RIVER ICE ADVISORY FOR THE ATHABASCA AND MCLEOD RIVERS

Alberta Environment and Parks has issued a River Ice Advisory for the Athabasca and McLeod Rivers in Whitecourt and surrounding area. With well above-average snowpack and warmer temperatures, ice covers have begun to break up on both rivers. Water levels are expected to rise as this occurs, and as snowmelt continues to occur. River levels are being monitored closely by the Alberta Environment River Forecast Branch and the Town of Whitecourt.

People are urged to use

extreme caution when near the rivers and to be aware of water levels in low-lying areas. The Town of Whitecourt encourages people to report river or flood level concerns to the Town of Whitecourt at 780-778-2273 so that the municipality can evaluate the risk involved.

Meet The Alternative Land Use Services Program, Here To Help!

The Alternative Land Use Services (ALUS) is a grant program that helps farmers establish environmental projects on private land. Projects can include fencing off wetlands and mature forest to keep livestock out, shelterbelts and ecobuffers, watering systems, nesting structures, and pollinator habitat creation. In 2019 the ALUS program enrolled 250 acres with seven farmers within Lac Ste. Anne County. The total cost of these projects was over \$120,000 which was shared equally between the producers and the ALUS program. A significant benefit of the ALUS program is farmers receive a per acre payment for any land they are no longer farming. They get paid to grow cleaner water, fresh air, and wildlife habitat. There is no transfer of title and the farmers retains all ownership to manage their land as they see fit. The ALUS program strives to support farmers in doing what they do best, taking care of the land. 





County News Highlights

COUNTY CHANGES KEY MEETING FORMAT TO LIVE AUDIO STREAM

Council and MPC Meetings held remotely due to COVID-19

To ensure the safety of Council, staff and citizens during COVID-19, County Council and Municipal Planning Commission meetings will take place remotely until further notice.

Councillors and administrative staff will attend key meetings via a digital conferencing platform, and access to these meetings will be made available to the public via live streamed audio.

Links and instructions will be posted at LSAC.ca/Council prior to meetings.

Meeting agendas and minutes will be posted to the County website upon completion and approval per standard procedure.

BEAVER SEASON BEGINS

Pet owners advised to keep animals on leash

Traps are being set starting Monday, April 20. As these traps are typically set in areas adjacent to County roadways, residents are strongly encouraged to keep their pets on leashes if they plan to venture into ditches. The County will provide additional notification if any traps are set in a location that may be more populated than a roadside.

Manual and mechanical breaching of dams will commence with the spring thaw. Please note that new federal regulation changes have affected the County's ability to blast dams. Visit LSAC.ca/beavers for details.

LAC STE. ANNE COUNTY COUNCIL AUTHORIZES UTILITY AND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF MEASURES

Recognizing that many are experiencing pressures as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, Lac Ste. Anne County Council has authorized immediate relief measures for County residents and business owners. The measures outlined below are designed to ease the financial burden for ratepayers in the short term.

For those who have the means, payment of accounts prior to their due dates is advised.

Please note that these measures have not yet been officially approved; they are scheduled to be ratified at the April 23, 2020 Lac Ste. Anne County Council meeting.

Utility Accounts (Water, Sewer and Garbage)

Billings for water, sewer and curbside garbage pickup will continue as normal. Utility bills are due monthly; however, penalties of 3.5% and other means of collection will not be imposed until September 1, 2020. Any Water/Sewer/Garbage amounts that remain unpaid at December 31, 2020 will be applied to the property tax roll in 2021.

Property Taxes

Property Tax Notices will be mailed in May 2020 as usual, with a payment deadline of June 30, 2020. Penalties on current taxes (not including the Tax Prepayment Plan) will be applied at 6% on September 1, 2020. On November 1, 2020, penalties to current arrears will be applied at 9%, and on January 1, 2021, a 9% penalty will be applied to the entire outstanding balance.

Solid Waste Utility

The Solid Waste Utility billing will be mailed out in April 2020. The utility billing normally due on June 30, 2020, has been extended until August 31, 2020. Solid Waste utility bills outstanding on September 1, 2020 will be subject to a 3.5% penalty, and any billings that remain outstanding on December 31, 2020 will be applied to the property tax roll in 2021.

Lac Ste. Anne County remains committed to supporting the health and well-being of the community during this public health crisis. We understand that many residents and businesses are struggling with concerns related to finances, essential supplies and the health of their families, and we will continue to offer support wherever possible.

FIRE SEASON UNDERWAY Be on the alert for fire bans and OHV restrictions


Please be advised that fire season is underway, and with it comes intermittent fire bans and OHV restrictions. Lac Ste. Anne County Fire Services issued a Fire Advisory on April 21, with a suspension of Fire Permit approvals until further notice.

Additionally, Alberta Parks has instituted a Fire Ban for all provincial parks and Forest Protection Areas in anticipation of slowing the start of wildfire season amid the COVID-19 pandemic. The Provincial Fire Ban covers all provincially-owned lands within the County (all areas marked in green on a County map). If you lease or occupy these lands, the provincial Fire Ban applies to you.
