximately 100 casual staff and a hiring freeze, which will result in approximately \$150,000 in savings until April 30, 2020. Continued reviews are underway to identify other cost-cutting measures.

MESSAGE TO MY CONSTITUENTS

I would like to thank you for continuing to do your part in the fight against COVID-19. I realize that as this goes on, some people will be tempted to ignore social distancing, but it is very important that we don't let up until the time is right.

I understand that there is

confusion around some of the programs being implemented to sup-Canadians. port . With new measures and changes being announced frequently, it can be difficult to keep up with. My team and I are here to help. We have been getting a lot of questions on the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB), so I have some info on that.

This week, the government announced new changes to the CERB. Workers earning less than \$1,000 a month, or who have seasonal employment and can't find a job due to COVID-19, as well as those who are running out of employment insurance, are now eligible to apply for the CERB.

If you applied for the CERB last week, just a re-

minder that you must reapply for subsequent periods if you continue to qualify.

That said, if you were transferred from Employment Insurance to the CERB, you will still need to do bi-weekly reports for EI as you did in the past to remain on the CERB but will not need to reapply monthly like those who apply directly for the CERB must do. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out to my constit-

uency office in Edson. As always, keep well stay safe and healthy.

Do you need assistance with getting groceries? Did you know some stores are offering pick-up or delivery services? Please check to see if your local grocery stores are offering these services. You can order your groceries from home and pick them up when you get to the store or have them delivered to your residence.

CITY OF LEDUC'S COVID-19 STATE OF LOCAL EMERGENCY TO LAPSE

- Emergency Coordination Centre to remain active in response to viral pandemic

The City of Leduc's State of Local Emergency will lapse on Monday, April 13, 2020, following a nearly month-long activation. The city's response to the COVID-19 pandemic will continue to be coordinat-

ed by the Leduc Emergency Management Agency in collaboration with Alberta Health Services (AHS) and the Province of Alberta.

"It's important for our residents to understand that just because our declaration of a state of local emergency will not be renewed on April 13. it does not mean the risk

is gone," says Leduc Fire Chief and Director of Emergency Management George Clancy. "While we continue to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in Leduc, the public health orders implemented by AHS and the province have given us the tools we need to enforce as well as to protect our com-

munity throughout this pandemic. This is simply a decision aimed at avoiding redundancy with provincial measures already in place."

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the City of Leduc is still taking the following measures:

- Ongoing activation of the City of Leduc Emergency Coordination Centre
- Closure of all public cityowned buildings and facilities until further notice
- Closure of all playgrounds within city limits until further notice
- Local enforcement of and adherence to all provincially mandated public health orders
- Enhanced cleaning protocols in all city facilities and public vehicles (including Leduc Transit)
- Virtualization of council chambers for upcoming Council and Committee-ofthe-Whole meetings



WHAT TO EXPECT DURING A BATHROOM REMODEL

Few renovations go off without a hitch. Once a project begins, contractors often uncover issues that weren't noticeable to the naked eye. BEST METHODS TO REPAIR DAMAGED DRIVEWAYS

Asphalt and concrete driveways are common throughout suburban neighborhoods. They are as much a part of a home as lawns, decks and other exterior elements. Regardless of how they're utilized, driveways need to be cared for and maintained to retain their appearance and function.

Even the most durable driveways can suffer from cracks and pits over time. As cracks form, they pave the way for more deterioration if they are not addressed. Water infiltration can break down the integrity of the driveway during freeze and thaw periods, and any little hole or crack can promote weed growth. Driveway repair can be a do-it-yourself project, but pay attention to the details to ensure the job is done right. Asphalt

The home improvement resource The Family Handyman says it is key to first repair cracks and pits in an asphalt driveway before planning to topcoat it, which is generally done every year or so to maintain its appearance and durability. A variety of topcoat products are available at various price points. Experts recommend investing in a quality product that will not shrink and crack. A melt-in material that is similar to products used by highway crews can be purchased for around \$100. This product also will require use of a propane torch. Caulk-style crack repair products may not require as many tools, and are much easier to apply. They may not last as long, however. Homeowners must weigh the

pros and cons to each before beginning.

The experts at Popular Mechanics say that there also are other asphalt patch mixes available at home supply retailers. Serious holes, rather than cracks, can be addressed with a coarse-aggregate filler commonly referred to as cold patch.

After cracks and holes are filled, use a sealer to lock everything in place and create a smooth topcoat appearance. Speak with a store employee if you are unsure which product is needed for your application.

Concrete

The process is similar with concrete driveways, yet the products differ. Small driveway cracks can be repaired by scrubbing out the crack to remove debris and then filling

using a mortar repair compound, suggests the repair advice site Home Guides. Larger cracks and potholes should be cleaned. Once that's done, apply a painted-in bonder to the crack or hole, followed by a dry concrete patching product mixed with water. The material can be worked into the damaged area with a trowel, and then leveled using a wood board. Afterward, a liquid concrete sealer can be applied to help prevent future cracks and holes.

Homeowners who are hesitant to fix their driveways can contact masons or asphalt specialists to perform the job. Keeping up on driveway repair can prolong the life of the surface and help delay a complete driveway replacement for several years.

ALBERTA RCMP WARN CITIZENS OF SPIKE IN COVID-19 SCAMS

Submitted by Alberta RCMP

Since the beginning of the month, there has been a spike in COVID-19 related scams in Canada. The most common reports are fraudulent merchandise sales and phishing emails.

The fraudulent merchandise sales frequently involve the sale and/or giveaway of health-related products such as facemasks and COVID-19 tests. There are also "free" products being advertised where the victim must pay a fake shipping fee.

The phishing emails im-

personate agencies such as the Red Cross, the World Health Organization, the Ministry of Health, Public Health Canada, the Canada Revenue Agency, and more. Typically, individuals are contacted through email or SMS and provided a link which prompts them to fill out personal and banking information. In some cases, the link contains suspected malware.

Other scams that occur involve individuals being advised of fake positive test results, donation campaigns, door-to-door decontamination services, and self-assessment surveys.

Here are some tips to remember if you are contacted:

- Never give out personal or financial details if you didn't initiate the call.
- If you didn't initiate the contact, you don't know who you're talking to.
- Don't click on suspicious links or attachments.Install anti-virus soft-
- ware.
 Be skeptical of emails
- even if they look legitimate.
- Check the "from" address by hovering over the name.
- Check the Canadian Anti-Fraud website for a list of reported scams.

- · All events, group and in-

terpretive activities are cancelled until at least May 31, 2020;

• Parks Canada will not be taking new reservations until at least June 1, 2020. All existing reservations set to take place prior to May 31, 2020, will be automatically cancelled and refunded in full.

"The Government of Canada is asking Canadians to stay home and help limit the spread of COVID-19. Parks Canada is taking these additional measures to help keep people safe. Like all Canadians, I love our national parks and historic sites, but at this

time we must all continue to do our part to flatten the curve, look out for one another, and make choices that will help reduce the pressure on our health care system." - The Honourable Jona-




