Onoway, August 28, 2020 – Today, the Onoway Public Library announced immediate availability of disposable, non-medical masks, for com-



munity use.
"These masks are part of

the Masks for Albertans program," said Kelly Huxley, Library Manager, "and coordinated by Alberta Municipal Affairs Public Library Services Branch."

Disposable, non-medical masks have been made available to Albertans through other locations, including the drive-thru at select restaurants. However, Kelly Huxley pointed out that not everyone in the community is able to access this program because of lack of transportation, distance or other reasons.

"As we were preparing our re-opening plans, we real-

ized that access to personal protective equipment in the community could be a barrier for many residents. Even though there are other distribution points, they aren't always accessible to everyone. Public libraries are a community resource and community gathering space. We are easily accessible to members of the community and we are committed to reducing barriers to information and resources in our community. By supplying masks, we are supporting community access to a tool that, currently, assists in preventing the spread of COVID-19."

Onoway Public Library re-

ceived 1500 masks for distribution. The masks may be used in the library and packages of 10 are available for community members to take away. The masks are available at the library located in the Onoway Heritage Center 4708 Lac Ste. Anne Trail. The library currently remains closed to the public; however, staff are on site Tuesday – Friday 10:30 – 4:30 and everyone is welcome to stop by to pick up some masks.



ALBERTA BEACH BOAT LAUNCH

August 25, 2020

In 1974, the Department of Alberta Energy & Natural resources and Alberta Environment partnered with Alberta Beach to construct a public boat launch within the confines of Alberta Beach, a Licence of Occupation was issued. Early on it became apparent that when the boat launch was built the planners did not take into consideration the natural water circulation of the lake and

over the years we had to deal with stagnant water, debris, and rotting buildup along the shoreline. In 2007, the Lac Ste. Anne Recreational Lake Use Committee was formed, whose goal was to do a revitalization and rehabilitation project to the boat launch and park area to help alleviate these problems.

In 2012 this committee applied for and received a grant through Alberta Culture and

Community Spirit for \$1.3 million to conduct major drainage and landscaping improvements to the boat launch, which has relieved many of our concerns. On July 16, 2013 Alberta Beach signed a new 25-year term DLO #740690, which states the Village is solely responsible for all maintenance and operation costs, (of this provincially owned asset) with no revenue generating opportunities. In order to complete

this project Alberta Beach had no choice but to sign this new DLO.

Starting in 2017 Lac Ste. Anne has seen unusually high-water levels, and on January 1, 2018 we also experienced an ice quake. The boat launch received damage and erosion from both events. Estimates to repair the damage to the launch is \$130,000, with ongoing annual maintenance costs of around \$60,000. Owing to the high-water table and the ice quake there has also been extensive damage to our roads, drainage system and parking facilities. Although it has been a challenge, the village has been working diligently to repair the damages using MS' funding and reserves.

The boat launch is an economic driver and recreational asset not only for our Village but the whole Lac Ste. Anne area, receiving visitors from neighbouring communities and all across Alberta. It is imperative we work together to find a way to keep it open and operational.

We would like to say a big Thank You to Reeve Blakeman and the Lac Ste. Anne County Council for acknowledging the importance of this regional amenity by providing a contribution of \$10 000 for maintenance/enhancement of the boat launch. LSAC Council has also been actively helping us lobby our neighbouring communities and the provincial government for assistance, unfortunately without much success. There is a commitment needed from all stakeholders in the region to support and keep operational the most used recreational boat launch on Lac Ste. Anne. We have also applied to Minister of Alberta Environment & Parks, Jason Nixon to amend to DLO to allow for the collection of user fees. Again, a huge Thank You to Lac Ste. County.



UNDERSTANDING R-VALUES

Insulation recommendations are based on certain factors that coordinate with regional climate zones to increase energy efficiency. These factors are known as R-values. The R in R-value stands for "resistance," and refers to how certain products resist the flow of heat through walls, floors and ceil-

ings. Products should reduce heat escape so heat is kept on the right side of the wall. In summer this means outdoors, in winter it means indoors. R-values relate not only to insulation, but also to walls, windows and other barriers. R-values also coordinate to the type, thickness and density of the material being used. The higher the R-value, the more resistant to heat the product is. The U.S. Department of Energy coordinates R-value to climate zones 1 through 7 (1: Tip of Florida; 7: Canadian border). A higher R-value is needed in Zone 7 and a lower R-value is necessary in Zone 1. Those embarking on home improvement projects that involve choosing between R-values are urged to speak with a professional or to visit the Department of Energy website (www.energy.gov) to determine which R-Value is ideal for their homes.



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
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
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
