CHARGES LAID IN FIREARMS INCIDENT

Moon Lake, Alta – Following an incident on July 28 that saw a pursuit, a vehicle fire, and the deployment of the RCMP Emergency Response Team, charges have been laid against four accused subjects.

At 8:32 a.m., Drayton Valley RCMP were dispatched to a home invasion which had just occurred. The suspects fled the house prior to police arrival.

The suspect vehicle was initially spotted on Highway 759 by an Alberta Sheriff, but an attempt to stop it was not successful. The vehicle continued to flee. The vehicle was spotted by a homeowner on Range Road 72 near Highway 624. The vehicle fled that property and was located by members in a field off of Range Road 73 near Moon Lake Hall. The RCMP set up containment when the vehicle was spotted on a field. The vehicle caught fire in the field, and the attending RCMP members contained the area.

Neighbouring detachments of Evansburg, Mayerthorpe and Parkland all provided assistance with the containment. Supporting units, including Police Dog Services, Emergency Response Team and Air Services were all engaged.

Two males were located initially at a residence near Highway 22. The other two subjects were located as a result of a tip from the member of the public.

Three of the accused were treated and released at a local hospital as a result of injuries believed to have been sustained by jumping from the moving vehicle. No one else was injured during these incidents.

Shawn Victor Fleming (30), Stuart Kevin McMillan (19) and Dylan Alexander Andres (21) all of Edmonton are jointly facing numerous criminal code charges including; break and enter to a dwelling house, using a firearm while committing an indictable offence, possession of a prohibited weapon, et al.

Judicial Interim Hearings were held and all three ac-

cused remain in custody to attend court on August 4 in Drayton Valley.

A 38-year-old female from Edmonton is also facing charges which have not been sworn in court yet.

Information received led investigators to a location where two firearms were recovered.

The public assistance received by the RCMP was very appreciated throughout this incident.

JUST Transition Center

The JUST Transition Center acts as a single point of contact for all workers affected by the phase out of coal fired power generation. Workers include unionized hourly, nonunionized hourly, staff, supervisors, and management. The Center is primarily, but not exclusively, supporting workers from Highvale Mine, Genesee Mine, Genesee Generating Station, Keephills Power Plant, and Sundance Power Plant.

The JUST Transition Center offers the following:

- Assistance for workers looking to access Federal and Provincial Government support programs
- Assistance in searching and securing other sources of funding and training
- Collecting and organizing data from the workers impacted from December 2017 ongoing

In 2015 the Alberta Government introduced the Climate Leadership Plan to reduce carbon emissions. Included in the plan was a carbon tax and the phase out of coal fired power generation by the year 2030. As a result, Companies have decided to convert from coal to natural gas much earlier than 2030. Lay offs have already impacted workers at the Highvale Mine and Sundance Power Plant with Genesee beginning lay offs some time in 2020.

Alberta's government has wrapped up a marathon session that saw 34 bills passed to make life better, diversify our economy and get Albertans back to work.

This means Alberta's government has already kept or is well underway on 255 of 375 promises to Albertans. That's 68 per cent of platform commitments made despite being only 31 per cent of the way through the four-year mandate.

During the spring sitting, Alberta's government passed 34 bills, keeping platform promises while taking action to protect the health and well-being of Albertans in light of the COVID-19 pandemic. To confront the unprecedented economic challenges and stimulate economic growth in the province, the government also took action by introducing the largest-ever infrastructure program in Alberta's history as part of Alberta's Recovery Plan.

Alberta's MLAs returned to the chamber earlier than any other sitting jurisdiction in Canada to do their jobs and make life better for Albertans.

Spring legislation highlights

Bill 8, the Protecting Survivors of Human Trafficking Act, protects vulnerable Albertans at risk of being trafficked, strengthens survivors' ability to escape physically, emotionally and financially damaging abuse, and is a key part of government's comprehensive action plan to fight the scourge of human trafficking.

Bill 13, the Emergency Management Amendment Act (2), further refined the authority granted to local governments to manage emergency public health measures during the pandemic.

Bill 15, the Choice in Education Act, expands the range of options available for parents and students to choose the schooling that works best for them – from charters to independents to home schooling to traditional Catholic and public schools.

Bill 16, the Victims of Crime (Strengthening Public Safety) Amendment Act, preserves support for victims of crime while expanding the capacity of Alberta's legal system to deter crime and prevent victimization.

Bill 22, the Red Tape Reduction Implementation Act, will reduce and speed-up the regulatory process throughout government, encouraging investment, increasing Alberta's competitiveness, and helping our economy recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and recession.

Bill 26, the Constitutional Referendum Amendment Act, sets out the rules governing provincewide votes on a number of issues.

Bill 28, the Vital Statistics (Protecting Albertans from Convicted Sex Offenders) Amendment Act, prevents convicted sex offenders from changing their names, limiting their ability to reoffend.

Bill 31, the Environmental Protection Statutes Amendment Act, provides clarity and consistency for job creators in the sand and gravel industry while still maintaining stringent environmental protection regulations.

Bill 32, the Restoring Balance in Alberta's Workplaces Act, supports our economic recovery by providing employees and employers with clearer and more transparent rules promoting fairness and productivity. Attraction Act, also supports our economic recovery by enabling the creation of an arms-length corporation to attract job-creating private sector investment and promote Alberta as a prime investment location for businesses from across Canada and around the world.

Motions passed in the chamber include:

Government Motion 7, which called on the members of the legislative assembly to reject attempts by radical groups to block critical infrastructure in the province.

Government Motion 20, which called on MLAs to stand against the federal government's gun grab.

Government Motion 24, which asked MLAs to condemn racism and bigotry in Alberta.

Alberta's Recovery Plan

Albertans are facing one of the most challenging times in our history, hit by the triple threat of the largest public health crisis in a century, the biggest global economic contraction in almost a century and an unprecedented collapse in energy prices.

The province came together to save lives and avoid large-scale shutdowns at the height of the pandemic – but the fight is not over. Just as Albertans must continue to remain vigilant and cautious, government will continue to work towards strengthening our recovery with Alberta's Recovery Plan.

Alberta's Řecovery Plan is a bold, ambitious long-term strategy to build, diversify, and create tens of thousands of jobs now. August 4, 2020 CommunityVOICE Page 5 NEW MOBILE APP TO HELP NOTIFY CANADIANS OF POTENTIAL COVID-19 EXPOSURE NOW AVAILABLE

Over the past several months, Canadians have been following public health advice and doing their part to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Now, as we take steps to ease restrictions and safely restart our economy, we need to continue to work together to contain the virus and keep Canadians safe and healthy.

The Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, and the Premier of Ontario, Doug Ford, today announced that COVID Alert, a new national mobile app, is now available to Canadians for free download. The app, first developed in Ontario, helps notify users if they may have been exposed to someone who has tested positive for COVID-19.

Use of COVID Alert is voluntary, and serves as another tool to help limit the spread of COVID-19. Once the app is fully functioning in their province or territory, users who test positive for COVID-19 will receive a one-time key from their health authority that they can enter into the app. When the key is entered, COVID Alert will notify other users who may have come in close contact with that person for at least 15 minutes in the past 14 days, so they can contact their local public health authority for guidance.

To safeguard the confidentiality and privacy of all Canadians, the app uses strong measures to protect any data it collects, and does not track a user's location or collect personally identifiable information. The Privacy Commissioners of Canada and Ontario were consulted on the development of COVID Alert, to ensure the highest level of privacy for Canadians using the app.

The Government of Canada has been working in close partnership with the Province of Ontario to launch the COVID Alert app. Health authorities in Ontario will be the first to begin distributing one-time keys. The Government of Canada is also working with the other provinces and territories to bring their jurisdictions on board in the coming weeks and months.

An expert Advisory Council will ensure the app meets the highest standards in public health outcomes, privacy, and technology. The members of the Council reflect Canada's regional and cultural diversity, and cover a wide range of expertise, including health, privacy, data governance, science, and innovation. Their advice will inform the implementation and rollout phases of the app.

The new COVID Alert app is just one example of how the Government of Canada is working with the provinces, territories, and other partners to protect the health of all Canadians, and support efforts to restart the economy gradually and safely.

"While we have made good

progress over the past few months, COVID-19 remains a very serious threat to the health of Canadians. As we continue to gradually restart our economy, innovative technologies like this new app will help us keep our families and communities safe and healthy." - -The Rt. Hon. ONE-TIME PAYMENT FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform constituents that Bill C-20, An Act respecting further COVID-19 measures, has received Royal Assent, extending CEWS to December 19, 2020.

Bill C-20 will also allow for the sharing of information to facilitate the delivery of a one-time payment for persons with disabilities with a non-taxable and non-reportable payment of up to \$600 who:

· Are holders of a valid Disability Tax Credit certificate (eligible persons not yet in possession of such a certificate will be able to apply for one up to 60 days after today's Royal Assent to be considered for the one-time payment);

· Currently receive Canada Pension Plan disability benefits or Quebec Pension Plan disability benefits; or

• Are in receipt of disability supports provided by Veterans Affairs Canada.

Gerald Soroka, Member of Parliament for Yellowhead, would like to inform constituents that the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) is extending the payment deadline and applying relief to interest on existing debt. The payment due date for current year individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns, including instalment payments, from September 1, 2020, to September 30, 2020. Penalties and interest will not be charged if payments are made by the extended deadline of September 30, 2020. This includes the late-filing penalty if the return is filed by September 30, 2020.

Interest on existing tax debts related to individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns from April 1, 2020, to September 30, 2020 and from April 1, 2020, to June 30, 2020, for goods and services tax/harmonized sales tax (GST/HST) returns will also be waived. While this measure for existing tax debts does not cancel penalties and interest already assessed on a taxpayer's account prior to this period, it ensures that a taxpayer's existing tax debt does not continue to grow through interest charges during this difficult time. This measure provides immediate relief to impacted taxpayers.

The previously extended filing due dates for individual, corporate, and trust income tax returns remain unchanged. However, the CRA will not impose late-filing penalties where a current year individual, corporation, or trust return is filed late if it is filed by September 30, 2020.

Remember to file your individual, corporate and trust returns as soon as possible, even though payment deadlines are being extended. This is particularly important for individuals receiving credits and benefits, such as the Canada Child Benefit.

Quick Facts

• COVID Alert is now available for Canadians as a free download from the App Store or the Google Play Store. The app assigns a random code to a user's device that pings other users of the app via Bluetooth when they are within a range of approximately two metres. If they test positive for the virus, users can choose to upload their random codes to a central server located in Canada. Once uploaded, the random codes are stored on

the server for 15 days, after which they are automatically deleted.

• The app has undergone a security assessment by Black-Berry and the Canadian Centre for Cyber Security. All data provided to the app will be securely stored and protected.

• The Government of Canada has taken extensive steps to ensure that citizens' privacy and data are protected. Given the importance the government assigns to these issues, the Office of the Privacy Commissioner has been consulted on this initiative.

• COVID Alert is a collaboration between Health Canada, the Canadian Digital Service, the Province of Ontario, and Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada. It builds upon an exposure notification solution developed by Shopify volunteers in coordination with the nonprofit Linux Foundation Public Health. It is also the work of a team of developers from across the country.

• As part of our commitment to open and transparent government, the Canadian Digital Service is making its work on the app's development and testing available on Github.

• COVID Alert complements the existing Canada COVID App, a tool that supports Canadians in tracking their symptoms while allowing them to receive the latest updates and access trusted resources.

Government has already announced more than \$10 billion in infrastructure spending as part of Alberta's Recovery Plan, creating more than 50,000 jobs. This includes:

• \$6.9 billion Budget 2020 capital spending

• \$980 million accelerated for Capital Maintenance and Renewal

• \$200 million for Strategic Transportation Infrastructure Program and water infrastructure projects

• \$600 million in strategic infrastructure projects

• \$500 million in municipal infrastructure

• \$1.5 billion for Keystone XL

Other actions taken under the Alberta Recovery Plan to strengthen the economy include:
