# CANADA CHILD BENEFIT IS INCREASING AGAIN

Submitted by Employment and Social Development Canada

The Government of Canada is committed to improving the lives of hard working middle class families. That is why four years ago we launched the Canada Child Benefit (CCB), which was put more money in the pockets of 9 out of 10 Canadian families and ensured that children have the best start in life.

The Honourable Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development, announced that starting today the CCB will be increased again for the 2020–21 benefit year to keep pace with the cost of living. This is on top of the one-time additional \$300 per child qualified CCB recipients received with their May 20 payment as part of the Government's response to COVID-19.

## GOVERNMENT SUPPORTS JOBS AND SAFE OPERATIONS OF JUNIOR MINING EXPLORATION

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, and Deputy Shadow Minister for Natural Resources (Forestry and Mining), is pleased to inform constituents that the government is taking measures to support junior mining exploration companies facing significant challenges as a result of COVID-19, including voluntary shutdowns or difficulty accessing the field.

The government is proposing to protect jobs and safe operations of junior mining exploration and other flow-through share issuers, by extending the timelines for spending the capital they raise via flow-through shares by 12 months.

This proposal would mean that companies with operations that are impacted by COVID-19 would be allowed additional time to incur eligible expenses and avoid costs from not meeting original flow-through share timelines.

# MORE PROTECTION FOR COMMERCIAL TENANTS

### Submitted by Government of Alberta

Bill 23, the Commercial Tenancies Protection Act, would protect eligible commercial tenants from having their leases terminated due to non-payment of rent as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. If passed, the act would also prevent landlords from raising rent and charging late fees and penalties on missed rent.

The new measures will help address shortfalls in the current Canada Emergency Commercial Rent Assistance (CECRA) program, and will give eligible business owners peace of mind as they reopen and help with the provincial economic recovery.

"Alberta has the most generous support models for small businesses in Canada, but we know that more supports are needed. We're listening to Alberta's business community, and we're responding to their needs.

BEAVER TRAPPING PRO-GRAM UNDERWAY: Exercise caution and keep dogs leashed in common trap areas.

Please be advised that the County's beaver abatement program is still underway. This program includes setting beaver traps in problematic areas across the County. If you encounter a beaver trap, do not go near or touch it; a beaver trap is a dangerous device. Dog owners are strongly advised to leash their pets when in lesser-traveled marshy areas of the County.

The County uses traps that are designed to kill instantly. These traps are placed in ditches and ravines, and are kept away from public trails and off-leash areas for the protection of dogs, park users and other wildlife. Traps are checked on a regular basis.

### EMERGENCY FUNDING FOR COVID-19 SAFETY MEASURES IN FOREST OPERATIONS

OTTAWA: Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, and Deputy Shadow Minister for Natural Resources (Forestry and Mining) is pleased to inform constituents that the government will be providing \$30 million to offset the additional costs associated with COVID-19 safety measures for small and medium sized enterprises in the forest sector, including tree planting operations.

This money will cover extra costs such as sanitizing stations, additional accommodations and/or transportation, facilities and services to maintain social distancing, and personal protective equipment.

The government intends to work with the provinces and territories to deliver this funding, which will preserve jobs for forest sector workers.

### Canada Child Benefit is Increasing Again

This means that for the 2020–21 benefit year, the maximum benefit will be \$6,765 per child under age 6 and \$5,708 per child age 6 through 17. This additional tax-free support ensures that the benefit continues to play a vital role in supporting Canadian families by helping to pay for things their children need such as healthy food, clothes and activities they can do together at home.

For example, a family with two children under the age of 6 and an income of \$30,000 will receive \$13,530. That is \$252 more than last year and \$3,080 more than in 2015, before the introduction of the Canada Child Benefit.

"Parents know how expensive raising a child can be. That is why I am pleased to announce on the 4th anniversary of the Canada Child Benefit, that it is again going to be raised. This means more money tax-free in the pockets of Canadian families each month." - The Honourable Ahmed Hussen, Minister of Families, Children and Social Development

Examples of payments for the 2020–21 benefit year:

• A single-parent family with one child under the age of 6 and earning \$25,000 will receive an additional \$126 for the 2020–21 benefit year, bringing their new yearly total benefit to \$6,765.

• A two-parent family with two children aged 4 and 9 and earning \$55,000 will receive an additional \$174 for the 2020–21 benefit year, bringing their new yearly total benefit to \$9,329.

• A two-parent family with two children under the age of 6 and earning \$90,000 will receive an additional \$136 for the 2020-21 benefit year, bringing their new yearly total benefit to \$7,322.

### Misericordia Community Hospital Now Under Full Facility Outbreak

The full facility outbreak extends to all adult and child services including the Emergency Department. Patients should not visit the Misericordia, and should instead visit one of the other hospitals within the Edmonton Zone or call 911 if needed.

This step is a necessary extension of the progressive outbreak restrictions put in place on July 6, with those restrictions now encompassing all patient services at the Misericordia.

Patients within the hospital will continue to receive the treatment, care and support they need. In order to keep everyone safe visitors will be restricted to end-of-life situations only.

Arrangements will be made for labouring mothers to deliver at Grey Nuns Community Hospital.

Alberta Health Services and

Covenant Health continue to aggressively manage this outbreak.

"Activating the full facility outbreak is necessary at this time to protect patients, staff and physicians. We acknowledge the challenges these additional restrictions create for patients, families, staff and physicians," said Dr. David Zygun, Medical Director, AHS Edmonton Zone.

Ongoing transmission means that this is a necessary



step to protect patients, staff and physicians and to ensure that the outbreak can be managed as efficiently and effectively as possible."

"The safety of our patients, staff, physicians and visitors remains our number one priority," said Dr. Owen Heisler, Chief Medical Officer, Covenant Health. "Covenant Health, Alberta Health Services and our teams continue to work tirelessly and collaboratively, taking every possible step to respond with compassion to this challenging situation and to ensure a safe environment for care."

As of this morning, there are 20 patients at the hospital who have tested positive for COVID-19 in relation to this outbreak. In addition, 15 staff members have tested positive. Admitted patients who have tested positive for COVID-19 are being treated on two units within the hospital.

Sadly, three patients linked to this outbreak have passed away. Our thoughts are with the family members and loved ones of all three patients at this difficult time.

If passed, these protections will provide businesses with more protection as they reopen and rehire staff as we move through the phases of relaunch and recovery." - Tanya Fir, Minister of Economic Development, Trade and Tourism

The legislation and upcoming regulation would cover the period from March 17 to Aug. 31, and would apply to:

• Commercial tenants with tenancy agreements that would be eligible for the CE-CRA program, but whose landlords have chosen not to participate.

• Commercial lease agreements where tenants have had to close their business due to public health orders or have had their business revenue decline by 25 per cent or more as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

If passed, any late fees, penalties or rent increases imposed on a commercial tenant by their landlord between March 17 and Aug. 31 would need to be reimbursed, however, the legislation would not undo any evictions or lease terminations that happened before the legislation was tabled.

"As small businesses move into reopening, many are facing lower revenues and fear not being able to make rent payments. Today's announcement of commercial eviction legislation will provide a safety net for those small businesses unable to access the CECRA and will help them reopen and continue their operations." -Annie Dormuth, Alberta provincial affairs director, Canadian Federation of Independent Business

"This moratorium legislation will reduce the anxiety and fear small businesses had of being evicted from their premises during the pandemic. Businesses who faced a potential eviction for non-payment of rent due to substantial revenue decreases can feel a bit more reassured of their chances of reopening." - Ken Kobly, president and CEO, Alberta Chamber of Commerce

"Restaurants Canada appreciates the government coming to the table with this much-needed commercial rent protection legislation. The inability to pay rent with little or no revenue for the past few months, combined with the inability to convince landlords to participate in the CECRA program or other rent relief arrangements, is the No.1 concern for the majority of Alberta's restaurants. The legislation introduced today will provide the time needed for restaurant

tenants and their landlords to agree to long-term rent solutions without worrying about evictions." - Mark von Schellwitz, vice-president, Western Canada, Restaurants Canada

The act would also help ensure landlords don't miss out on deferred rent by requiring tenants and landlords to work together to develop a rent payment plan for missed payments.




