The project began in the planning and design stage. The students determined the appropriate size of the project given its intended hanging location and the appropriate length: width ratio. They then calculated the amount of material required to construct the project. After that they began designing the overall shape of the flag, calculating the appropriate frequency and wavelength to make the project aesthetically pleasing. While the students are unable to physically participate in the construction process, it is still being constructed using the procedures they have created. From the ripping and cutting of lumber to the creation of a stencil to the lamination of the cut wood. For any issues that have arisen, the students used their problemsolving

skills to address the issues to get the project back on track. GOLFER'S GUIDE

HOW TO MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR DAY ON THE COURSE

(NC) Most great golf games are filled with sun, competition and camaraderie, but you can enhance the experience with a few tips that have less to do with your swing, and a lot to do with your 18-hole enjoyment:

Dress for success: The right golf apparel can be as important as the clubs you carry. Check the weather in advance to make sure you'll be as comfortable as possible during play. Determine if you're dressing to impress or to elevate your game. Light, non-restrictive clothing will allow you to swing freely and keep you comfortable and cool in the heat, or warm if the temperature drops. If you're a guest, always check out the dress code at the club you'll be visiting to ensure you comply with the rules.

Choose your company carefully: Your playing partners can have a lot to do with how you play and how you socialize on the golf course. If you're out with friends, you can relax and enjoy the day knowing what to expect. But if it's a game with your boss or clients, always make sure to test the waters. Will they play by the rules or is it just a relaxed day? Are your clients

there to play golf or do business? Understanding the landscape on the first tee will alleviate any awkward moments later on.

Create friendly competition: Sure, there's already a scorecard, but you can add more competitive fun to your game by creating a little friendly rivalry. For example, try a little Bingo Bango Bongo - a points based game that awards a total score based on three kinds of achievement: Bingo – first person on the

green gets a point; Bango – the player whose ball is closest to the pin when all balls are on the green gets a point, Bongo –the player who is first to hole out gets a point. Add up the points and the person with the highest total for the round wins.

1,500 - 2,000 calories. Golfers that ride carts will burn only about 1,100 - 1,300 calories.

Say cheers and enjoy: The 19th hole remains one of the best holes on the course. - The cities of Edmonton and Calgary have each been supplied 500,000 masks, and will be responsible for distributing them mainly through their transit operations.
- Planning is underway to supply masks to places of worship across Alberta.
- Plans to distribute another 20 million masks are being developed.
- Instructions for proper care and use of non-medical masks are available at alberta.ca/ masks.

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform constituents that the Government of Canada will waive up to 75 percent of eligible commercial rents for April, May and June 2020 or equivalent annual rents. This relief is additional to measures announced March 27, allowing commercial operators to defer payments ordinarily due on or after April 2, 2020, to as late as September 1, 2020.

Parks Canada will be contacting all holders of commercial leases and licences of occupation in national parks, national historic sites and national marine conservation areas to provide details on this additional relief offered by the government. Information will also be made available soon on the Parks Canada website.
