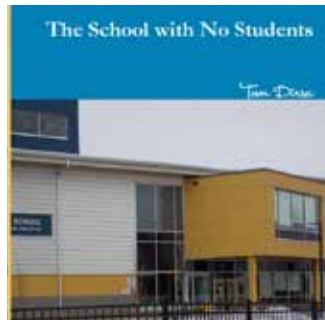

NURSE PRACTITIONER CLINIC TO OPEN IN WARBURG JUNE 1

Announced earlier this year, the underserved towns of Thorsby and Warburg, and their surrounding communities, are going to be receiving primary care support from a dedicated Nurse Practitioner (NP). Michelle Williams, NP, has been hired by the Leduc Beaumont Devon Primary Care Network (LBD PCN) through a grant provided by the Government of Alberta via the Nurse Practitioner Support Program.

After months of prepara-

tion, the Warburg Nurse Practitioner-Led Clinic is now ready to serve the community.

Clinic hours will be:
Monday, Wednesday, Friday 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

Closed for lunch between 12:00 p.m. – 1:00 p.m. and on statutory holidays

(825 is an Alberta area code that was introduced in 2016 and covers the entire province)

• The clinic space has been provided by and is located in the Village of Warburg office.

• The entrance to the clinic

and parking for clinic patients is located at the back of the village building.

• Those with limited mobility can access to the elevator by entering the building through the front office door; a ramp is available.

• Funding for the NP clinical administrator has been provided by the County of Leduc.

Michelle will provide health services to individuals, families, and communities including health promotion, disease and injury prevention, and treatment of acute and chronic illness.

- Perform physical exam-

inations and screening interventions

- Order and interpret diagnostic tests, such as lab tests and x-rays
- Provide counselling and education
- Refer you to other healthcare professionals and specialists
- Prescribe medications
- Manage chronic diseases

such as diabetes, COPD and asthma

- Provide palliative care



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A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

This year's spring season has presented many unexpected challenges for our community. Undoubtedly these have been difficult times, both financially and emotionally, for many of us. I want to assure all of my constituents that our government is considering every possible step to support Albertans as we look towards economic recovery.

The COVID-19 pandemic has presented many challenges and uncertainties. Mental health is an important part of our well-being. Our government is investing \$53 million to boost mental health services in communities across the province, ensuring that all Alber-

tans have access to the mental health supports that they need. I encourage everyone to reach out to loved ones to help boost their spirits. Resources are also available to anyone who is struggling during COVID-19. The Mental Health Help Line provides 24/7 confidential support at 1-877-303-2642.

Throughout the pandemic, sharing accurate and up-to-date information to the public has been an important component of our province's response. Information on public health guidelines, resources for coping, and supports for individuals and businesses in Alberta can all be found at alberta.ca/covid19.

We recently announced funding to meet new staffing needs at hard-hit continuing care facilities during COVID-19. New

funding will help with staff hiring of health care aides, and will relieve some of the pressures on these facilities during the pandemic. Additional funding will be available to top up wages of an additional \$2 per hour for health-care aides, and create up to one thousand paid student practicum positions to fast-track certification and help meet staffing shortages. In addition, \$24.5 million is being advanced to continuing care operators to help address immediate cost pressures from the pandemic. Continuing care facilities have been disproportionately affected by the COVID-19 pandemic, and our government is committed to supporting staff and helping residents get the quality and compassionate care they deserve.

And finally, our government has announced new measures to connect and celebrate volunteers during the COVID-19 pandemic. The new Alberta Cares Connector will connect volunteers with organizations during COVID-19, and can be found at volunteerconnector.org. This week, the Alberta Northern Lights Volunteer Recognition Program was also launched. This award program is accepting nominations of any individual or group who is helping make their community a better place. As we respond to COVID-19, Albertans are building on our province's culture of volunteerism by stepping up and finding new ways to support their communities.

Finally, the government has decided that the provincial numbers are trending in a positive direction to the point where we can begin to re-launch the Alberta economy. The goal is to allow business to gradually and safely ramp up over a period of time through the 3 stages. It will be important to remember that should at any time this very contagious virus flare up again that the government could move back towards a more restrictive position of self-isolation and the shutting down of businesses. As the economy continues through the 3 phases of the re-launch we must all remember to continue to live the lessons that we have learned about self-isolating and hand washing so that society is safe and working once again.

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SOURCING MORE FARM-FRESH LOCAL FOOD FOR ALBERTANS

Farmers can connect directly with food service and retail operations to get more farm-fresh food on Albertans' tables through an enhanced online tool.

Agriculture and Forestry provided \$81,000 to the Alberta Farm Fresh Producers Association (AFFPA) through the Canadian Agricultural Partnership to enhance its online producer directory.

The grant allowed AFFPA to expand its directory to include more producer profiles and build awareness of the high-quality farm-fresh food Alberta is known for. The site will now give retailers, wholesalers, restaurants and the food service industry more opportunities to connect with farms.

With the recent increase in demand for local food, the province's restaurants and stores have looked for new ways to bring more locally grown and produced food to Albertans.

Site enhancements include:

- Additional and more detailed product categories.
- Identification of additional certifications and licensing.
- More marketing channels for producers to include food service and retail.
- Improved search and mapping capabilities.

The AFFPA will also be offering complimentary memberships for farmers and ranchers for 2020 and 2021.

LEDUC COUNTY COUNCIL APPROVES 2020 BUDGET, SETS TAX RATES

Leduc County council approved the final 2020 budget and set the 2020 tax rates at its regular council meeting yesterday afternoon.

Council approved an \$84.9 million operating budget, which covers day-to-day municipal operating expenses and includes \$25.6 million collected on behalf of the Government of Alberta and the Leduc Regional Housing Foundation for school, designated industrial property and seniors' requisitions. They

also approved a \$17.0 million capital budget, which includes infrastructure costs for buildings, roads, bridges, and equipment. This results in a four per cent tax budget decrease over 2019.

"The 2020 budget demonstrates our commitment to supporting our residents and businesses. This four per cent tax budget decrease, coupled with the extension of the tax payment deadline, is one way we can help with the current economic challenges that many are facing." - Mayor Tanni Doblanko

2020 capital budget highlights

- \$10.9 million for the annual road-surfacing program; this includes \$1 million for the Rural Road Initiatives program

- \$1.5 million for capital equipment and vehicle purchases

- \$1.3 million for bridge rehabilitation

2020 operating budget highlights

- \$2.1 million for parks and recreation, including a \$500,000 contribution to the Beaumont Sport and Recreation Centre expansion and \$1.6 million in additional recreation cost-sharing with regional partners

- \$5.5 million for road

maintenance projects, which includes \$3.0 million for the annual gravelling program

2020 tax rates

The four per cent tax budget decrease results in a tax reduction for most land owners. Approximately 89 per cent of Leduc County property owners can expect a property tax decrease, while six per cent will see no change. Five per cent of property owners will see an increase over 2019 due to an assessment value increase.

Property taxes are made up of municipal taxes, external requisitions, local improvement tax and the provincial education tax. Leduc County is obligated to collect the provincial education tax, as set by the Government of Alberta, as part of its property taxes.

Property tax notices will be mailed to residents on June 18. Taxes are due by Sept. 30, 2020.

RCMP ARREST MALE TWICE IN TWO DAYS

Buck Lake, Alta. – A male arrested and released on May 22 was arrested again on May 24, 2020 and is now on house arrest.

On May 22, the CAD CRU was in the Buck Lake area when they located a vehicle which was identified as having fled from police in the past. The license plate on the vehicle was stolen and the CAD CRU effected a traffic stop.

The driver of the vehicle, Levi Allen Rain (25), was arrested without incident. RCMP located brass knuckles when his vehicle was searched. Rain was charged with possession of stolen property (x2), possession of a prohibited weapon, operate a motor vehicle while prohibited and three charges under the Traffic Safety Act. He was released on an Undertaking with conditions, and scheduled to attend Breton Provincial Court on August 12, 2020.

On May 24 at 6:45 p.m.,

a Breton/Thorsby RCMP member was patrolling in Buck Lake when he attempted to stop a quad, which fled at a high rate of speed. Assistance was provided by other RCMP members in the area, and the quad eventually stopped. The quad was determined to be stolen and the driver, Levi Allen Rain, was arrested. A search of Rain, incidental to arrest, led RCMP to seize a bag of what is believed to be Methamphetamine.

Rain is charged criminal-

ly with possession of stolen property, operation of a motor vehicle while prohibited, flight from peace officer. He is also charged with possession of Methamphetamine under the Controlled Drugs and Substances Act, as well as six charges under the Traffic Safety Act.

A bail hearing was held and Rain was released on strict house arrest conditions. He is scheduled to appear in court on August 12, 2020.

CHARGES, WARNINGS ISSUED OVER MAY LONG WEEKEND A RECORD LOW

More travellers in Leduc County seem to be following the law, with the number of charges and warnings issued by Leduc County peace officers over the Victoria Day long weekend hitting a record low.

Over the four-day period from May 15 to May 18, peace officers travelled 2,829 kilometres and issued a total of 23 charges and 10 warnings for speeding and gaming and liquor violations.

This is down from the 21 charges and 16 warnings issued over the May long weekend in 2019 and the 152 charges and 40 warnings issued during the same weekend in 2015.

“Public safety is our primary focus when we patrol county roads, and we are pleased to see that more residents and visitors are contributing to safer roads

by driving at safe speeds, wearing their seatbelts and eliminating distractions.” - Clarence Nelson, director of Enforcement Services

Speeding continues to account for the majority of charges, with 22 of the 23 charges relating to speeding. One motorist was charged for travelling 55 kilometres over the post-

ed 70-kilometre-per-hour speed limit on Township Road 510 near the Royal Oaks subdivision. Another motorist was charged after speeding 40 kilometres per hour over the speed limit on Airport Road near Range Road 243.

Peace officers patrolled corridors leading to transfer stations and the region-

al landfill to educate about properly secured cargo. In addition to patrols within the county, peace officers conducted traffic safety operations in various locations, including Sunnybrook and Michigan Centre, as well as a handful of boat inspections.

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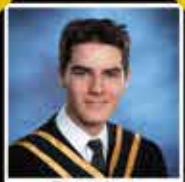
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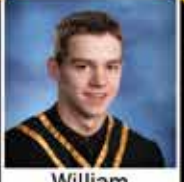

APPLICATION PERIOD OPEN FOR AAFC YOUTH EMPLOYMENT & SKILLS PROGRAM

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform constituents of the Youth Employment and

Skills Program to provide new positions for youth in the agriculture sector.

The program will provide employers up to 50 per cent of the cost of hiring a Canadian youth up to \$14,000. Indigenous applicants and those applicants hiring a

youth facing barriers are eligible for funding of up to 80 per cent of their costs.

Eligible applicants include producers, agri-businesses, industry associations, provincial and territorial governments, Indigenous organizations and research

facilities. Employers can apply for this funding retroactive to April 1, 2020, with projects to be completed by March 31, 2021.

RCMP INVESTIGATE DRIVE BY SHOOTING

Beaumont, Alta. – On May 27, 2020 at approximately 7:45 p.m., Beaumont RCMP responded to a report of a drive by shooting outside a residence in the Montrose Estates area.

Preliminary investigation has revealed that a vehicle from Edmonton with several occupants was travelling to Beaumont. The driver

noticed a suspicious grey vehicle following theirs as they entered the city limits of Beaumont. Upon arrival near a residence the suspicious vehicle pulled up next to the victim's vehicle and shots were fired. The suspect vehicle then fled the area. No one was injured.

Beaumont RCMP with assistance from Leduc RCMP and Edmonton Police Air One searched for the vehicle in the area but it was not

immediately located.

A suspect vehicle believed to be involved in this incident was later located abandoned in the Leduc County area.

Beaumont RCMP along with the RCMP Serious Crimes Unit and RCMP Forensic Identification Section continue to investigate. Police do not believe this was a random incident.

Beaumont RCMP would like to advise this incident is

not linked to a separate incident reported on May 13, 2020 in the Forest Heights area which remains under investigation.

MESSAGE TO MY CONSTITUENTS

Provinces are slowly easing health restrictions after being shut down for weeks. While we are not out of the woods yet, there is reason for cautious optimism here in Yellowhead and across the country.

However, the Trudeau government has been slow to react from the very beginning of this crisis, and their failures have cost Canadians.

They spent the cupboards bare in the good times and were unprepared when the pandemic hit. Their failure to close our borders allowed the virus to spread. Their inability to maintain Canada's

national stockpile of personal protective equipment meant there weren't enough medical supplies when our doctors and nurses needed them most. Their failure to get federal COVID aid programs right the first time has allowed businesses and workers to fall through the cracks.

We cannot afford to have Liberal failures derail provincial efforts to get our country back on track. But that is precisely what federal programs are threatening to do.

For example, for those Canadians who want to work but who lost their jobs due to the pandemic, the Canada Emergency Response Benefit (CERB) and the Canada Emergency Student Benefit (CESB) both prevent

you from earning more than \$1,000 per month. As businesses open and have shifts to fill, their employees will be penalized for returning to work under the Liberals' program. That's wrong.

Conservatives are calling

on the Trudeau government to make programs like the CERB more generous and more flexible so that no one is worse off going back to work or picking up a shift.

Liberal failures must be fixed before it's too late.

LEDUC CITY COUNCIL REFLECTS ON A SUCCESSFUL 2019

Leduc City Council is pleased to share the 2019 Annual Report with the community. The report is based on the 2019-2022 City of Leduc Strategic Plan, centered on four focus areas:

- A City Where People Want to Live, Work and Play
- A City with a Plan for the Future
- An Economically Prosperous City and Region
- A Collaborative Community Builder and Regional Partner

The 2019 Annual Report showcases accomplishments and milestones that occurred in 2019.

“I am proud of the work we have done as a city and with our partners, and the 2019 Annual Report is a great reflection of this success,” says Leduc Mayor Bob Young. “This past year has presented us with some tough economic challenges, but I believe our council and administration have done an excellent job at meeting current goals as well as focusing on the future.”

Some highlights of the report include:

- Seniors Active Afternoons and Active 8’s and 9’s saw more than 2,300 users take advantage of the free membership options at the Leduc Recreation Centre
- The Maclab Centre for the Performing Arts hosted more than 15,400 attendees in the city’s first year of operations and management of the centre
- The city focused on environmental efforts by expanding the Eco-Station, resulting in 40,592 users (a 32 per cent increase over 2018)
- The Telford Lake Multiway trail was completed, adding to the nearly

70 km of multiway trail in Leduc

The city enhanced regional collaboration and initiatives through partnerships such as Edmonton Global, the Edmonton Airport Accord, the Edmonton Metropolitan Region Board, Leduc Regional Leadership Forum, Regional Transit

Services Commission and more

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
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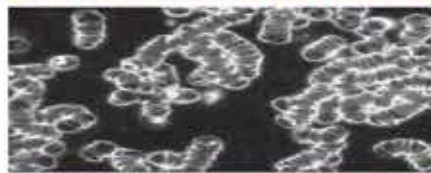
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
