To be eligible, an applicant looking to benefit from this temporary public policy must:

- Have a valid status in Canada as a visitor on August 24, 2020
- Remain in Canada
- · Have a job offer
- Submit an application for an employer-specific work permit that is supported by

a Labour Market Impact Assessment (LMIA) or

- Have an LMIA-exempt offer of employment, no later than March 31, 2020 and
- Meet all other standard admissibility criteria

This temporary public policy also provides the opportunity for applicants who meet these criteria and who had a valid work permit in the past 12 months to begin working for their new

ALBERTA RCMP OFFICER INVOLVED SHOOTING IN EVANSBURG

Evansburg, Alta. – On August 30, 2020, at approximately 4:15 p.m., Alberta RCMP received a "be on the lookout" (BOLO) for a suspect wanted for an aggravated assault and believed to be in possession of a firearm that originated out of Onion Lake, Sask. A number of Alberta RCMP resources were deployed in an effort to locate this suspect within Alberta

As a result of further investigation by Alberta RCMP, it was learned that the suspect's cell phone information indicated a possible location west of Edmonton. At approximately 8:30 p.m., the Alberta RCMP Emergency Response Team located the suspect vehicle heading westbound on Highway 16 and attempted a traffic stop;

however, the suspect vehicle failed to stop for police and a pursuit was initiated.

While westbound near Entwistle, the deployment of a tire deflation device was successful. The suspect continued westbound until the vehicle came to a stop at Highway 16 near Range Road 73. An interaction occurred between RCMP members and the male suspect, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle, that led to officers firing their service firearms.

The RCMP Emergency Response Team Emergency Medic provided first aid to the male immediately following the incident before emergency medical services arrived on scene to take over; however, the male was injured fatally and died on scene. No RCMP members were injured during this incident.

The westbound lanes of Highway 16 near Range Road 73 remained closed to traffic until approximately 3:30 a.m. on August 31, 2020.

The Director of Law Enforcement has been notified and the Alberta Serious Incident Response Team (ASIRT) has been directed to investigate the circumstances surrounding the officer

involved shooting and the actions of police. The RCMP will continue to investigate the events leading up to the confrontation with police.

The Alberta RCMP will not be commenting further on this incident. All media inquiries about this incident should now be directed to ASIRT at 780-641-9099.

SCHOOL HEALTH MEASURES NOW INCLUDE MANDATORY MASKS

Submitted by Government of Alberta

As part of a number of new school safety measures to combat COVID-19, mask use for Grade 4 to 12 students, and all school staff, will be mandatory when school returns for the 2020-21 year.

While mandatory mask use is for students in Grades 4 to 12 and all staff, all students and staff in public, separate, Francophone, charter and independent schools will receive two reusable masks from Alberta's government. More than 1.6 million masks will be distributed to 740,000 students and 90,000 staff. Additional single-use masks will be available at schools. if required.

Mask use will be mandatory for staff and teachers in all settings where physical distancing cannot be maintained. Students will be required to wear them in all shared and common areas such as hallways and on buses. Exemptions will be made for students and staff who are unable to wear a mask due to medical or other needs.

Mask use for kindergarten to Grade 3 students will continue to be optional. Mask use for younger children is a challenge due to difficulties with proper fit and compliance. In addition, evidence shows that children under 10 may be less likely than older children or adults to transmit COVID-19.

"The safety of our staff and students continues to be my number 1 priority. Since cancelling in-person classes in March and developing our school re-entry plan, we have been clear that we would continue to adapt our guidelines as necessary based on current medical advice. These new safety measures will help prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our schools, and we will continue to work with our school

authorities to ensure they are equipped for a successful start to the school year." - Adriana LaGrange, Minister of Education

"After reviewing the emerging evidence, it is clear that masks can play an important role in limiting the spread of COVID-19. I am not making this updated recommendation lightly, but acting on the best current evidence available. While masks are important, I want to stress that they are only one of the many public health measures in place to limit the spread of COVID-19 and protect the health of students, staff and families." - Dr. Deena Hinshaw, Chief Medical Officer of Health for Alberta

"CASS' board of directors appreciates the government's commitment to adapting Alberta's health guidelines as new medical information becomes available and for ensuring school divisions are receiving the protective equipment they need for a successful transition back to school. This announcement clearly demonstrates Alberta Education's willingness to take the necessary steps to support the safety of staff and students. We appreciate their continued collaboration and support as we approach the beginning of a new school year." - Bevan Daverne, president, College of Alberta School Superintendents

Alberta's government remains committed to adjusting the school re-entry guidelines

based on current medical advice. The chief medical officer of health has been studying the evidence around masking in schools, and this decision is a direct result of evolving medical advice.

Face shields

School staff will receive one reusable face shield for their use in the schools. Shield use is at the discretion of the individual staff member. Plastic face shields can help reduce exposure but are not equivalent to masks. A mask must still be worn while wearing a face shield.

Hand sanitizer

About 466,000 litres of hand sanitizer will be distributed between all school authorities. The specific volume provided to an individual school authority will be based on student population.

Thermometers

Each school will receive two contactless thermometers to assist with managing student and staff health. Thermometer use will be at the discretion of the school authority.

Staff testing

Alberta Health and Alberta Health Services are working hard to expand testing capacity and reduce turnaround times for testing, including in-school staff, teachers and students, so that anyone with symptoms or close contacts of cases can be rapidly tested and receive test results promptly.

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BLUE-GREEN ALGAE (CYANOBACTERIA) BLOOM ADVISORY ISSUED FOR MINK LAKE

Submitted by Alberta Health Services

PARKLAND COUNTY – A blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) bloom has been identified in areas of Mink Lake. Residents living near the shores of this lake, as well as visitors to this lake, are advised to take the following precautions:

• Avoid all contact with blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) blooms. If contact occurs, wash with tap water as soon as possible.

• Do not swim or wade (or allow your pets to swim or wade) in any areas where blue-green algae (cyanobacteria) is visible.

• Do not feed whole fish or fish trimmings from this lake to your pets.

• Consider limiting human consumption of whole fish and fish trimmings from this lake, as it is known that fish may store toxins in

their liver. (People can safely consume fish fillets from this lake).

As always, visitors and residents are reminded to never drink or cook with untreated water directly from any recreational body of water, including Mink Lake, at any time. Boiling of this water will not remove the toxins produced by blue-green algae. An alternate source of drinking water should also be provided for pets and livestock,

while this advisory is active.

Blue-green algae is naturally occurring, and often becomes visible when weather conditions are calm. Appearing like scum, grass clippings, fuzz or globs on the surface of water, blue-green algae can be blue-green, greenish-brown, brown, and/or pinkish-red, and often smell musty or grassy.

People who come in contact with visible blue-green algae or who ingest water containing blue-green algae may experience skin irritation, rash, sore throat, sore red eyes, swollen lips, fever, nausea and vomiting and/or diarrhea. Symptoms usually appear within one to three hours and resolve in one to two days. Symptoms in children are often more pronounced; however, all humans are at risk of these symptoms.

Exposure to blue-green algae may be fatal to pets.

Weather and wind conditions can cause algae blooms to move from one location in the lake to another. As such, this advisory will remain in effect for Mink Lake, until further notice.

Please note that areas of Mink Lake in which the bluegreen algae bloom is NOT visible can still be used for recreational purposes, even while this blue-green algae Health Advisory is in place.

SIMPLE WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR PANTRY

People have been spending more time at home in 2020 than in years past, and certain projects around the house have become a priority. One home improvement idea that serves the double benefit of creating organization and making cooking at home more efficient is to reimagine

the kitchen pantry.

A pantry is a room or closet where food, beverages and linens or dishes are stored. Pantries can be highly useful spaces that provide ancillary storage in kitchens. Many modern homes are equipped with pantries, but older homes may require

some modification to create more useful pantries. Whether starting from scratch or modifying an existing pantry, these tips can help projects go more smoothly.

• Maximize vertical storage. Utilizing vertical areas can help increase storage capacity. Build in extra nooks by investing in undershelf storage baskets. These baskets can instantly create designated areas for different types of ingredients. Homeowners also can look for ways to use the inside of cabinet doors or add extra shelves on walls or in eaves.

• Consider your needs. Figure out which items you would like to store in the pantry and then shop for corresponding storage systems. For example, storage solutions may feature wine bottle racks, baskets for potatoes and other produce, shelving for small appliances, and even pull out racks for baking pans or cutting boards.

• Use clear storage. Put ingredients in clear, airtight containers of similar dimensions so that you can easily find items you need. Transfer bulky items, like cereals and baking supplies, to storage containers for uniformity.

• Store bulk items elsewhere. Bulk shopping can be cost-efficient, but bulk items can quickly eat up real estate in the pantry. Designate another area for non-perishable bulk products, like paper goods or canned items, such as in a garage or utility room.

• Pull out drawers are convenient. Pull-out drawers can reduce the need to seek and reach for items. These drawers conveniently roll out so items in the back can be accessed without disturbing foods in the front. Drawers can be custom built for any pantry space.

• Make it accessible. Think about who will be taking items from the pantry. Put children's snacks on the bottom pantry shelf where they can reach them, and then organize other shelves for adults in the home.

A pantry remodel can add valuable storage space and make one of the busiest rooms in the house operate more efficiently.



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UNDERSTANDING R-VALUES

Insulation recommendations are based on certain factors that coordinate with regional climate zones to increase energy efficiency. These factors are known as R-values. The R in R-value stands for "resistance," and refers to how certain products resist the flow of heat through walls, floors and ceilings. Products should reduce heat escape so heat is kept on the right side of


the wall. In summer this means outdoors, in winter it means indoors. R-values relate not only to insulation, but also to walls, windows and other barriers. R-values also coordinate to the type, thickness and density of the material being used. The higher the R-value, the more resistant to heat the product is. The U.S. Department of Energy coordinates R-value to climate zones

1 through 7 (1: Tip of Florida; 7: Canadian border). A higher R-value is needed in Zone 7 and a lower R-value is necessary in Zone 1. Those embarking on home improvement projects that

involve choosing between R-values are urged to speak with a professional or to visit the Department of Energy website (www.energy.gov) to determine which R-Value is ideal for their homes.













HOME BUYING DURING THE

Homeowners know that the process of buying a home can be both exciting and nervewracking. The

anxiety associated buying a home has hit new heights during the outbreak of the novel coronavirus

Historically low interest rates and limited inventory has made 2020 an especially unique time to buy a home. It's also a competitive and potentially expensive time to buy a home. While the economic consequences of COVID-19 have been severe, the Federal National Mortgage Association, also known as Fannie Mae, forecasted a significant increase in median home prices in March 2020. home tours had declined sharply. While 98 percent of realtors reported taking clients on home tours as recently as February, that number had declined to 63 percent by April. As many regions pause their reopening plans, prospective home buyers should ready themselves for virtual tours as opposed to in-person home tours.

• Expect limited inventory. While home prices are up, many people are holding onto their homes. The NAR reports that total housing inventory at the end of May 2020 was down nearly 19 percent from the end of May 2019. Buyers will have less inventory to choose from, so those intent on buying

may need to prioritize what they need in a home and focus on finding properties that can fulfill those needs.

• Expect to move quickly. Realtors have seen homes sell within days of being listed, and that has put pressure on buyers to move quickly. It also highlights the importance of finding a home inspector before your search begins as well as a lender who can handle quick closings. Ask around for recommendations, but make sure you have these two important professionals lined up before beginning your search. Doing so will give you a better chance of buying in an unusual time.

· Make the best down pay-

ment you can afford. A high down payment makes buyers look better no matter the state of the economy. An offer with a high down payment looks like a stronger offer, and that can make the difference between winning and losing a potential bidding war.

Buying a home during the COVID-19 outbreak presents some unique challenges to prospective buyers.



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

5 TIPS TO PREPARE FOR WINDOW REPLACEMENT

Winter is coming, and for millions of people who reside in areas of the country that see the mercury drop considerably between December and March, that means prioritizing staying warm. Inefficient or aging housing materials may compromise your ability to do just that.

Drafts from doors, poorly protected attics and basements and aging windows may force heating systems to work extra hard to maintain interior temperatures.

Replacing old windows can make a home quieter by blocking out exterior noises. Consumer Reports also notes that new windows are often easier to clean and maintain than older varieties. 1. Get several estimates. Ask for recommendations from neighbors or other people in your area on which companies they used to install their replacement windows. When you interview the prospects, ask several questions about how they go about installing the windows. Questions can include:

- How long will the project take?
- Will I need to remain home during the process?
- Do you discard of old debris?
- · What is the protocol for

installation during inclement weather?

2. Research permits. Most home renovation projects need to be approved by the local municipality. Go to the permit office and find out the requirements. Some window contractors will include securing permits in the cost of the project. After the project is completed, an inspector will come by and ensure the work was done according to code.

3. Change up the appearance. Look at the type of hardware you have around the home and other fixtures. Choose windows that have locks or latches that can match those features for continuity of style. Think about choosing a different style or frame color of the window, or a different type of window to improve efficiency and function.

4. Research top window man-

ufacturers. It's tempting to purchase windows based on price alone, but replacement windows are often a decision that only has to be made once or twice for the life of the home. Invest in durable windows that will have staying power. Consumer Reports offers unbiased reviews on various window brands and can help homeowners make sound decisions.

5. Prepare for installation. Clear pathways, remove window treatments and disconnect window alarm systems. Plan for one to two days of installation, advises Andersen Windows and Doors. Keep pets and children away from work areas.

Replacement windows can be a smart investment. New windows can improve the look of a home, reduce heating costs and can keep interior spaces comfortable.

All supplies will be distributed to school authorities by the beginning of the 2020-21 school year. Authorities will then distribute to individual schools, staff and/or students based on the needs of their own communities.

Provincial health guidance for a safe return to school will continue to evolve as necessary to reflect the latest evidence on the nature of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Individual school authorities are developing returnto-school plans that meet the needs of their own communities. These plans are based on direction provided under the provincial school re-entry plan, and supporting health guidance documents.

Alberta's Recovery Plan is a bold, ambitious long-term strategy to build, diversify, and create tens of thousands of jobs now. By building schools, roads and other core infrastructure we are benefiting our communities. By diversifying our economy and attracting investment with Canada's most competitive tax environment, we are putting Alberta on a path for a generation of growth. Alberta came together to save lives by flattening the curve and now we must do the same to save livelihoods, grow and thrive.

Quick facts

• Alberta's government announced students and staff would return to school under scenario 1 – near-normal daily operations with health measures – on July 21.

• School authorities are required to be prepared to move between the three scenarios outlined in the provincial school re-entry plan. Changes to scenarios will be determined by Alberta Education.

A MESSAGE FROM MLA MARK SMITH

In the 2019 Provincial Election the United Conservative Party ran on a platform of reducing government spending by trying to find about 3 cents of savings for every dollar spent by the government. The debt under the previous government had grown to close to \$63 billion dollars, the economy was in a recession and who ever was elected was going to have to start to address the debt and government spending. Between finding efficiencies and growing the economy the UCP government believed it could eventually have a balanced budget and then begin looking at how best to reduce the debt that the government had accrued.

Alberta has been hit especially hard by the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, the oil price crash and an already weakened economy. On August 27, 2020 the Minister of Finance presented Albertans with a provincial update and the fiscal reality that Albertans must now face is serious indeed. Here are some of the numbers you need to know:

Revenue is down

- Resource revenue has dropped drastically to \$1.2 billion a \$3.9 billion decrease.
- Bitumen royalties of \$686 million are forecast, \$2.5 billion lower.
- Personal income tax revenue is forecast at \$10.7 billion a \$1.9 billion decrease.
- Corporate income tax is forecast at \$2.1 billion which is \$2.4 billion lower.
- Total Revenue is projected to be \$38.4 billion a decline of \$11.5 billion or 23% from Budget 2020.

The Deficit and Debt are up

• The yearly deficit

now sits at \$24.2 billion – \$16.8 billion higher than estimated in Budget 2020.

- Alberta now faces a debt burden of \$99.6 billion, or \$22,400 per Albertan.
- Interest payments on the debt have increased by \$21 million and is a net \$154 million higher.
- The Economy is struggling

 Manufacturing
 shipments and goods exports are down 20%.
- Non-Energy exports are down more than

10%

- Drilling rig activity is down nearly 80% on a year to year basis.
- Investment in oil and gas extraction is forecast to fall by over \$8 billion or more than 30%.

When the Premier told Albertans that a time of economic reckoning was coming he was not exaggerating. Albertans have not faced these kinds of economic times since the "Great Depression". But we are not

without hope! Albertans are a hard-working, entrepreneurial people who are prepared to pull together, address the problems set before them and work to overcome our challenges. That was the message of the Finance Minister in his update to Albertans. We will face the challenges, we will work towards living within our means and we will work hard to grow the economy and provide a pathway of hope for all Albertans.
