MP SOROKA CALLS FOR MORE SUPPORT FOR AGRICULTURE AND THE TOWN OF JASPER

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, and Deputy Shadow Minister for Natural Resources (Forestry and Mining) was in Ottawa to take part in the sitting of Parliament on April 29. While in the House he questioned the government on its response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Jasper National Park and the Town of Jasper are both heavily reliant on tourism, which has been shut down due to COVID-19. Each year they pay land rent for municipal purposes such as roads, parks and cemeteries, however this year they cannot afford to do so due to lost revenues.

MP Soroka asked if the

Deputy Prime Minister will "help the towns of Jasper and Banff, the only two municipalities in Canada that pay land rent to the federal government? Will the government eliminate the land rent for this year?" Ms. Freeland failed to indicate whether the government would be offering this relief or not.

COUNCIL PASSES 2020 TAX RATE BYLAW

Submitted by Parkland County

Parkland County Council passed the 2020 Tax Rate Bylaw at today's regular Council Meeting, which included a 1.28% decrease in the total tax requirement for the median resident and a 4.41% decrease for a median non-residential prop-

erty.

Property taxes are calculated based on assessment values, which means properties throughout the County will be affected differently. An analysis of market values found that residential values have decreased by approximately 2.36% while non-residential market values have increased by 2.20% over 2019. The 2020 Property Assessment & Taxation Notices will be mailed out to residential and non-residential property owners before the end of May. Payment is due on or before June 30th.

Soroka went on to question the Minister of Agriculture asking, "Is the government going to announce a program geared specifically to agriculture?" Canadian farmers are playing a vital role during this crisis, but they need help now.

"...We are working right now to see where the gaps are for the agriculture sector. We will come back with further measures as soon as we can," said Minister Bibeau. Soroka also questioned the Minister regarding the Canadian Federation of Agriculture's agri-food emergency preparedness plan, concerns surrounding meat processing capacity, and the Minister's failure to implement industry pro-

posed measures such as the set-aside program which has been on her desk for months.

For those experiencing economic hardship, Council voted to eliminate late penalty charges for property taxes for the month of July and August to reduce the economic impact of COVID-19 on residents and business owners. Therefore, late penalty charges will take effect starting September 1st at a rate of 5%. Those who are able to make their payments on time are encouraged to do so.

This year's spring season has presented many unexpected challenges for our community. Undoubtedly these have been difficult times, both financially and emotionally, for many of us. I want to assure all of my constituents that our government is considering every possible step to support Albertans as we look towards economic recovery.

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented many challenges and uncertainties. Mental health is an important part of our well-being. Our government is investing \$53 million to boost mental health services in communities across the province, ensuring that all Albertans have access to the mental health supports that they need. I encourage everyone to reach out to loved ones to help boost their spirits. Resources are also available to anyone who is struggling during COVID-19. The Mental Health Help Line provides 24/7 confidential support at 1-877-303-2642.

Throughout the pandemic, sharing accurate and up-todate information to the public has been an important component of our province's response. Information on public health guidelines, resources

for coping, and supports for individuals and businesses in Alberta can all be found at alberta.ca/covid19.

We recently announced funding to meet new staffing needs at hard-hit continuing care facilities during COVID-19. New funding will help with staff hiring of health care aides, and will relieve some of the pressures on these facilities during the pandemic. Additional funding will be available to top up wages of an additional \$2 per hour for health-care aides, and create up to one thousand paid student practicum positions to fast-track certification and help meet staffing shortages. In addition, \$24.5 million is

being advanced to continuing care operators to help address immediate cost pressures from the pandemic. Continuing care facilities have been disproportionately affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, and our government is committed to supporting staff and helping residents get the quality and compassionate care they deserve.

And finally, our government has announced new measures to connect and celebrate volunteers during the COVID-19 pandemic. The new Alberta Cares Connector will connect volunteers with organizations during COVID-19, and can be found at volunteerconnector.org. This week, the Alberta Northern Lights Volunteer Recognition Program was also launched. This award program is accepting nominations of any individual or group who is helping make their community a better place. As we respond to COVID-19, Albertans are building on our province's culture of volunteerism by stepping up and finding new ways to support their communities.

Finally, the government has decided that the provincial numbers are trending in a positive direction to the point where we can begin to relaunch the Alberta economy. Assuming that those numbers continue to trend in the appropriate direction we have set the date of May14th for the launching of the first phase of the economic re-opening. The goal is to allow business to gradually and safely ramp up over a period of time through the 3 stages. It will be important to remember that should at any time this very contagious virus flare up again that the government could move back towards a more restrictive position of self-isolation and the shutting down of businesses. As the economy continues through the 3 phases of the relaunch we must all remember to continue to live the lessons that we have learned about self-isolating and hand washing so that society is safe and working once again.

The Liberal government announced major firearms policy changes in the middle of a global pandemic that does absolutely nothing to address the real problem – gun violence and illegal weapons in Canada. This is wrong. Members of Parliament should be allowed to debate policy changes and raise their constituents' concerns.

Conservatives have and will always support common-sense firearms policies that keep guns out of the hands of dangerous criminals. We are the only party calling for action to tackle the real issue -- illegal and smuggled guns. According to Peel Region police, 75% of seized illegal handguns are smuggled in from the U.S. This was also confirmed by Ottawa's police chief.

We want to ensure Canadians are safe and secure in their neighbourhoods, which is why during the last election, Conservatives campaigned on a plan for A Safer Canada. It included the creation of the Canada Border Services Agency (CBSA) Firearms Smuggling Task Force to work with law enforcement to crack down on smuggled guns. REGULAR BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

April 14, 2020 - The Board of Trustees is pleased to share with all education stakeholders the highlights of our recent Board meeting held on Tuesday, April 14, 2020. The adopted minutes will be available on our website following the next Regular Board meeting.

The Board approved the Three Year Capital Plan 2021-2024 to be submitted to the Government of Alberta. Each year, school jurisdictions submit facility needs for the next three years and await funding and approval from the province.

With the pending closure of Seba Beach School at the

end of June 2020, the Board approved the revised attendance areas for Tomahawk School, Entwistle School and Wabamun School.

The Board of Trustees is responsible to review Board Policies on an ongoing basis in order to adhere to the requirements necessary to provide excellence in public education and comply with the Education Act and provincial, as well as federal, legislation. As such, the Board approved the revised Board Policy 13: Appeals Regarding Student Matters. (tracked changes)

The Board also changed an upcoming Regular Board (Virtual) Meeting on May 26, 2020 from 6pm to 9:30am.

IMPROVE SOIL QUALITY FOR A BETTER LAWN

A lush, green lawn can vastly improve a home's curb appeal. Thick, healthy grass indicates that homeowners care enough about their properties to invest the time, effort and money to make them beautiful.

According to the landscaping tool company Troy-Bilt, soil fertility is the foundation of healthy lawns. In fact, the quality of the soil is essential whether one is growing acres of grass, potted plants or vegetable garden beds. No matter which type of soil a homeowner is working with, there are various ways to make it better.

Remove thatch

Thatch is a tightly knotted layer of leaves, grass roots, stems, and other debris that accumulates between the grass blades and the soil.

Too much thatch can hinder the movement of water, air and nutrients into the soil. According to organic fertilizer company Organo-Lawn, thatch often occurs if the production of dead organic material in the lawn exceeds the ability of the microorganisms in the soil to break down that organic matter. A half-inch of thatch is normal. If thatch gets too thick, it will need to be removed. The home improvement resource DIY Network says dethatching can take place in the summer, fall and winter using a thatching rake.

Aerate

A lawn aerator will create holes in the soil. This can improve drainage and encourage worms and helpful microorganisms that require oxygen to thrive in the soil. The Briggs & Stratton Company says the best time to aerate a lawn is during the growing season when the grass can heal and fill in any holes, such as spring and fall. Aeration can help develop deeper grass roots for a healthier lawn.

Test and amend soil

A great lawn has loamy soil, which has a key ratio of clay, silt and sand. Silt is a granular material of a size between sand and clay that originates from quartz and feldspar. It is the most fertile of the three types of soil components. Sand does not retain water, but it helps to create spaces in the soil that permit air to circulate. Clay particles are small and bind together tightly, but clay is naturally nutrient-rich. The home improvement site

BobVila.com says loamy soil should have equal parts sand and silt and half as much clay.

If the lawn is not yet established, loamy soil can be created and then the grass seeds planted. For established soil, after removing thatch and aerating, top-dressing the lawn can help. This involves adding a thin layer of soil over the lawn. It can improve the soil without killing the existing turf. Ideally, it should be done in early fall or spring, as this gives the grass time to grow through three to four more mowings before severe heat or cold sets in.

Healthy soil is vital to a lush lawn. It takes a little work, but improving soil can create vibrant, healthy, green grass.
