

company, such as spouses, children, other family members, caregivers, or other service providers. It can also come from more removed individuals. The abuse can occur in either private residences or outside the home.

Common signs of elder abuse can include:

- Confusion
- Depression or anxiety
- Unexplained injuries

Changes in hygiene
Seeming fearful around certain people

• Fear or worry when talking about money

If you suspect that an elderly person is at risk from a neglectful or overwhelmed caregiver, or being preyed upon financially, it's important to speak up. It is best to ask questions away from the place where you suspect the abuse is happening. The person may be afraid to speak up if there is a chance of being overheard by the abuser or someone who will relay the information.

If you or someone you know is being abused and you don't know how to help, please call 2-1-1. You'll receive confidential, prompt aid and referraresources to help you deal with an abusive situation. If you believe someone is in immediate danger, do not hesitate to contact 9-1-1.

Everyone deserves to live in safety, and to be treated with dignity and respect. These guidelines can help you recognize the warning signs of elder abuse, understand what the risk factors are, and learn how to prevent and report the problem.

June 16, 2020 Community VOICE Page 3 DAMAGING OR STEALING SASQUATCH SIGNS COULD PUT LIVES AT RISK

Every year someone gets stranded on our rivers, and these signs help our first responders find them.

Each time a numbered Sasky river sign in Yellowhead County is stolen or damaged, it makes these river rescue signs ineffective in providing emergency assistance. Destroying or removing these signs can prevent a successful rescue and potentially put lives at risk.

Here's how the signs work: 1. Each sign is numbered.

2. Anyone needing help on a river can reference the last numerical sign they saw when they call 9-1-1. 3. That number will help first-responders get a better idea of where they're stranded on the river and help to reduce the time for first responders to locate the source of the distress call.

The signs serve as a rescue assistance tool-meaning

that if they're damaged or stolen, those in an emergency won't have these additional safety precautions.

The County urges visitors and residents to respect these river rescue signs, which may be necessary to someone needing emergency aid or rescue.



I hope that you have all been able to enjoy the warmer weather and spend some time outdoors. At long last, playgrounds and parks across our community are reopening. I encourage you to explore these local places – while maintaining physical distancing, of course!

This week, our government continued its work to make life better for Albertans. New pieces of legislation were introduced to help tackle the issues that matter to our community, including creating an Alberta Parole Board, addressing the health harms of smoking and vaping in youth, and freeing up police and courts to make Alberta safer. All of these proposed laws live up to our promises to Albertans.

I am happy to share that our government is reducing red tape for Alberta businesses. These businesses can now incorporate and get their federal business number and federal

tax program account number in one easy step, and it will be easier to access services at different levels of government. In addition to streamlining the incorporation application process, the federal business number enables Alberta businesses and non-profits to identify themselves by using a single identifier, instead of different registration numbers. By reducing red tape, our government is saving businesses and non-profit organizations valuable time and resources that have previously been spent on



needless bureaucracy.

This week, our government introduced new legislation to help restore capacity in the justice system and make our roads safer. Bill 21, or the Provincial Administrative Penalties Act, proposes a simplified, accessible and swift system for resolving matters involving impaired driving, traffic tickets and other traffic safety offences. By removing these matters from the court system, our province will save thousands of hours of police and court time per year, ensuring Alberta's prosecutors and courts are able to focus on the most serious justice matters. The bill would also introduce a new Immediate Roadside Sanction program in late 2020, which would keep our roads safer by providing serious, immediate and escalating consequences for all impaired drivers. This new legislation will help take pressure off the legal system and ensure that impaired driving is taken seriously in our province.

Our government has also announced that it is investing \$5 million to help build school playgrounds across the province. This funding will support 18 school divisions to build playgrounds, supplementing their fundraising efforts that are already taking place. Funding for playgrounds will address playgrounds at schools that were replaced on the same site as their original building, as well as new school projects announced between April and December 2013 where the playground has not been built. Playgrounds are a fundamental part of any school community, and our government is helping ensure that these important spaces are open to children across Alberta.

I am happy to see all of the hard work that members of our community are doing to help prevent the spread of COVID-19, even as our province reopens. For further information on how to protect yourself and your loved ones from COVID-19, visit alberta. ca/covid19.

ADJUSTING GOLF SWING GETS EASIER

Golfers rejoice! Those dreaded slices or hooks could become a thing of the distant past thanks to adjustable clubs and drivers. In addition to helping improve accuracy, adjustable clubs also lighten the load in your golf bag.

With a few twists of a wrench or even turning the shaft of the driver itself, golfers can adjust the face angle, loft and lie angle of the driver to hit the ball farther and straighter. Golfers can make small adjustments to create the right loft and improve distance without having to purchase a new club or visit a club fitter.

Many club manufacturers now offer adjustable drivers and other clubs. According to an informal poll on Golf.com, 34 percent of the 2,337 respondents owned an adjustable driver by the end of 2011. The ability to upgrade shafts has also become popular as golfers respond to what the pros are doing.

Adjustable golf clubs enable golfers to walk out onto the course with one driver and a few different shafts. With a couple of clicks from a wrench, a person can have an entirely new driver. That cuts down on the equipment that needs to be carried and can fine tune a golfer's accuracy. These high-tech clubs are corresponding to changes being made to golf balls. Engineers have reduced the spin on golf balls to help the balls travel farther. To do so, golf experts advise that the ball needs to be hit higher into

the air. Adjustable drivers can give players the edge they need to produce the right height and trajectory.

According to data from golf club manufacturer TaylorMade, 70 percent of consumers who use the company's adjustable drivers adjust their club at least once to get the desired shot. Afterward, 10 to 15 percent of adjustable driver users report further adjustments as they become comfortable with the features.

Although golfers can now put adjustments into their own hands, it is still advisable to get a professional fitting regardless of which clubs are chosen. A certified club fitter can help a person sort through the myriad options available and make recommendations based on various factors, including the golf ball used.

Those who are not fans of adjustable drivers say that the adjustment mechanisms add weight to the drivers, which can compromise efficiency. However, that isn't stopping larger numbers of golf fans from taking adjustable drivers for a trial run in an effort to improve their game.


