In recent years and most noticeably this year, the Tri Village Regional Sewer Services Commission (TVRSSC) experienced extremely high flows throughout the system during rain fall events. In several of these instances the system was running at full capacity

to keep up and in some cases additional trucks were required to haul from lift stations out to the lagoon in order to keep up and prevent backups.

This includes owner-operated small businesses that had been ineligible for the program due to their lack of payroll, sole proprietors receiving business income directly, as well as family owned corporations remu-

nerating in the form of dividends rather than payroll, will become eligible this week.

To qualify under the new eligibility rules, applicants with a payroll lower than \$20,000 will need:

· A business operating account at a participating financial institution;

- A Canada Revenue Agency business number;
- A 2018 or 2019 tax return; and
- Eligible non-deferrable expenses of between \$40,000 and \$1.5 million.

This causes additional wear and tear on the system, roads and other infrastructure as well as additional expenses to the commission for the additional maintenance and repairs required as a result of. These expenses are then passed along to the end users via taxes and utility rates via the member municipality that you reside in. We have seen an average cost for trucks to haul from the lift stations to the lagoon come in, in excess

of \$40,000 depending on the duration and then addition costs related to mechanical and electrical repairs.

Seeing extremely high increases to flows during rain events identifies that we have some infiltration issues, as well as the possibility that some properties may have tied in their sump pumps, eavestroughs, floor drains in garages and patios. Under our bylaws it is prohibited to tie in any sumps, eavestroughs and vard drains. The only permitted connection is for a sanitary sewer connection, all

other connections if identified are subject to \$2500 penalty under the bylaw.

In the near future the TVRSSC will be looking at having a testing agency perform smoke testing throughout the system. This is a non toxic non evasive means of testing for leaks and identifying potential non compliant connections. In the mean time if you know of any connections to sumps, eavestroughs, etc. we ask that you disconnect them if they're yours or notify us with locations of possible non compliant connections. If you are unsure if you have non permitted/ non-compliant connections, you can call a plumber to check for you. Remember it is a portion of the tax dollars and utility rate collected for each property within Alberta Beach, Sunset Point and Val Quentin that helps pay for the operation, maintenance and repairs to the TVRSSC sewer system so it is everyone's responsibility to help keep the system running efficiently and thus the costs down.

Update #3 - Barrhead Incident

On June 18, 2020, at approximately 9 p.m., Barrhead RCMP received a complaint of a break and enter to a residence located in the area of Secondary Highway 658 near Fort Assiniboine, Alta. The suspect vehicle attempted to ram the complainant's vehicle in an attempt to flee the property.

Barrhead RCMP attempted to locate the suspect vehicle and the suspect vehicle came to rest in a ditch in the area of the Athabasca river southwest of Fort Assiniboine, before both suspects fled into the forest. RCMP Air Services and the RCMP Police Service Dog was utilized and one of the suspects was taken into custody without incident. The second suspect remained at large.

Further investigation has resulted in the second suspect being identified as Bradley Gordon Duff 35, of no fixed address.

A 28-year-old female from Whitecourt, Alta. remains in custody awaiting a bail hearing.

BACKGROUND:

On June 9, 2020, at 5:49 a.m., Whitecourt RCMP received a complaint of a vehicle in the ditch with a passenger unconscious with Emergency Services on scene. When the male became conscious, he fled into a forested area.

Whitecourt RCMP are seeking the public's assistance in locating Duff's whereabouts as he is a suspect in the stolen vehicle investigation and has outstanding arrest warrants on unrelated matters.

Duff is believed to have been wearing all dark or black clothing and a red bandana covering his face and was in the process of removing items from a white Dodge truck parked off the roadway. The same white Dodge truck was later reported to Emergency Services by a passerby to be on fire on June 15, 2020, at 12:30 a.m.

On June 14, 2020, High Prairie RCMP received a report of a sighting of a male believed to be Bradley Duff during the night / early morning hours in the vicinity of Range Road 185 and Township Road 742 in Big Lakes County, Alta. This location is 3 km's southwest of Triangle Hall, located 20 kms west of High Prairie on Highway 2, or 25kms south of Mclennan, Alta., on Highway 2.

Lessard Lake Public Campground and Paddle River Dam Campground (Peter's Pond) are now open to both seasonal and overnight patrons.

Outhouses will remain closed until further notice. Laundry facilities at Lessard Lake Public Campground also remain closed to the public.

County playgrounds are now open, but will not be part of a regular sanitizing schedule. Parents and guardians must ensure children clean/sanitize their hands prior to and after using the playground structures, and that children maintain physical distancing.

It is essential to note that group camping will not be permitted (only one unit per site) and physical distancing and proper hand hygiene will be expected by all patrons while enjoying our facilities.

PLAYSCHOOL REGISTRATION NOW OPEN

Registration for the Onoway Playschool program's 2020-2021 school year is now open. The school year will run from September 14, 2020 to June 10, 2021.

Although there is some uncertainty about the 2020-2021 school year due to COVID-19 and related provincial health restrictions, the County is proceeding with registration for its Playschool program. Should public health restrictions remain in place in September, this will necessitate some changes to our program which will be shared with parents and guardians accordingly.

this difficult time, the County has reduced fees for all students enrolled for the full 2020-2021 school year, pending full payment of fees or approved payment plan in place – fees will not be charged for the September through December 2020 portion. COUNTY PLANS JUNE 22 RE-ENTRY: Safeguards for ratepayers and staff are being implemented.

Phase II of the Government of Alberta's relaunch strategy is set to begin Friday, June 19. As we eagerly look forward to this next phase, Lac Ste. Anne County is considering a full return

of staff and re-opening to the public on Monday, June 22.

The County is working to determine how its local plans and timelines for re-entry can be executed in tandem with the Province's Phase II re-entry mandate. In all decisions, the safety of ratepayers and staff will remain the County's top priority.

Phase II of the Province's

relaunch strategy will allow additional businesses and services to reopen and resume operations starting June 12 - a week earlier than had been initially set by the Province. Public health guidelines such as physical distancing requirements will remain in place, but indoor and outdoor gathering sizes are being increased.

Please note that the County's reentry strategy is sub-

ject to change. Updates will be provided on the County's website and social media channels.

COUNTY COUNCIL MEETINGS TO RESUME: Live audio stream of meetings to be discontinued.

In accordance with the County's reopening strategy, County Council meetings will resume at the County administration office. Meetings will be open to the public. Safety protocols related to COVID-19 including physical distancing and gathering size will be in effect.

COUNTY ADMIN OFFICE **REOPENS JUNE 22: Safe**guards for ratepayers and staff are being implemented.

In alignment with Alberta's phase 2 re-entry plans, Lac Ste. Anne County will reopen its administration office to the public beginning Monday, June 22. Regular business hours of 8:30 am to 4:30 pm will be observed.

County staff from all departments will be on hand to address a variety of ratepayer requests, albeit with modified procedures and staging areas to ensure the safety of ratepayers and staff.

9 WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR GOLF GAME

Warmer weather sends scores of golfers to their favorite courses each and every day. Golf is a challenging pastime, but a few pointers can help golfers hone their short games, long games and everything in between.

Choose the right clubs. There is more to selecting clubs than pulling any old iron out of your golf bag and whacking away. Wind, hazards and obstructions in landing areas should influence your decision of which club to use. Novice golfers may want to rely on their caddies to make club recommendations, and as they become more confident in their abilities they can start to make their own choices. Anchor your feet. Anchor your foot behind the ball to drive the ball further. **Right-handed** players will keep the right foot anchored, and lefties

will do the opposite. Do not lift your foot prematurely; otherwise, you can lose power and distance. · Identify your

weaknesses. As with any hobby, identifying those areas that need the most work can help you become a better golfer. Keep track of each shot you take, and then look at the results to see which areas of your game need the most work. • Fix your alignment. Align your shots by assessing the target from behind the ball. Then set the clubface behind the golf ball and align it with the target before you enter your stance.

• Use your torso for power. The torso is essential to a solid swing. Practice rotating from your core to control your backswing and then maintain the same spine angle and posture on the downswing.

Use the wind. Not every golf game will be played in perfect weather. A good player knows how to make adjustments for the wind depending on the shot. Use the wind to your advantage when you can, and adjust your swing when hitting into the wind. Become a better chipper. Many players put so much emphasis on their backswings and putt shots that they fail to devote any practice to chips. All shots are important for golfers trying to shed strokes off of their scores.

• Keep fit. Maintaining or improving your physical strength and overall health can help your golf game. Exercise and eat right, and you will have more endurance on the links.



By aligning its lagoon dumping fees with fair market rates, the County will be better equipped to maintain the present wastewater quality and capacity standards of its lagoons while allocating partial funding for longer-term solutions such as its recently-completed North 43 lagoon & sewer force main; vital infrastructure that has significantly reduced regional wastewater management via vac trucks, holding tanks and field systems.

The County takes a proactive stance on protecting its lagoon systems, mitigating risk, and addressing the considerable environmental degradation that private sewage systems have impacted on its lakes for years. In the near term, this stance allows for the adoption of a sensible, sustainable solution for maintenance of its legacy systems.

BEAVER BOUNTY FUND-ING INCREASE: Annual program is designed to control overpopulation.

On June 11, 2020, County Council approved an increase in the beaver bounty from \$40 per tail to \$80 per tail. The beaver bounty program is subject to con-

COMMUNITY VOLUN-TEER INCOME TAX PRO-GRAM: County tax preparation service resumes in a limited capacity.

Although in a limited capacity, Community Services is now able to process 2019 income tax filing through the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) for those clients that qualify. Due to health risks associated to COVID-19, the document pick-up service will not be available this year.

The CVITP is a partnership between the Canada Revenue Agency and Community Organizations which host tax preparation clinics and arrange for volunteers to prepare income tax and benefit returns for eligible individuals.

While the House will be rising for the summer, my colleagues and I will continue to fight for Canadians and ensure they have the freedom and support that they need to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Since this crisis began, I have had many constituents reach out to me, saying that they were falling through the cracks in the programs announced by the government. While others, such as seniors and farmers, felt like they were being ignored altogether.

My colleagues and I brought these concerns to the attention of the government. We were able to pressure them into providing support for seniors and amend the eligibility requirements for the CEBA so that more farmers would be able to access it. These are important steps in the right direction, but there is still much more that needs to be done.

As part of my role on the Agriculture Committee, I heard from witnesses pointing out that much of the "support" the government announced for farmers was reallocating funds that were already available through the AgriInvest, and the money provided for the set aside program barely covered the costs for a few weeks. The business risk management programs for farmers were insufficient before the pandemic. They are not sufficient to support farmers now. The Standing Committee on Agriculture and Agri-Food will continue to meet through the summer, and we will look for ways in which we can amend these programs to deliver better results for Canadians.
